### SYSTEMS OF STUDENT RESPONSIBILITY

There has been some discussion recently between boys and prefects on the merits of a Student Representative Council as opposed to a Prefect System. I would like to point out that, theoretically at least, a Prefect System can achieve as much and more than a Student Representative Council, and so in changing from the former to the latter there would be at best no gain.

The reason behind discussion on these bodies is most certainly the wish of students to have more responsibility and to have more say in school matters. This is both a good sign and a bad sign. Firstly it indicates that students have an urge to involve themselves and be active members of the school community. Secondly, it means that this basic activity of education is not being granted to them.

So the students are wondering whether a Student Representative Council will give them greater parts to play in school life than does the present system.

Such a Council would, to some extent, grant their wish, in that several boys from each year would sit on a committee, the suggestions of which would be forwarded to the Headmaster, directly or indirectly, for his consideration. This is generally all a Student Representative Council does. (The element of the Headmaster is present in any school student body. Fortunately or unfortunately, students cannot have direct control over the school constitution, the reason being they lack in experience and know-how at running a school.) To the point I am trying to make. A Prefect System can achieve this too. The prefects can meet with the younger students every week or so as in a Student Representative Council. These represen-

tatives of their respective years would have as much say as they would in a Student Representative Council. (Representation by a few of a majority is present in any practical system and there is nothing wrong with this. Any person of the majority may and should feel free to pass his views on through a representative to the gover-

ning body.)

As well as this the Prefect System has added advantages: the older students have the respect of age which enables them to police rules of the school with authority and they are a closer knit group, having more contact and more in common with each other, so the likelihood of their acting as a body rather than as a number of individuals is greater. Unanimity and uniformity of opinion are naturally necessary for decision making through a committee.

I said at the start, theoretically a Prefect System can succeed and do these things. Unforetunately, as is the case so often, when the human element is introduced, the infallibility of the plan on paper dissolves. This year this vital communication between prefects and younger students lagged somewhat, but was present in some way last year and it is certainly hoped that it will be strong in future years.

Summing up, although change is certainly good, when unnecessary it can only lead to confusion. A good look at the situation in hand can reveal that there is no need for any radical change at all.

# 5 CHAPLAIN'S ANZAC DAY ADDRESS

#### **ANZAC DAY 1974**

Just what are we doing today on this occasion when we solemnly try to remember not only those who fell on a hill at Gallipoli, but all those who have been caught up in the monstrous horror or war, in the senseless slaughter of mankind that has always preceded so steadily. We used to remember the Great War of 1914 — 1918 and of 1939 — 45 but we must add to them the wars of Korea and Vietnam.

First of all we realise that although for most of us we have no memory of these wars (except of the latest and again most of us were only aware of that through the media, which means that even knowledge of Vietnam was filtered, the reality obscured as we protected ourselves from the impact of constant exposure to its horror). We are aware that fewer and fewer still live who were directly involved in these wars. The fact remains that we owe our existence as a nation with the right to shape its own destiny to the sacrifice and gallantry of the men who fought in two world wars when we are rightly not making a very good job of building a better world, a world in which more and more trust and understanding and co-operation then that's our failure for which we must be penitent. It's no excuse for mocking the sacrifice the fallen made in wars on our behalf.

But what does this fact amount to?

Does it amount to nothing more than an annual Chapel service. Surely it must mean something more than an enforced pause to remember the contemporaries of some of our parents and grandparents, something more than an irritating imposition. Certainly we cannot continually consciously be thinking about the admittedly remote persons who gave their lives that we might live. Though it might not be a bad thing occasionally to ask ourselves about some of the things we do and purposes we serve. "Was it worth the death of even one man that I might be free to do this?" And let us have no mistakes — our style of living would be very different if we were still living under Japanese occupation — and an occupation of 30 years or so is no record.

Let us remember also the vast number of people to whom we are indebted all the time. Every moment of every day we make use of other people's lives — in our society they are well paid for the service they give — but we are dependent also on people in the global village who have enriched our lives and gained previous little for it, tea pickers in India, industrial workers in Taiwan, seamstresses in Hong Kong, rubber tappers in Malaya, copra cutters in Papua, who inspire the high standard of our lives with little gain to themselves.

The fact that you and I are alive, and other men

and women died in war is an extreme illustration of the fact that we depend on one another — What

can we do about it?

