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

## **CAPTAIN OF SCHOOL REPORT**


What have the students of Christ Church achieved in 1987? Achievement means "accomplishing", which suggests having clearly defined goals in the first place.

Music remains central to the Arts and many boys, as performers or audience, have enjoyed the concerts and chapel music through the year.



At this point, my thanks go to all the prefects, especially Grey Mycock, for their support and hard work throughout the year.


1987 has been a good year. We thank our teachers, the non-teaching staff and parents for all that they continue to do for us.

## Mr. TONY HILL



In August last year the School learned that Mr Hill had accepted an invitation to become Headmaster of Melbourne Grammar School from the beginning of 1988. The news was received with a mixture of sadness and pride—sadness at the loss of a distinguished servant of the School and pride that Christ Church was to provide the next incumbent of one of the leading positions in Australian education.

Educated at Sydney Grammar School, Mr Hill went on to take an honours degree in History and French at Sudney University in 1961 and later to study Educational Administration at the University of New England and Japanese at the Australian National University. Teaching appointments at Canberra Grammar School and Sydney Church of England School followed and the next four years, from 1972 to 1976, were spent in the United States, teaching at Phillips Academy, and studying for a Master of Education at Boston University. He returned to Australia to become Senior Master at the King's School, Parramatta, and took up his appointment at Christ Church on 1st January, 1982. Among Mr Hill's contributions as a Headmaster have been his understanding of the diverse nature of the School community and his encouragement of various groups to see themselves as integral parts of the whole. It was thought appropriate that the Mitre's tribute to him should reflect this aspect of his leadership and representatives of various sections of the School community have consequently been asked to record their impression of him from their particular point of view.

THE CHAIRMAN OF THE SCHOOL COUNCIL In 1980 the then School Council was faced with a decision that no Council for the previous 30 years had been called upon to make – the appointment of a new Headmaster. Mr P. M. Moyes was retiring at the end of 1981 after 31 years of service to the School and a new Headmaster had to be appointed to commence at the beginning of 1982.

The Council was very conscious and proud of the great development and advancement that Christ Church had made in the years following World War II. It sought a Headmaster who, as the School's leader, would not only continue this progress but give it added impetus. In Mr Tony Hill it saw this man. Six years later it can be said that Tony Hill has exceeded the most optimistic expectations of Council in achieving this objective for the School. We have indeed been fortunate to have had him as the Headmaster for these last six, all too short, years.

The Chairman of a School Council and a Headmaster must have a special relationship. This I believe at Christ Church we have enjoyed. It is from this perspective, and from the overview of the School vested in the Council, that I can speak. To put the qualities of Mr Hill in any order of priority is difficult. As soon as I think of one that I believe is predominant, another springs to mind. The real strength of the man has been his so many qualities of such excellence. It has been this combination that has produced such an outstanding Headmaster.

He has displayed compassion and humanity to the boys and staff. He has encouraged and inspired them as individuals and fiercely defended them if the prospect of an adverse decision had to be made. In return I believe he gained their loyalty, respect, and admiration.

A council appoints a headmaster who will continuously review all aspects of the activities of a school and bring forward ideas for improvement. The enthusiasm, energy, and drive with which Mr Hill set about fulfilling this role set a challenge for the Council to meet.

From the beginning it was obvious that he had a sound knowledge of school administration; that which was unfamiliar was quickly mastered. The impressive presentations by senior staff to the Council's Education Committee have made it increasingly apparent that he has gathered at Christ Church staff of the highest calibre, who have been selected and attracted by him to the School.

His own academic qualities and leadership have achieved this.

The impetus he gave to the building programme, including two successful appeals, resulting in a new Preparatory School and a new Science building about to start, has been remarkable. It was through his persuasion that the Foundation was established.

But apart from these achievements he encouraged within the School all aspects of its activities – sporting, cultural, or educational, in the widest sense. He fostered the relationship between the School and its wider community, the Old Boys and parents. He was involved in wider community activities. These included professional educational bodies, the Sail Training Association, Anglicare, and St. George's College. He ensured the good relationship between the School and the Parish continued. I leave others to recount in more detail his achievements in these and other areas.

It was soon apparent to the Council that at Christ Church we had an outstanding Headmaster. In 1986 when he told me he was intending to apply for the appointment in Melbourne and sought my support, it was with sincere regret and sorrow that I received the news. I unhesitatingly agreed to support his application as on his appointment he had said he might not stay more than seven years and did not see Christ Church as his final appointment. When he leaves he will have served the School for six memorable years.

He came to a School which enjoyed a high reputation. He leaves it with its reputation considerably enhanced due to his untiring leadership. We hope he will remember his years at Christ Church with affection and pride. Christ Church will certainly so remember him. The School will always be grateful to him for the great advances made during his term as Headmaster.

#### . . . . . THE STAFF

In paying tribute to a departing Head Master of the calibre of Mr Tony Hill, one runs the risk of lapsing into hagiography. I know that Mr. Hill would be anxious for me to avoid this. However, the simple truth is that he has been a quite superb leader of the men and women who have been his staff. He will always have our respect and gratitude for what he has done and for the gracious way in which he has done it. Christ Church Grammar School has a most competent and dedicated staff. This is no accident. Much of it has to do with Mr. Hill's discernment. But the process works both ways. He is the sort of man who attracts gifted and highly motivated people to join with him in a worthwhile enterprise. He knows when to encourage and when to challenge. He knows that talented people need both support and room to move. Achieving this difficult balance is part of his style.

The staff at Christ Church seem proud of the School. No doubt this has something to do with Mr. Hill's own confidence in the people who make up the School. His belief in his staff helps them to believe in themselves and in each other.

Mr. Hill's pursuit of excellence is characterised by a creative restlessness which refuses to be content with past achievements, no matter how recent. This must be a healthy approach in an institution like ours. As soon as we stop looking for the next challenge we risk mediocrity.

Mr. Hill's role as Head Master is to have a wide vision. Some people talk about it in terms of having a "big picture." This readiness to look well beyond our own rather comfortable environment in Queenslea Drive, Claremont, is essential if our School is to be truly involved in education. Mr. Hill has taken some very positive steps to counter the isolation which might easily cause us to be left behind in a rapidly changing world. At the same time, he has recognised that we in the West have something important to say to this wider world. In this spirit, Mr. Hill has encouraged teacher exchanges. He has also welcomed young men straight out of schools in England, the United States and Japan who have contributed to our life here in a number of ways, perhaps mainly through offering another perspective on things.

