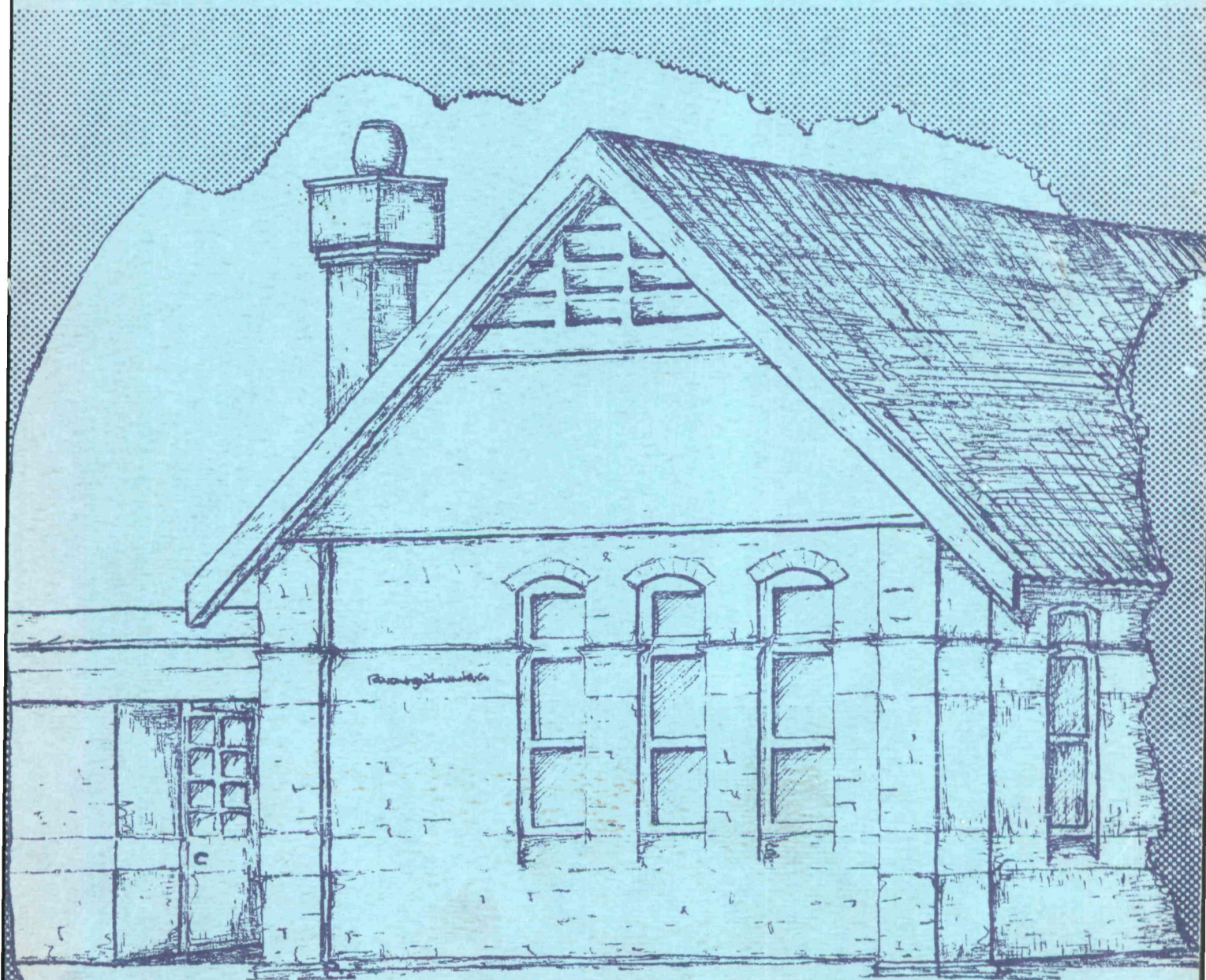

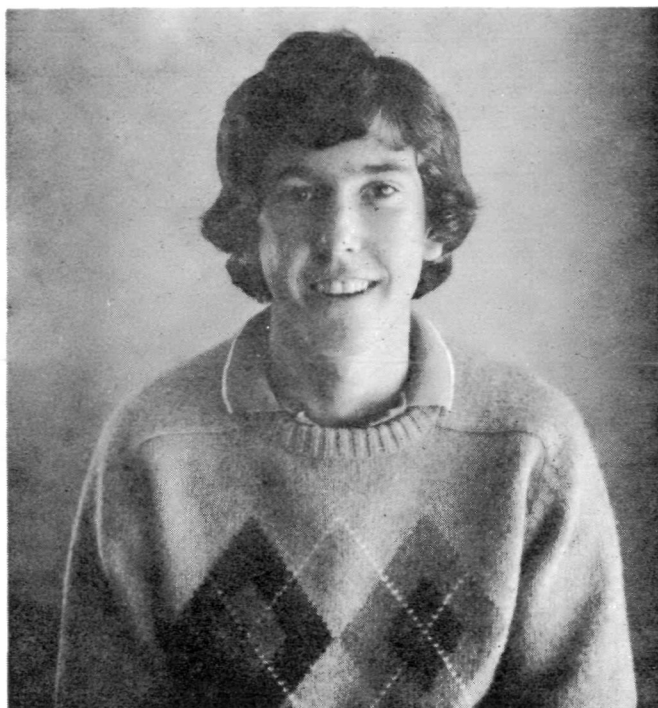

THE BROOKING MANUAL ARTS CENTRE

On the last day of School Term, August 24th., a gathering from all branches of the School community enjoyed a short ceremony in which Mr. Peter Jones, the Minister for Education, named the Brooking Manual Arts Centre.

Amongst the guests, we were delighted to see Mrs. Brooking and members of her family, and they heard Mr. Jones pay tribute to the late Mervyn Brooking, and to his life of service to others.

Mr. Mervyn Brooking attended Christ Church in its earliest days and soon showed a considerable talent in the sporting field. He played for the State, as a schoolboy, in soccer and in his early years was a champion motor cycle rider. He excelled in hockey, becoming an A grade player for Perth and later transferring to the Old Boys and helping attain A1 status. He captained the State hockey team.

He was a foundation Old Boy and a member of the Committee of the first Old Boys' Association, and here he built up an imposing record of service, holding at different times, all offices including that of President.

His interest in the School and its development never flagged and he gave generously to the War Memorial Fund in the early 1950's. In November 1956 he provided the funds to purchase the school's first rowing eight which he asked to be named W.J. McClellans after his first headmaster. When he died in 1971 he remembered the school in his Will and so greatly assisted in its planning and development.

