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
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Mr. ANDREW TAIT

An introductory interview

The boys of Mr Hardy-Atkins Year 12 class devised this interview which provides insight into the attitudes and background of Christ Church Grammar School's Deputy Headmaster, Mr. Andrew Tait, who joined the School this year.

What sort of student were you yourself?

I think fairly average. I suspect that I probably did too much sport. I managed to get to University so I suppose I was a slightly above average student.

What were your sporting preferences?

Vast — I had a very catholic choice. I played soccer, and cricket, was a moderate athlete, swam a fair bit, played rugby; I probably did most of the things that were available at school.

What was your motivation for becoming a teacher?

(Thoughtful pause) None I suppose because I had intended to join the services. I hoped to win a commission in the Air Force but at the last stage I was rejected because of some sporting injuries I'd suffered. I was rather at a loss as to what I should do and the Headmaster at my school asked me "Why not teach?" and that's how it happened.

(Ingenuously) You couldn't think of a good reason? I couldn't (laughs).

Do you have a personal philosophy of education?

Well, I've been teaching now for a fairly long time and I think I've been through several changes. I had my teaching changed quite dramatically by various new courses which were trialled in the United Kingdom. I believe very strongly now in a classroom which is student centred rather than teacher centred. I believe we should be teaching for understanding rather than learning, that means that a teacher becomes more of a resource than an authority in a classroom. Teaching in this particular way is not easy because of the increase in informal exchange of ideas. One needs the right sort of surrounding, the right classrooms and equipment, but I believe that in general students learn better if they do things for themselves while the teacher acts as a resource rather than just giving a great deal of information.

Is this process of classroom interaction likely to continue and is the line between those who are teaching and those who are taught, likely to become less distinct?

I would think so. It's not many years now since we called all boys by their surnames and now we commonly address boys by their Christian names. Boys still call us by a title but I suspect that in the not too distant future we'll be addressed by our Christian names.

What we have to try to do, as teachers, is to make our students recognise that in learning, it's not just one person, the teacher, doing all the work, while the students just sit, it's a corporate effort and there has to be an increasing input from students. I think that as that input develops, classrooms will become much less formal than they were a few years ago.

What for you is the most important feature of discipline?

When you work in an enclosed and crowded community as we do, there have to be certain rules so that we can function, and if those rules break down, the functioning of the school becomes less efficient. I look upon discipline as a means of allowing this body to function efficiently and I suppose to achieve the best results possible, whether they be academic, sporting, social, dramatic or whatever. One requires guidelines in these areas. I'm strongly in favour of putting boys in the position where they accept their responsibilities and realise that their behaviour affects the whole community. When they learn to adapt their behaviour so that the group does function efficiently they master the art of self-discipline.

It's a complete change of subject but what were you expecting when you came to C.C.G.S.?

I'd met Tony Hill previously at a conference, and had enjoyed his company very much. I'd enjoyed his views of what he'd thought education was all about and I

had been looking forward to doing something different. I'd been head of physics in various schools for something like 20 years; I'd become somewhat involved in administration in my previous school and I suppose I looked forward to moving deeper into administration because I think the challenge of running a physics department was beginning to wane. I felt I was in danger of slipping into a comfortable rut so I was looking for something new.

In your last school, you were very closely involved in the supervision of Year 12 boys. In accepting this position was there any regret about the possibility of being less involved with the students?

Very much so. I suppose at the end of a sixth form year, a Year 12 year, I'd got to know 250 boys fairly well. I was still teaching in the lower part of the school so as they arrived in the sixth form I tended to know a fair number. The job that I'm doing now doesn't give me quite as much contact, there are compensations I suppose in terms of sport and drama where you meet boys in a smaller group and you get to know them rather better but it is a bit of a loss when you get into the kind of job that I'm doing now, when you don't have quite as much contact as a Tutor might do and I miss that.

After two terms, what do you see as Christ Church's unique advantages; what charm does it have for you?

I suppose the charms are two — firstly there's the delightful site — and secondly it's probably got the most caring atmosphere that I've ever been in in a school and this is perhaps a function of its size — I think it's also a function of its organisation in terms of the Tutorial system — I think also it has a particularly caring staff, they are, in general, very interested in, and very caring for, the students and that makes life very pleasant for students and the administration.

How do you see the roles of the four central administrative figures at Christ Church?