When Mr. Hill took some sabbatical leave recently, few would have been surprised that he chose to venture out into a wilderness of great beauty in another country where he was able to find some more mountains to climb.

His love for the outdoors is well known. Perhaps this goes some way towards explaining his support for Kooringal and its programmes. Kooringal is all about people showing endeavour. It is about the self esteem which comes from striving to do one's best in the face of unfamiliar difficulties. Unless I am quite mistaken, this sort of learning is at the centre of Mr. Hill's philosophy of education.

Perhaps I could intrude a somewhat personal word at this point. As Chaplain, I often see Mr. Hill grappling with difficult decisions about boys who, for various reasons, are not gaining what they might from being at Christ Church. Time and again, he returns to these questions: "What can we do for this boy?" "Is the decision right for this individual?" Perhaps these are the obvious questions to be asking. But institutions often forget the obvious and spend more time looking after their own interests than the interests of the people they are there to serve. In remembering such questions he displays two of his finest qualities, fair-mindedness and compassion.

The Jesuit theologian William Johnston once wrote that in life "the great challenge is to remain open to love, to remain open to change, to remain open to growth." Certainly, in responding to the many challenges which have faced him as Head Master, Mr. Hill has done this. Those of us who have worked with him have been taught about these things and about much more besides.

#### . . . THE OLD BOYS' ASSOCIATION

Since Mr Hill's arrival at the School, he has been an active and strong supporter of the Old Boys' Association and its objectives.

He quickly developed a close working relationship with members of the Committee and supported the development of various programmes and initiatives undertaken by the Association. He has made a point of contacting a large number of Old Boys, has renewed their interest in the School and encouraged them to play a role in its continued development.

From the outset, he made available to the Association School facilities such as the computer, which enabled our membership to be computerised effectively for the first time. This greatly improved the administration of the Association and has allowed it to be run in an efficient manner.

In conjunction with the Association, career luncheons and vocational work experience programmes were established. The work experience programme now caters for eighty boys in Years Ten and Eleven with up to seventy Old Boys participating in the programme. In addition, career luncheons have been run for the past four years involving further Old Boys. The emphasis on these projects has been to increase Old Boy participation, and they have been an outstanding success.

On his own initiative, he has promoted Old Boy luncheons back at the School for various year groups. Over the past three years Old Boys from 1910 through to 1966 have been invited back to the School to assess for themselves the changes which have taken place. They have not been disappointed.

This interaction between the Association and the School has not only created a greater interest amongst Old Boys in their school, but has also helped to identify the Association with current students. Several Captains of School have served on the Old Boys Committee in the past five years.

Mr Hill's commitment and faith in the building of the new Preparatory School and his ability to convince Old Boys into supporting this worthwhile project, were testimony to his determination and persuasive powers!

In his short stay at the School he has fostered a great deal of goodwill with the Old Boys Association and has helped change many preconceived views held by former students.

On behalf of the Association, I thank him for his efforts and wish him and his family every success in the future.



## MR AKOS KOVACS



Mr Akos Kovacs is retiring on 31st December, 1987, after thirty three years on the staff of Christ Church Grammar School. In August he was a guest at a Farewell Dinner held by Christ Church Old Boys Association and the following is the text of a speech given in his honour by Dr Peter Hollingsworth, a former pupil of Akos and now a research scientist in medicine at Royal Perth Hospital.

"I count it a great honour and privilege to be invited to speak in honour of Akos. This is an opportunity to acknowledge his example, his commitment and his enormous contribution to us and to Christ Church. In order to appreciate this, it's important that we consider the background to his life and career in Australia.

Akos, you rarely spoke of your young life in Hungary. I hope you will permit me to do so tonight.

Akos was born and raised in Eastern Hungary, adjacent to the Russian border. He attended a boys secondary school of 1100 students. An accomplished

equestrian, he was also keen on sport and physical education. He aspired to a career as a physical education teacher. Because of the great status of physical education in Hungary at that time, entry standards were very high and Akos could not meet the standard for the 100 metre sprint. He chose instead to enter military college as an officer trainee.

In 1938, while Akos was about fourteen, war began between Hungary and Russia. His father died in that war. Akos himself volunteered to serve and fought in the same theatre, though the conflict was soon to become a part of the Second World War. He was taken prisoner by the Russians. Although he has said almost nothing about his imprisonment, we do know that he suffered from scurvy. Toward the end of the war, he became a prisoner of the allies.

He worked on a cargo ship taking beef from South America to Europe. At the end of the war, he seriously considered migrating to South America. He learnt, however, that his mother was now alone at home. His elder brother had not returned from the war with Russia, and his sister was unable to be contacted. He returned to Europe, disembarking in France. His train journey home was to take a month. He later learnt that his mother died on the day his train reached Hungary.

In 1948, the Social Democrats were elected, and shortly thereafter, the communists who had infiltrated the Social Democratic Party seized power. Both Akos, and his father before him, had a reputation as anti-communists. Akos was detained two months later. He escaped and found his way to Germany, where, as a refugee he found work in a bakelite factory. Working conditions were poor, with heavy dust contaminating his eyes, nose and lungs. However, with thirty million people unemployed in Germany at that time, he had no alternative.

In 1949 he left and migrated to Australia, working his way on a cargo ship, and contracted to work for the Australian Government for three years. He had had no formal instruction in English language. At first he worked as a labourer on the Hydro-electric Scheme at Butler's Gorge in Tasmania. Later he became a miner at the Queenstown Copper Mine. The shifts were hard, but Akos found enough spare time and energy to establish and run a basketball competition. This was so successful that he was soon invited to fill a locum as a physical education teacher at the local technical college. Here, Akos grasped one of the narrowest opportunities imaginable. The position was unpaid, since he had no formal qualifications, but he was promised a scholarship to Melbourne University in lieu of payment. He arranged to work the early shift at the mine — 4 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. — so that he could teach during the afternoon. Ultimately, the headmaster of the college did not honour the promise of a

scholarship. Devastated initially, Akos resolved to go to University anyhow. He applied for a Commonwealth scholarship. This was refused as he had not yet become a citizen. He decided to go entirely at his own expense. In 1954, he graduated with a diploma in physical education from Melbourne University.

... "Who would true valour see, let him come hither". Akos decided to work for a private school, obviating the state schools' requirement for a further two years of training at teachers' college. He also feared that the state system might transfer him to a desk job after 45! He arrived at Christ Church in 1955. That was to be the last year that Guildford, or any other school for that matter, would dominate the State Junior Gymnastics Competitions.

