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SOMETHING POSITIVE

Captain of School, David Ransom, examines student attitudes.

In recent years much has been written and said about the issues of student attitudes. This school is no exception, and it is a good and necessary thing that we examine ourselves.

There are two main areas in this matter which we should do something about. These are student-teacher relationships and the relationship between the students themselves.

The relationship between the student and teacher within the classroom cannot: be readily changed, but there could be a definite improvement in the relationship outside the classroom. Boys are often indifferent or even antagonistic towards masters. There is a need to know the master more as a person and less as a disciplinarian. Students rarely talk to masters on an informal basis. If this was done many of the problems which result from a lack of communication and therefore a lack of understanding could be readily solved.

I would like next to deal with the relationship between the main group of boys and the student who does not appear to 'fit in'. In any community there are bound to be a few people who do not conform to the accepted behaviour patterns of the rest. Within the school, there is a tendency to ridicule these boys and sometimes this is carried to extreme lengths. There are boys who seem to derive great satisfaction from belittling a student who is in some way different. Derisive comments are made on the pretext of being funny but usually all that is achieved is that the object of this 'wit' becomes miserable.

It could be argued that this type of behaviour goes on in every school, but this does not mean it should go unchecked; and much of it can and should be checked by those students who know it is wrong but do nothing to prevent it.

Lastly I feel that there is an increasing need to meet people from other schools, other than on the sporting field. An attempt was made this year to organize several inter-school social events but none of these eventuated. The objectives are worth pursuing.

In all cases what is needed, I feel, is a more positive attitude and some positive action.



MOTHER TO NINE HUNDRED

After eighteen years as Housemother of Romsey, Miss Muriel Heales, one of the School's best known members is retiring. Reg Meyer now in fifth year offers a few reminiscences and on behalf of many boys, a vote of thanks.

There are very few boarders at Christ Church who have not had the 'Miss Heales experience'. In fact, Miss Heales calculates that she has mothered almost nine hundred boys and watched them grow up in the school — quite an impressive compromise for someone who has not had a family of her own.

Perhaps the reason for Miss Heales' success is the fact that she possesses all the qualifications and requirements of a Housemother: a constant supply of biscuits, an inexhaustible stock of 'spare' hankies, socks and the oddments of clothing which boys tend to lose, and, above all, the ability to sympathise with the adolescent point of view in every conflict.

It's no mean task to be a 'mother away from mother', but Miss Heales says she wouldn't have had it any other way. The ironical thing is, however, that she might never have taken the job on at all. "All my friends said I wouldn't last a month, but I told Mr. Moyes I would give it a go for a term." An eighteen year term in fact during which time Miss Heales has been an indispensible part of Romsey House and is just as active today as she was when she first came.

"If it wasn't for my knees, I'd stay and outlive the lot of you," is an oft-heard remark, and, "get your hands out of the biscuit-tin— I've been here since long before you were born, and I know all your tricks," was the typical admonishment to which we listened as we dipped our hands into the tin of gingersnaps—conveniently placed.

And so, Miss Heales, from nine-hundred who have had 'the experience' best wishes for a long and happy retirement and . . . thank you.

Although we were lacking in individual stars we put in a much greater effort than ever before and, this enabled us to function as a better team. In the many weeks of dedicated training a unity grew within the team. Our coach Mr. Bowker built upon this unity until we were very strong, not only physically, but in spirit as well.

With only one week to go before the Inters we entered our strongest team in the Quadrangular Sports — which we comfortably won by 44 points from Wesley.

A Lack of Strength at the Top

We shocked all those who take an interest in Darlot Cup cricket by defeating Hale by an innings and 24 runs in the first match of the season. Good performances were recorded by Nott and Kay in the batting, while Meikle took 5 for 25. Dave Meager gave a brilliant display of inswing bowling in taking 8 for 31 in the second innings.

Unfortunately we weren't capable of continuing in this vain as the next week Trinity reversed the result. We lost many early wickets very cheaply and the middle and later order batsmen had to face up to fresh, inspired and accurate bowling with an unblemished ball.

The first innings against Scotch was a repeat of the previous week, but in the second innings the batsmen showed more application.

At Guildford we were completely outclassed and this was magnified when easy catches were spilled.