He was, of course, well known for his connection with the motor firm that he founded and which bears his name, and for his interest in the automotive and motor cycle industries and motor safety, so that it is particularly appropriate that the building which will be devoted to Manual Arts, engineering and automobile mechanics, should be named after him.

The School can be particularly proud of its efforts in producing this new facility, for although it is housed in the oldest buildings on the site, these have been, in the words of the Acting Chairman, Mr. Roger Price, "recycled" so as to be a most valuable addition to the school's educational resources. It has been a self-help project, for the work has been carried out by boys, who carted 217 yards of filling by wheelbarrow, and by the maintenance staff of the school under the direction of Mr. Scott, with the Bursar and School Architect supervising.

The building now contains, in addition to the art room and toilet block constructed earlier, facilities for a full range of arts and crafts, woodwork, technical drawing, benchwork, oxy acetylene welding, electric arc welding and automotive mechanics.

New courses will be offered to students at all secondary levels, and a new teacher has been added to the Manual Arts Staff, so that students will be able to take

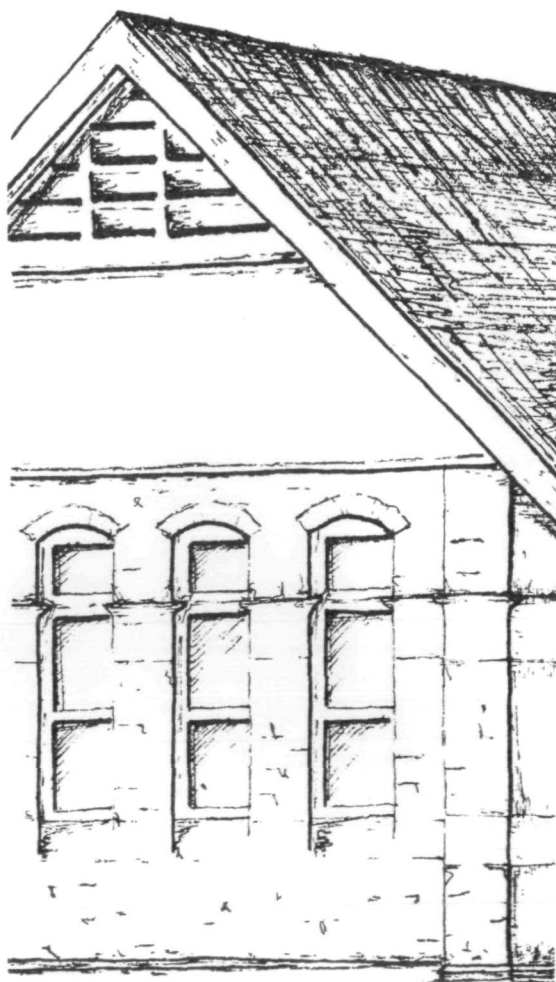
the fullest advantage of the facilities provided. Of particular interest will be the courses, at Year 11 and Year 12, in Industrial Engineering, covering four main areas; engineering: benchwork: machine shop and benchwork: and automotive mechanics.