Since that time, Christ Church has won individual and team championships at every State Championships except one. Akos has produced many great team captains and State Junior Champions. These include, Smirk, Hibble, Driscoll, Watt, Eyers, North, Scott, Rischbeith, Rutter, Witt, Millband, Payne, Porter, Nylund, Robinson, Kong, Isobel, Zinc, Salmon and Giles. We were all immensely proud that Nylund represented Australia at the Commonwealth Games in Edmonton in 1978 and became an Olympian in 1980. Apart from these great captains and champions, there

was a much larger number of lesser known boys who achieved great strength and skill as gymnasts under Akos' dedicated tuition. His contribution to the sport was recognised recently when the Public Schools' Association established the Akos Kovacs Trophy for the Inter-School Gymnastics Competition.

Apart from the enormous number of extra hours that he contributed to coaching, Akos also spent time building much of the equipment.

Of course, Akos made great contributions to many other sports. He established basketball at Christ Church. He coached the swimming team for sixteen years, laying the foundations for the School's great victory in P.S.A. Swimming this year. His pupils had unparallelled success in lifesaving. His shot put teams have been excellent, and we remember particularly the great David Atkinson who dominated this event.

But for most of us, our major recollection of Akos is from P.E. I can still remember my first encounter with him. It was down at the jetty on one of those typical February afternoons: the wind occasionally dropped below 25 knots, here and there were breaks in the cloud cover, and here and there, breaks in the otherwise confluent layers of jelly fish. Akos appeared, broad shouldered and enormous, at times impassive, at times fierce. Within minutes, several of us were

called out to be disciplined. Bend over. His arm raised, fist clenched, above my neck. He's going to kill me. I'll run! No, then he will kill me. The blow, ultimately was gentle and rarely repeated.



It was in the gym, on the climbing ropes, that we were really exposed as puny ex-State School weaklings. I'll always remember William T. Overton dangling helplessly at the bottom of a rope, twisting slowly in the wind, and the gentle swish swish as his shorts brushed the floor. Akos was tough on these occasions, but I thought he judged very well whom to goad. Once we cringed with embarrassment when he declared John Dowson a weakling. Within two years Dowson became the School Under 17 Cross Country and One Mile Champion, ran in the Inters and became an accomplished middle distance athlete. Later, in open competition, he was placed in several State Championships in the 800 metres.

Akos was always concerned for the safety of the boys. He was a skilled first aider. Kevin Rutter once dislocated his elbow after a fall. Before he could begin to feel pain, Akos forced him to the ground and reduced the dislocation in a single swift manoeuvre.

He was even more renowned for his pride in the maintenance of the gymnasium. Philip Holten tells me that at one time his P.E. class was held immediately after morning break. In the break, before the lesson, several boys were climbing ropes (illegal) while others milled below. The bell rang. Panic. One boy, who had been at the top of his rope, slid the first ten feet or so (illegal), then jumped (illegal). He landed squarely on Phil's big toe, splitting it wide open. As Phil collapsed in white faced agony, Akos entered. Skilled first aider that he was, Akos summed up the problems in an instant. "Holten," he said. "Get your bloody bleeding toe out of my gymnasium!"

Akos has many other accomplishments. Not the least is a stint of sixteen consecutive years as a boarding

house master, much of it spent on a one in two roster.

For many years the boys (and I suppose the masters). had gazed wistfully over the western boundary of the School into M.L.C. and declared that someone really ought to do something about and with and to the young ladies of M.L.C. It was left to Akos to take action. And when he did, it was with a brilliance which reflected his military training. Using the pretext of folk dancing, he delivered them in scores to his boys. And they weren't served up in their usual frumpy dark green blazers. Oh no! They were full breasted and tight bodiced in traditional Hungarian costumes. David Atkinson still looks glazed when he thinks about it. But for many, the bicycle is Akos' hallmark. Dean Bowker tells me that Akos' first bike was used originally by Bill Johnstone, the groundsman, but he grew too frail to ride it. It was passed on to Akos, to help him commute to and from Claremont Baths. It had a distinctive carrier on it and was widely recognised around Claremont. One of the boarders, who was in love with a girl who lived some distance off, would "borrow" Akos' bike at night, such was his haste to meet her. After one such assignation, the police recognised Akos' bike being ridden by someone other than Akos, and subsequently reported the boy to Akos. When next Akos found him, he said "Nuh! You hairy goat. You going to get some baby





Akos, there are many other things that we remember, but will not mention now. We thank you for your absolute commitment to our physical education, for your interest in every one of us, and most of all for your example of steadfast courage. We do not believe that you will ever retire. But, at this time of change in your career, we want you to know that you are known, admired and respected by more than three thousand graduates of Christ Church Grammar School.

## MR PETER TOOKE



Peter Tooke entered the Christ Church Preparatory School in September 1964 and moved to the Senior School in 1965. A quiet student and an all round competitor, Peter seemed to thrive on Christ Church and his career became increasingly distinguished. The little known off-spinner in the Under 16 A team became a leading bowler and handy bat in the Darlot Cup, the quiet cadet, an under-officer, and the all round footballer a top Alcock Cup ruckman. He served the School with distinction as its Senior Prefect in his final year, 1969, received an Honour Blazer and finished with very fine academic results.

Pursuing his academic career with success at UWA occupied most of the next three years, and he duly finished his Science degree majoring in Physics. However Major Fraser our OC Cadets has a quick and discerning eye for talent and it was not long before Peter was back on staff with the Cadet Unit while studying at UWA. Amongst the many fine Old Boy contributors to the Unit in the late sixties and seventies his association with the Unit is quite outstanding, particularly in the assistance given to Frank into making this Unit perhaps the most outstanding Adventure Training Unit in Australia. I am sure those cadets going out on their first bush exercise who were handed a live chook and half a dozen potatoes as rations will remember his many innovations.

Peter joined the fulltime staff in the Science Department in 1972 and was very soon in the thick of things. In particular staff/student sporting fixtures received a great boost with large scores being posted against the First XI and tremendous punishment handed out with the hockey stick. When severe injury to the right shoulder put him out of competitive football it was typical of the spirit of the man that in a few months he was playing squash lefthanded better than most of us

with our good arms, and throwing the cricket ball as ferociously and accurately as he did with his right. He coached the First XI for a time and was often on hand to do fitness work with the senior football teams.

