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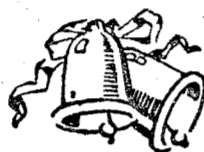
The football talents of Geoff Laurent and Rex Townsend have carried them to the top. Geoff is currently playing for Claremont and Rex for East Fremantle.

The Diamond Jubilee Year

1970 is our sixtieth anniversary and it is fitting that in this year the major occasion should be the dedication of the Chapel. In Second Term we are planning Jubilee Week, which will begin with a service of thanksgiving on Sunday evening, August 10th. During the week there will be a concert and play evening in the chapel, an "Open Day" for Parents and Old Boys, and the Jubilee Dinner.

To mark and record the events of the year there will be special issues of the Chronicle and in December the Jubilee edition of the Mitre. We plan to produce articles and photographs dealing with past events, Old Boys and staff, and to look into the future.

This is the first of such issues. The growth of the School is an interesting study for the enrolment figures indicate the slow development of the State of Western Australia and the lack of appreciation of the importance of secondary education. For instance, it was not till 1911 that Perth Modern School was founded and in the years up to the outbreak of the Second World War only five more five-year High Schools were established. The two World Wars, the Depression of the early 1930's, the changes of Headmaster and the management of Christ Church School are reflected in the figures. The following table makes an interesting study.

The enrolment figures presented in the following manner indicate the growth of secondary education. In Western Australia secondary enrolments have increased four-fold in the past twenty years but at Christ Church the increase has been five and a half times.

*The figures in brackets are the number of boys in the Senior School in 4th and 5th Years.

The increase in enrolments in the State is partly attributable to the increase in population but is also due to an increase of retention rates, that is, the "holding power" of schools. These undoubtedly reflect the increasing appreciation on the part of the community of the value of education and the improved economic conditions. It may be, too, that the vastly improved secondary school facilities and courses have had their influence.

The School was founded on 7th February, 1910, by Canon McClemons, who was Headmaster for the first six years. From 1917-1950 the Council for Church of England Schools was responsible for its management. In October, 1950, the Diocese of Perth decided that the schools, Guildford, St. Hilda's and Christ Church, should each have its own Council. In the twenty years since 1950 the Fellows of the Council have worked untiringly laying down policy, planning and developing the School. There have been three Chairmen only, namely, Mr. J. E. D. Battye, Mr. Justice Clarkson, and Mr. J. H. Lord, all Old Boys. Apart from the buildings, equipment and property the Council approved

a steady improvement in staff — pupil ratio. It is now slightly better than 1:17. It has supported and encouraged the appointment of well qualified and experienced staff and laid down the enrolment of the School under the present organisation of primary and secondary education in this State, namely, 270± in the Preparatory School and 600± in the Senior.

Quite apart from the achievements in games, music, art and crafts and many specialist areas, the Council can take some satisfaction in the academic results of the School for indeed they are the result of its endeavours and forward looking policy. This final table illustrates the academic achievements over the past ten years.

The matriculation pass rate has been 70 per cent. or better in recent years (State pass rate approximately 49%) and in the ten years, 1960-1969, one in every two boys who matriculated received a Commonwealth University Scholarship.

