EDITORIAL

As recent events in connection with the nation's Bicentennial Celebrations indicate, foundations can be a source of controversy and dissension. Fortunately, although it aroused some concern at the time, this is not the case with the foundation of Christ Church Grammar School. The enterprise and foresight shown by Canon McClemans on February 7th, 1910, are now widely admired and the event, together with achievements of his successors, is one we can look back on with affection and pride.

Considerable thought was given last year to ways in which the School's 75th Anniversary in 1985 could best be recognised. In the end it was decided not to attempt any special programme of celebration and apart from the Foundation Service, Annual Concert and Speech Night, the label has not been widely applied to events during the year. This does not suggest a lack of interest in our past and its achievements. The expanding work of the School Archives group and the introduction of re-unions of Old Boys of particular periods, clearly show otherwise. But whereas anniver-

saries such as a 75th have special significance in terms of an individual's life, they are not particularly relevant in the life of an institution and special programmes to mark them often have an air of artificiality. It was also thought that the School Calendar was already varied and crowded enough without imposing extra items.

The Mitre as a record of the School year reflects that general decision. Apart from the theme of the cover designed by the School Photographers and the characteristically probing piece by Mr. Pate below, no special emphasis has been given to the anniversary in this issue. We have included four pages of colour for the first time, attempted to improve the presentation of our group photographs and have hopefully produced a more comprehensive coverage of the range of activities that make up the life of the School today. In trying to improve the quality of our present achievement, these developments, although modest, perhaps illustrate the most appropriate way in which the School magazine can mark the occasion of our 75th anniversary and pay tribute to our forbears and our heritage.

EXAMINATION JITTERS

Probably one of the more unnerving things that can happen to the average and every-day motorist is to be tailed by a police officer on a motor cycle. The sensation of being under the microscope has an almost paralysing effect as you try to keep one eye on the road, one eye on the rear-vision mirror, one eye on the speedometer and one eye on the green traffic light that is sure to turn amber at the most incriminating moment

Paralysis, in fact, seems to be an occupational hazard for those who spend too much time on the receiving end of microscopes. I remember a Speech Night some years ago where the Guest of Honour related the story of a very talented student sitting for a particular paper one November. Apparently his nerve failed him and, writhing in the contortions of a mental block, he wrote, "God knows the answers to these questions. I don't. Merry Christmas." The examiner returned his paper to him with the note, "God passed. You didn't. Happy New Year."

In the school world, Novembers and anniversaries seem to have at least one thing in common: they both trigger the Examination Syndrome. However, anniversary examinations are slightly different from

academic ones. The latter entail an assessment of knowledge content and intellectual expertise; the former too often consists of an excoriating of educational philosophy

Close soul-searching can be a healthy and necessary thing for a school. I would be the last to denigrate it. All the same, I think that there are circumstances in which minute scrutiny can be counter-productive, can result in paralysis — can, in other words, cause exam. jitters.

Of course, it is equally counter-productive to go to the other extreme. It is all very well to try to put your hand to the plough, your shoulder to the wheel, your best foot forward and your nose to the grindstone, but it is extremely difficult to work in this position. I am not advocating the abolition of examinations, anniversary or otherwise. What I am advocating is a slight reduction in introspection and a slight increase in action upon what seventy-five years have revealed as being the enduringly good things to do.

Let us, in fact, leave our microscopes for a short time and work up a bit of honest sweat.

The Prefects Ball, organised by Tim Bailey and held at the Kings Ambassador Hotel was undoubtedly the most successful for many years. The year saw a closing of many gaps in the School hierarchy. There seem to be growing bonds between all staff and students which can only produce a much better working environment.