When the Master of Marlborough wrote to Peter Moyes asking if we could recommend a suitable physics teacher to spend a year at that great English public school, Peter was an obvious selection and jumped at the opportunity, although he admits to some trepidation before his first classes. A great year it must have been with trips to the continent to add to the experience of Marlborough. Most memorable too for Peter for within a year of his return to WA he was to journey back to Marlborough's beautiful Chapel for his wedding to his lovely bride Alma. Within the month it was back to WA and Alma who had formerly taught Art at Marlborough brought her expertise to Penrhos.

After the retirement of Alan Blackwood the subsequent reorganisation of the school hierarchies saw the installation of Peter as the School's first Senior Master, with major responsibilities in the discipline and pastoral care areas. It also fell to him to act as a senior School representative to the PSA and to attempt to help their conservative sporting bodies move into the eighties. The Senior Mastership is a position that he has filled with distinction and his usual enormous energy and excellent organisation. In addition he found time to complete his M.Ed. His appointment as Deputy Head of Brisbane's leading Anglican School came as no surprise. The loss of Peter and Alma from the School community will be keenly felt. However we are glad too for them and they take with them our good wishes and a great deal of affection.

## MR FRANK FRASER


Born in Wagga Wagga in 1927, Frank Fraser was educated at the local High School. He was still at school when, in 1943, he put his age up to join the army. He was sent for an interview but his true age was discovered; 'at least I got a free return trip to Sydney', reflects Frank. After a second under-age attempt also failed, he left school and worked as a tally clerk and drover in outback NSW. This sharpened his appetite for outdoor life. Eventually, in 1947, Frank realised his dream and succeeded in joining the infantry.

A series of Australian postings followed and, in the early 1950's, he married Adrienne. Soon afterwards they moved to Papua New Guinea as Frank had been attached to the Pacific Islands Regiment as a platoon commander. Highlights of four years there included the birth of their son, Wayne, and Frank's leadership of the first expedition to successfully negotiate the Bowani Mountains from south to north. Its task was to mark the PNG border and it entailed a trek of almost 500 kilometres through difficult terrain. There were occasional clashes with hostile tribesmen but, according to Frank, 'superior firepower convinced them'.

Two years back in Australia was followed by a posting to Malaysia. Sukarno's 'Konfrontasi' was at its height and Frank helped to intercept Indonesian troop landings on the Malay Peninsula. He also served in Thailand and on border operations in Malaysia.

Frank's final army posting was to 16 Royal Western Australian Regiment as a Warrant Officer Instructor. He obtained his discharge in 1967 to enable his son to complete his education and he settled into 'civvy street' by joining CCGS in that same year. Frank found the transition difficult. In a recent farewell dinner speech he revealed that he adapted by treating Christ Church as merely another army posting. He saw the students as recruits and the staff as officers and NCO's. Frank successfully resisted the soldier's natural urge to salute moving objects and whitewash stationary ones!

During his twenty years at Christ Church Frank has been widely active. In his association with Kooringal, for instance, he helped to select the site and establish the original facilities in the early '70's. He was then chosen to run the camp and set up the first programmes. For almost ten years boys developed



valuable bushcraft and camping skills under his expert tutelage and, during that time, it became a vital and valuable strand of the School's unique fabric.

To School Cadets Frank has not only brought his military expertise but also abilities in organization and leadership and a ready rapport with young men. He believes that the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme provides a worthwhile and attractive alternative to military activities. Since 1973 Christ Church students have won many Awards, including 50 Silver and 8 Gold, by participating in survival training, citizenship projects and community service. Frank has gained State recognition of his service to the Scheme and hopes to maintain his interest in the future.

Characteristically, Frank plans an active retirement in voluntary service to community and local government organizations. Both he and Mrs Fraser enjoy caravanning and they look forward to circumnavigating Australia by road — following the sun wherever possible. We wish them a happy and fulfilling retirement and express the gratitude of the School for Frank's years of dedicated service.

We wish Les every success with his position at





## A VISITOR'S VIEW — I

It is only with reluctance that I have agreed to the Editor's request to write down some comments about my year of exchange teaching at C.C.G.S. A visitor to WA, particularly from the UK, is on dangerous ground, in a State that is not sure of its status, in a country that is not sure of its status in the world. Adverse comments might be dismissed as 'whingeing' and favourable comments would appear to be mere platitudes.

Also such requests for articles should perhaps be made in the first few weeks of a visit for some of the things that struck me as odd or unsatisfactory then, have now become more familiar and reasonable as I have become educated in West Australian ways.

Clearly 1987 was not a typical year for WA with Elton John, the Pope, Dennis Connor and Mike Gatting all in Perth in the same week, I began to get the impression that I really was at the centre of world events. But with the Cup lost, the visitors left and Fremantle resumed its role as gateway to thousands of miles of nothing, which I guess gives the place its unique character and charm.

Perhaps 1987 was a more typical year for Christ Church, at least typical of the last few years of its existence. There were many cooperative and willing students for me to teach, hours of sport to coach and watch (one of my PSA teams won one of its games),

and camps to attend at Kooringal and in the snow at Mount Buller. It was a most rewarding experience teaching in a school with its committed and highly professional staff and imaginative and open leadership.

I was reluctant to leave at the end of the stay as I felt I was beginning to master the language. For example, I learnt that to McClemans boys 'to study hard' meant to think about taking their Economics textbook out of their locker up to the House, and that 'an optimist' was a Christ Church 1st XI batsman who put zinc cream on his nose before going out to bat (or a 1st XVIII footballer expecting to kick a goal against Scotch?) I thank everybody who has been associated with my exchange most sincerely.

When Dennis Connor departed these shores with the Auld Mug still dripping champagne and Aussie ambitions shattered, it was time for me to face the challenges posed by a new school, unknown students and an unfamiliar system. Day one brought my first classes and evoked memories of the last time I had worked in an all boys school. During my stay in Australia, I was not to hear one convincing argument for retaining a single sex system of schooling, but no doubt the debate will continue — as will the status quo.

It didn't take long to get to know my students. Although their manner was more causal and informal than I had been used to in Hong Kong, I enjoyed their company for the remainder of my stay. The assistance and advice from my colleagues in the Manual Arts Department was excellent and contributed to what has proved to be a very happy experience for me. I hope I have been able to make a useful contribution to the education of my students and I will be returning with very positive feelings about the benefits of teacher exchanges in general — and mine in particular.

I wish the many students I have had the pleasure of teaching at Christ Church continued success with their studies and achievements.


## **NATIONAL CHEMISTRY QUIZ, 1987:**

While the results obtained by students from Christ Church in this quiz have previously been very good, this year has produced a particularly outstanding set of results.

It is notoriously easy to distort any set of data with statistics, however, the following statistical information bears testimony to the talent of students at Christ Church.