I think that the roles have not yet become absolutely crystallised and that's really due to the pace of what has been an exceptionally busy year, in all sorts of ways. I hope that in the next year these roles will become more tightly specified but I see my responsibilities as being the academic programmes of the school. Peter Tooke has the job of co-ordinating the activities of the houses, making sure that the masters and teachers, within houses, perform their functions. I see Tony Burns' prime function as timetabling. He's absolutely brilliant at that and research. We obviously have to do quite a bit of research about the directions in which we're thinking of moving and Tony is obviously very good at that.

You've overlooked the Headmaster.

Well the Headmaster of course is the one who makes the ultimate decisions and the one who pushes us in the directions we should be thinking about. His overview of the whole school is much, much bigger than ours. He, I guess, is our director.

You haven't mentioned the Head's role as a fund-raiser.

Well, it seems to me that in schools like this, with the possibility that government funding might wane, Headmasters become more and more responsible for funding and more and more responsible for the public image of the school so that funding can go reasonably well and of course he has the total picture of where the school is going to develop; what the building programmes should be and these sort of things.

What would you like to achieve most in the next few years, for yourself and for the school?

That's a fairly difficult question but I suppose most of all I would like, if possible, to strengthen the school's academic programme, perhaps being in some way responsible for improving the academic results of our students. At the moment I suspect we should be doing a little better than we are.

Secondly I think — schools like this tend to be geared toward an academic programme and though I think we do quite well with students who are not academically inclined, I think we should still do a lot more. Over the next few years I think we need to look very carefully at the sorts of programmes which we offer to students who either don't want to go to University, or who, for reasons of ability, will not be able to get into tertiary education. I think we should probably broaden the base of the curriculum in that regard.

I would like to give support to the several embryonic co-curricular activities which are now growing fairly rapidly within the school. By those I mean music — drama and the outdoor education programme. I think I need not be as supportive of the sporting programme as it's well established.

I'm also most interested in the physical part of the school because I think that will need to change as time goes on to meet the demands that will be placed on it.

How important to you is it that this school should maintain its physical attractiveness? Does that charm affect the students?

I think it's enormously important! I started my teaching career in the east-end of London in a school that was just about 500 years old. It was on a very small site with no gardens. It was surrounded only by asphalt. I think the students in those surroundings did pretty well. But having taught in two Australian schools — both with really beautiful surroundings, I think it makes a tremendous difference to attitudes. It's much easier to be cheerful in beautiful grounds. I think our situation is an enormous plus. It just makes it good to come to work.

THE 1984 BUILDING FUND PROGRAMME

In the late forties, there was a strong suggestion that Christ Church Grammar School would have to close down or to become a Preparatory School for Guildford and Hale. With the support of the Old Boys and under the leadership of the School Council and the young Headmaster, Mr. Moyes, that pressure was resisted. Enrolments grew steadily from a few hundred to the present level of 1.050. Old buildings were refurbished or replaced, land was purchased at Claremont and Mt. Claremont and fine new buildings were added. Supporters of the School contributed generously to Building Appeals which financed the Memorial Hall, the new Gymnasium, the Chapel and other major projects. Large sums of money were borrowed and the cash flow produced by increasing enrolments was also used to finance capital works.

Over the last seventeen years, every building in the Senior School in the boarding section and at Kooringal, has been either completely rebuilt or dramatically refurbished. The one section of the School that has received only limited assistance, has been the Preparatory School — the oldest part of the School and one that has received widespread praise for its educational contribution, particularly under the leadership of Mr. Don MacLeod. For years he and his staff have worked under makeshift conditions with the promise of an eventual rebuilding of the whole Preparatory School.

At last their time has come. A fine new building has been designed by our Architects and work will begin on the \$2 million project before the end of this year. Large, bright, modern classrooms for every class, a first-class library, Art and Craft rooms and courtyard, a Science Laboratory, extensive covered areas for recreation, a Film and Activity Room, specialist areas for remedial teaching and extension classes, will be some of the facilities provided.

As an additional benefit the old Preparatory School buildings will become available for the Music School, which presently has to function in a crowded area under the Chapel and in various areas around the boarding houses.

To finance the project the School decided to borrow \$650,000, to draw \$350,000 from cash flow and to seek to raise \$1 million from its supporters. The target was a daunting one and it was with some trepidation that the Appeal was launched on 1st July. The response of parents. Old Boys and other supporters of the School soon put any fears to rest. In the first two months \$800,000 was given or promised. Almost everyone approached has agreed to support the Appeal to the best of his ability and the only difficulty has been in making contact with all parents and Old Boys. The work of the General Gifts Committee under Mr. David Conners and Mr. Barry Crommelin continues through until March next year. By then it is hoped all members of the school community will have been given a chance to share in this exciting new stage in the School's development.