Other additions will be a course for the older boys of the Special Education Centre, and woodwork for the Year 7 boys of the Preparatory School.

The School has long been concerned with a need to provide instruction in these areas for those thinking of taking up apprenticeships in the skilled trades, those returning to family properties, as well as to those interested in architecture, fine art, engineering and leisure pursuits in these fields, and the new centre will go a long way towards seeing these aims fulfilled.

Those who took the opportunity to view the centre when it was open after the ceremony, will have formed an excellent idea of its potential value to the School, and no doubt many others will do so as the occasion arises. As to the students that pass through its doors, it is to be hoped that not just a few of them will have the curiosity to ask about the man whose name it bears, and strive to follow the fine example his life so clearly gave.

KOORINGAL

This edition of "Mitre" marks the second year of the full time operation of Koorinal, our "Home by the water". During that time 582 students, parents and staff visited the school camp in 1976 and 537 in 1977, a total of 1,119 not taking into account those pioneer groups who assisted in developing the camp prior to 1976 and these include the fathers of The Koorinal Club, the Preparatory School classes and a number of Biology, Geography and Prefects groups.

These years have also taught a number of lessons to staff and students alike in the areas of administrative logistics and the best utilisation of the camp and district facilities and it seems that this will continue as each visit gives breath to a new development or activity. Class groups visiting the camp remain in residence for an average of three days with study programmes centred on area geography, biology, ecology and environmental studies and including bushcraft survival, map and compass work relative to their year of study.

1977 saw the broadening of this scope of activities to include the Adventure Units, Junior and Senior Leadership course, to which two outside cadet units were invited, a detailed riverine environmental study a German camp (complete with appropriate menu), a fathers and sons week-end, a Preparatory School class group and parents visit, a week-end with the boarders of McClemans house in residence, two visits by the Special Education Centre and a comprehensive study by Year 12 students of the geographical and historical aspects of the district, ranging from the camp through to Dwellingup and on to Pinjarra and Mandurah.

Each group to visit Koorinal is urged to make some small contribution to camp development and this has resulted in improved drainage and site development, construction of additional teaching and leisure facilities, better protection from fire and general camp maintenance. Experience has shown that groups delight in their second and subsequent visits to the camp to see how their contribution is being utilised.

It is felt that the scope of activities will continue to develop and there seems no reason, providing current transport difficulties can be overcome, that day study tours of the local forestry, timber and aluminium industries cannot be made in the future, using Koorinal as a base. The popularity of the camp motivates students to work, and work willingly, at their study and leisure programmes for upwards of ten hours a day. This means of course that three-days at Koorinal on a well prepared programme is equivalent to five days in the classroom.

As an observer who has seen school groups of almost all ages at The Camp undergoing study programmes of a very wide range, I feel secure in saying that Koorinal is a success and that after two years full time operation we are only starting to probe the academic and youth development potential of the venture.

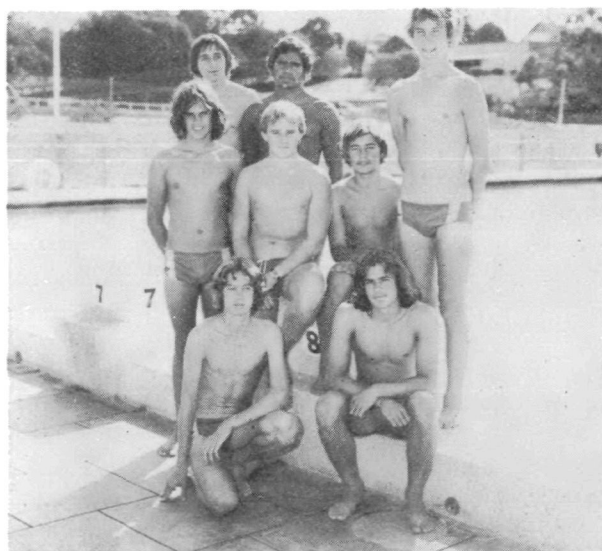

The swimming officials were elected late in Third Term last year in order that some organisation could be got under way and training could begin during the final weeks of the Christmas vacation.

With the assistance of Old Boys - Glen Koski, Simon and Peter Martin, Michael Halliday, Malcolm McGibbon and Victor Raeburn, training was put on a much more personal scale with small specialised groups training with their respective coaches. The groups were brought together as a unified team under the guidance of Mr. Bowker.

Training was fairly well attended and the small carnivals and competitions created a break from the routine at the same time building up spirit.

The Quads. were once again held at Wesley and provided us with some idea of the competition we were to face at the P.S.A. Inters. The results were somewhat heartening with our defeat of Trinity. Yet it was evident that Wesley was to have a stronger team than we could field.