YEAR 12: Total number of students in Australia entering quiz, 8569. Total number of students from C.C.G.S. 31. 21 of these students were in the top 10% in Australia, while 6 students were in the top 1%.

of 4 Year 12 students in Australia to gain that mark. Michael has received a plaque and a Certificate of Excellence for his effort.

YEAR 11: Total number of students in Australia entering quiz, 10,708. Total number of students from C.C.G.S. 25. 19 of these students were in the top 10% in Australia, while 8 students were in the top 1%.

David Gibson was equal second in Australia. Both David and Adrian Foo received plaques for being placed in the top 25 students in Australia.

YEAR 10: Total number of students in Australia entering quiz 8662. Total number of students from C.C.G.S. 28. 22 of these students were in the top 10% in Australia, while 2 students were in the top 1%. Every student in Year 10 was awarded a Certificate.

The eight students in Year II who were in the top 1% in Australia (the total population of this select group is about 250) have been selected to sit preliminary tests for the Australian Chemistry Olympiad. These students are Eu Jin Ang; Khong Sheong Chia; Rob Davidson; Adrian Foo, David Gibson; James Hall; Yagan Millet; Paul Phillips.

The term Renta is an abbreviation of "Rent-a-pom" but has come to be used Perth-wide to describe such students of any nationality. Thus in Term 1 Christ Church employed a total of seven Rentas in varying fields. From England came Jonathan Wells and I to work in the Music Department, while Robert Bruce and Chris Bantvala helped in the Sports Store. Chris MacQuarrie and, briefly, David Garrett came from New Jersey in the U.S.A. in order to help out with drama (though nobody actually <code>saw</code> them engaged in anything more strenuous than sleeping!) David Cavenor, an assistant laboratory technician, had come the relatively short distance from Canberra but was as much a stranger to Perth as the rest of us.

It was interesting to see how the seven of us coped with our new conditions, having been thrown together in quarters which, with all due respect, were less than palatial. There were a couple of clashes of personality as we went through the process of adaptation, not the least the disparity between our biological clocks. Americans seem to rise at about 1pm and rage on until 3 the next morning, much to the disgust of the back dorm in Parry House! Our cramped circumstances (seven in four rooms) certainly taught us the basic principles of consideration for others and meant that we had to develop standards of personal tidiness and organisation. Inevitably some were more successful in these things than others — an education for all in the broadest sense of the word.

The contingent of Rentas was reduced to three in Term II to leave myself, Jonathan and David Cavenor with room to breathe, while in Term III Jonathon Goff, again from New Jersey, arrived to take over the Sports Store and Hiroyuki Sahara, an arts graduate from Japan, came to help in Japanese conversation classes. At the time of writing we expect Philip Dearn to join the Music Department from England in Term IV to replace Jonathan and me. We are returning in late September to begin our careers at Cambridge and Oxford respectively.

In his report written on his return to England, last year's musical Renta, Matthew Vine, penned the simple phrase "Christ Church doesn't ask you to do too much..." Certainly some of us feel that the School might have made more use of us in the fields where it could have drawn upon our diverse educational backgrounds and experiences. Occasionally I was given to wondering just how much the School community knew about our presence and the reasons behind it, especially when asked by a senior member of staff halfway through Term II whether I was a student here! Nevertheless, our flexible working hours enabled us to participate in a wide variety of activities both inside and outside the School. Jonathan and I were privileged enough to be invited to join the "Midnite" orchestra, for example, and we enjoyed our involvement in the musical's Perth season immensely. The winter vacation gave us the chance to venture outside Western Australia - David to Kakadu, Jonathan to the Barrier Reef and myself to New Zealand and we all managed to travel down to the beautiful South-West at some time or other. Not that there were many reasons to flee Perth, of course. Frequently the temptation of an afternoon on Cottesloe Beach proved just too great to bear!

I think I echo the sentiments of all Rentas in saying that Christ Church has allowed me to have the time of my life - none of us, I believe, will return to our native lands untouched by our experiences of the people and the lifestyle of the world's most remote city. Students here interested in the idea of a "gap year" should note that a reciprocal scheme operates in several English schools which will, I am sure, extend as warm a welcome to visiting Australians as Christ Church has extended to all of us.



#### BASKETBALL

Trinity batted first on a wicket favouring the batsmen. They scored quickly at the beginning, assisted by some wayward bowling and a fast outfield, and made their way to 3-209 overnight. The next day Christ Church started well with early wickets but failed to prevent a score in excess of 300. Peter Campbell provided the major threat to the Trinity batsmen, taking 4-61 from 21 overs.

When Christ Church batted little resistance was shown, with the exception of Peter Campbell who showed remarkable character in compiling 41 runs. Christ Church were made to follow on and improved to finish 5-137 at the close.

When we played Scotch the following week, our batting instability was again exposed by a less than brilliant attack. Of the 185 scored, Matthew Liggins made 68 to give us some hope of victory. An early wicket with the score on 4 put Christ Church on top. However, Scotch fought their way back into the match and, despite Marsh and Hicks taking three wickets each, thwarted Christ Church again.

Apart from a spirited partnership by Campbell and debutant Stuart MacGill, neither Christ Church's

batting or bowling presented any major threat in the following match against Guildford.

But Wesley were the team to beat this season and they were looking for extra points against the young Christ Church team. They found the going tough, taking only 3 wickets from the fighting Christ Church batsmen on the first day. The next day wickets tumbled, leaving again only a small total for our bowlers to defend. Christ Church fought hard as they had the previous day.

Craig Hicks conceded only 3 runs from his first 7 overs. Then a fielding error let Wesley back into the match with a 101 run stand for the fourth wicket. When this was broken we took 6-68 to finish off a weak Wesley tail. If only we had taken that catch!

Our next innings, against Aquinas, saw all the top order fight for survival on a very unpredictable wicket; we never really mastered the Aquinas attack, reaching only 163 all out. Aquinas started quietly and after lunch seemed to be running out of time when rain sprinkled down in patches. Then Jason MacLaurin struck, bowling the Aquinas Vice-Captain and then another player for a duck. Aquinas opened up and tried to slog the 163 before the rain or MacLaurin finished them. They just made it, for the loss of two more wickets, but Jason finished with the impressive figures of 6 wickets for 87 runs. In our second innings we lost 4 wickets for 100.

Our last game against Hale did not turn out as we

would have liked. We were bowled out for 134 with Andrew Spafford making 54. Hale then made 250, declared and sent us back in. We made 81 for the loss of 3 wickets.