TEACHER EXCHANGE SCHEMES

As in many other areas, the independent schools in Australia have led the way in arranging regular overseas exchanges for their teaching staff. These exchanges have generally been with schools in England but over the last ten years an increasing number have been with North American schools. Christ Church teachers have shown a great interest in gaining overseas experience as a list of recent exchanges shows:

1985 — Mr. Roger Dixon will exchange with Mr. Bill Chamberlin of Noble and Greenough School, Dedham, near Boston, Massachusetts, U.S.A.

1984-85 — Mr. Roger Dettman is on exchange with Mr. Arne Schulte of Balthaser Neumann Gymnasium, Bavaria, West Germany.

1983-84 — Mr. Peter Hopper took leave for two years to teach in the government schools of Zimbabwe.

1982-83 — Mr. Geoff Matthews exchanged with Mr. Doug Brown of the Saskatoon School System, Saskatchewan, Canada.

The benefits of the exchanges to the School and to the individual teacher are considerable. The School Council has accepted my recommendation that it should pay the travel expenses for one exchange each year and the teaching staff has responded enthusiastically to the opportunity.

At the same time I have persuaded the Headmasters' Conference of Australia to establish an Australian and New Zealand Exchange Scheme, of which I am the organiser. Links are being forged with similar organisations in Great Britain, Canada and the United States and it is hoped that, with the help of the computer, the independent schools of all English-speaking countries can eventually share in a comprehensive Exchange Bank

The sporting side of school life is one strongly emphasised and creates strong and lasting links between schools and individuals throughout the P.S.A. Sport is also an integral part of the School's public image and is therefore in direct proportion to the pride and spirit we, the students, all feel. Last year the average place for sporting teams was 5th, out of the seven schools comprising the P.S.A. This year this was raised to 3rd place. That is the average position on the P.S.A. table for all Christ Church teams, putting us well into the top 50% as far as sporting success is concerned.

Special mention must be made of teams at both extremes. Ten out of 11 of the first teams for the major sports improved on their position. The 1st XV Rugby team gained one place up to second position, Cross Country remained undefeated and the 1st XVIII Football team trained and played strong and disciplined football to lift themselves from the rut, two positions to 5th.

Success like this elevates school spirit and morale to the point that it is now far above anything I have experienced in the five years that I have been a part of Christ Church.

This pride is of the utmost importance, not only in the cellular confines of school, but in local district pride. It is also of importance to success in the economics world and equally important on a national level. It is therefore fortunate that the boys of Christ Church can experience the strengths behind spirit and pride, to stand them in good stead to apply this in later life.

However, Sport is not the only aspect of school life which has lifted the morale of the school family. It has been a very active year academically, with students winning medals in both National Chemistry and Mathematics Competitions and one member of the School being included in the Australian team for the "Maths Olympiad".

There have been no fewer than ten Drama productions, three of which were produced in the new "Hall Theatre". These provided yet another boost to the School's public image.

The public eye was also constantly focused upon boys from Christ Church in a more varied field. Boys from Christ Church played and captained the State Lacrosse team, won the State Schoolboys' Surfing title, and the "Bridge to Bridge" windsurfing race.

But the pride of the boys was not raised by any accident. The year commenced well with tennis and Rob Phillips, the 1st VIII's Captain, making a desperate and emotional plea to the school to discard the apathy we had unfortunately inherited and try our hardest.

The results of the tennis were outstandingly impressive. They rose from last place, five positions to a well-deserved second.

Swimming followed and this time the Prefects did their utmost to support our team. A large publicity campaign was launched with pleasing results. The team rose from last year's 6th to the impressive position of 3rd, but the most impressive part of the carnival was the 100% support the team received from the very enthusiastic and proud Christ Church supporters who packed Beatty Park to urge on their team.

So obviously there are many people to thank who were instrumental in this transition. Firstly, the very talented members of staff and the Headmaster, who were constantly supportive and helpful. Secondly, the Year Twelves who truly are a great group. Also the fourteen other Prefects, especially the two Senior Prefects Brian Beresford and Chris Kelsall - I trust they will all fondly remember our swimming skit in Chapel and the success it had. I would like to thank you all for a great year.