AN AMERICAN VIEW

Living and working in another country and another culture for a year is about making changes, learning new ways of doing things, breaking old moulds, and experiencing the new and unexpected. 1985 at Christ Church has been all of those for the Chamberlin family. We set off on this year's exchange in search of the adventure of living differently than we do in the USA. We have found the adventure in this very congenial land. Living in the climate of Perth is like receiving a Christmas toy every day for those who live in the more extreme and changeable climates of the northern hemisphere. The perfect days which we treasure at home because they are so rare, are common here. Teaching at Christ Church has been very different than teaching in an independent school in the United States. It has been challenging; it has required me to stretch and to learn new methods and strategies. That has been very good for me. Although certainly not always easy, it has given me the opportunity to break the moulds of a dozen years of teaching in the same place. My classroom experiences at Christ Church will invigorate my teaching in the United States.

Particularly when we have travelled outside the Metropolitan area we have appreciated and learned to really love the vastness and the majesty of this dry, sunny, and colourful land. My suspicion is that Australia will have spoiled our family for travelling in the United States. Never again will we be able to travel such uncrowded spaces, have such choice in camping spots, and be able to do it all with minimal planning ahead. The United States is much too crowded. When we talk about our year in Australia as a family thirty years from now, one of the first remembrances for all of us will be the campfire in the bush, whether in the Stirling Ranges or the Flinders Ranges or on the northwest coast of W.A. or the south coast of Victoria. The colours of the sky and the land at dawn and dusk. the laughing of the kookaburras and other birds, combined with the crackling sound and sweet smell of the burning wood, have created a lasting image for all four of us, an image we shall treasure and for which we shall be thankful always.

THE NEW PREPARATORY SCHOOL

Next year the Preparatory School will move into a newer, better building. This move has only been made possible by the kind donations by parents and friends of the School and the tireless assistance of many others.

In 1984 the Building Fund Programme was launched. The organisation headed by John C. Roberts and Ian W.P. McCall consisted of a General Gifts Committee of 75 members. They were faced with the formidable task of creating \$2,160,000 for the new facilities. It was hoped that at least \$1,000,000 could be raised by donations with the other \$1,160,000 coming from internal resources and a new bank loan. Unfortunately a Government Grant applied for by the School Council was rejected and the School was left to raise the required amount.

The new Preparatory School building was designed to provide new horizons and relieve the somewhat cramped conditions which have prevailed for the last fifteen years. The old building lacked a proper Library and Art Room and had no provisions for Science, Music, Craft or Computer Science. The new building will provide facilities for all of these.

The new Preparatory School Building is part of a Master Plan for development instigated seventeen years ago and at a cost of over six million dollars has, as Mr Hill puts it "tranformed Christ Church Grammar School from a small financially insecure school to one of the major educational institutions in Western Australia".

SWIMMING

The 1985 swimming season was one of the most successful years for Christ Church since our induction as a P.S.A. school. At the Inters we finished a clear third behind Scotch and Hale, yet this does not indicate the security of our position. Throughout the night we were the only school with any chance of overhauling the two leaders and we were never in danger of dropping to fourth.

This success was due to a fine blend of individual achievement, consistency and incredible team spirit. We were never last in any race and, out of the 52 events, we were placed in the top four on no less than 42 occasions — a remarkable feat.

Several swimmers deserve special mention for their performance at the Inters. U/13 champion, Chris Lapinski, amassed 74 invaluable points in winning the 50 metres Freestyle, Breastroke and Butterfly. Peter Galvin set two School records and an Inters record in the Backstroke on his way to accumulating 45 points. Dion Mepham won the $U/15\ 100m$ Freestyle and gained 64 points, while Choong Lee contributed 34 points, including his amazing 200m swim which was a highlight of the evening.

A "58 Second" Club was established for the first time at Christ Church. It included four freestylers who swam times less than 59 seconds for the 100m Freestyle: Choong Lee, Tom Kelly, Dion Mepham and Peter Galvin.

The success at the Inters was a culmination of events that started with training during the Summer Holidays. Special mention must be made of the House Sports which saw 12 new records being set. Trial meets against M.L.C. and St Hilda's proved to be of great value and our swimmers in many cases were surprised by the speed and skill of their female counterparts. Several medals were won in the State Relay Championships, notably a Silver in the blue ribbon event, the "Popp Agnew" Cup. The final event before the Inters was the Quads in which Christ Church finished a very close second to Scotch.