Throughout the season we never dropped our heads or took the game lightly and always enjoyed it. It was good to see team members enjoying others' success as much as their own. Next year's team has some promising players and a good foundation to build on.

Miss Day put in many hours organizing everything from taxis to players and was indispensable. Mr. MacGill showed great patience and understanding as coach and gave us the full benefit of his deep knowledge and wide experience of the game. I have special thanks to give him as this is my fourth season with him as coach.

The 10A team lost five of their matches but finished by preventing Hale gaining any points in the last game. They showed some fight to force a draw. This team

contained a lot of individual talent which will help Christ Church in future years. The 10B team, as with the 9B, could not manage a win but could not be accused of lack of endeavour. The 9A team drew one game and won two. This team contains several good players but two who cannot escape mention are Dan Marsh and Tony King, both of whom could play 1st XI next season and make plenty of runs. I would like to thank Dan and Tony for acting as twelfth men for the 1st XI. The 9B team could not manage the big victory but fought gallantly and did not lose for lack of effort. The Year 8A team finished with two wins and a draw and look set to finish high up in their competition which continues in Term 4. Similarly the 8B team has one draw and two wins.

Generally the situation in the Middle School augurs well for a Darlot Cup victory in three or four years.



Several competitions were held in which the students played either 9 or 18 holes, from which some of the


more competent players went on to join the club's Pennant Squad. They included Brian Millar, Jason Cordes, Michael Allan, William Edmonds and David Inglis.

1987 has seen Christ Church's high standard of gymnastics dominate the year's events.


During the initial part of the season the Invitation



The Year 10 students had the more challenging task of attempting their Bronze Medallion. Advanced water, rescue, theory and resuscitation work culminated in a total of 127 Year 10 students passing their Bronze Medallion.

Meanwhile a smaller group of students from Year 11 decided to persist with improving their Life Saving skills which resulted in 37 of them being presented with the advanced Award of Merit. This year it was most pleasing to see a band of dedicated upper school boys put in the extra work in their own time with Mr Kovacs to achieve their Instructors Certificate.

Those boys involved were Simon Hanson, Dion Mepham, Adam Collins, Anthony Morgan, and Peter Galvin.

On the competition front Christ Church entered a Life Saving team in the Medibank Private State Schools Championships which were held at Guildford Grammar School in November last year. Halfway through the season the 1st VIII were undefeated and the 1st IV and the 2nd VIII were performing strongly. As with last year, the Middle



The Inter-House sports on 23rd February saw a great night of swimming. Queenslea were the winning House, displacing Craigie who had won for the last few years. Individual Age Champions were: U/13 Sukbin Song. U/14 Lachlan Lidbury; U/15 Chris Lapinski; U/16 Shane McDermott; and Open Peter Galvin. The fiercest competition was in the U/15 Age Group where Chris Lapinski, Robert Murphy, Danny Court, Paul Reemeijer, Francisco Malta and Wysun Wong swam a series of close results, all in excellent times.

In 1986 our win in the Quads was a little unexpected. In 1987 we were quietly confident. On the night Christ Church demonstrated great depth of swimming to win the John Ryan Shield for the second time. This gave the team a great lift going into the Inters one week later. The results were C.C.G.S. 1298; Scotch 1047; Wesley  $789\frac{1}{2}$ ; Trinity  $580\frac{1}{2}$ .

The ultimate test for the team was the Inters held on 21st March. Christ Church felt that the 1987 team offered the best chance of success since the 1968





Dion Mepham's record time of 55.33sec in the Open 100m Freestyle was a National Standard time and confirms him as the fastest ever swimmer to go to Christ Church.

The stars may have set up the win but it was the relay swimmers and the Second Division swimmers who completed the victory. They trained harder than ever before, competed for places in the team and on the night, without exception, swam personal best times. They are too numerous to mention but they represent our "winning spirit." Congratulations and thank you to every one of them.


After last year's disappointment it was great to beat Hale who have been our major competitor in tennis over the last few years.

## INTERVIEW WITH THE 1ST VIII COACH

Interviewer: In the time (since 3rd Term 1983) that you have been coaching the 1st VIII, you've had a lot of success in the Gerald Newson (Term 3 Competition) but winning the Corr Cup this year must have been the highlight?

O. Van Kampen: Even though four successes from 1983 to 1986 in the Gerald Newson Competition were marvellous, winning the Corr Cup this year certainly was the highlight. The result of 20 sets to 4 over Hale in the final was especially pleasing as Hale had beaten us narrowly in 1985 and 1986. To beat them so convincingly was a good feeling.

Int.: What was the difference between Christ Church and Hale this year?

O. D. V. K.: In 1985 Hale clearly had the best team in the PSA. In 1986 Christ Church had almost caught up with them, but in the final at Hale they used their slow home courts to advantage and their key players who were in Year 12 showed great character to enable them to win 14 sets to 10. This year it was our turn. Our top four players — David Culley, Darren Patten, Paul Kilderry and Kris Court — were all in that losing side of 1986 and were determined to avenge that loss. That was the difference. This time we had the key players with the experience, character and ability to win. For David, Darren and Kris, all in Year 12, this was their last chance and they certainly grabbed it. It was, I guess, an historic occasion for the School — its first ever Corr Cup victory.

Int.: You mention your top four players — those same boys went on to play in the premier State 18 and Under teams competition, the Slazenger Cup.

O. D. V. K.: Yes, they played in the final on the centre courts at Kings Park, also against Hale, and trounced them 6 rubbers to nil. Mind you, it wasn't as easy as the score makes it look. Some of the rubbers were very close and the overall standard of play was quite stunning. The level of tennis was on par with that of the Men's District A Grade Pennant Final. Int.: It sounds as if the second half of the 1st VIII team were inconsequential.

O. D. V. K.: Not so! The bottom four are just as important as the higher ranking players — they play just as many sets and you can't win without depth. In fact their win against the top four players of Wesley in the WALTA State teams competition "Murcell Shield" was a commendable achievement. Charlie Perkins won a critical singles rubber and our doubles combinations played superbly.

Int.: Who were the other boys in the Murcell Shield team?

O. D. V. K.: Julian Butler, Brett Patten and Todd Davies.

Int.: Were there any individuals who really stood out throughout the 1st VIII season?