CRICKET

Preparation for the 1984 Darlot Cup season began with the Gamble Cup in third term of 1983. Although we won only one of the four matches all the losses were close games. It should be noted that the team was seriously disadvantaged in this term by the loss of Steve Russell after the first game. Then, if that wasn't bad enough, Colin Walker became horribly ill over the summer holidays and wasn't available for the Darlot season. Consequently, we never had both our opening bowlers at the same time, after the first Gamble Cup match.

The best feature of the team's third term performances was its sound batting. This was led by an outstanding run of form by John Hui who scored over two hundred runs in the four matches, including a century against Scotch. Overall, the 1st XI's prospects were healthy.

The season opened with a rather unsuccessful campaign against the Old Boys. Despite some promising batting we could only muster 68. The Old Boys, due to some inaccurate bowling, won by six wickets, eventually making 8 for 167 declared. We were 4 for 50 in our second innings.

Every Darlot Cup match revealed one of our weaknesses. In the first match against Guildford, our fielding was slack. We dropped four catches, enabling the opposition to reach 5 for 174 before an incredible collapse saw them lose their last five wickets for only three runs! Spinners, John Hui (5/32) and Brad Keenan (3/16, including a spell of 3/0) were the destroyers. We eventually won the match by four wickets, thanks to a monumental 71 by Danny Sudlow. He was well supported by Steven Russell (50), Mark Lucas (23), Paul Jory and Andrew McNeilage (2). We eventually made 233. Guildford were 1 for 12 in their second innings.

There is very little to commend in our match against Wesley. Once again our fielding and bowling was slack, reaching an all time low on the Saturday morning. Wesley's captain dropped twice, made a century on their huge total of 8/316 declared. It should have been a lot less. Our own innings started well, with openers John Hui (35) and Mark Lucas (51) putting on 97. But, in a way reminiscent of term three, our middle order batsmen collapsed, and we slumped to 7/151! A stand by Steven Russell (42) and John

Taylor almost saved the day. We made 199, losing by 117 runs. Wesley were 1/23 at stumps.

The Aquinas match was an extraordinary game of fluctuating fortunes, which, unfortunately for us, went the wrong way. On the very last over of the match, we needed four runs to achieve an outright victory. Nerves, good bowling and misunderstandings saw us make only two.

Aquinas batted first, and after 20 minutes of play, slumped to 4/6. They did have a brief recovery, but ended up with a mere 90. Our fielding was excellent, a great improvement over the week before. Only requiring a modest total for first innings points, we were outplayed and dismissed for a mere 52!

Aquinas fared much better with the bat in the second innings, making 6/165 declared. This meant that we had to score 204 runs to win outright in what turned out to be 50 overs.

Steven Russell and Adam Tetlow came together at 4/99. In brilliant fashion, amidst great excitement, the two put on 97 in just under an hour. In one over they hit 17 runs! But Russell was out for 51 in the penultimate over of the match. Tetlow (46) followed him on the second ball of the ill-fated last over.

What can you say about the Hale match? Our brittle batting in the first innings cost us the match. On a reasonable batting wicket, it was inexcusable to only make 97. Hale showed us what we could have done, making 0/198 declared. John Taylor bowled well, taking five wickets. Mark Lucas batted throughout our second innings, making 66 not out, out of a total of 6/167, avoiding an outright defeat.

The drawn Taverners match was uneventful, except for a stand of 100 between Mark Lucas (72 n.o.) and Steven Russell (64 n.o.).

After losing so many close matches over the years, it was good to win one when we played Trinity. From a seemingly hopeless position, we fought back with determination to win by $9\ \mathrm{runs}$.

Batting first, we were in dire straits at 6/58, when John Hui and Andrew McNeilage, both out of form, came together. With great determination, concentration and skill, against all odds, the two put on 80 runs, Hui making 63 and McNeilage 33. John Taylor and Paul Jenkins also batted well in a valuable last wicket stand which robbed Trinity of batting time. When our innings ended, we had 164 runs on the board. Although this was a fine recovery against some fine bowling, there were doubts raised about if it would be enough. Trinity were cruising towards victory, at one time being 1/95. Our fielding had not been up to standard. We had missed several dropped chances and were being written off. Then came the collapse.

