






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The Headmaster: Mr. P.M. Moyes

TWENTY FIVE YEARS

Twenty five years ago, in February 1951, Mr. P.M. Moyes took up his appointment as Headmaster of the School. To mark this occasion two senior students, Jonathon Silberstein and David Joske sought an interview . . .

I have to remind you that anything you say may be taken down and used as evidence against you.

People say that to me guite often . . .

When you took the position of Headmaster 25 years ago what were your objectives?

I suppose the thing I hoped to do was to create a school where young people could learn to think for themselves... the thought of turning people out in a particular mould horrified me and horrifies me still. I hoped to create a community where there was tolerance and understanding of the needs of other people, an environment where there was a real interest in learning and a love of it and where the students could come to appreciate the problems of the world.

Are these still your objectives now or is the present machinery such that no further change is necessary to fulfil those objectives?

No, I think we've got a long way to go. I think academically we have achieved a certain environment and I think that can be supported by the achievements of students over the years. I am deeply concerned at what little progress we appear to have made when it comes to tolerance and understanding of other people but then I think we're caught up in a community which places more emphasis on material things than it did 25 years ago and there is less self restraint.

How would you go about promoting this greater degree of tolerance?

I think we've got to put in front of them what other people believe and why they believe it...I think a lot of the intolerance comes from people who don't really believe anything at all.

Would isolation from this materialistic community help?

No, I think that in order to promote tolerance of other people we must bring other people into the school. This is why we have guest speakers, for example. We also allow parents, Old boys and outside organisations to use our facilities, and this is one way the school can become more a part of the community. I think that as a result parents have been taking more interest in the school. It is clear however, that in some cases there is one set of values at home and a different set at school.

Is there evidence that confrontation has increased tolerance?

We deliberately situated the Special Education Centre where it is in the Senior School so that students would be exposed to it, and they have shown a willingness to accept it: there is very little teasing of its students. Isn't the fact that the school is not co-educational a case of the school isolating its students from the school?

I think there is a place in the community for schools which are very diverse. There ought to be in the community schools which are small, large, single sex, co-educational progressive schools, traditional schools; I think all of them have a place. The day that I will be happy is when the government dezones schools so that if I want to send my child to a particular high school then there is nothing to prevent me. The point which would interest me is whether the school was interested in the student as a person.

Now as far as co-education here is concerned; it has been considered by Council several times and no doubt will be considered in the future but the research evidence to date indicates that academically, the single sex school is more effective than the co-educational school. This of course does not take into account the social aspects. I think it is very largely immaterial whether or not the school is co-educational if it is a day school in the metropolitan area. If it is a boarding school and it is isolated there may be difficulties. But in the metropolitan area I think segregated boarding schools can be managed provided there is constant contact with other schools.

Certainly I would say that in the buildings we have put up in the last ten years, if there were a decision later on to become co-educational it would present little difficulty.

For all the modern educational innovations such as film, videotape, overhead projectors, language laboratories and so on, do you think the student of today is better educated?

I think he is probably better informed or capable of being better informed because it is easier to get concepts across...I would agree of course that there are people who would probably get along just as well without them...but even those are helped by the good use of aids. I am thinking more particularly of films or transparencies where you can demonstrate something scientific, geographical, historical and so on, and you can do it much more quickly. However, teachers need to be trained to use them effectively and the aids must be readily accessible.

As for the language laboratory I think it is very useful in the hands of a teacher who really wants to use it and who feels it is a very good tool. But in the hands of somebody else it would be a waste of money. For instance, I would only provide overhead projectors to the members of staff who really want to use them.

Let me get it straight. What really matters is that there are good teachers who are interested in learning and in motivating and stimulating their students. All the aids in the world will not transform a poor teacher into an effective one. Indeed, the selection of staff is surely the most important task of a Headmaster.

CAPTAIN OF SCHOOL

What does one write in the "Captain of School's Space"? It is dangerously easy to feel like a protege of Kirwin Ward. The difference is that you realise your audience will probably grace your writings with about one tenth the attention. Only a minority of Year 12 students will get around to reading this work in the near future. Most of us will be only too eager to cast off any reminders of the recent exams and the five years leading up to them in a system many feel too restrictive. A few perhaps will glance back at this Mitre in a decade or so in a moment of nostalgia and if this "disease" grasps us too firmly, we might even join the Old Boys Association!