O. D. V. K.: There were a few who stood out but first of all let me emphasize that there were ten boys in the Squad. Scott Bruce and Anthony Lewis played a number of games and performed with distinction, and each player depended upon his team mates for overall success. That's one of the nice things about team competitions, you have to train, work and play together to achieve a goal. But back to individuals who stood out. I think it's fair to point out David Culley's efforts as Captain and number one player in the team. He really did lead by example — he trained hard, was fiercely determined, 'lifted' his game in all of the big matches, supported his team mates and never lost a set in the season. The other individual I also want to acknowledge is Mr Rob Kilderry. His assistance with coaching and his general support of the team was invaluable. His knowledge of technique, tactics and everything to do with tennis is probably without equal in this State, if not in Australia.

Int.: And what of the future?

O. D. V. K.: No one's mastered predicting the future, so it's difficult to say. Certainly at Christ Church we've developed in tennis forward momentum and success. Success often goes in cycles but Christ Church should at worst be competitive over the next few years and if the boys play well enough, (it is up to them) then the School should enjoy further successes.

## **ADVENTURE UNIT**

"There must be a harder way," Hell Track went on and on and on and the hill got steeper and steeper and steeper and steeper. And it was raining. Here we were a sturdy bunch of Year Tens who called ourselves the Adventure Unit. We were on the first camp of the year, which involved not only being dropped off beyond the map and being told to "use your own initiative" to find our way, but also being capsized in the river and trying — usually without success — to Eskimo roll. was spent exploring the nearby caves, cliffs and an eagle's eyrie and was topped off by fresh fish for dinner.



The next day, Wednesday, was spent climbing Thumb Peak and swimming in the surf around Twin Bays. The superb weather continued and the final day's walking proved to be pleasant, with lunch time entertainment provided by a school of dolphins and more whales.

Despite small set-backs, including minor injuries and a shortage of water, the expedition was indeed an adventure, and an extremely enjoyable one.

The year's activities were not always easy — in fact they were usually the exact opposite — but because they were always 'challenging' we gained a lot of satisfaction from completing them and learned a lot along the way (especially those that made the effort to 'be in it' and attend many of the optional weekend camps).

We would like to thank the Year 11 leaders, Mr. Froude, Mr. Saggers, Mr. Tait and Mr. Brackenreg for a great year in the Adventure Unit.



## **AMATEUR RADIO**

The Club made a few attempts to start this year but the demands of other kinds of radio kept gaining priority—the School's Commercial HF radio, the Cadet Corps radios, the Pilbara Expedition communications and then more Cadet activities.

The radio link betwen Kooringal and the School is used almost daily and has now been extended to include vehicle mobile to Kooringal and/or the School. Upon request a second frequency was allocated by the Department of Communications. This means that if another operator is using one frequency, or if there is no propagation, there is an alternative. New dipole antennae, capable of operating over a frequency range of 2-20 MHz, were erected and these proved useful for the Amateur Radio Bands and the Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) Radio, both of which were reliable means of communication during the Pilbara Expedition. Amateur Radio provided "armchair copy" communication with Perth from Carawine Gorge, near Telfer, which is not near anywhere else! Some days, because of the vagaries of propagation, it was easier to talk to Perth via Adelaide. The Amateur Travellers' net has control stations in all states to ensure that all travellers carrying Amateur Radio can check in at mid-day. One of the RFDS bases in Meekatharra, Derby or Kalgoorlie, was contacted each morning and all provided a 24 hour radio link for the expedition. Convoy communication for the five vehicles was by means of commercial VHF



on 167 MHz with a range of up to 50 km over flat country. The HF commercial radio covered the long distances and back to Perth.

The grateful thanks of all CCGS radio users go to the Cadet Unit and to Kooringal for maintaining and making available radios which increase the safety of outdoor activities and enable others to share the enjoyment of these activities. The whole of the North West knew about CCGS and MLC at Carawine Gorge via Outpost Radio!

## **CADETS**

Cadets for 1987 commenced on 24th January with a promotion course at Kooringal. This was the first time for a number of years that the unit had held such a course without Guildford Grammar. A disadvantage of not working with the Guildford Unit is that our junior and senior cadets do not become exposed to the other School's cadets and officers. The advantages are that as a unit we could put twice the number of students on the course and the areas of training needing attention were already known. Twenty seven students completed the course, nine senior and eighteen junior cadets.

Items included on the training programme were: leadership, lesson preparation, lesson delivery, skill improvement, and a number of night activities that focused on small group work in navigation and decision making. Highlight of the course was the "special one man mission" conducted at night by Troy Taylor (alias Birthday Boy). Troy was set the extremely important task of delivering a special consignment of S.A.N.D. in a pack. His patrol was commenced at 2000 hrs approx. and completed by 2230 hrs — another successful undertaking by a dedicated member of the Unit.

Staff conducting the course were Maj. Nowak, Lt. Mathie, Lt. Moore, Lr. Norris, Lt. Cox and Lt. Parker. Catering facilities were provided by Margaret Nowak and Heather Norris, with haircuts also being available, compliments of Margaret Nowak and John Parker. The Headmaster presented awards to Nigel House, Top Senior Cadet, David Maddams, Most Improved Senior Cadet, James Fernley, Top Junior Cadet, and Brad Lynch, runner up.

After the Year 10 Cadets were kitted out with their uniforms, they were allocated to five platoons and a signal platoon. The Unit this year has increased dramatically from 112 to 155, mainly due to the large number of year 10 cadets and the fact that more senior cadets have stayed on.

Several weeks into the cadet year, the Unit went to Kooringal for the Annual Bivouac. Training included the ropes course, weapon handling, navigation, living in the field, and a 24 hour field exercise. A number of lessons were learnt, in particular how easy it is to become disorientated in the dark and the need for accurate pacing while navigating. Cpl. Hirsch led a recce. patrol which decided to brave all the elements and show the rest of the Unit who were the real men. The show of bravado concluded when the patrol members convinced its commander to head back to base at 0300 hours.

One of the highlights of the Bivouac (besides the wet weather) was the Church Parade on ANZAC day. Father Frank Sheehan and the Headmaster attended the parade, C.U.O. C. Binning read the lesson and Cdt. Mike V'Delli led the hymn singing on his guitar.

In May, Cadet headquarters announced that the Units ARES sponsor was to be 7 Fd. Ambulance, located in the Artillery Barracks, Fremantle. Lt. Col. Brian Wiliams is the Commanding Officer and the father of Cpl. Dave Williams. The Cadet Unit has previously been well supported by the Fd. Ambulance and we are thankful for their support through Capt. Grahame Lawe and W.O.1. Mick O'Sullivan.