When Trinity lost their second wicket at 2/24, no one was particularly alarmed. But when two more wickets fell at 108, our opposition's position was not so

secure. We had a game on our hands. At tea, they were 5/132. The rot continued after tea with three quick wickets. Although the scales were now in our favour, Trinity's ninth wicket pair defended grimly, until John Taylor took the new ball and took the last two wickets. But, despite a fine team performance at the end, it was John Hui's match. He followed up his 63 with 3/24 and a fine catch.

We batted extremely well in our last Darlot Cup match of the season against Scotch. John Hui continued his good form with 52, well supported by Simon Johnson (48), Mark Lucas (37) and Danny Sudlow (34). They all made fine contributions to our score of 9/237 declared. Unfortunately, we could not dismiss the opposition. Their late order batsmen defended continually; Scotch made 7/147 and escaped with a draw. Like the Taverners match, the Incogniti game will be remembered because of a partnership of 72 between Richard Pate (36) and a newcomer, Paul Jenkin (36 n.o.). Ending up with 6/115. Christ Church's other teams had mixed results in 1984. The 2nd and 3rd XI's unfortunately had bad seasons, although there were some good individual performances. While the results in the Years 8 and 9 competition may sound discouraging, both years improved vastly and should be major forces by 1985. Easily the most successful of our teams were the two Year 10 teams. Out of the 12 matches they played, they won 8 and only lost 2. Their depth in both batting and bowling can only mean that the Darlot Cup will return to Christ Church in the near future.

RUGBY

1984 was undoubtedly the most successful season for the 1st XV for a number of years. Out of ten P.S.A. games, we only lost one and that very narrowly. We finished in second place on the table, one game behind Guildford who went through the season undefeated.

Fifteen players who had previously represented the 1st XV were eligible again this year, so competition for places was fierce, and expectations were high. During the May holidays there had also been a rugby tour to the Eastern States, so we were all match conditioned for the start of the P.S.A. competition. The first four matches of the season saw us running out clear winners in most cases. The highlight of these was a wonderful second half comeback against traditional rivals, Scotch. We ran out eventual winners 16-9, after trailing 0-6 at half time. The highlight (or lowlight) of the season was our midseason clash against the previously undefeated Guildford (in the mud!). We led, through a penalty goal, for 95 per cent of the game. Brilliant defence, especially from Chris Holme and "crash-tackling" Jim Roget, saw us hold our line until the sixth minute of injury time, when Guildford against the run of play exploited our defensive error to score the winning try.

The 1st XV forwards worked tirelessly as a unit throughout the season, but this was never more obvious than against Hale, where their determination saw them steamroll a much taller and heavier pack. It was all the more memorable as we had injuries to two key forwards.

One of the highlights of the season was Simon Johnson's kicking. He managed to score 61 points in 9 games. Newcomer Brett Morgan was the highest try scorer, managing to score ten tries in only seven 1st XV games. 


Now that Mr. Kovacs is back the gymnasts are developing their exercises with the utmost enthusiasm and are looking forward to next year's competitions.



Year 8

The Year 8 Outdoor Education Programme was held in second term, when Kooringal can be a cold, wintry place, but with brief sunny days.

The activities were strenuous and demanded a good deal of personal effort in order to achieve results. Some boys thought the required effort was beyond them, but with encouragement from staff and fellow-students, most reached the goals set, resulting in immense personal satisfaction.

Each science set of about twenty-six boys lived at Kooringal for twelve days. The initial periods of orientation and instruction built onto the foundations set from the first day. Mr. Firth has designed the programme so that each new day teaches skills which complement those learnt on the previous day. The initial compass lesson led to native scrub orienteering, followed by overnight hike navigation. A half-day introduction to kayaking skills was followed by a full day canoe trip, from Naga Bridge, downstream about 15km through white-water rapids to Kooringal. The overnight hike, towards the end of the first week was the trial run for the three-day hiking expedition in the second week.

To some people who haven't experienced it, Kooringal may sound like a hard-labour bush camp — the boys do all the cooking, cleaning and general housework, they are worked physically hard, some activities appear intimidating and the boys are away from home for 12 days. But as they progress, they find that Kooringal is really about living together, learning skills and having fun.

Kooringal in Year 8 provides a stepping stone for advanced specialised activities in later years. But in Year 8, Kooringal is about personal effort and achievement, and living successfully in a small community with compassion, caring, compromise and co-operation.

The Year 9 Camps

(To enlighten readers as to the nature of Year 9 camps I present my view of the White Water Canoeing Camp.)

