

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THE INDIVIDUAL IN THE SCHOOL COMMUNITY

The 1980's, a decade which for so long has seemed a distant future era, is rapidly arriving and while not presenting a world of space technology and total subservience to the State as many writers predicted, still offers a real challenge to those who wish to pursue their own interests and develop an individual identity.

Perhaps the most difficult thing for any student to do whilst at school is to speak up for, or actually do something, which has never been attempted before. He is under continual scrutiny from both his peers and his school, and to make such an attempt places his credibility in jeopardy. It is the individual thinker who suffers from these pressures and in some ways such pressures are increasing; vet as we approach the decade of "Big Brother" and conformism, every attempt should be made to protect the freedom of thought of individuals, both within and outside the school. Our society tends to shun these people and, as much as we may dislike to admit it, we cannot deny the fact that social unawareness, and even instances of persecution of those who differ in anyway, are apparent within the Christ Church community: fortunately not on a scale as large as in some other communities.

Our major aim as the 1979 Prefects was to reduce such feelings within the school and our results have been marked with creditable success. We have attempted to influence all members of the school into accepting people as they are rather than trying to make them what they consider they ought to be. The Prefects meet every week and once a month are joined by Year representatives. As well as discussing minor school policy and activities, we quietly discussed those members of the school who we felt had problems which prevented them from fitting into school life. In most cases it was due to their difference in approach to some aspect of school life, and the problem has been solved by a Prefect and/or a member of staff informally helping and watching the situation. At this point I must thank other Prefects for their help in this function, for I feel that this is the most important and fulfilling task which the Prefects, in their limited capacity. can undertake. On the other side of the coin there was a necessity to consider those members of the school who because of antogonism, hindered other students from fitting in. Regrettably, we have a few students who usally attempt to denigrate others to disguise their own inadequacies. These people were also discussed at meetings

and some conclusions regarding the reasons for their actions, and how they could be helped, were made, for it was obvious that these people were also having difficulties in adjusting to school life.

Still on the theme of individuality, there appears to be no reason why students at Christ Church should not be able to expand their interests with the diverse selection of clubs and societies, coupled with the relatively large range of subjects available for study at all levels. However this year, more than in previous years, vast pressure has been placed on students to excel in academic areas and it has resulted in many students being forced to discontinue their outside interests. Dramatic, musical and other activities, which are regarded by many as an essential part of education, have seen a drastic, sometimes complete, reduction in patronage from Year 12's who previously have been the powerhouse of these activities. Although,

to achieve a good academic record is important, an individual can only expand his personality through participation in cultural areas, and to deprive him of this opportunity will only cause him to resist his academic commitments. An ideal situation is one where his schoolwork and outside activities are allowed to co-exist, to a point where he is both suitably qualified to pursue a career once he has left school, and able to take part in one or more interests, resulting in a greater degree of cultural awareness.

I look to the future Prefects in pursuing the aim of satisfying the individual's needs, for, if fulfilled, it will undoubtedly lead to a school in which tolerance is apparent, and the needs of other people are recognized.

A tireless worker for the church, she came to us with a proven record of hard work and dedication to the community. In those early days, office space was at a premium, every financial record was handwritten or typed, there was no such thing as a copy machine and hand messages were the only means of contact, there being no internal telephone system. As finance became available and office procedures were modernised, she cheerfully learnt to operate ledger machines, offset printing machines, telephone boards and the like.

Nothing was too much trouble to her and office hours were an unknown thing. She has indeed made her mark in the school and we wish her a long and happy, well earned, retirement.

AKOS KOVACS

The "Gay Hussar" of C.C.G.S.

Akos Kovacs was appointed to the Physical Education position in 1955. He was recommended to the Headmaster by Dr. Duras from the Melbourne University, after having graduated with a Dip. Phys. Ed. in 1954.