First of all we could merely cash in, accept our good fortune and shrug our shoulders. In the lottery of life we were lucky, indeed the odds are over 50-1 against you being born an Australian rather than an Indian, and there are three times as many refugees as Australian citizens, yet we were lucky, so we could say "no worries" for no one in my family is dying of starvation.

Secondly, we could make some contribution. Perhaps we are so pressurised that we feel we cannot we just don't have the time to do anything Yet it's busy people who find time; find the time to visit the Lucy Creath Home or write post-

cards for Amnesty International.

Thirdly, we could realise in the best of all possible ways our one-ness with our fellowman. Of course I can't do much, my resources are limited and there are so many human needs. But I can at least be thoughtful about what I owe to others and being aware of that, can offer to God my concern — and my prayers — and penitence in the faith that He can use them on behalf of those I cannot reach. Most important of all I cannot think of the sacrifice that other men have made for me without remembering another sacrifice — a solitary death on the cross of one who was both Son of Man and Son of God, who died that Sons of Man might become Sons of God.

If I accept that sacrifice and take my stand unashamedly in the company of Christ I shall know that the most I can do may be little, but it will not be lost.



The 1st VI had a most interesting year in 1974. We had a very mixed team, including some very young and promising players. And it was a pity that in the last game of the season, which eventually turned out to be the grand final, between ourselves and Trinity, we were defeated.

Throughout, we were inspired by coaching from ex-A grade pennant players and staff members who all gave freely of their time and skills in order to knit us together as a team. This was shown by our first performance against Scotch College.

After some long matches, the win became a formality and was a definite confidence booster for the players. It was also perfect weather and the standard was very promising.



Lunch time games of softball and volleyball all failed as there was a lack of interest shown by


each house.


At Canberra we were accommodated, together with five other schools from the other states, at Canberra Grammar School, the venue for the festival.




# **BOATSHED MAIN-**TENANCE — '74

This year the Natural History Club came into existence and it was neatly timed because Kooringal was ready for use for the first time this year. Consequently all our work has been centred around it. We have now had two week long camps there. Our main aim is to photograph and classify the wildlife in relation to the geography and overall ecology.

We are especially interested in the ecology and we will attempt to observe the effect at clearing. building, human habitation and regrowth from fires. This is a long term project and will be kept going for many years. Already we have taken some 200 slides and made a huge transept of the property. This involves noting the position of every tree and shrub along a certain compass bearing and it is a means of observing changes in biotic communities.

Kooringal has turned out to contain a wealth of wildlife as well as many different types of communities. A great deal of it is Karri and Jarrah country with fairly dense bush.

Our first camp produced masses of fungus, some of it quite unusual including a very rare species that was sent to England.

This spring we caught over twenty varieties of wildflower on film and saw traces of mammal life. There are plenty of reptiles and Mark Hutchinson, who is our bird specialist has recorded 37 species.

The river contains plenty of fish, shrimps and gilgies and we took some cine film of an obliging Marron who was nearly 10" long fully stretched. We have decided to apply for a licence since the river seems a very rich source of life.

So far we have hardly begun our task - and it is something that you never finish. As the communities change we must continue to record and observe these changes. We might even set ourselves up as a watchdog on school groups who are not environmentally conscious. It would be a disaster if Kooringal or the valley became spoiled by human intervention, and it takes very little effort to do that-

With so much natural bush being cleared these days, it is important to keep the real nature of our wildlife in perspective. In this respect Australia is lagging behind many countries who have realised that the concrete jungle and the accompanying rat race is not a healthy environment for man to live in. Man is a part of nature, however hard he tries not to be. The value of the school having a tract of bush cannot be set too high. If it does nothing else, Kooringal will help this generation to be a bit more concerned with its environment than previous generations have been.


To start the year, Christ Church dominated the State Junior Championships, which were held in the Memorial Hall.

We won the Sheard Trophy, which is the schools prize, with 121 points, 42 ahead of second place. The individual success was David Lang, who won himself the title of U/14 State Champion, winning 8/9. Other results of note were: Michael Millward, Peter Reynolds and Nick Silberstein who came respectively 8th, 5th and 4th in Open Division with 5, 5 1/2 and 6 out of 9. Millward turned it on in one game to beat the State Junior Champion, meanwhile Reynolds and Silberstein both managed to lose to an eleven year old. David Storer was 5th and Rae Deeley came equal 13th in the U/16s, and also in U/14s, Tim Stephenson came 7th. From a practical point of view, our prizes amounted to \$35 and two trophies.

