### **HEADMASTER'S FOREWORD**

In writing this brief foreword in the 1943 "Mitre," I would like to greet those parents whom, because of the war and its urgency on what leisure we have, I have not had the pleasure of meeting.

Mr. B. T. Walters left at the end of 1942 after ten years work building up the School in numbers, reputation and moral worth; and he left, carrying with him the good wishes of the many boys and parents with whom he had been in touch during those years. He built upon the foundations laid by the founder of the School and those who followed in his steps as Headmasters, and their work will always be remembered by the boys who passed through under them.

The future of our country lies, in part, in the hands of the boys who are passing through the various Forms, and, on what has been laid down already, we have to build a system that is going to prepare these future citizens to the fullest extent physically, mentally and spiritually. The times, at present, are difficult; the administrative problems sometimes seem impossible to overcome; but, despite the apparent difficulties, the School and the boys who pass through her classrooms have a great contribution to make to our national life; a contribution that is of great value and reality.

Finally, although the problems of living at the present time are not conducive to the smooth progress of education in the School, yet, in the pages of this magazine, will be seen the record of an achievement that shows, despite obstacles the times place in our path, there has been made some good progress.

### EDITORIAL

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A school has its part to play in the life of a country and its service to offer. We as a School have offered of our best for what our country most needed during the last four years.

Some of us are leaving school now and many of those know exactly where they are going at the moment. Few could say what call might be made on them in twelve months time. Some of us will be here for another year, some for two years, and none can say what sort of world we shall enter. We are now confident of victory in a war in which we willingly saw our country engage to rid a great evil from the world, but not all see its termination in less than two years.

What then remains certain about a future for young people who do not know even what their first step will be? Hilaire Belloc assures us that he feels the last step is at least as important as the first, and deprecates too much attention to the saying that "Well begun is half done," which may be picturesque but is not accurate. The first step is only one step and we hope that some of our later steps may be stronger and sturdier, and that we shall have seen a sure goal towards which we shall direct them.

Among God's gifts to mankind, certainty is not to be found, any more than rest. But we have been shown a way on which to base our faith. We are being given training for our minds and our bodies. If our first steps be along the path to war, so be it. Our later ones will be towards the goal of peace and our country will need us not less to live for it then, than perhaps to die for it now. May we then be as ready to live our lives for our country as to give them. Be it not said to our shame that, when peace came, we were not ready through lack of will or preparation to meet its difficulties.

This year the staff changes have, unfortunately, been rather numerous. At the end of the first term we lost Mrs. Cross, who was replaced by Mr. Hawken, and at the same time we also welcomed Mr. Bril. At the end of the second term we were most unfortunate in losing Mr. Blain (the Chaplain), Mrs. Hartley and Mrs. Spratling. However, Mrs. Berliner replaced Mrs. Hartley, and Miss Tory has taken over Mr. Blain's work in Fifth and Sub-Junior Latin forms.

Also at the beginning of the year we welcomed Mr. Williams and Mrs. Henn; and Mrs. Watts joined us at the beginning of the third term.

A School Church Service this year has been held each term instead of being held annually as in previous years.

We must thank the Parents' Association for arranging and providing the afternoon teas at the inter-house football matches during the second term, and also the Old Boys match. These teas were greatly enjoyed and appreciated by all.

We would like to extend our congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. A. F. J. Blain on the arrival of their son.

During the year we were fortunate in having many speakers who lectured us on missionaries in various countries. Among these speakers were Bishop Cranswick, who told us of missionary work in New Guinea and China; Rev. W. J. Clift, who told us of the good work done by the Mission to Seamen in the port of Fremantle and other ports all over the world; Mr. Perry, who also lectured us on missionary work in New Guinea around Milne Bay and the other battlefields where our soldiers are at present.

The number of boys now attending School is 225, 75 of whom are boarders, who are back again at their original home.



### SPEECH DAY 1942



Lynn (leader), G. L. Cramer, and R. Long; Swing: D. A. Dorricott (leader), J. B. L. Tucker, and R. Walker. The adjudicators were Mr. Robins and Mr. Millar, to whom we offer our thanks. It is interesting to notice that the classical team consisted entirely of swing fans and that, after the debate, both teams adjourned to the Prefects' Room for a "jam session."

Also held in the first term was a Spelling Bee, which was well attended and caused much laughter, and a second vaudeville show, which was held in a packed hall before a very appreciative audience, and which cleared £2 exactly.

During second term there were no activities on our part because our members were occupied with numerous other diversions which did not seem to require augmenting by us.

Although the majority of the organising members of the society are taking the Public Examinations, those who are not have contrived to arrange two dances in order to provide much-needed relaxation from their studies for those who are swotting. The first dance was everything that could be desired from a first-class show; the orchestra, the floor, and the supper were all excellent, and the dance was faultlessly organised. Our thanks are due on this and on other occasions to the orchestra of Mrs. Sylvia Le Cornu, which gave us the very best of music through the evening.

We shall be unfortunate in losing the services of J. R. Moore and J. B. L. Tucker from our sub-committees next year. On this note I conclude, hoping that the society will have an even more successful year in 1944.