From the first afternoon and initial contacts it became obvious to all 20 of us in the white water canoeing camp that much more was expected of us this year. But of course we had all experienced the 12-day camps last year and although the building was new the routine seemed very familiar. We were at work in groups at once.

As the explanation of the 6-day camp unfolded I had a thought of how easy it might have been to choose bicycling, hiking, rock climbing/abseiling or canoe touring instead even though friends had reported how demanding and tiring these had been. But even to have the camp later in this third term, or early in first term, like other Year 9 camps would have helped. Still it was my choice at the beginning of first term — I would have to stick with it.

All of Day 2 was taken up with a 24-hour exercise in navigation, bushcraft and group living as groups of five successfully(?) manoeuvred through the jarrah forest around Kooringal free this year from leaders or adult guidance. This was most enjoyable, but I saw it only as a chore before the canoeing began.

So down to serious paddling on the Collie river (3 hours drive!). The first morning was spent tidying up our strokes and manoeuvring skills as well as practising capsize drill and trying the "Eskimo Roll" — some of my group managed straight away.

The slalom course — approximately 400m of river with six or seven rapids between start and finish occupied us for the afternoon. Our first tentative struggle down now seems pathetic as we are all now very confident and competent — thanks to lots of practice and coaching.

As the day finishes we drag ourselves away from the water to the camp site to confront our other big challenge of the week. We are expected to fend for ourselves for three nights — the teachers simply look after themselves! We quickly recall skills learnt last year, improve on early mistakes and begin working as a group very soon. It turns out to be a successful and enjoyable three nights camping. We also tackle the day trip down the Collie River — some 15km of rapids which proves a real test of skill and endurance. All of us easily survive to exaggerate stories on the bus returning home on the Friday. Waterfalls very easily grow to 2m high and the numerous capsizes and mistakes are pushed aside and considered only for what they really are — part of learning itself.

Apart from the heroic stories on the return journey the entire atmosphere and feeling is one of achievement. This canoeing is really just a walk in the park — brave words as we sit warm and dry having completed it all. But as we arrive finally back at C.C.G.S. we all quite rightly consider ourselves fair paddlers, as Mr. Firth soon acknowledges. We thank him for a week very well spent — extending us from Year 8 at Kooringal, developing our skills in this specific area, and giving us the opportunity to share and co-operate for the good of all in a challenging environment.

I'm sure whatever camp the Year 9's chose, they would have experienced the same sort of things — far different from anything at school — things they can do, enjoy and learn from as well.

I look forward to future ventures into the outdoors.

MUSIC

This has been another challenging year for all members of the music department. Our most important venture occurred at the start of the year, when the school linked up with St. George's Cathedral as a "choir school." Boys from CCGS made up the treble and alto line in the Cathedral choir, with some senior boys singing tenor and bass. To make this scheme work, a new member of staff was employed to assist Mr Hutchinson — this was Mr John Bates, who had taught previously in New Zealand and Victoria. Mr Bates is the assistant organist at the Cathedral and also teaches at school.

Although the work at the Cathedral takes up much time, it has been a most exciting year for both school and Cathedral, and the Cathedral choir is now at a very high standard. There are now 16 trebles and 4 altos, with plans to increase that number slightly next year.

In August, we received news that Mr Southwell would be leaving Christ Church to take up a new position with the A.B.C. His work over the past years with prep. choir and prep. orchestra, senior string group and playing the organ has been greatly appreciated. We welcomed in his place, Miss Helen Pedrotti, who came to the school with considerable experience. She

has already made her presence felt in class teaching and with prep. choir and prep. orchestra. Next year, she will be responsible for the music in the preparatory school.

Another exciting scheme was the "Short term visiting choral scholar" idea — one of Mr Hutchinson's brainchilds. Under this scheme, several budding Cathedral choral scholars, or organists, who have just finished their "A" levels at school in Britain, come to Perth for six months, and sing in the Cathedral choir, as well as helping out with music at the school. In 1984, we had Nick Brown and Sandy MacLaren — who fitted in marvellously with the scheme. In 1985, we will welcome three young men, who come with the highest references and considerable musical background.

The various performing groups have worked well and their reports occur in this section. We have now 3 full-time members of staff, 15 visiting music teachers and roughly one third of the total school population learning an instrument. Certainly our accommodation is tight, but we are delighted that once the new Prep. school building is complete, we will, again temporarily, move into the old main prep. school block. This will help a great deal.