Hale once again dominated the Inters, and once again Scotch put up the only strong opposition.

Throughout the evening we were consistent and even though we did not obtain a first place in any of the events, we were able to hold Guildford and Trinity at bay and spent most of the evening only a few points behind Aquinas.

Walsh for winning the Open Championship and to the other age group champions, Under 16 - A.D.J. Smith, Under 15 - D. Huntley, Under 14 - A.N. King, Under 13 - R. Cullingford.

In conclusion I would like to put on record the team's gratitude to all those people who helped in the organisation and coaching, with special thanks to Mr. Bowker for his untiring dedication.

LIFESAVING

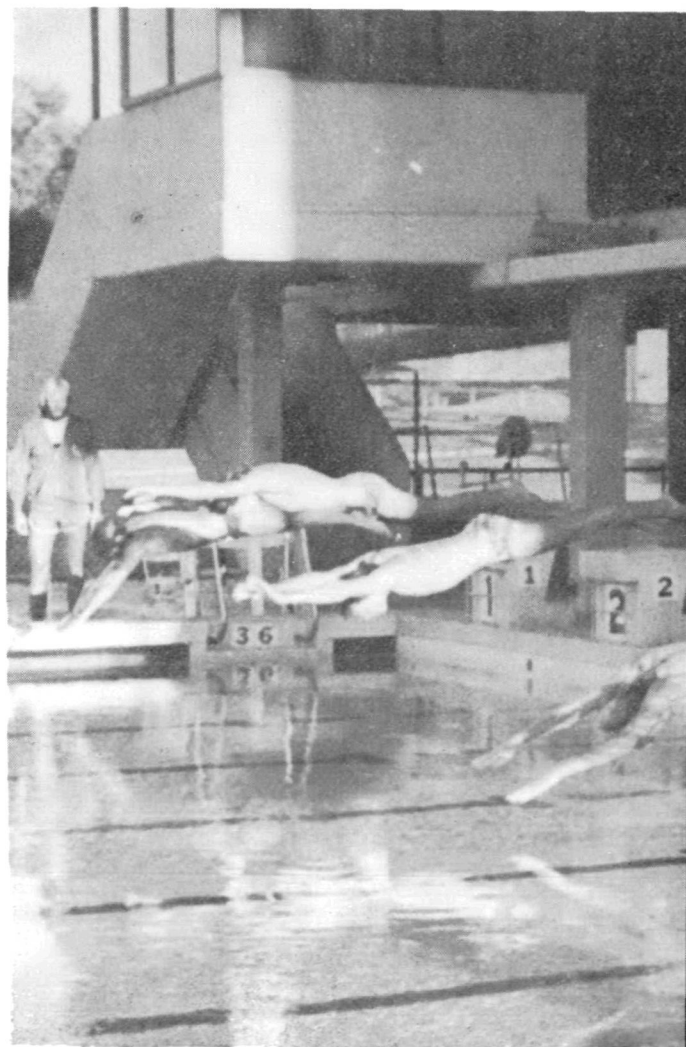
The duties of the school's qualified lifesavers begin in the last week of October when the pool is opened for swimming and continue through to the end of April.

W.H. Breidahl Apart from Bill, the squad was entirely composed of Year 12 players, while he has two more seasons ahead of him. A left arm spin bowler ready to bowl round or over the wicket and maintain extreme accuracy combined with subtle variety, Bill Breidahl was, after Sheppard of Wesley, the most successful bowler in the competition.

C.D. Turner A Somewhat unorthodox batsman with little back lift, Clive nevertheless hit the ball extremely hard and played 3 sterling cup match innings including a century against Hale after going in at 4 for 44 and having scored a duck in his previous knock. A very safe catch in the deep.

C.T. Lewis Each time he batted he looked better and no one who saw his incredible 69 not out in the fading light on the 2nd of April 1977 will ever forget it. A magnificent fielder and potentially good late inswing bowler.

R.N. McNeil A sound number 3 batsman and safe first slip, Richard played no small part in bringing the cup to Christ Church. Particularly memorable were his fifties against Hale (in Third Term) and Trinity and his aggressive innings as required against Guildford. Possibly the most correct batsman in the side.

D.G. Stephenson A most reliable opening bowler who never let us down. A good fielder with an excellent arm he also looked a better batsman week by week and played a saving knock in partnership with Lewis against Scotch.

R.S. Wharton Left arm opening bowler who looked very dangerous on occasions.

J.S. Atkinson A fine hitter who helped Lewis put on 114 runs in 57 minutes to win the Darlot Cup. At all times an exceedingly keen player.

D.J. Grewar First change bowler who at times was quite quick. He played a great part in the final match.

A.M. Haslam A determined batsman and enthusiastic fielder who would have easily found a permanent berth in a less talented side.