The A team, consisting of Peter Reynolds, Michael Millward, Nick Silberstein and Craig Williams won Premier League with eight won matches and one draw. Their game score was 30-6: 27 wins, 6 draws and 3 losses. David Storer, David Utting, Steve Stearns and Andrew Barker constituted the B team which convincingly won its division of Secondary A League, defeating four other A Teams, they were unexpectedly beaten in the semi-final and placed 3rd in the league. All four members of the team played consistently well - their score in the qualifying rounds was 24-4.

The three Christ Church teams in Secondary Reserves League: the Junior 1sts, the 'C's and the Junior 2nds came respectively 1st, 2nd and 3rd in their respective divisions of that league.

The 'C's, consisting of Robert Storer, Bryce Nock, Lawrie Archer, Michael Wood and assorted other 4th years, defeated the J1s (David Lang, Michael Ellies, Graeme Smith and Rae Deeley) in the semi-final. They then went on to win the final at the second attempt, after drawing the first one. There were several outstanding individual performances in this league including Ellies 5/5 Wood 7 1/2/8 and Deeley 6 1/2/7. (Wood and Deeley spoilt each other's perfect records in the semi-final).

The J2s performed creditably for their third place, they were Tim Stephenson, Geoff Haycraft. Ben Carrington and Peter Morris.





# "THE SHAPE OF THINGS TO COME?"

"The Shape of Things to Come?": what does this broad title mean/ How does it affect us? What has "shape" to do with our daily lives?

It is the purpose of this essay to tell you my opinions about the part shapes play and will play in our day to day existence. I intend to show you

the profound effect upon our lives.

Shape. Think of the word. Swallow it, chew it. Look around you: a brick, many bricks in a wall; a desklight, a desk, a cup; all common-place articles and yet. One hundred years ago, these common-place articles were different. The wall was built differently, the desklight, the desk, the cup.

Or should it? Should all the shapes that combine to form our existence be stark in their functionality? It is this transition of objects from beautiful to functional that is the point of this


I believe that this trend to functionality is having a significant effect upon our lives, and hence,

functionality can be bad for us.

An example: a businessman, in a very important position, decides to increase the output of his business. It becomes necessary for him to sack five men and replace them with a machine that does their work in half the time.

To increase his functionality, or rather the functionality of his business, the man decided to eliminate the chances of human error. In other words, to find function he has employed simplicity and it is what I have termed ULTRA-SIMPLICITY that is destroying society today.

This modern trend, this ultra-simplicity is not applicable only to shapes: it is applicable to any subject, any topic, that requires work, that has a goal. For to do the work, to reach the goal, one must function.



To do the work best, to reach the goal earlier, is one of man's major preoccupations. His desire to be there first, to win, to be best, is superseding the love of his fellow creature.

It is the same way that function is being superseded by sterility, by lack of variation. In a lot of cases function is satisfactory, as in the modern car. It still has variety, it still is interesting; it has gadgets, it has complete mechanisms, and it is functional. It is functional in making our lives simple, as we can move more easily from A to B: but it

does not have sterility.

Look at any block of flats. Is there variety? Yes, you may answer; look at the trees, nature's attempt at breaking up the rigid jig-saw of human existence. But the buildings - they are the same; they are functional — they function to provide housing for a lot of people, to make their lives more simple. But they are sterile, they give people an impression of being crushed together, thoughtlessly and carelessly. The sheer impersonality of one single flat in one single block - and yet in that single flat of that single block a family must live, survive, grow, love; and in the next one is the same situation. Because of functionality of the building, they do not know who lives next door. The occupant is unable to express his personality, by painting the outside of the flat, no people can see what he thinks his home should look like.

It is this sacrificing of the need for variety in human existence for pure functioning in an at-tempt to amplify life that is so horrifying in our society. Horritying? Yes. We read of the growing drug trade, as the next generation seeks a way out

of the holocaust of sterility in society.

What can be done about it? How can the disregard of human needs be stopped?

The blame is on everybody. "Hippies" yell at the "old" generation for causing it; the "old" generation yell at the "hippies" for doing nothing; and neither do anything to remedy it.

The rot must be stopped at all levels. Designers. politicians, doctors - all should battle for

fulfilment in human society. Shapes should change; perhaps man will adopt nature's shape in his buildings; but it will still take squat rectangles

to do it. Is it too late?


