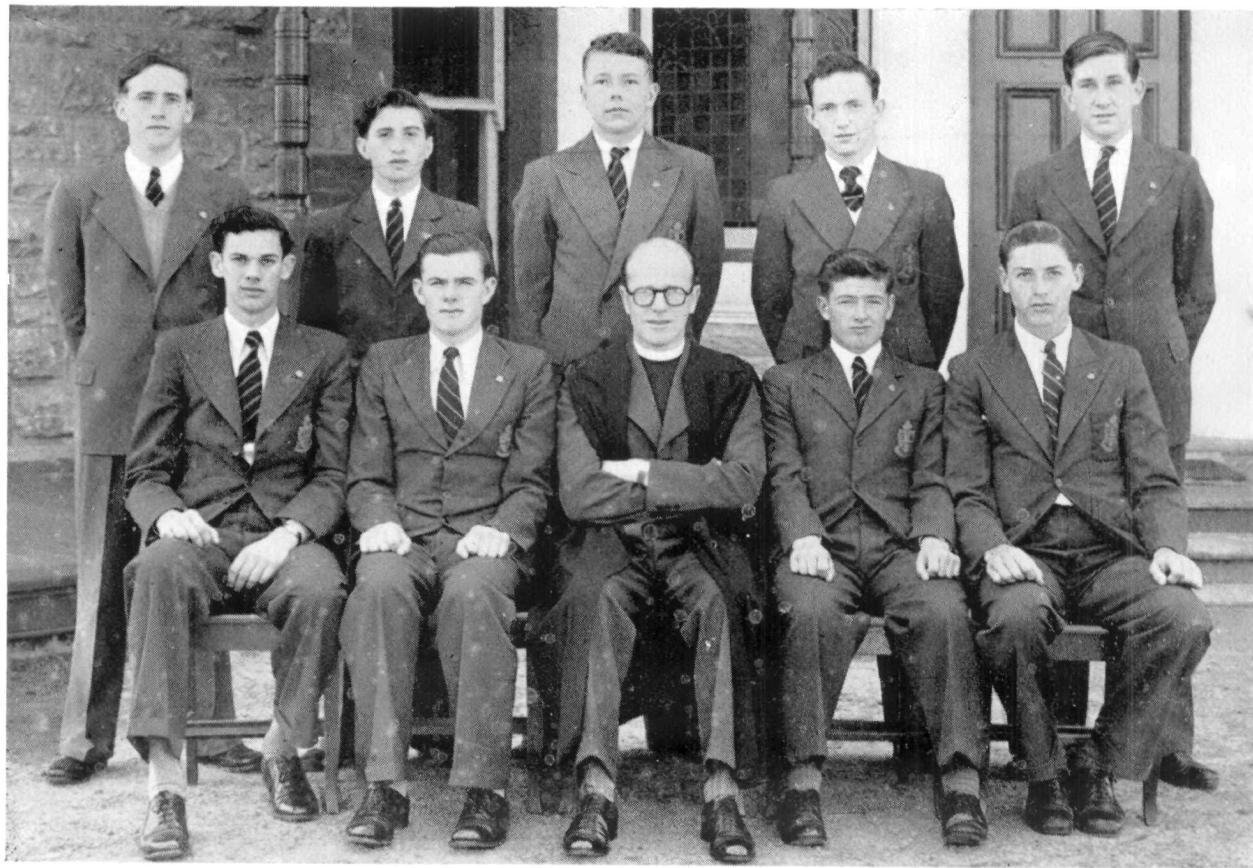

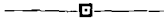

EDITORIAL



For five years we have been living in a doubtful peace. Now it appears that we are once more about to engage in world wide conflict.

Perhaps the greatest factor causing periodic wars is that the different nations do not really know and understand the peoples of other lands. In fact most of them do not even really know their fellow countrymen. In Russia each man is expected to spy on his neighbour and as a result Russia is the greatest menace to world civilisation today.

Since Australia seems to be the only country capable of combining the peaceful democracy of England with the youthful impatience of America it behoves us to give an example to the rest of the world. By living together in peaceful harmony with our everyday contacts we can train ourselves to live in concord with our international neighbours. But before we can do this we must have a body of people who are already accustomed to living in a spirit of friendly co-operation with others. These people come from schools such as Christ Church Grammar.

Here we are taught that to help someone else is far better than merely satisfying our own desires. By constantly living with other boys we become accustomed to accepting their minor eccentricities, and we learn that if we expect people to do things for us we must in our turn be prepared to do things for them.

Once we have been taught these things ourselves it remains for us to take them out into the world and teach others. If we do this successfully we may rest assured that we have done something concrete toward the cause of world peace.

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SCHOOL NOTES

Since these notes were last written four members of the staff have left us, and seven others have come to the School. Those to leave were Miss N. Bogg and Messrs. Neilsen, Wittber and Davey. Miss Warren and Messrs. Bennetts, Burnett, McKenzie, Peard, Smallman and Sweet are the new members on the staff.

During the August holidays we learnt that Mr. P. S. Moyes, B.A., of Geelong Grammar School, was to be our Headmaster from January, 1951. We welcome his appointment and earnestly hope that everyone, staff, boys, parents and Old Boys, will give him every assistance and encouragement possible. His task is not an easy one—he knows that—but let us make it easier for him.

Building activity has been confined to the construction of a brick class room for Form I, but as yet it is not ready for us. Around the grounds more changes have been made. Cyclone netting has been erected along the north side of the gravel tennis courts; posts and chains have been put in position near the paths around the school buildings; the tank-stand and laundry near Queenslea have been demolished, and the quadrangle at the senior school has been given a bitumen surface.

After being out of service since September, 1948, the lower oval was used again during the second term of this year.