Without doubt, the level we achieved could not have been reached except for the quality and enthusiastic coaching that was maintained through the season. Shane MacGurk, head coach, was ably supported by Dave Tydeman, Kim Grist and Old Boy, Jack Mah, whose specialist tips and advice were invaluable. The skill of the coaches and the co-operation given by the boys made up for any lack in talent.

Finally, we must thank Mr Bowker whose administration and organisation of the team was such a factor in ensuring its smooth operation. He willingly undertook all the behind-the-scenes work, and the planning for next season is already well under way. The future of swimming at Christ Church is extremely promising. The team is without doubt going to be a real threat to Scotch and Hale in 1986.

ROWING TRIP: 1985

On Thursday, 7th March, the 1st VIII along with its coach, flew to Victoria for the 1985 Rowing Trip. Over the next five days the crew were to see and take part in much Victorian rowing; an exercise which would boost our standards to much higher levels.

Accommodation during the first three days was found at Geelong Grammar School. Judging from the history of their Boat Club, they are a strong rowing school but the standard of rowing among all Victorian schools was very high and during the first few days we had to get over the amazement of it all.

The crew rowed on the Barwon River in Geelong during this time and quickly adapted to local conditions. Some sessions were spent with Geelong's first and second eights, who were more than an even match for us.

Victorian 1st VIII crews are definitely older, larger and more experienced than W.A. school crews and this was to limit the amount of race confrontation we were to have with them.

On the Saturday we rowed in the Barwon Regatta. Although not a big success, it would prove a valuable pipe-opener for the larger regatta on Lake Wendouree in two days time. The crew's rowing stood up well to the pressure; however, in both races were were only able to gain second places to Scotch College and St Kevin's. This was admittedly against 2nd VIII's and in a field of three crews in each race, but we finished strongly in both races against good opposition.

Sunday saw the crew travel all the way to Ballarat and Queen's Grammar School. Not far from the school

was the venue for the Ballarat Regatta on Monday — Lake Wendouree. This was also the venue for the 1956 Olympics in which our coach, Mr Monger, had rowed in the Bronze Medal Australian Eight.

Before the regatta we managed to get a row with the Scotch College 1st VIII, which was guite an experience. This crew, who were to come second in the Victorian Head of the River, were very polished and it was hard work simply keeping up with them when they were paddling light. Our regatta races were both disappointing and encouraging. The first two were against second eights and produced no results (in one race we sustained a breakage of equipment). However, in our third race we narrowly missed out on going through to the finals. Racing in a field of six we came a very close fourth to Melbourne University. Geelong College 1st VIII and Melbourne Grammar 1st VIII. In the closing stages of the 2000m race, we managed to pull past a Caulfield Grammar crew and just miss out by the narrowest of margins in third place to Melbourne Grammar. This was a fine achievement by the crew.

Leaving Melbourne on a high note, we arrived back in Perth on Monday night having realised that we had the potential to do much better. Great enthusiasm would now drive the 1st VIII on to the Head of the River.

Having seen their crews in action I can now easily understand why Victorians are such a force in Australian rowing. All thanks must go to Mr Monger who organised the entire trip. Such a worthwhile experience was of great value to all who went.




ROWING

This year the Christ Church Boat Club gained new strength with the presence of Mr Adrian Monger. Coming from Scotch College in Third Term, 1984, he took up the job of teaching Accounting and coaching the 1st VIII (somewhere along the line he also gained the role of managing the Boatshed). 
On Monday, March 25th, the School held its own Life Saving Championships. Boys swam, waded, towed and were rescued showing off the skills they had learnt.