B.D. Rillstone He played a magnificent 76 against Trinity in third term and is a very fine fielder. Like Andrew Haslam, Brian was unlucky not to be a regular member of the eleven.

U. Menon Eight of this squad were skippered by Uni Menon in the victorious First Year A side of 1973. As an all rounder of great potential he could go far.

A.G.H. Shilling Alan was very unlucky not to get a Darlot Cup game, as he is a medium pace bowler of great control and subtlety.

R.A. Norrie With Russell McKay not returning after Third Term we had no left hand batsman in the side. Ross almost filled this niche and as a good reserve wicket-keeper deserves mentioning as a great team man in this wonderful squad.

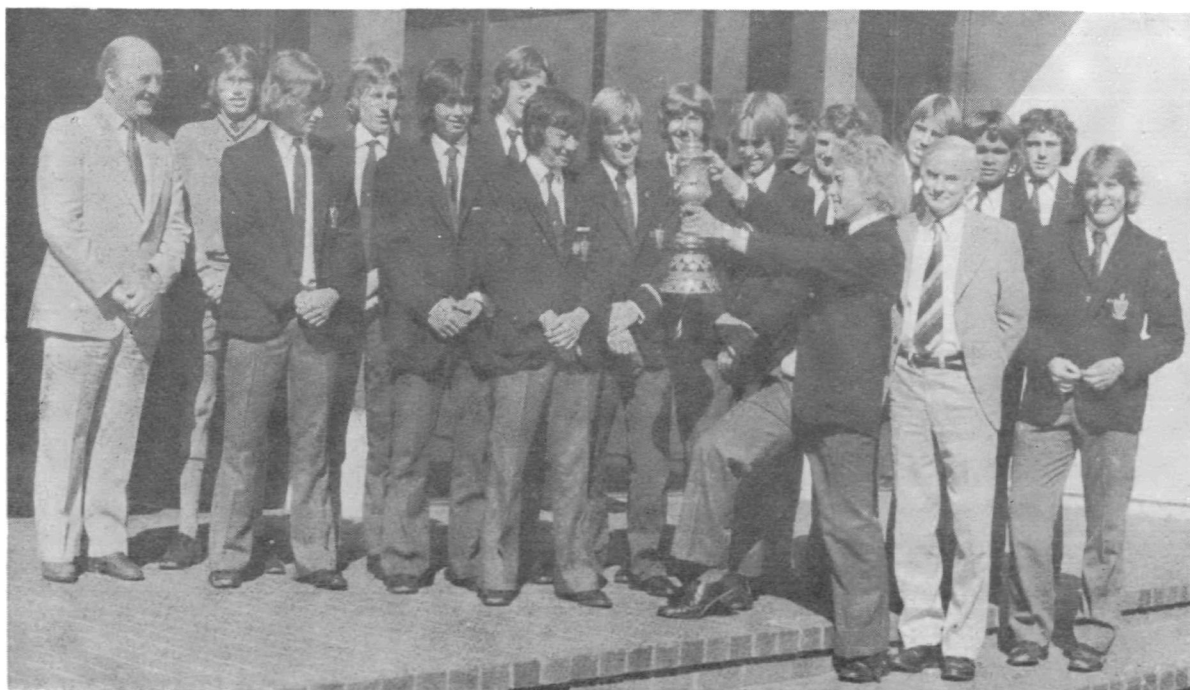

In second term we organized a Quiz Night which was a great success, raising \$150 for Parkerville Children's Home. We have assisted on Doorknocks and Street Appeals for Red Shield, Red Cross, Sister Kate's, Parkerville and donated to the Royal Life Saving Society. On one occasion we played postman for the Freedom from Hunger Campaign.

The Special Education Centre asked for help and members of year 10 recorded talking books which were of great use in the Centre.