The increase in staff numbers has been due to increase in Forms. IIa and IIb are now separate, and a new Form has been created in the Senior School.

Shakespeare's "The Taming of the Shrew" was presented at St. Hilda's School by senior pupils of both St. Hilda's and Christ Church at the end of second term. (See elsewhere in the magazine for further details.)

The number of boys at the School is now 270. 130 boys are boarders, 50 in Romsey and 80 in Queenslea.

Groups of boys have taken time off from formal studies to attend the following: The film "Hamlet," "The Gondoliers," the Wild Life Show, Franquin, "The Barber of Seville"—the screen presentation, the Repertory Club's "The Guinea Pig," and Insurance Education Day.

Many boys took part in the Mission to Youth during June. More is said about this under another heading.

As a result of a Bill passed at the Anglican Synod in August, the School, from the 1st October, 1950, came under the control of its own Council. (Previously the Council for Church of England

Schools had controlled Guildford Grammar School, St. Hilda's Church of England School for Girls, and Christ Church Grammar School.) This new Council has nine members elected by the following: The Archbishop (1 nominee), Synod (3), the Diocesan Council (2), the Old Boys' Association (2), and the Parents' Association (1). At the time of writing the first eight members had been elected, namely: Lt.-Col. Hurford-Jones, Rev. A. Pidd, Dr. L. Cook, Mr. F. Gamblen, Rev. L. R. Jupp, Mr. D. Chipper, Mr. J. E. D. Battye, and Mr. H. N. Giles.

The year has also seen a considerable increase in strength and the enthusiasm and ability of all cadets has been of the highest possible standard on all occasions throughout their training.

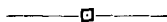

At the A.T.C. Squadron Church Parade held at C.C.G.S. on August 6th, all metropolitan flights were represented, whilst F/Sgt. Koek acted W.O.D. The parade was inspected by W/C Ford and our Headmaster and then, led by the Fremantle Pipe Band, marched down to the Church. At the door certain members of our flight formed a guard of honour for the Governor Sir James Mitchell, who was kind enough to honour us with his presence. Following an impressive service, the march past took place in front of the school, the salute being taken by His Excellency the Governor, accompanied by W/C. Ford and the Rev. J. Dobson. According to all reports the whole parade was very spectacular and was a definite reflection on the high standard of efficiency of the A.T.C. A great deal of credit is due to F/Lt. Sweet to whom we extend our hearty congratulations for such a turn out.

Churchill was a member of the A.T.C. shooting team which came third in the State R.A.A.F. shooting competition.

Three of our flight attended an officer's and an N.C.O.'s course at Pearce during the August vacation. Corporal Davison has so far passed his officer's exam successfully but has still to complete another 56 hours before he is eligible to take the final exam. L.A.C.'s Hodges and Parker have completed the N.C.O. course and it will not be long before we hope to see their promotions in the P.O.R.'s.

The A.T.C. was also represented in the Church parade held at School on Anzac Day; the Army and A.T.C. parade and march past at which General Whitelaw took the salute; and the forming of a guard of honour with the Army cadets for the funeral of Bishop Murray after the disaster of the Amana.

On behalf of the boys who are leaving the A.T.C. at the end of the year, I want to wish F/Lt. Sweet and No. 9 Flight all the success and the best of luck in the coming year, and may its quantity justify its quality.

THE MISSION TO YOUTH

From June 11th to 25th a Mission to Youth was conducted in this diocese by Charles Murray, Bishop of the Riverina; and Norman Blow, Dean of Newcastle, at the invitation of the Anglican Youth Fellowships. The aim of the mission was to strengthen young people in Christian work and witness. "God and You" was taken as the theme.

The first week was spent by the missionaries in going to the Youth by means of rallies, held at convenient centres, and inviting them to come to rededicate their lives to Christ, at the Mission Services which were to be held each night at St. George's Cathedral throughout the second week. Many of the Christ Church boys attended both the rallies and the Mission Services and the School was honoured by a visit from each of the Missioners.

Unfortunately the ending of the Mission was overshadowed by a tragedy which has brought sorrow to many homes in Perth and elsewhere, I refer to the great air disaster of June 26th, in which along with all those aboard, our two inspiring Missioners perished. In that same tragic week the boys of Christ Church paid their last respects to the Bishop, as his remains were solemnly returned to the Creator. In silence they stood to attention, forming a guard of honour, as the cortege moved slowly to the Crematorium.

But there the Mission did not finish, and it is the hope and task of every one of us that we shall remember Norman Blow's faith in us and not let him down.

"On June 26th we fly away, but we are quite certain that the Mission to Youth will not really be ending. We simply say to the young people of Perth, 'Over to You,' and I am quite confident from the way they supported the Mission that they will carry forward the work we have tried to do."

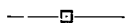

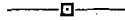

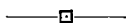


A KNIGHT OF OLD

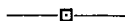

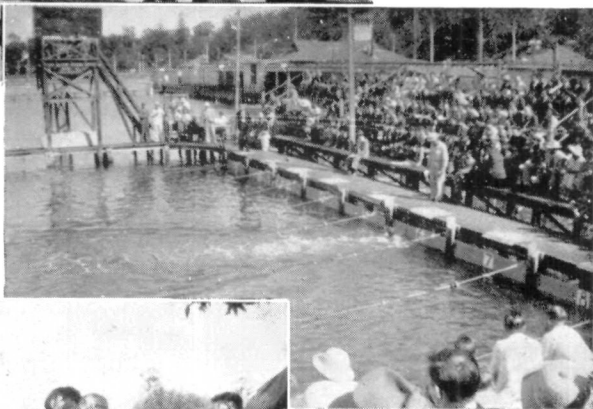
