# SCHOOL NOTES

Some of the older boys remember "Shorty" when he taught at Christ Church before the war. Mrs. N. Goss, who had been with the kindergarten for two years, left during third term. To these three we would like to extend our best wishes.

On the other hand we welcomed Mr. A. W. Nielsen as Senior History and Bookkeeping Master. Mr. H. Lance took over the Chemistry Department and completely revolutionised the laboratory, so that now the school can boast of a really well-stocked laboratory. Mr. Wittber is now in charge of Sub-junior and also teaches Fourth Form Maths. and English. Miss Bogg is the new Second Form Mistress. The two members of the staff attached to the Kindergarten are Miss Barnes and Mrs. Watts.

During the year the school has been treated to some very interesting visits, lectures and visual education films. During the second term His Grace the Archbishop made his first visit to the school and inspected the Guard of Honour comprising Army and Air Force Cadets. His Grace spoke to many of the boys in the Guard and by his questions showed them that he was quite at home with army matters. The prefects met His Grace and Mrs. Moline at a reception given them by the Parents' Association in the Gymnasium.

Several interesting lectures were given to us by members of the Rotary Club. These included one on the Wittenoom Gorge Blue Asbestos Mines, the weaving industry of W.A., and another on Secondary Industries in this State. Other extra-curricula activities have been the showing of several educational films by the courtesy of the Shell Coy. The subjects of these included Biology, Geography, Geology Chemistry, Physics and some other interesting "shorts." Mr. Wood, of the Shell Coy., must be thanked for the time he devoted to the showing of these films to the members of our school.

During second term Mr. D. C. Ryan organised a very successful Boxing Display by present and former State Boxing Champions. Some members of the school and boys from the Claremont Police Boys' Club also took part. A large audience enthusiastically voted that another display should be given. This will probably take place early in 1948. Proceeds from these displays are being applied to a fund to purchase a racing "eight" for the school.

We thank Mr. Ottaway, of Kodak's for his series of very interesting illustrated lectures on photography and look forward to renewing his acquaintance next year. Mr. F. H. Bates has also regularly held Crusader Meetings and has been appreciatively listened to by many of the boys. On 19th November the school had the opportunity of listening to Bishop Wynn Jones, Bishop of Central Tanganyika, who gave a very interesting talk on his missionary activities in Africa. His words made a deep impression, I am sure, on the minds of his audience.

Notes on the Sports:-

Special praise must be given to G. K. Archer who was under 16 champion. Others such as R. L. Leggo and P. Wall also swam well, gaining points for the House in open and under 16 events.

# Cricket — A. M. Moore

Especially in this team do we lack such players as F. Butler, R. Fulwood and D. Davies who left at the end of last year. However, we were able to hold our own quite well and gain second place to Romsey. The team spirit was high and, considering our lack of big boys, played well together.

# Tennis - A. M. Moore

Yet again we came second to Romsey although we had many exciting matches. Our team was led by Moore who was successively beaten by Norrie of Romsey and by Oliver of Craigie after a three set duel. Of the other members of the team Rosman played well to win his match from Lynn of Craigie. The other two members of the team, Tindale and Heppingstone, also played well in both singles and doubles.

### Football — A. M. Moore

Our success in this sport was hampered greatly by our size and lack of team work. However we "nearly" beat Romsey, but—we didn't. Of our team Evans deserves praise for his excellent play in centre, as for the others, Betham, Archer Leggo and Moore, deserve praise for their occasional bursts of energy which enabled us to keep the ball in our direction.

# CRAIGIE HOUSE NOTES

For the past year the House has had much success but it is now evident that in the "race" for the Beatty Cup, Craigie was left at the post. It is now for Romsey to ward off the final effort by Queenslea, who led in points for the Eagling Work Cup and are thus a danger in the Beatty Cup Competition.

Although it may appear that Craigie was below par in sporting activities this year, this is far from the true position. A summary of Inter-House sport is a follows.

# Swimming — G. W. Atherden

Craigie was exceptionally strong in this field in 1947, as in previous years and the points gained practically doubled the total of the other two houses. Although the whole House is praised for the excellent effort, mention is due to Atherden, Oliver, Crommelin, Webb, Bate, Hill I, Hill II and Kerby. It was unfortunate that B. Lynn was ill on the occasion of the House sports. It is

also worthy of mention that Craigie won every relay and such swimmers as Scott, Littlejohn and Newton, who later comprised a winning inter-school relay team against Wesley and Modern School, deserve praise.

# Cricket — L. Webb

This branch of sport this year was rather disappointing. With such players as Webb, Bate, Hobbs, Heseltine and Oliver in our House Eleven, better results were expected. However the "A" team was defeated by both the other Houses. The effort of the "B" team was an excellent one, it winning both its matches, but as the points thus gained were not counted towards the Beatty Cup, the victory was merely a moral one.