After the game against Wesley was abandoned we met Aquinas on a sticky wicket which should have been to our advantage as we were a bowling side. However our batting failed dismally and we lost outright. Meager

again returned very good figures with 6 for 49, and Nott batted extremely well in the second innings for 49 not out.

We lost four out of five matches in the Darlot Cup competition basically because our batting was weak and our catching ability was below First Eleven standard.

David Meager was the outstanding fast bowler in Darlot Cup this year, and he led an adequate division.

The depth of cricket ability in fourth and fifth year this year was the lowest for many years. Fortunately there are many enthusiastic boys at present in second and third year to compete for places next year.

More work needs to be done in the basic skills of the game, especially in the preparatory and middle school. Fundamentals such as grip of the bat, defensive shots on the front and back foot must be developed well before a cricketer reaches the First Eleven.

On behalf of all players I'd like to thank Mr. House for his efforts in his hard job as coach. A special thanks must also go to the ladies who prepared the lunches and afternoon teas and to the boys who assisted with the scoring.

THE ALCOCK CUP.

The following week we were due to play Hale, the pre-season favourites for the cup, in the first official match. Two new players were included and some positional changes were made. It was Aquinas who finally cracked under the pressure and although we had three players crippled by cramp, the team forced the ball forward to see Ian Avery goal and put us in front. Following this, for the final five minutes of the game, our half-forwards sprayed the goals and we won 11-16 to 11-6. We thus had the Cup in our possession for the very first time.



Music 1971

The two most important developments in the Music Department this year have been the institution of lessons on string instruments at Grade 4 level in the Preparatory School, and the amalgamation with Methodist Ladies College from First Year, so that we now have jointly a first orchestra of 45, a second orchestra of 30, and a Prep. School orchestra of 25. This gives a fair opportunity for future development. Next year there will also be a Wind Orchestra of 50.

At present there are 40 boys learning String Instruments, 60 Wind Instruments, 28 the Piano, and 8 learning the Organ, also two groups of Guitar players. In August, three evening concerts were presented in conjection with M.L.C., consisting of the following works: Britten's opera 'The Little Sweep', Minuet & Trio from Schubert's 5th Symphony, orchestral suite from 'The Beggar's Opera', Haydn's 'Toy Symphony', Mozart's Contradance for Wind Orchestra and Six Marches for Wind by C.P.E. Bach.

On 5th December the first orchestra and the choirs of M.L.C. and Christ Church will perform Schubert's 'Mass in F', Pastoral Symphony and Chorale from Bach's 'Christmas Oratoria', Trumpet Concerto with String Orchestra by Handel, 'Greensleeves', three Sinfonias for Brass and Organ by Monteverdi and 'Jesu Joy of Man's Desiring' by Bach.

Plans for 1972 include the formation of a Music Club.



In concluding, it could be said, those cadets, who didn't enjoy their year should have made more of their opportunities.



SOCIAL SERVICE

Again our most consistent and most rewarding activity has been the weekly visits to the Lucy Creeth Hospital.

We have found by experience that this can most successfully be carried out by a select few who are best able to establish rapport with the patients and to organize their own roster and transport.

For most of the year a second group assisted at the Claremont Hospital where the pastoral centre was trying to build up a library. Here too a small group who were self-sufficient proved to be the most effective.

Once more we supplied collectors for the Red Cross Door Knock Appeal in March, and then were asked to assist the Salvation Army in its Red Shield Appeal. This involved us in far more organization as it was run from the school. In August we provided a rostered group of street collectors to help the Royal Life Saving Society.

Altogether, the money raised by the boys on these occasions plus the amounts from our own collections within the school, totalled something like \$3,000 - solid support for the various charities.

FILM SOCIETY

This is essential when it is considered that the average boy in Australia watches over 18 hours of films on television every week.

With our world being increasingly dominated by the projected image rather than the printed word, UNESCO'S study of 'The Media and the Rights of the Child' (1963) is relevant. There it is asserted that screen education is the most effective way of helping young people cope with the 20th century.

Films from Japan, England, Russia, Italy, U.S.A., Cuba, India, France and Australia have been shown. Attendance has generally been very good, although films with foreign sound tracks and subtitles have not appealed to the boys very much. However, appreciation of different and complex films is a slow process. For this reason discussions were very limited until the end of the year unfortunately, and magazines and printed notes provided most of the follow up material. However, discussions must become an integral part of the Society's activities. With the experience gained this year, our Society should be very productive next year.