Upon arriving at the school he took up residence in Romsey boarding house (now better know as Parry House) and set about the task of establishing a physical education course that the school could well be proud of. Soon after he commenced duties the Memorial Hall was completed and this building was to be the centre of all phys. ed; basketball and gymnastic activities for the next seventeen years.

In May 1957 Akos moved into Queenslea boarding house (now known as Walters). He continued as an assistant housemaster until 1969 when he left to be married.

There are undoubtedly many young old boys of the school who were suitably impressed by the "Kosh" discipline in and around the boarding houses. Some learnt how to sing Hungarian washing songs, while the odd one even managed to borrow Akos' only means of transport, a sturdy old bike, to visit a girlfriend at night.

It has often been said that a good teacher will always have at his disposal a ready supply of excellent teaching aids and in this regard Akos is no exception. Since his appointment to the school he has assisted with some valuable contributions to his department. He has always endeavoured to set up a functional gymnasium, consequently many pieces of the gymnastic apparatus have been made by him during what little free time he has had.

For some seven or eight years he cared for and attended to the swimming pool in the same way as he cared for his gym equipment. The term "gymnastrada" is foreign to the present school population. However, Akos introduced these evenings of performance to the school in 1956 and, in all, produced ten very successful and colourful gymnastic displays. On these occasions everyone who was a part of the phys-ed programme participated, for Prep school to Year 12.

He has coached the school swimming team; basketball team; lifesaving team; gymnastics team and assisted with the athletics team. He has taught under hard conditions, when the swimming lessons for P.E. were conducted down beside the boatshed in the river, and now under near perfect conditions in our magnificent gymnasium. No matter what sport or facility or condition he has had to work under, he has for twenty-five years demanded and set high standards; and been a most conscientious teacher. His dedication to his work has brought a high degree of respect from all those boys who have been fortunate enough to have a little bit of A.K. rub off on them.

He would no doubt consider the pinnacle of his career being in the area of gymnastics. He has had many dedicated young gymnasts striving for national recognition. One in particular, Lindsay Nylund, who for eight years learnt almost everything there is to know about gymnastics under Kovacs, is now, at the young age of twenty, the winner of a silver medal at the 1978 Commonwealth Games in Edmonton, Canada, is ranked among the top ten gymnasts in the U.S.A. and indeed the top twenty in the world. That must indeed be a credit to the perseverance of the student. However, if we were to ask Lindsay Nylund what is perfection and where does he get the personal drive, we know that his answer would quite simply be, "Akos Kovacs!"

We the staff and students of Christ Church applaud the man who for twenty-five years has practised and preached perfection, and respect to all.

1st XI Report

During third term 1978 we were team building. There remained a strong nucleus of players from the previous Darlot Cup season and all had high hopes for the coming 1979 season. The team performed rather inconsistently in their Gamble Cup matches. Highlights were the wins against Trinity and Guildford and a draw against Aquinas. For no apparent reason, the team would play extremely well one week and incredibly poorly the next. We tried desperately to develop some consistency. Encouraging features of our third term matches were the steady, accurate bowling from the Breidahl — 'Machine', the latest legspin weapon in the form of 'Percy' Richmond and some solid batting by Mark Paris and Cameron Lewis.

Bill Breidahl was elected captain, with Duncan Cameron his deputy and Cameron Lewis as third selector. I wish to thank them for their support.

As the Darlot Cup 1979 season opened we were extremely hopeful of doing well, but alas the inconsistency which became apparent in third term was again to plague the team.

In our first match against Trinity we had them 8 for 62 on the first afternoon and then allowed them to reach a total of 155. Inexplicably our batting also failed, and we were all out for a total of 119. We had lost our first contest. Soundly beaten by Scotch in third term we were able to reverse the result, undoubtedly due to a fine innings of 63 by Breidahl and a devastating spell of bowling by Richmond who captured 6 for 44, well assisted by the fielders and Paul White who took 4 excellent stumpings.