Although not totally successful in our quest for immortality, the team developed a great spirit and thoroughly enjoyed themselves throughout the



YEAR 9

The Year 9 compulsory Outdoor Education course aims to extend and expand on the skills and ideals imparted in the Year 8 course. Students select a specialist activity area and spend 4 or 5 days totally devoted to the area. A brief description follows —

- a) White-Water Canoeing (Collie River and Murray River) extending the practical and theoretical understanding of rapids, developing Kayak skills including Eskimo rolls.
- b) Canoe Touring (Canadian) (Blackwood River and Murray River) with *all* gear in barrels travelling large distances (up to 70km) and camping alongside the river each night.
- c) Rock Climbing/Abseiling (Willyabrup-Margaret River). On the 50 metre sea cliffs some exhilarating climbing and rappelling — as well as camping on the coast.
- d) Bushwalking (Stirling Ranges National Park). Day walks and extended walks in this spectacular part of W.A. Cave camping included.

A number of boys opted to combine two of these activities during the week in the outdoors. As well, no matter the boys' choice, each camp contained a compulsory component — a 24hr navigational exercise where, in a group of 5 or 6, boys used maps, compasses etc to plan and walk a route through often unknown areas — camping, surviving and experiencing as an independent group — revision of Year 8 skills. Overall, groups found this activity rewarding and well worth while.

"Life on some sort of a rhubarborous maundaring yellogreen funkleblue windigut Diodying applejack . . ." Finnegan's Wake.

The blatantly obvious meaning of this statement by James Joyce sums up the mood and style of drama at Christ Church admirably . . . entertaining, flowing and . . . well . . . uh . . . unpredictable.

From Colin Walker's amazing and prefectorally perfect imitation of a gunshot: "FffffBANG" (and that's a quote) to Nicky Imberger's equally outstanding impersonation of dual organ stops, drama at Christ Church in 1985 was an amazing success, both for the School and the student participants.

Although the set spitefully remained wet during the opening night of "Count Dracula" and "The Times" of London was proved to be definitely not a daily paper, such hardships were overcome. The actors and backstage crew teamed up to make "Count Dracula", a polished, and, from all accounts, most entertaining production (even if some amateur magician did change the inside contents of the decanter into something stronger).

The enthusiasm displayed by the Year 12 actors and crew was apparent right down through the ranks of Christ Church in both the inaugural House Drama Festival and the Year 8 Drama Festival.

The Year 8 Festival for its third year in succession continued with three nights of high frequency and highly successful drama. The Festival introduces the Year 8s to all aspects of drama, from wearing silly clothes (on and off the stage) to setting up lights and acting out scripts. The programme demonstrates a real depth in drama, ensuring super value from students in the following years.

In its first year at Christ Church the House Drama Festival ran both smoothly and successfully. The enthusiasm shown by those who performed, worked backstage, or simply sat back on whatever they could find, indicates that the Festival will become a popular annual event. The eventual winners were Noake, with their comedy thriller cross between James Bond and Caligula, "The Backstabber". The Festival exposed many students to a wide variety of the jobs required to produce even a small play. The experience gained by students in operating the lighting and sound, directing, producing, stage managing, acting, set construction (and in set demolition by Wolsley House and McClemans' Dean Evans) will be most helpful in producing first-class plays in future years.

The Music Department has its music rooms, the Physical Education Department their gym, so too, Drama needs a real "full-on" theatre, not a Clayton's theatre like the Memorial Hall (the theatre you have when you don't have a theatre).

Only then will it shift from its semi-important status on the C.C.G.S. fixture list to its potential as the leader of

the School social calendar. As Joyce said, so succinctly and truly in an earlier moment of "Finnegan's Wake": "Quarry Silex, Humbrie Nocenswa! Undy gentein festykness. Circa Nansera! Wokeneup."

DRAMA CLUB

Drama Club was regularly attended by a small number of dedicated Year Eleven and Twelve students from both Christ Church and Methodist Ladies' College.