However many will cleanse themselves of the school as quickly and efficiently as possible.

What is being rejected by these students? Is it the feeling of being too tightly governed; of having no chance to argue back; of learning by the clock the same facts as so many others: Can this be avoided?

The school tries to alleviate the situation by offering a diverse education. 1976 has seen further steps in the right direction. The introduction of more avenues of diversification; clubs, services, activities, extra sports and subject combinations certainly helps.

The school is of course economically and logistically restricted in the subjects it can offer. But there is room for improvement in other areas. The Headmaster speaks of a constant attempt to create a school community and incoming prefects always resolve to do something about the "spirit". But what can be done? It is a common misconception that something can be offered to interest all students. It can't. However, the majority are more likely to find interests and get in-

volved, if and only if, they don't feel dictated to: We must, and I speak as a student, feel more fully in control of our situation. Increased student representation seems to be the answer. In this regard our prefect system can be improved. It is seen too much as another arm of authority. The word "prefect" has immediate connotations of discipline. No doubt a necessary function but not one which is acceptable in its present form. We know of course the ultimate answer is self discipline but like all ideals it is probably impossible to attain fully in the school situation. However, if the majority of students can be made to feel that they have some hand in formulating rules and in applying them then the simple phenomena of peer group pressure, begins to operate and the necessary discipline is achieved.

Boys will be boys and learning what is acceptable and what is not is all part of our education. Boys being boys, the occasional act of irresponsibility will occur and should be condemned. What must be avoided is the undue focussing of attention on this aspect of behaviour so that it is disproportionately enlarged.

At present the prefect system is being examined. The future looks bright for a more equitable arrangement next year. Something akin to an all-years Student Representative Council is in the air and hopefully this wider representation will help to eradicate the need to focus on constraints. We must not be negative!





Our Darlot Cup season opened with a 30 run victory over Wesley. Luke Holland, Peter Seward and Andrew Haslam all batted well for a time and our total of 156 was enough to enable Richard Breidahl (5 for 22) and Ross Wharton (3 for 16) to have our opponents all out shortly after tea. This match proved to be our last Darlot Cup success until the final round. The home game versus Aquinas was washed out by rain: Hale defeated us outright by 10 wickets: Trinity beat us by 45 runs on the first innings: Scotch thrashed us by an innings and 77 runs; and so, it was with some relief that we made 250 against Guildford, Robert Donaldson (49) and Peter Moore (67) both batting extremely well, and beat them by 78 runs due to some very persistent and accurate bowling by Brad Ethell, David Stephenson, Moore and Breidahl.

As for our three defeats, it was the spin of Barrymore and S. Marsh rather than the pace of Gepp that was our undoing at Hale, although Brian Rillstone batted well twice. In the Hale innings of 180, G. Marsh and Aitken scored 137 and, had an early catch or two been held, the story might have been very different, for Breidahl (6 for 50) and Wharton bowled extremely well. Against Trinity, Ethell bowled 24 overs, 11 maidens and took 4 for 34 and, if our middle order batsmen had been able to use their feet against the well flighted spin of Harries (8 for 62), we could have won, for Donaldson, Joe Fisher and Richard McNeil gave us a good start and Seward and Stephenson

caused our tail to wag. Scotch outplayed us, although Seward and Stephenson between them took 8 for 72 in an innings of 9 for 231. As for our batting, Moore reached double figures twice and Holland made 17 not out in the first innings and batted 2 hours for 25 in the second - for the rest, the least said the better. Peter Seward was an extremely astute captain. His fielding was outstanding, and his batting improved markedly. Peter Moore, the vice-captain, only regained his form with the bat late in the season but, when in full flow, is a magnificent driver of the ball. Richard Breidahl, for the second year in succession, won the bowling trophy. He has a very deceptively late inswing and bowls with his head. Robert Donaldson has tremendous potential as a batsman and, coupled with his determination, should prove a tower of strength in the 1966-7 season. Luke Holland is an extremely good wicket-keeper and often made runs when they mattered. Joe Fisher and Richard McNeil are correct batsmen who should make many runs. Brian Rillstone, Andrew Haslam and Clive Turner are batsmen with gaps in their armoury, but who could prove their worth if these are filled. Brad Ethell and Ross Wharton bowled very well on occasions and David Stephenson came into the side for the last three matches and showed great promise in all departments of the game. In the final match, Andrew Viner played a good innings and so did Russell McKay.