THE TUCKSHOP

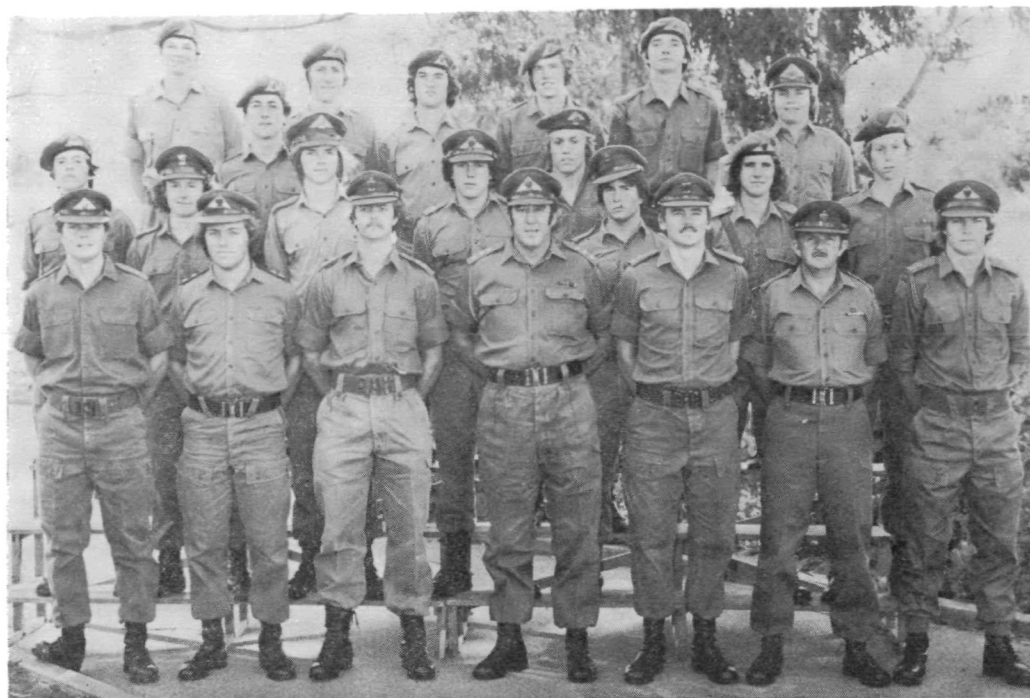

During the past year, the Cadet Unit went from strength to strength. We have turned the near death of two years into re-birth.

Home training started with a large group of new cadets, plus newly trained N.C.O.'s from a promotion course held at Koorinal in January. Basic drill was taught to A Company (the new cadets) as quickly as possible, so emphasis could be put on practical aspects, such as Orienteering, map reading, shooting with .22 rifles and first aid.

Meanwhile Support Company (senior cadets from years 11 and 12) learned the skills of Pioneer-Rescue, signals and canoeing.

A real highlight in the year came when, on March 14 the whole unit went by bus to Campbell Barracks to ride in the Iroquois, the standard helicopter in service at the moment. Divided into trips taking 11 cadets each time, everyone enjoyed a fairly brief but exhilarating ride over the Barracks and the sea.

Not long after came the Koorinal bivouac. This took place over the week end of 16th to 18th April. The two and a half days and two nights included one and a half days and a night on an inter-company tactical exercise. The bivouac also included lantern stalks, "hootchie" (tent) erecting competitions plus more food than even the boarders could eat - thanks to the planning of Capt. Fraser.

Back at school, home training continued, but now the emphasis was on attaining the standards of the Duke of Edinburgh award scheme, bronze for junior and silver for the senior cadets.

Also at around this time, nine lance corporals were promoted from the ranks of A Company.

Then at the end of August came the big event. From August 22nd to 29th the annual camp was held at the Northam Army Camp.

Highlights of the seven days were: the training and shooting with the self loading rifle, the current Service weapon; Support Company's flying fox and huge flagpole; the marked improvement in everyone's marching and drill; and most of all, the Duke of Edinburgh Award test expedition.

The expedition was held in the Northam - Toodyay area from Friday morning to Sunday lunchtime. The three A Company platoons patrolled the Avon River area between the two towns independently, and regarding each other as hostile. In addition, Support Company guerilla units code named "Panther" harrassed continually. The whole exercise, "Operation Swordfish" was quite as ambitious as anything that would be attempted by the Army Reserve. It went off with out a hitch. For supplies, Army one man ration packs were issued, and many a flour bomb

was thrown at an "enemy". Thanks must go to Lt. Tooke for his meticulous organisation of the exercise.

The camp was a tremendous success, and a fitting climax to a great year's activities.

Especial thanks must be given to the Officers who gave up their time for us, namely Capt. Fraser, Lts. Tooke, May, Brine, Williams and Rinch as well as the Head-

master for his enthusiastic interest. We are also pleased to welcome Lt. Tom Bradshaw, former S.A.S. cliff roping instruction who has just joined us.

If the spirit of '78 is as good as this year's, it is going to be an outstanding year.