One afternoon each week, alternating between The Hall Theatre at CCGS and the Gertrude Walten Centre at MLC, was spent developing and practising many of the basics of performing, acting, public speaking and miming.

Activities such as character building, character development, gibberish, voice projection, scene building, relaxation techniques and role playing were introduced.

Mr Gipson of CCGS and Mr Ballantyne of MLC were always helpful, encouraging and enthusiastic when dealing with the group. Both teachers gave much time and effort in preparing and taking the workshops, providing a diverse range of subjects and situations to deal and experiment with.

The girls, as well as being able to create a relaxed atmosphere, revealed a great deal of sensitivity in their acting and were far more challenging in the material for their skits and mimes.

A typical afternoon would begin with some "warm up" and "wake up" exercises. Then one of the teachers might give a small talk about one aspect of character development or role playing. Next the students would divide into small groups of about four, or five and practise these skills and present them by means of short skit, play or mime.


After each performance the teacher and students would discuss and make constructive criticisms and comments.

The typical afternoon would conclude with the whole group being involved in a large skit or mime which required the students to enter the stage, and begin acting, one at a time. This required careful observation skills and often clever thinking so as not to disrupt the continuity created by the previous students. On occasions music was used to accompany movements and stimulate ideas.


Many of the students involved are very enthusiastic about being in a major production next year, and hopefully the skills and techniques learned at these workshops will be put to good use.

DRACULA IN REHEARSAL

CADETS

The 1985 cadet year began in the last week of the summer holidays, with some 20 Christ Church cadets giving up their time to attend the C.U.O.'s/N.C.O.'s Promotion Course at Kooringal. After a gruelling week's training, all the candidates passed out as either corporals, sergeants or C.U.O.'s with Neil Gibson topping the Senior Wing, and Craig Brooks coming runner up in the Junior.

Once back at school, the unit began operating in earnest, with a successful recruiting campaign resulting in over 100 new cadets being issued with uniforms, and being divided into platoons.

After an initial settling in period, training for the Bivouac began, with the Junior Cadets being taught foot drill, bushcraft, mapwork and first-aid, and the signals section learning the basics of R/T operating procedure under the direction of Mrs. Challinor.

In mid-April, with training well advanced, the unit moved to Kooringal, for the four day Bivouac. The first two days consisted of static exercises, including the ropes course, a .22 range practice and river crossings. At the conclusion of this period, the 4 platoons set off on a two day reconnaissance mission through the foothills of the Darling scarp, and onto the coastal plain, in pursuit of a force of invading Marsurians.

With the commencement of Second Term, Wednesday training began again, with two aims: A satisfactory standard of bushcraft and mapwork for the August camp, and a high standard of drill, ready for the Headmaster's parade. With hard work, both aims were achieved, and by August, the unit was ready to go bush once again.

Upon arriving at the Bindoon Field Firing Range, a

temporary bivouac was established, and platoon commanders were detached from their platoons, which were then split into sections, under the command of corporals and sergeants. That night section leaders were briefed, and ammunition in the form of agent WPF (a white marking agent) was issued to the troops, in preparation for the tactical phase.

Early next morning, the troops were embussed, and moved to their drop off points, while the C.U.O.'s 'sphincter' team, under their fearless commander Lt. Toby Moore, made ready for battle.

For the next three days, the bush resounded with frantic battle cries, as the troops were harrassed by each other, and the deadly 'sphincter-mobile'.

At the conclusion of the tactical phase, 120 soggy, dirty, flour-caked cadets returned to campsite 1, ready for Phase Two of the camp. This consisted of two days of weapons training, archery, and other activities, leading up to a range practice with the AR-15 Armalite Rifle. The practice, under the inimitable direction of the unforgettable Sgt. 'Ankles' Howarth of the Australian Army, consisted of each cadet firing ten rounds in semi-automatic and ten rounds in full auto at a figure target on a 20m range.



The Academy again entered four teams in the West Australian Debating League Competition. It turned out to be a year of torrid competition though Christ Church fared well, winning ten out of a possible sixteen debates.