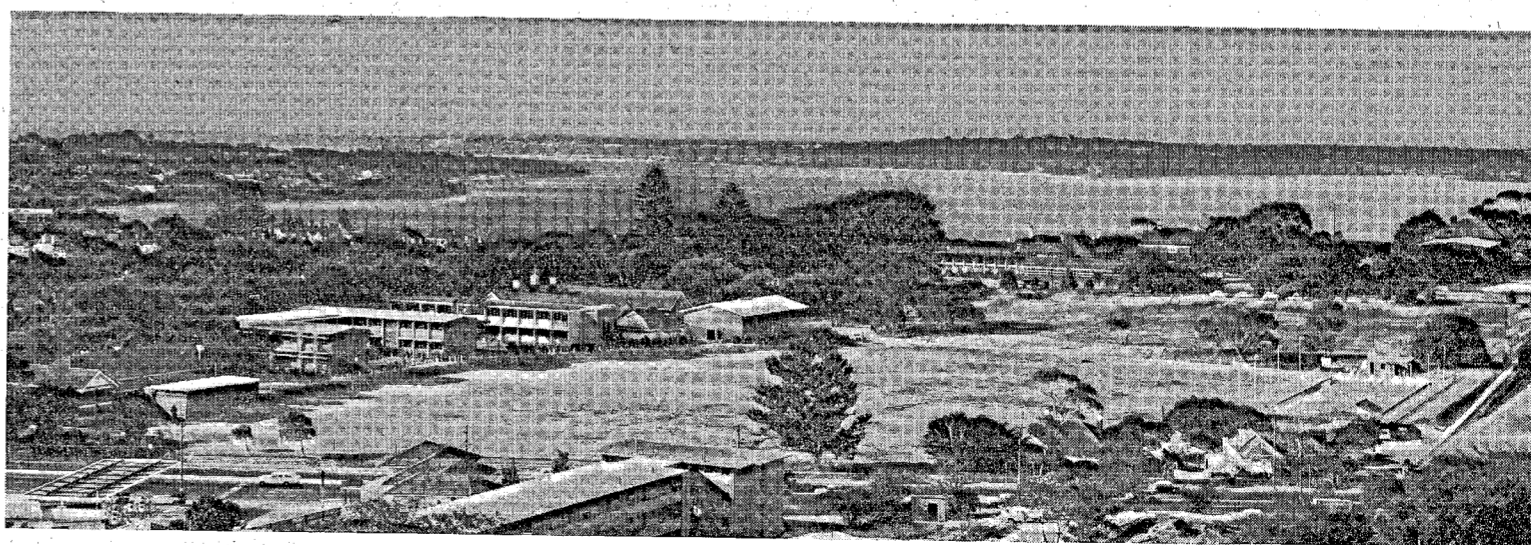
Moreover, in evaluating this record the retention rates of the School must be taken into consideration.

Finally, the excellence of the scholarship can be demonstrated by the fact that boys from Christ Church have been awarded University Exhibitions every year in the past decade. It is the only school to have achieved this. Moreover, 20 Exhibitions are awarded annually and the School's total over the ten years is 28.

I have touched upon matters past and present and this seemed appropriate for the first issue of the Chronicle in the Diamond Jubilee Year. The article might be entitled — "The School Grew Up." In the second issue I hope to write about the Chapel, and in the third term to deal with the master plan and the future.

CANON W. J. McCLEMANS:

A Profile of the School's First Headmaster



CANON McCLEMANS AS CAPTAIN-CHAPLAIN WITH THE BRITISH IMPERIAL FORCES

It is fitting that in the School's Jubilee Year we should pay tribute to the vision and energy of the founder, Canon McClemans.

In his twenty-three years of service in the Church, Canon McClemans built five churches, founded what is now one of the major schools in the State and was one of those instrumental in bringing Mr. Charles Harper's school at Guildford into the Church — the present Guildford Grammar School. For the two years between the purchase of the School by the Church and the arrival of Canon P. U. Henn as Headmaster, he acted as honorary secretary and administrator of Guildford Grammar.

All this was in addition to establishing Christ Church School, serving as its Headmaster and carrying out his duties as Rector of Claremont, and, from 1912, a Canon of the Church.

Canon McClemans was educated at the Cathedral Grammar School, Elphin, Ireland, and at Trinity College, Dublin, where he graduated in 1897. Two years later, having come out to Western Australia, he was ordained by the Bishop of Perth and took up duties as curate in charge of Greenbushes where he built a new church — the first of the five he was to build in his very active career.