CHORAL

THE SEA

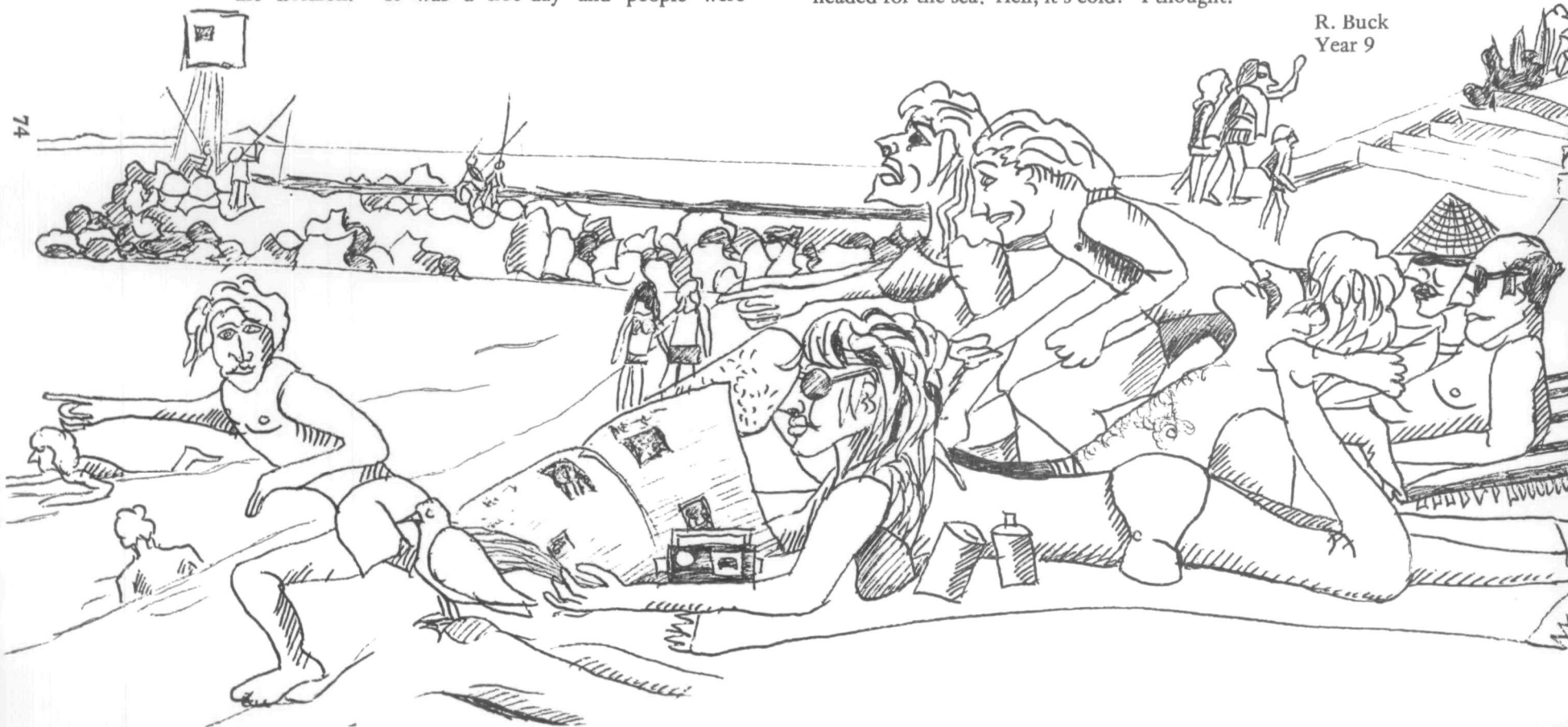

THE CATTLE YARD

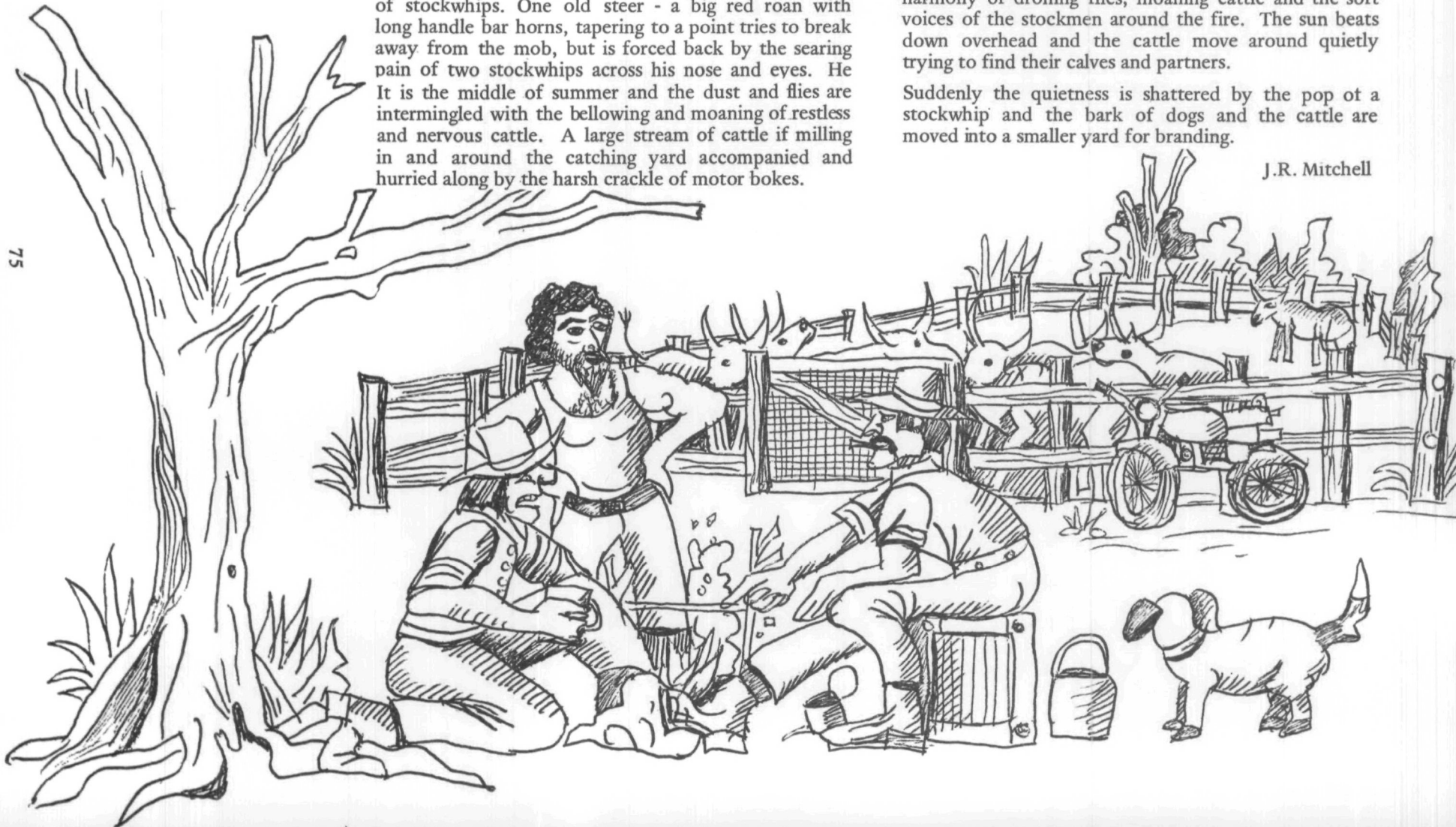

DECISION

It sounded like the swell was bigger than we had expected and I pondered over the fact that we might not be able to get our ballooned baits out from the bottom of the cliff and away from the influence of the surge.

The track suddenly opened up onto a wide expanse of rock which was slightly damp from the saturated atmosphere. Crevices ran parallel with the track along both sides of the rock and any slight depressions in the flat surface were filled with crusted salt. We put our tackle boxes and spare rods along the end of the track and took our heavy ballooning outfits and bait down to the edge of the rock. We then hooked up our life ropes round our waists and shackled them onto the steel pole cemented into the centre of the rock. The rope was an essential element of our fishing now, as a year ago one of our friends had been washed off the rock and drowned.

Baits were soon in the water and the swell didn't prove too much trouble so all of us got out baits about four hundred yards off. A container of liver and blood was emptied into the water and we prepared for a lengthy wait until a shark showed itself. The shark came about twenty minutes later and our minds were not on what we had come to do; it caught all of us unprepared. While we scampered around trying to get gaffs organized and pull in our rods, Doug. picked up his screaming rod and tightened up the drag. The line tightened and a consistent arch formed itself into the fibreglass stick. Doug. struck twice setting the hooks good and true. The fight was brief but powerful and the shark was soon rolling around at the base of the cliff. Doug. gave his rod to Bradley and got the cliff gaff. He