I should like to thank Messrs. Tooke and Fisher for their great assistance in coaching and Mrs. Seward and other mothers for their unfailing support of the inner man. Rae Deeley proved an outstandingly helpful scorer and there is no doubt that, with the continued support of such people as these, our 1976/7 XI could well achieve the ultimate goal — the Darlot Cup for the first time — for we have 9 old colours available and several other cricketers of similar talent.

As for the other teams in the Senior School, the 2nd XI, coached by Mr. Pate and skippered by Robert Fletcher, had an excellent season, winning most of its

matches and the Under 16A XI, under Mr. Woollett and Doug Grewar, also did extremely well; a century scored by Clayton Lewis being perhaps the highlight. The 3rd XI with Mr. Blackwood and the Under 16B with Mr. London and Wayne Sheppard won more matches than they lost and a Thursday cricket group, under Mr. Woodall, flourished.

The Middle School P.S.A. competition continues into third term, but after the first term matches, the 9th year A XI under Mr. House and Bill Breidahl is unbeaten and the other teams have been more than holding their own.

Maintenance Group

The Boatshed Maintenance Group, as always, attempted to keep the crews well equipped and afloat. Late 1975 saw the replacement of nearly all the oar leathers with new P.V.C. sleeves and the strengthening of the "Fraser" with new ribs. At this stage Mr. Hammond's appearance on the scene to supervise maintenance created a much tighter organisation.

The 1976 Season began and, with the D.H. Fraser available for training, the two McClemans Eights were taken out of commission and given major overhauls. Unfortunately, an unlucky combination of "washes" broke the "Fraser's" back less than a month before the "Head of the River Regatta". However E.A. (Eddie) Cook was called in and the boat was in commission again within 48 hours.

A boat which normally comes under heavy repair each year was, this year, sadly neglected. The "Parry" was officially taken out of service after an active life of about twenty years.

The under 16 record cracker was Nigel Forrester who created a new School record and also set an inaugural record for the Quads, in the 400 metres which he ran in a fast time of 53.5 seconds. In the U/16 age group two records were broken, one by the brilliant Ross Clarke in the 1500 metres, with a time of 4 min. 38.4 seconds and the other by Mark Alderson in the high jump in which he cleared 1.64 metres. This jump wiped out yet another long standing record of the versatile R.E. Merrells. Finally in the U/14 age group M. Whitford broke a long standing record in the hurdles in a nippy time of 15.8 seconds.

Then came the Inters where once again there were some very pleasing individual results. The team as a whole tried extremely hard to get out of that last place and to get rid of the wooden spoon. At some stages throughout the day it appeared as if our dream would come true but a poorly run relay let us down, consequently we were last again.

A total of eight wins were recorded by members of our team which was almost three times better than last year. The winners were Mark Bingemann in the Open 110 m. hurdles, Andrew Haslam in the Open 1500 m., Richard Dale in the U/17 110m. hurdles, Duncan Sullivan in the U/17 1500 metres, Clayton Lewis and Nigel Forrester in the U/16 800 metres first and second divisions, Edwin Sinclair in the U/15 100 metres and Ross Clarke U/15 1500 metres. Congratulations to all these boys on a solid job.

Once again the long distance runners dominated the points scored and credit must go to Mr. Marsland for his dedication in the training of these boys. Thanks must also go to all other coaches who gave their time so generously.

Avid readers of this column might recall a comment or two made in last year's "Mitre" "The End of an Era - - The Cadet Unit is dead"! Fortunately, this is now about as realistic as a jog to the top of "Peter Tooke's Peak" at Kooringal!

Mum came in the door. When she saw the kitchen she dropped her shopping. "What happened?" she asked.







UNION RULES

The truck pulled up and two men dressed in overalls climbed down from the truck's cabin. 