The Tasmanian tour was our highlight for 1984 — but we sang and played in several churches, including the Cathedral, for several hospitals and for old boys' luncheons at the school. We had two major concerts, as well as the Easter Carol service, and the Advent Carol service. 1985 will provide further challenges for us.

The "Ad Hoc Chorale"

This has been another adventurous and exciting year for the Chorale, which increased its membership to twenty-five. By far the highlight of the year was the Tour to Tasmania during May. For this tour, we prepared many new works - sacred and secular. Mr Hutchinson arranged the school rules to psalm chants - and these were always well-received. He also arranged "Ill Wind" — one of the Flanders and Swann songs — to the Mozart Horn Concerto theme. In this, we had some hilarious moments with James Kish and Richard Bowman singing the cadenza - "I miss its music more and more."

Our most difficult work was the 5 part motet "Omnes de Saba" by Jacob Handl. But what a reward to be able to sing this marvellous work — with 5 separate independent lines. We also sang "Ave verum" by Byrd, as well as madrigals and the famous "Mermaid".

Many of the tenors and basses sang in the "3 Choirs Festival" which is written up elsewhere.

Since the Tasmanian tour, we have changed our repertoire — to tackle more polyphonic works such as "Sacerdotes Domini" by Byrd, "Cantate Domino" by Pitoni and the fabulous Broadway hit "Hey Look Me Over".

It has been a great year — our standard has increased as well as our ability at sight-reading. The 3 Choirs Festival

On Sunday, 10th June, in St. George's Cathedral, Perth's first ever "Three Choirs Festival" took place. This was based on the British festival of the same name, in which the choirs of Worcester, Hereford and Gloucester Cathedrals combine. In order to keep the school and public completely offbalance, we then staged another radically different production. The offering this time, in conjunction with our own Music Department and PLC, was the Lloyd-Webber/Rice musical, "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat". Although frequently dubbed the most performed musical in the world, I think it fair to say that the cast gave it their own, unique interpretation. The most impressive aspect of this show, though, was the enthusiasm and commitment of the company, actors and stage crew alike, who were prepared to work long hours into the night in rehearsal. All this labour paid off, for on the night they achieved an infectious energy and enjoyment that ensured the success of the season. Nelson Woss, who had an appendectomy the week before the show, but still made sure that no audience missed out on his fluid hips as he sung his way through "Pharaoh", epitomized the spirit of the production. In short, there was only one star in this show: the company.

As the star-dust settled from the two major productions of second term, we were finally given the opportunity to try out the as yet unfinished Memorial Hall Theatre Workshop. The honour of opening was

shared between the Preparatory School and the Senior School in a double bill of "Ned Kelly" — a short musical adaptation of Kelly's life — and "The Freeway" — a light satire written by our own Arthur Pate. The Preparatory School musical showed that we have a lot of talent coming through to the Senior School and augurs well for drama in the future. The impressive thing about "The Freeway" was the enthusiasm that the students, together with girls, this time from St. Hilda's, generated for the play. And, once again, we saw a production of a high standard that reflected a true ensemble presentation.

The final production of the year was the Year 9 presentation of "The Thwarting of Baron Bolligrew", directed by Mr Bob Woollett. As with "The Freeway", the Memorial Hall was used to its fullest effect, and it was shown that the Year 9's could perform with the same discipline and aplomb as the older students. As with "Joseph" and "The Freeway", too, the students were committed and enthusiastic even when what appears to be the curse of Christ Church drama — appendicitis — once again raised its ugly head.



The School looks forward to learning from his professionalism again next year.




Steven Briggs and Russell Vines in conflict in "The Freeway".

CHAPEL REPORT

George Orwell predicted the triumph of the antireligious forces in 1984. At Christ Church, however, there have been some exciting innovations in our Chapel activities.

The most important change was the introduction of House Chapel for day-boys. Each day-boy comes to Chapel with his House once a fortnight, and Year 12 boys have assisted the House-masters and Chaplain in working out just how House Chapel should be worthwhile for the boys in each House. We have been trying to keep a balance between the need to build House identity and the importance of letting boys hear about the Gospel of Jesus. We are working towards a House Chapel in which House spirit and the Christian gospel are seen as complementary.

An exciting innovation has been the Year 12 Chapel option, in which boys can choose to attend a Eucharist

in school time. The celebration of the Holy Communion is preceded by a discussion or Bible study.