attached about sixty feet of nylon rope to the gaff, shackled it onto the line and lowered it down to the apparently exhausted shark. I was standing about ten metres to Doug's right and I could only see a grey shape about ten feet long at the end of his line and the gaff head being lowered down his line.

The next thing I knew was that the water had exploded and spray was blurring my view of what was going on down there. Apparently when the gaff connected, the shark had taken a fit and headed off towards South Africa. Doug. didn't let go and was pulled off balance and down the cliff. His arms groped vainly, trying to get a hold on something, but there was nothing. He fell about twenty feet onto a ledge which was about ten metres off the water. His head torch lit up the ledge and I could see it was very narrow. He seemed to be unconscious but it was hard to tell as my torch was dimming. Someone had to do something so I went and grabbed Doug's life rope hoping it was still attached to his waist, however, it wasn't; he had taken it off to get the gaff. So I lowered myself over the edge and gradually down the cliff. When I was about ten feet away a wave rolled in and covered me with spray, I prayed that Doug might still be there when I looked down, but he was gone!

I swung round on the rope and saw his head torch bobbing around in the water about twenty yards away. What could I do? I could either try and swim to him (possibly not to return to the top of the cliff) or I could leave him. But wait, I might be able to get a rope to him. I called to the others to throw down a rope with a buoy on the end, meanwhile Doug floated further away. By the time I had the buoy and rope Doug's unconscious body was too far away and his head light was getting duller. His body was sinking.