#### Football — G. W. Atherden

As such players as Webb, Atherden, Lynn, Oliver and Bentley were in Craigie, a very strong team was formed for the inter-House competition and clear cut victories were gained over Romsey, in particular, and Queenslea.

The first match of the series was between Craigie and Romsey and with Atherden, Webb, Oliver and Lynn in excellent form and the whole of the team pulling its weight, Craigie ran out winners with 14 goals 9 behinds to Romsey's score of 2 goals 4 behinds. In a later match Craigie defeated Queenslea by a fair margin, after a hard tussle in adverse conditions.

# Boxing — M. S. T. Hobbs

Craigie entries for the Inter-House Boxing were rather poor, however we were placed second to a strong Queenslea team. This position was mainly due to the good efforts of the younger boxers in Beaver, Hill I, Hill II, Kerby, Faye, Evans II and Glasson. Others who proved themselves were Wilson, Sears, Scott, Mc-Kenzie, Oliver-and Seel. The final fight of the night between Hodge, the School Champion; and Craigie's Boxing Captain, M. Hobbs completed an excellent tournament. Hobbs fought very gamely and though he was defeated on points, praise is certainly due to him.

# Gym. — M. S. T. Hobbs

The House gained third place in the Gym. Tournament but this placing was much better than it appears as the Houses finished within a point of each other, Romsey gaining the very close decision. S. G. Scott drew with Lapham (Romsey) as under 15 champion. Scott was also second to Norrie (Romsey) in the Open division.

#### Tennis — R. Oliver

Again Craigie attained third place, due perhaps to the lack of training together. However little time was afforded the tennis team and they put forward their best effort. From our House, Oliver, Sears and Blunt together with Lapham (Romsey) comprised the under 15 Junior Competition team, so it seems that Craigie will do better in inter-House tennis in future.

#### Athletics — L. Webb

The result of the Athletic Meeting on October 4th was rather a disappointment for Craigie. The House was decidedly lacking in Open competitors and L. Webb was the only one in this division to do at all well. He ran second to R. Biddiscombe (Romsey) in the Open 440 when "Biddy" broke the record. Webb also gained places in the 220, the High Jump and the Hurdles.

In the under 16 Division H. Heseltine successfully gained places in the 100, 220 and 440 to Evans (Queenslea) the Champion of the Division. B. Lynn ran well in the distance races and B. Crommelin secured the Hurdles title.

R. Oliver was runner-up to Speldewinde (Romsey) in the under 15 group and McKenzie gained places in both the High and Broad Jumps of the division. Hill I ran well in the under 13 and under 12 100 yards and Hill II won the under 11 100 yards and proved himself in the under twelve division. Brockway, in the 50 yards under 8, equalled the record established in 1941 and Fitzharding ran second in the same race. Browne-Cooper III ran second in the under 7, 50 yards.

Thus had Craigie been afforded some better Open runners to support the rest of the team, the House may have done better. However with so many good juniors, there is promise that Craigie will have a stronger team for future meetings against Romsey and Queenslea.

To conclude the House Notes, we congratulate G. Atherden, H. Heseltine and M. Hobbs on the appointment as School Prefects. Also to L. Webb, R. Oliver, B. Lynn, M. Hobbs and H Heseltine on their award of House Colours.


# PREFECTS' NOTES



In 1947 the school was rather unlucky not to have been more successful in Inter-school Competition. The Annual Triangular Sports held in the Crawley Baths on Saturday, 15th March, resulted in a win for Wesley College with 58 points from Perth Modern School, 47 points, with Christ Church, 34 points, third

The effort of some of our swimmers was outstanding. The School failed mainly in the Open division where Agnew and Harris, State Representatives in Australian Championships in 1946 and 1947, excelled for Modern School.

Our most successful swimmer was R. Oliver who gained first place in the 55 yards Freestyle under 14 and also in the 100 yards Freestyle, under 15. This was a creditable performance and it is to be hoped that this swimmer will continue his good efforts for the school. D. Baker swam well in the under 16 division where he gained third place in the 55 yards Freestyle, second place in the 220 yards Freestyle and second also in the 55 yards Backstroke. In both the Open 110 yards Freestyle and the 55 yards Backstroke, G. Atherden was third. In the 55 yards Freestyle under 14, won by Oliver, Eggleston II was second. Seel swam into third place in the under 15 Breaststroke.

The under 11 55 yards Freestyle, where points did not count, was won by M. Hill with A. Anderson second. The relay teams were not strong enough to be successful in Inter-school competition, except the under 15 team, Newton, Scott, Littlejohn and Fawcett, who gained an excellent victory.

Thus, with the possibility of a stronger team for 1948, the performances of the following boys, probably returning to the school, should be observed and encouraged:—Oliver, Crommelin, Wall, Webb, Seel, Lynn, J. Hill, M. Hill, G. Archer, Eggleston II and A. Anderson. Also those who comprised the various relay teams should be coached and as far as this is concerned, Mr. Ryan will carry on his excellent work and thus mould a team to win the 1948 Triangular Swimming Competition.