Boarders celebrate the Eucharist every Sunday, and there is a good feeling of unity at these services. A successful experiment this year has been to allow Year 12 to choose to come to most services (they have to attend the major services each term.) This allows them to exercise their own mature decision making, and they have responded positively to the change.

The Chapel Prefects chose to use the Boarders' Chapel Collections to help homeless and jobless young people in Perth through Anglican Health and Welfare Services and orphans in South India at the Goodwill Children's Village in Thandigudi. Mr Anthony Dixon visited boarders' Chapel in Term 1 to talk about the work of the Anglican Health and Welfare Services. As an Old Boy, and the son of the Senior House-Master, he was a most welcome old friend, and he spoke eloquently about the needs of disadvantaged teenagers in Perth.

The cross which was given to the School by Mr John Foster, the Founder of Goodwill Children's Village, and made by the boys there, was mounted over the font, and reminds us of the love of Christ linking us with his people at Goodwill.

Steven Daly was confirmed at a joyful Easter Carol Service in Term 1, and 25 boys were admitted to their First Communion during the year. The Chapel is the place of activities through which people come closer to the Lord, and we thank Him for that.

CADETS

At last the time arrived for the first term camp. The Senior Company commenced activities such as shooting and the ropes course, down at Kooringal. PREPARATORY SCHOOL NOTES

During 1983 it was decided to alter the format of the Preparatory School section of the Mitre so that its purpose would be to record the important events of each year. A separate publication, called "Freshwater", will contain the student's original work. The change aims to provide more scope for pupils to have their work published, because "Freshwater" is produced twice yearly to provide an avenue for illustrated stories and poems, and for jokes, puzzles, riddles and so on. The idea of "Freshwater" is not new. Mr. Matthews organised boys to produce such a magazine some years ago and their efforts were well received. From now on "Freshwater" will be published on a regular basis and will provide continuing experiences in magazine production for the older boys in the Preparatory School.

Just as this literary development should provide new opportunities for creativity, the weekly House Assemblies in the Preparatory School provide occasions for the boys to develop their talents in the dramatic field. Through varied first-hand experiences which reinforce the class-room drama, the students learn the rudiments of stage craft culminating in such

activities as "Ned Kelly" a musical which was the first public performance in the Hall Theatre.

This year also, students and teachers have been given a preliminary exposure to computers in the classroom. Giant strides have yet to be made, but at this stage there is a Preparatory School Computer Club that meets regularly on Thursday afternoons, and also some computer activity in all classes.

NEW BUILDINGS FOR THE PREPARATORY SCHOOL

A healthy organisation constantly needs to develop new and better ways to achieve its goals. It should grow, change and react to community needs. For some years the Preparatory School with its 11 traditional classrooms has been a somewhat inadequate structural environment for the diverse activities that should flourish in a primary school. Now the School Council has given the staff the opportunity to participate in planning the design of the total working and playing environment of the new school. Acceptance of this rare chance has been an exciting task for the teachers.

The new buildings will cater for the same number of

students that attend at present, so there will be eleven classrooms. However, the rooms will be much more spacious with moveable walls and flexible furnishings. In addition the new school will have many interesting learning environments both indoors and outside. Our library will grow in size and facilities to become the focal point for the development of language and the growth of knowledge.

Adjacent to the library will be a large activity room for films, drama and related studies. Experimental work in science, stifled somewhat because of poor facilities should flourish in the new science room which also has a section for computers. The Art room, with its additional space for crafts such as print making, ceramics and sculpture will be a welcome replacement for the present G Block Undercroft. Auxiliary rooms in the new building will provide also for interviewing, testing and storage. Special Education will be catered for with rooms for Extra Reading and for Extension Classes.

The new building has been designed with the Perth weather in mind. Wide verandahs outside classrooms provide covered ways and there is a large under cover area for boys to have lunch and play informally in in-

clement weather. It is true to say that a school is not the buildings, nor the equipment but rather the people who are part of it. Nevertheless, equally it is true to say that a suitable school environment engenders a feeling of well-being, satisfaction and pleasure amongst those who work in it. The new Preparatory School buildings will provide new creative possibilities for students and staff alike.

Siteworks are planned to begin before the end of the year so that the new buildings may be opened in time for the 1986 school year. At that time the present G Block will become available to the Music Department which needs the additional space.

In deciding to build a completely new school for the primary pupils, the School Council has taken an initiative that will have far-reaching effects. Certainly, Christ Church will have a Preparatory School with incomparable facilities and with the capacity and flexibility to cope with future change.