This year's committee of Bassett, Caddy, Christie, Fagan, Grigg, Lemann, McGibbon, Pearse, Rose and Sloan, along with O'Dea, Stein and Herman as First, Second and Third year representatives deserve to be congratulated for the results their hard work has achieved.

PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB.



It is also reflected in the increasing size of the teams we enter in competitive events and in the fact that Christ Church has won the Royal Life Saving Society's award for the school making the greatest contribution to Life Saving for three out of the four years in which the pennant has been given in this State.

This year for the first time we conducted an inter-house life saving carnival, a highly successful event in which a great many boys took part. From these competitors we selected the largest single representation ever to compete in the Royal Life Saving State Championships at Beatty Park. While the team produced no outstanding performances it filled many places. Best prospects for the future seem to lie with the Junior boys as our under thirteen and under fourteen team finished second to a very strong Guildford team.

At this event, Malcolm McGibbon and Garry Pallot defended their State titles in the Chambers Cup and Australia Cup events respectively but both lost to Simon Martin, one of our younger Old Boys.

Garry Pallot, the team captain won selection for the State team which competed in the Australian Championships in Queensland in January. A pleasing feature of this team of six was that three were Christ Church students, past and present.

In the two other main events, in which we competed for the Law Shield and the McFarlane Cup (open and under sixteen rescue events) we were beaten by strong teams.

Essentially life saving is a community service and with this ideal in mind we have continued to preserve a balance between competition and wide student participation.

The Preparatory School

At the start of the year Mr. Dowson joined the Senior School and Mrs. R. Mortlock came to us to take charge of the Copper class. 281 boys fronted up for the first day of the year and a further ten have joined us since. Altogether 1971 has been a happy and productive year with several successful innovations.

One important change concerns the Mitre and the Preparatory School contributions to it. Last year the 'Prep. Paper' provided an avenue for the literary and artistic efforts of the students. Copy was provided from all classes and the production was in the hands of the Grade 7 students. This year the 'Prep. Paper' was continued, at first by the Grade 7 boys, but more recently by the Grade 6's. This freed the Grade 7 editorial staff, who had had the experience of producing the cyclostyled newspaper, to bring out a printed Preparatory School Magazine geared for young readers. Under the guidance of Mr. Matthews, the boys have produced the first edition of 'Freshwater'. Apart from being a record of student efforts, this has given the boys total experience in magazine production. They planned the thing themselves, chose and rejected copy, organized the artisic work and the layout, and even did the actual typing of the stories and poems themselves. So it can be said honestly that 'Freshwater' is the boys' own magazine, and the boys concerned deserve praise for launching this new venture. With its introduction the Preparatory School lieterary contributions to the 'Mitre' have been discontinued. 'Freshwater' has already stimulated interest in the reporting of events, and the writing of poems and stories, and this has brought a purposeful approach to creative writing throughout the school.

This year has seen also our first step in film-making in the Preparatory School with another group of Grade 7 students. Using their own ideas, a tape recorder and an 8-millimetre movie camera the boys began this venture early in Third Term. They soon found it necessary to do a good deal of research into camera techniques, script writing, film editing and so on, so another very useful and productive activity was the outcome. In this sort of project the end product is incidental to the activities related to it. The important thing is that a number of students have had real experience in this very important medium of communication. Their minds and their imaginations have been engaged and extended.

During Second Term the Preparatory School Orchestra gave us its first 'recital' by playing for a hymn during the morning Chapel Service. Since then it has practiced hard, and performed during a concert at Wesley College, and several of its members have given instrumental items in the chapel from time to time. It has taken a good deal of patient instruction and guidance to get to this stage, and this is just the beginning. It is expected that through the choir and the orchestra, music will play an increasing part in our day to day school life in future.

1971 has been an active year in the sense that the boys have taken more direct responsibility for the various projects undertaken. In most cases the boys themselves have provided the initiative, and the outcome has been all the better for this, but activity has also been stimulated by prizes provided for Art by Mrs. J. Dowson and for Australian history projects by Mr. Peter Dodds. A prize has also been endowed by the parents of last years P1 class in memory of Kim Morrison who was accidentally drowned. It is to be awarded to the boy who has made an outstanding contribution to the work of the Preparatory School library.

We are very grateful to them for their continued interest in the Preparatory School.




INTER-SCHOOL ATHLETICS.