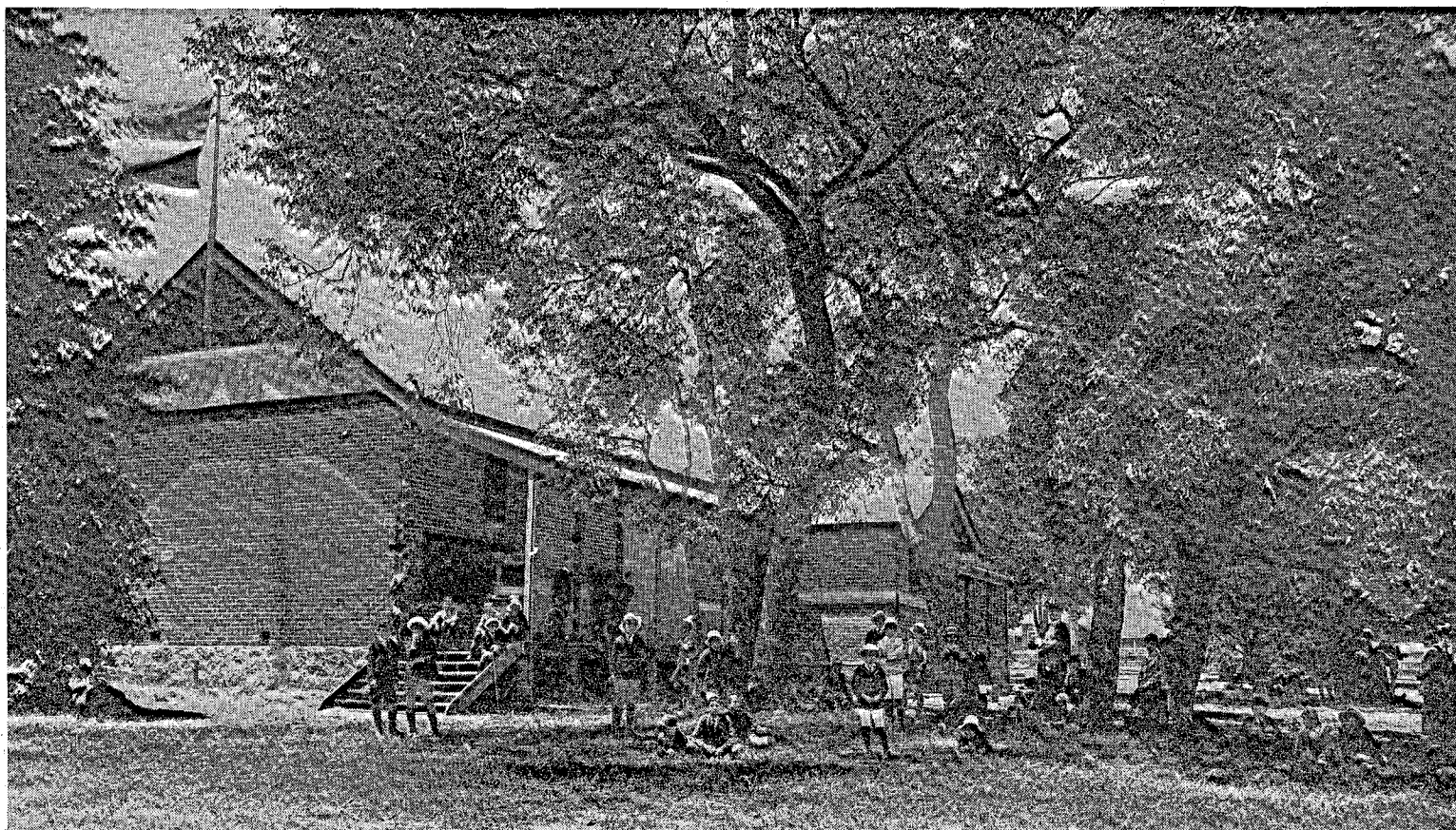
In 1901 he was appointed rector in charge of the Murchison Goldfields, a parish which then extended from Yalgoo to Peak Hill. His second church was erected during this time at Day Dawn.

From 1903 to 1905 he was rector of Geraldton, and then succeeded Canon Moore as rector of Boulder where again he was responsible for the building of a large church.

When Archbishop Lefroy resigned as rector of Claremont, Canon McClemans was elected to the parish. During this period he built St. Andrew's, East Claremont, and was also rector of St. Margaret's, Nedlands, where he preached the first sermon.