The youngest of our teams proved to be the most successful. The gallant Year 9 team, consisting of Michael Thanos, Bernie Wansbrough, and Yagan Millet, blitzed through their division winning all but one of their preliminary debates against teams a year older. They then proceeded to make their way to the Grand Final of their Junior Debating Division. It was there, unfortunately, that their run was stopped by a 2-1 majority decision in the favour of the opposing Mercedes team.

The other team that competed in the Junior Division was made up of Year 10's. So strong was this year group that six strong debaters (dividing into two separate teams) contested for the limited three spots. It was decided that each team would compete in half the number of preliminary debates. The Sandy Sutherland, Peter Broun and Simon Hoffman team, which took the first two debates, easily won both of them due to the team's contemporary "let it be" style. They then handed the reins to the Peter Campbell, Jason MacLaurin and Olivier Sicouri team. It was a year of learning for the team which met with mixed results. The team's relaxed tone and style was often outmatched by older, more experienced teams.



AMATEUR RADIO

High Frequency (HF) radio activity is low at present because of low sunspot activity. The sunspot cycles average roughly 11 years in length, the approximate bottom of cycle 20 was at the end of 1974. Amateur radio is not, however, in the doldrums for much interest is now being shown in the area of satellite communication which, being largely line of sight propagation of VHF and UHF, is not dependent on solar activity.

CCGS Radio Club proposes to establish satellite communication from the School and will be doing preliminary tests in the near future.

The Club continued in its fourth year in a modest way, with a membership of up to twelve. Participation in the Remembrance Day contest in August resulted in 700 points for the State, that is, 700 two-way HF and VHF contacts were made with amateurs in Australia and New Zealand in one weekend. A more typical meeting would entail listening on the HF bands and trying to make a contact, talking with Perth amateurs on VHF, making an antenna or talking over some electronic principles.



PHOTOGRAPHY

SOCIAL SERVICE

1985 proved to be a reasonably successful year for the Social Service Committee. But as in previous years, the group has been supported mainly by the faithful few.

This year, for the first time, each House has been responsible for co-ordinating its own fund-raising activities, and deciding on a charity or cause towards which these funds would be directed. Each House raised between \$200 and \$400. Some of the achievements are as follows: Craigie supported the R.S.P.C.A.; Queenslea supported the Speech and Hearing Centre; Romsey donated to Cystic Fibrosis Research; Wolsey are aiming to pay for the training of a Guide Dog; Noake supported the Goodwill Children's Village; and Jupp made a sizeable donation to the Cave Drop-in Centre.

In addition to House collections, the Social Service Committee was involved in several fund-raising ventures during the year. We decided that, as an Anglican school, it would be appropriate for us to support Anglicare — The Anglican Health and Welfare Services. Anglicare works mainly with those who are young, homeless and unemployed, and those who become the victims of family breakdown.

Our first effort was a Casuals Day held late in first term. These have been popular in the past, and this one raised about \$300. July saw the production of the Year Twelve Drama, Dracula. The Committee

organised the sale of food and refreshments during the intervals and before the show each night. This involved a great deal of organisation such as the purchase of stock from wholesalers, applying for a Liquor Licence, and finding suitable manpower. The profit was a mere \$140, a little disappointing after all effort and late nights involved. But we learnt from the experience and had the satisfaction of knowing we provided a worthwhile service to an appreciative audience each evening. Two more Casuals Days were held in Second and Third Term, each raising about \$200.

Once again we were asked to assist with the Red Cross Door Knock and the Salvation Army Red Shield Appeal. The response to our requests for volunteers was disappointing, as boys were only asked to assist for one hour on a Sunday morning. Also, there were several street appeals held during the year, for which the response was equally disappointing. As members of a Church school, I feel we need to re-evaluate our commitment to the community, particularly to those less fortunate than ourselves. We tend to take our very comfortable lives for granted, forgetting those for whom the attainment of even the basics of life is a continuous struggle.

