Bill Moran continued his sailing successes by winning the Little America's Cup for Australia.


Robert Cann and Kerry Harmanis represented the State at the Rugby Carnival in Adelaide.

The Headmaster writes on the threefold purpose of the Chapel

The Chapel is the meeting place for the School Community. In a world of 'High Rises', high speed machines, telephone, radio, television and large cities there has developed a growing insensi-tiveness and loss of identity. The sheer crush of people — a coagulation of humanity-has brought about a situation of loneliness and isolation and the sense of belonging has withered. Our dependence on mechanical means has led to an abandonment of some human values and to a decline in the importance of the human scale — the scale delineated by the senses such as seeing, hearing, feeling, and by the capacities to think and to will. Our Chapel is a place for worship to encourage all "to lift up their eyes to the hills". It is a place which is both a symbol and a reminder of the truth that everything human is theological -that is of the nature of God, and that the religious man is absolutely involved in the world. The Chapel in itself is an expression of the creative will in man and, in the belief that all good qualities are seen to come from God the creator, it is offered to Him, together with our own creative acts. Through it a philosophy of purpose is pursued: firstly, the purpose of developing a social conscience

in which there are deep and real relationships, relationships which may be costly in time, work and money, with emotional involvement and a real caring; secondly, the purpose of allowing, stimulating and encouraging individual minds and spirits to grow to their full stature.


The Pedication of the School Chapel

In this school and the Chapel we are concerned with the quality of life in which understanding, tolerance, humility

and compassion are opposed to ignorance, intolerance, arrogance and indifference through which fear, hate and violence erupt. In this 'quality of life' sensitivity, imagination, creativity, integrity in the search for truth, the pursuit of learning and growth of wisdom will lead to an awareness of God and his creation.

The concept of the Chapel may be explained diagrammatically with the Creator at the centre and through worship, education and a deep concern for others we search for an understanding of God's purpose.

Under the heading of worship would come the liturgical services, the creative acts of the architect, the sculptor, the artist, the organ builder and craftsmen in the building of the Chapel, and since then the music, the drama, the art and debating created and performed by mem-

bers of the school community. The second area is education. Through talks on conservation, vocations, Islam and other religions it is hoped that our understanding will grow and that ignorance and fear will decrease.

The third arrow indicates 'concern' for others and it demands a deep involvement if the underprivileged are to be assisted, if poverty is to be overcome and the fear of illness and old age is to be erased. This involvement leads us to Christ.

CHRIST CHURCH CHRONICLE

This concept is summed up in the prayer which was written for the Dedication Service:----

"Father, we pray for your blessing upon the threefold purpose of this Chapel:

That in worshipping we may feel ourselves called out to the source of all our creativity, even to you, O God, that in knowing you, we may come to know ourselves.

That in all that we do here we may be concerned to further the education of those entrusted to us.

That our compassion and concern for all men may be deepened as we learn that we are all brothers and children of one Father, even you, O God."

THE DEDICATION SERVICE

The Chapel, the second project in the plan for the development of the School, which was launched at the time of the Appeal in 1967, has become a reality very fittingly in the year of our diamond jubilee.

A section of the choir during the singing of one of the hymns.



CENTRE.-His Grace proceeds with the dedication accompanied by the Headmaster and the acting School Chaplain the Rev.