It was in 1910 that he founded Christ Church Preparatory Boys' School and although installed as a Canon in 1912 he continued as Headmaster in addition to his extensive parish duties until 1915 when he went overseas with the first A.I.F. He was later seconded to the British Imperial Forces and served in Egypt, Gallipoli and France with the rank of Captain/Chaplain. While in Egypt, with the help of the church army, he built St. John's Church at Ishmalia.

Returning from the war, Canon McClemans again entered vigorously upon his many duties but his health broke down under the continuing strain and in 1923 he retired to his farm at Wongan Hills. He died in 1960, retaining to the last his interest in the development of the School.

RHODES SCHOLAR



Old Boy, Peter Hollingsworth, who has now completed his fifth year in medicine, is the W.A. Rhodes Scholar for 1970.

Peter capped a most successful career at Christ Church in both academic and sporting fields by winning a General Exhibition in his final year 1964. He was also school captain. He has since been a most consistent prize winner in his university course and was secretary of the university sports council in 1967. Last year he was elected vice-president of the W.A. Medical Students' Association.

When Peter completes his degree in Perth he will leave for Oxford to take up his scholarship. He will do his pre-registry year at Radford Hospital where he hopes to pursue his interests in clinical medicine.

Peter recently gained some valuable experience in this sphere when he worked with the Department of Public Health in New Guinea during the last summer vacation. He was particularly interested in the Department's treatment of leprosy sufferers amongst the native peoples.

We wish Peter every success when he leaves later this year for England.

FIRST TERM JOTTINGS

The Deputy Headmaster, Mr. Alan Blackwood, who is on leave until 3rd Term, is from all accounts, having a thoroughly relaxed and enjoyable time in the U.K. During Mr. Blackwood's absence, Mr. Drok is acting Deputy Head.

The fortunes of the First Eleven fluctuated somewhat this season. The team won two matches — against Trinity and Wesley — and finished fourth in the Darlot Cup.

Our swimming team, in an extremely close competition, gained second place to Hale School in this year's Inters for the third year in succession. There were some outstanding individual performances but in the main our success was due to our all-round strength and tremendous team spirit.

The School's Life Saving team, entered for the State Championships, was our largest ever and had a most successful day in gaining three firsts, a third and two fourths.

The tennis team started very slowly, losing their first two matches. However they won three out of the remaining four matches to finish third in the competition.

The Fashion Parade which was organised by the Mothers' Auxiliary on April 10th, was thoroughly enjoyed by the capacity crowd which filled every available square inch of the Dalkeith Hall. The attractions of the fashions (and the models) was enhanced by a good selection of wines.

School rowing crews again performed creditably in the Head of the River Regatta, gaining third place in the Head of the River and first place in the Second Eights. The fours narrowly missed places in some very closely contested races.

THE SCHOOL BUILDING PROGRAMME

The Building Programme laid down by the School Council at the time the Building Fund Appeal was launched is rapidly approaching its final stages.

Already we have seen the completion of the Swimming Pool and Sandover, which houses the new dining hall, kitchen and sick quarters. The impact of these two projects on the life of the School has been most marked.

The School Chapel now dominates the sky-line along our river bank and is nearing completion. The many visitors to the School who have watched this building grow and have seen it in its nearly completed stage have been most impressed with the Architect's concept and the way in which he has used the site to its maximum advantage. We believe that as both a spiritual and cultural centre it will bring a new dimension to School life.

Now we are in the throes of all that goes into the planning of the last of the projects laid down by Council in the current programme, namely, the Physical Education Centre. This will contain a full sized gymnasium capable of catering for two physical education classes at one time, together with an auxiliary gymnasium for self testing and remedial teaching, Cadet Corps offices and storage, Exploration Club headquarters, School maintenance workshop and store, squash court, hard tennis courts, new senior change rooms and toilets, male residential staff quarters and grounds equipment storage and offices.

The building will be sited so that the change rooms and gymnasium will lead directly on to the North end of the Swimming Pool concourse and thus complete the concept of the grouping of all Physical Education facilities within the one area.


It may be seen that this project will be quite an impressive venture and, as with those that went before, the School Council will press forward with the planning and building as rapidly as finance will permit.