I would like to thank sincerely all those boys who have been involved with Social Service for their hard work and participation this year. Finally, I wish to thank Mr Colin Williams, our co-ordinator for his guidance and inspiration.

CHRIST CHURCH ABROAD IN 1985

FINLAND

The International Mathematical Olympiad is held every year in a different country. In 1985 it was in Finland. There were 209 contestants from 38 countries. The competition involves two $4^{1/2}$ hour papers each with three questions. The questions are of a different sort to school maths problems.

After a week's "training" in May, the Australian team of six left in late June for a two week stay in Finland. The Olympiad was held in the country, out of Joutsa, a small town of about 5,000 people. Everyone stayed together in a small holiday resort on a lake. This gave the opportunity to meet the other contestants and swim and play volleyball with them. Almost all of them could speak English.

Finland is a democratic nation of about 5,000,000 people. Most of the land is lakes and forest. For much of the year it is freezing and bleak, but in summer (when we were there) it is green and beautiful. The sun shines for almost 24 hours a day.

Australia gave her best ever performance in the 1985 Olympiad, coming 11th out of 38 countries and gaining one gold, one silver and two bronze medals, more than ever before. (Medals are awarded to about half of the contestants.) Competing in the Olympiad is a good way of seeing another country, meeting people from other countries and motivating yourself in mathematics. Let's hope more West Australians compete in future years.

After Aix we exchanged with the other group and I spent two weeks there with another family. We all spent a night in a haunted Chateau in the countryside which was very exciting and a lot of fun.

MELBOURNE - I

During the last week of Second Term I was fortunate enough to be one of nine Year 11 students selected from W.A. to attend the Youth ANZAAS in Melbourne. This was run in conjunction with the annual ANZAAS Congress organised by the Australian and New Zealand Association for the Advancement of Science.

The objective of this first Youth ANZAAS was to allow students from around Australia, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea to participate in learning about developments in science technology, and the related social sciences. A total of 890 students attended. The Youth programme was part of a special effort to involve the general public in this, Victoria's 150th Year. It was very successful in this respect as approximately 15,000 people attended the full congress.

Each morning during the week, the youth delegates attended a series of lectures covering such topics as Light, Life, Space, and Time. The lectures highlighted advancements in the various sciences but also emphasised the need for caution in the application of these developments. Some interesting demonstrations and experiments were also included. Each afternoon, we visited various local industries to illustrate the practical applications of technology in modern society.

The programme was interesting and informative and highlighted some of the moral problems faced by society in adopting advances in science. For example, there was a vigorous debate in the session on Life between the biologists and the social scientists on the application of genetic engineering to human reproduction. It reflected the dilemma faced by the community

at large on a sensitive issue. An interesting observation was the difficulty experienced by some very capable scientists in communicating their ideas.

Overall, I found my time in Melbourne to be exciting, stimulating and very rewarding.

"Look after these and give them back at the end of the year and you will be a good boy, son", he said.


"Strewth! What've we got here?" I thought.

The Lightning Carnival was held in August. We were represented by football, hockey, soccer and rugby teams. All the teams performed very well.



SOCCER



The results from the basketball season were extremely encouraging. All boys performed well at training and it was pleasing to see the progress in the boys' skills and understanding of the game.






SOFTBALL


Competitively this year C.C.G.S. were once again well represented. The team, ably led by Anthony Lewis, played Scotch, John XXIII and Wesley. Many

As often happens with school orchestras, some of our best players left at the end of last year and went into the senior school.


However, we began the year confidently and have continued to rehearse each week. Our standards have improved during the year and we are enjoying the experience of playing together.



MATHEMATICS COMPETITION

Although Christ Church has performed wonders this year in several different mathematical quizzes and competitions, 1985 has been primarily the year of Andrew Hassell, who won his fifth medal in the Westpac (National) Competition, the major State prize of \$150 in the I.B.M.