Undoubtedly our best performance was against Guildford who we defeated outright in a very exciting game. A magnificent century by Lewis and good support from Cameron and Milligan set our total of 6 for 243 declared. Richmond again struck taking 5 for 33 in the first innings and Breidahl 5 for 26 in the 2nd. Fielding was again excellent.

Having played ourselves into a very strong position we then collapsed. I blame our performances basically on a lack of concentration. Our fielding deteriorated badly and our batting proved extremely brittle. As a result we ended up out of the competition. A little disappointing for a team of this potential!!

I cannot conclude without making mention of a few further highlights. Cameron Lewis produced another magic century against Hale and a fine 64 against Aquinas. Duncan Cameron also scored a fine century against Wesley. Will Atkins developed into a fine medium-pace bowler and consistently bowled well, his best performance being 5 for 49 against Aquinas. Finally Bill Breidahl who, in the past three Darlot seasons has established a remarkable record having taken 109 wickets. I congratulate him on his efforts.

The team owed a lot to Ray Strauss who assisted greatly in the area of coaching and to the mothers led by Mrs Breidahl and Mrs Cameron who always did a quality job in providing lunches and afternoon teas.

Many thanks also to David MacKenzie whose efforts as scorer have been truly outstanding.



This high success rate was then followed up in the U/16, U/17 and Open division of the 1500 m races, when every Christ Church competitor gained a place in one of the first three positions, Rob. Grylls put up a courageous effort to win the U/16 1st Div, 1500 m, Hamish Carnachan secured a first place in the 2nd Division U17 1500 m, and Mike Knox and Tim Flaherty pulled off the quinella in the Open 2nd and1st Division races respective-

Other good performances that occurred throughout the afternoon included Cameron Lewis's win in the Open 2nd

Division Long Jump, Andrew King's win in the U/16 2nd Division Long Jump, Willy Atkin's fine run in the Open 2nd Division 100 m to take in first place, Ashley McDonald's win in the Open 2nd Division Triple Jump. Then there was Mal Thomson's superb effort in winning all three 1st Division jumping events in the U/15 age group.

By the time the last event of the day, the Open Relay. was about to commence Christ Church still remained in fifth position by 10 points to Guildford who was fourth overall. But due to great team effort in this particular event by Willy Atkins, Cameron Lewis, Edward Sinclair and Paul Michael, they gained third place and secured a fourth position overall by 4 points from Guildford, who slipped back to fifth place

It was an excellent conclusion to a fine athletics season, where not only did we win the Quads. but we also did well at the Inters. It must be realised that this success was only made possible through the organization and coaching both from inside and outside the school. Thanks must go to Mr, Marsland for his very successful coaching of the middle distance runners, to Mr. Bowker for his organizing efforts throughout the season, also to Mr.Kovacs, Mr, Merrells, Mr, Blackwood, Mr. London, Mr.Van Kempen, Mr. Ryder and to the outside coaches, Duncan Sullivan, Jim Bogle. Mr. Taylor from the U.W.A. and to anyone inadvertently omitted.

On this note I would finally like to take the oportunity to wish next year's athletic team the best of luck and the hope that they have the success we shared this year.

This year has been one of change for the Social Service. From the beginning, this year's committee decided on a new emphasis in activity that would lead to increased participation out in the community. This kind of participation has slowly declined in previous years, as former committees decided it was easier to raise money that could be channelled into worthwhile causes, rather than become involved directly with people requiring personal assistance.

It was our aim to rectify this trend, and to encourage student participation in the community in areas that students of such an affluent school such as Christ Church seldom encounter.

We began by forming links with Lucy Creath a home for victims of muscular dystrophy. After five visits, it became apparent that our visits were of little real value to the crippled children. It was, in retrospect, naive to assume that we could bounce into such an environment and communicate with people with such complex problems. The lessons we learnt made our endeavour worthwhile, and was a real eye opener to the terrible handicaps endured by some.