Early in the first term of this year, Lieutenant Short, O.C. of Cadets, left the school to take advantage of the Army Rehabilitation Scheme. #### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The Annual General Meeting was held in the School Gymnasium on 22nd March, 1947, at 8 p.m., Mr. T. C. Bedells presiding.

**Election of Office Bearers.** President: Mr. Bedells stated that he felt this should be an honour which passes annually and therefore did not offer for re-election. In his place he nominated Mr. G. C. R. Maclagan, who was seconded by Mr. Langsford. There being no further nominations Mr. Maclagan was declared elected. Mr. Maclagan took the chair, and in a short opening address said that he regarded the position as a great honour, and wished the Association a successful year.

Notices of Motion: Mr. Maclagan spoke on the two notices of motion, as published in the notice of meeting; namely, "that the Gymnasium Fund be closed, and the balance transferred to the Memorial Fund. The motion was seconded by Mr. Flintoff and carried. The second notice, namely, "that the necessary rule of the constitution be altered to read 'that at each Annual General Meeting, a Patron—the Headmaster for the time being—and vice-Patrons—the Archbishop of Perth for the time being, and all previous Headmasters—and one President, an Immediate Past President, and three only Vice-Presidents shall be elected'." Mr. Maclagan pointed out that his intention was to make the office of Vice-President an honour to the recipient and a reward for past services, rather than camouflaged request for a donation. Mr. Armstrong spoke in support of the motion, which was seconded by Mr. Lord, and carried unanimously.

**War Memorial:** Mr. Hayward spoke on the necessity of the Memorial being dedicated to the member of the School who lost his life in World War I in addition to those who made the supreme sacrifice in World War II. The meeting was in general agreement with Mr. Hayward.

**Honour Roll:** It was moved by Mr. Tucker that "The Honour Board sub-committee should meet again before the board is considered to be completed. This motion was carried.

Bursary Fund: Mr. Brooking gave a clear cut detailed report of the aspects of the Fund, its administration, etc. Mr. Jupp spoke on its success, and considerable discussion followed. The committee this year have been very keen and active under the capable leadership of our President Mr. Maclagan. Early in the year a subcommittee consisting of Mr. Lord, Mr. Currie and Mr. May was appointed to bring the address book up to date. No easy task, and the sub-committee are to be congratulated on a fine effort. So far about 800 names have been tabled and of these about 400 addresses are known. Most of you have no doubt received the questionnaire, and the response to date has been gratifying. If you know of anyone who may have lost contact with the association please advise the Secretary, as we wish to make the association bigger, better and brighter, for, as the President says in his introduction, a school is largely judged by its Old Boys.

## HOCKEY CLUB NOTES

This year the Club completes its fourteenth season and third season since the gap caused by the war years.

At the annual general meeting which was held in the school buildings on 19th March, Mr. Campbell Armstrong was re-elected President, he was also the only member present of the original 1930 team.

This year the Club fielded two teams only, as it was thought that the strength of the Club was on the wane and it was necessary once again to set a more solid foundation before attempting to field larger numbers of teams. It, therefore, adopted the policy

of fostering the younger players, as it was fully realised that by continually drawing upon the older players the Club would never rebuild to the strength of pre-war days. This feat has now been conclusively accomplished and although there were only two teams fielded, the number of players registered was 39, all of whom have the satisfaction of knowing that they have helped the Club to regain the status that they had always enjoyed.

The A2 Team: In this grade there were eleven teams competing and as a result two complete rounds could not be fulfilled. Christ Church, after a slow start, due to three drawn matches, finished the first round sixth on the list with the same number of points as East Cannington and Old Modernians. In the second round the team won every match with the exception of one which was, as in the first round, a draw against Old Guildfordians. With this row of successes the team finished second to Fremantle.

In the semi final the team, lacking its usual balance and dash, fell to Fremantle with a score of 3-0. In the finals Christ Church accounted for Old Wesleyans with a score of 3-1, after a fine display of goal keeping by Peter McRostie, and a well-balanced forward line. In the Grand Finals, Christ Church versus Fremantle, Christ Church won; a truly creditable performance as it accounted for a team that had only been beaten twice throughout the season. In this game Clayton Bickford, Peter McRostie, Terry Crommelin and Peter Lynn were all outstanding.

Before concluding these notes we must express our thanks to the committee and sub-committees formed throughout the season for all the hard work that they put into the affairs of the Club.

Our very sincere thanks are also due to the Headmaster for again allowing us the use of the School Oval for training purposes.

We look forward now to the start of next season when our hopes are for a return to A1 grade as well as Reserve grade; B2 grade and Junior grade teams. New players are needed and all interested will be welcome to join in the fun.