Our reception at Wanslea (a short term hostel for young children whose parents, due to sickness or other problems cannot support their children) was completely different. No communication barrier existed in this situation, as was demonstrated by the Christ Church boys who could be seen cavorting around the Wanslea play grounds. These Friday afternoon visits provided relief for over worked staff, and again introduced us to social problems unusually encountered by us.

The money raised throughout the year totalled about \$500. This money was presented to the St. Bartholomew's Home for derilict and destitute men. Those of the committee who visited the home saw the severe poverty that still exists in our society.

It is interesting to note that house collections — a source of money that used to be the school's only fund raising activity have, in recent years, drastically diminished, and that the majority of money now raised through house collections comes from the Preparatory School. To compensate for this lack of income, the Social Service Committee has spent nearly all its time organising fund raising activities such as quiz nights and the ever popular "Mr. Christ Church" competition.

It is a pity that our worth is judged in dollars raised rather than in people helped.

Although many lessons were learnt, we must be honest and say that we failed in our basic aim. The visits to Wanslea, and all our fund raising activities were pereformed by a core of twelve students, with virtually no other help from the rest of the school. Repeated pleas for help were ignored as the majority of students believed that "somebody else" would do the work.

The question that must be answered is whether in fact it is not hypocritical for a school like Christ Church to boast Social Service, while all the effort is made by a handful of boys.

The 1979 committee wishes the 1980 committee the best of luck in its work and gives its thanks to our patron, Mr. Williams, who quietly but firmly helped us on our way.

During 1979 The Selwyn Prior Library has continued to fill an increasingly important role in the life of the school. Since moving to its larger quarters in 1976, the Library has rapidly established itself as the school's major meeting place for students, and this trend intensified during the year. Students have, in ever increasing numbers, opted for the air-conditioned comfort of the Library, in preference to braving the elements. As the Library is the only large, sheltered area to which students can go before school and at lunchtime, it was often crammed during winter's cold and wet patches.

Although the staff and prefects were pleased with the growth in Library usage, it was not without its problems. With so many people in the Library, it is essential to maintain a reasonably low level of conversation. It is the Library Prefects main task to police this, and more particularly, to maintain total silence in the "Quiet Area", the section to the west of the Librarian's Office. A sizeable majority of students seem determined to abuse the unique intention of this area as a place for individual work without talk, and the prefects are given the responsibility to evict those selfish and/or unthinking members of the school community who refuse to obey the wall charts, prefects and staff which/who warn against the dangers of incessant chatter. The maintenance of silence has however proved a daunting, almost impossible task although I feel that a gradual improvement has been achieved over the year in noise levels.

COMPUTER CLUB

1979 was a year of education for the computer club. We have not been as busy writing and then playing computer games as we have been in the past. We concentrated our efforts on all aspects of computer use, and some interesting programmes resulted.

A few years ago, the chief computer users were year 12's, mainly because boys did not start using the computer until year 10 or 11. Since then, however, there has been a gradual change, and now year 12's use the computer only occasionally, especially during third term, when study for the T.A.E. tends to leave little time for extra curricular activities.

This year, three year 11's, D. Cooksley, P. Hill and S. Nixon have proved to be the most able computer operators, and have explored every aspect of the computer's capabilities. This knowledge has been shown in the programmes they have written and used this year. These three members also give up valuable computing time to teach younger members of the club to use the computer. As a result of this, year 9's and 8's are now able to handle the computer by themselves, and consequently play an active part in the club.

A 'feature' of the club not to be forgotten is the man at the top, Mr. Merrells. In the last few years, due to high levels of computer exposure, he has unavoidably caught the 'computer bug' disease. He arranged for computing to be taught as part of the maths sylabus in years 9 and 10 in 1979, and the club hopes to extend the field of computer use to all students, as the computer is becoming an increasingly important part of our technological world.

During the year we lost our phone link with larger outside computers, such as the computing system at the University. For the rest of the year we were temporarily based in Mr. Merrells maths classroom in S-Block. The result of this move was an extremely high level of computer-saturation for him. One can take a limited amount of exposure to computers, and many members of the club sympathize with him having sat in front of the computer screen for an hour to two too many themselves.

MUSIC

DRAMA NOTES

The introduction of Options into the Year 11 timetable this year saw the participation of a dozen boys in the Drama Option and a consequent increase in the Year 11 involvement in the July Drama Evenings. On these two evenings, the English Department put on a selection of poetry readings and one-act plays in the School Memorial Hall. Casts and directors were encouraged to be exploratory in their approach to sets, lighting and movement. The result was a programme that showed a pleasing range of technique.

One very interesting development, for instance, was the use of a rear-projection screen, which allowed performers to work inthe context of a variable backdrop. There was also an increase in the number of original playscripts. As

well, the trend towards music-and-movement became very apparent.

Then on November 1st, 2nd and 3rd, Mr. Pate put on a musical he had written to celebrate WAY 79, "The Golddigger". Boys of Christ Church Grammar School were joined by girls of Methodist Ladies' College in a performance that combined freshness and zest with a message for all of us.


Camp development continues and it is pleasing to report that the four outside tables constructed by the Special Education group have been in constant use since their installation and their solid construction will ensure many years of useful life.

Visitors to the school may be excused if they believe that Walters Boarding House has been replaced by a modern building based on the design of the old one, for the whole boarding house has been renovated to a large degree. Quiet aptly, it has been painted the house colour and now the white house stands in all its glory, dominating the school with its commanding position.

The internal renovations have involved the construction of either a single or double cubicle for every student. Each unit is self-contained with each student having a desk, bed, individual study lights and clothing storage space. On at least two of the walls there is a facility for posters and any other objects they may wish to decorate their cubicles with. These "other objects" have ranged from Indonesian Batiks through to a ram's skull and a high scoring economics assignment.

THOUGHTS AND OBSERVATIONS OF A 22ND CENTURY STUDENT

The powerful green floodlights shine on the school campus in their vibrant way, mimicing the brilliance of the sun which will rise in about four hours. Looking above my naked head I can see a space shuttle hurtling across the sky in a splash of red, enveloped in the dark canopy which is peacefully settled above the day-like surface. Disappearing over Swanbourne Hill, its roar gradually dissipates into the silence of the mid-morning shift. Next semester I hope to be put on the morning to mid-day shift so I can be with my friends whilst at school. Even though I am not permitted to talk to them whilst on campus it will be pleasant to see them during my study time. If this is to eventuate I must improve my grades so my application will be approved.

Looking around the surface world, embalmed in its green light, I can see members of a Year 11 form undergoing their swimming lessons in the old pool built near the Stirling Linc-Route. The speaker suspended above the heavily chlorinated water blares out its familiar instructions to the students, who, today, appear to be learning water rescue techniques. If students fail to undergo an instruction correctly the electrodes at each end of their lanes jump to life, sending a bolt of electricity through their white, untanned bodies to ensure they will not make the mistake again. However, this form appears to be made up of good students and there is no need for any of them to be punished.

Turning my back on the pool I cast a glance in the direction of the newly-opened museum which traces school history back to 1910. The faces of the players are expressionless in the artificial, translucent light of midmorning which beams down on the campus to allow us to overcome the limiting factor of time and utilize the educational facilities we are provided with.

While thinking about the utilization of time, I glance at my watch and realize it is 1.40 a.m., and that I have only twenty minutes of my feed break left. Moving towards the Food Dispensary Service I pass the hundreds of sleeping students who lie in the massive, bubble-like, transparent recuperation domes. Their peaceful faces indicate that they have no knowledge of the nocturnal goings on outside the domes, thus proving the efficiency of our recently installed electronic coma device which makes dreaming and light sleeping a thing of the past. It also allows the students to be fully refreshed, enabling maximum intellectual absorbtion when they attend classes. Looking around I see the many happy faces of students who sing with vitality and vigour . . . and I know that we are all safe from the enemy under the kind wing of our Federation.

No one stirs in their seats except two young Aboriginal girls,