On 1st and 2nd August fifteen Cadets supplied the VHF radio net for the Fd. Ambulance who were tasked by 5 Military District to support the Avon Descent. The exercise provided the members with valuable radio experience prior to the Annual Camp. C.U.O. Carl Binning was impressed with the Military reveille given to the participants of the descent — a salvo of fire from a 105 mm Artillery gun at 0430 hours on Sunday morning.

The Annual Camp was again the highlight of the training year. The Camp was held a month earlier this year. The first two days were based at Kooringal. Training sessions emphasised living in the field, platoon harbour procedure, cooking of damper and other rations, field hygiene, navigation techniques, field sketching by day and night and they also incorporated the annual range practice. The next four days involved moving to Mt. Keats from Nanga Mill. In the Mt. Keats area, the platoons put into practice the techniques they had been taught. Of particular benefit was the navigation at night. All cadets were required to move out of the company base camp in small groups of three or four. Their objective was to depart from the main position in fifteen minute intervals to a new position approximately one km. away. It was a noted success that all groups reached their objective without difficulty. The last groups left the position around 2345 hours and were in their new position by 0300 hours. The key to the success was the careful pacing and efficient compass work.

On the second last day, the excellent weather conditions came to an end. The weather cleared long enough to allow a forced march to the vicinity of the embussing area for the next day's departure for Perth but "Solo" was put into effect the same afternoon to the backdrop of lightning and thunder. It was rumoured that numerous pig noises were also heard between the claps of thunder.

Throughout the camp, the Unit remained in radio contact with the School. Frank Fraser monitored the VHF net throughout the day and provided the rear link so vital in the event of injury or illness. All Signal Cadets were impressed with the potential of radio communications and now have a better understanding of the need for this facility.

Support for Annual Camp came from Maj. Nowak, Maj. Gibson, Lt. Bishop, Lt. Cox, Lt. Mathie, Lt. Moore and Lt. Potter. Mrs Challinor again demonstrated her skill in ensuring that the safety vehicles were properly fitted out with radio and that the equipment was in the best possible working order.

From the conclusion of the Annual Camp, a hectic period of activity was experienced by all, the major function being the Headmaster's Parade on 16th September. Mr Tait as Acting Headmaster reviewed the Parade and awarded trophies to C.U.O. House, 'The Beresford Memorial Prize'; Sgt. Fernley, 'The J J J Benson Sash'; Cdt. Weiks, 'The Alexander Todd Prize', and to Cdt. Rutter, the 'Norrie Cup'.

Cadets for 1987 will conclude this year with the Annual Promotion Course to be held at Christ Church. It will be a residential course conducted from 12th to 18th December. Cadets considered to be suitable for leadership training will be invited to attend. This move will avoid the annual conflict with the rowing and swimming camps.

Many thanks must go to the outside assistance the Unit receives from Maj. Gibson, Lt. Bishop, Lt. Cox, Lt. D'vorak and Lt. Mathie, and we extend our best wishes to C.U.O. Binning who won a Defence Force Academy Scholarship for 1988.



## **CHAPEL**

During 1987 we had a number of interesting speakers to our Chapel Services. The Rev'd Doug Davies, Chaplain at Princess Margaret Hospital, spoke about his work. Father Davies is a former School Captain. Another Old Boy to address us was Jeremy Hobbs. Jeremy works for Community Aid Abroad. During his talk he invited staff and students to take part in the Walk Against Want. Later, he visited several Social Science classes and was able to answer questions about C.A.A. The Rev'd Jeffrey Berger is always a welcome visitor to the School. Father Berger is the Director of the Australian Board of Missions in Western Australia. He told us about the good work of A.B.M. in the Solomon Islands. In April, Father Berger returned to the School with the National Chairman of A.B.M., Bishop Ken Mason, Bishop Mason spoke to several classes. On March 28th we had the first of our Family Services for the year. Mr Anthony Howes gave the address which included some delightful references to the "Gospel According to Peanuts."

At the beginning of Term 2, Mr Anthony Ellis spoke at the Staff Service, Mr Ellis, an Old Boy, is the Executive Officer for the Anglican Schools Commission. On Anzac Day we had a special service which included readings of poetry and prose. Many people found this quite moving. We always read out the names of Old Boys who have died in wars. We then pray in silence. The Rev'd David Beales, Diocesan Youth Chaplain, spoke to us of his experiences at a Boarding School. He told us that Christianity first began to mean something to him following a camp organised by the local church. He then invited students to a camp organised by himself. Six of our Year Ten students attended this camp at Baldivis. They found it a most worthwhile experience. Mr Roger Dixon spoke to us about the problem of racism. His words were most challenging. The Rev'd Dr Jeffrey Sturman, Rector of City Beach, spoke about attitudes towards environmental issues. Dr Sturman is a member of the Anglican Social Responsibilities Commission.

On August 2nd we had our second Family Service. This was to celebrate Founder's Day. The Rev'd Dr Ivan Head, Director of the Anglican Institute of Theology, gave a very thoughtful sermon. Dr and Mrs Head have two boys in the Preparatory School. The Director of Anglican Education for the Diocese of Perth, Dr Ron Noone, spoke to us about the Transfiguration. The Rev'd Ken Frewer told us about his work with the Christian Missionary Society. Dr Jane Figgis, who produces the splendid Science Bookshop program for A.B.C. Radio, gave an address on the need for Science and Religion to be friends. The Rev'd Peter Ferguson, Chaplain at Curtin University, spoke about adolescence with particular reference to the ways in which young people relate to their parents. Towards the end of third Term, the Rev'd Alison Cheek spoke about the religious

significance of dreams. It was most interesting to have an Alglican woman priest with us. Mother Cheek is an Australian who was ordained to the priesthood within the Episcopalian (Anglican) Church in the United States. Mrs Nicole McGowan spoke about the Student Christian Movement which is active on university campuses. Mr Graham Nielsen, a staff member who holds a senior position within the Uniting Church, gave a talk about the philosophy of the Australian Council of Churches towards Aid to other countries. Although school holidays had begun by Palm Sunday, Christ Church made its annual visit to St George's Cathedral on this day. Students helped with the readings, the offertory procession and the distribution of palms. The Head Master also read a lesson and the Chaplain gave the sermon. We value out association with the Cathedral. We always receive a gracious welcome from the Dean and the congregation.

The Inter-House competition was narrowly won by Walters House (Khanna, Stevens, Dun, Wright) from Wolsey and Noake.



The aim of Community Service is to provide the students with the opportunity to work in a situation which they would not normally experience. The students are expected to spend one-and-a-half to two hours per week at a placement of their choice.

This year's placements were: Claremont Community Centre, entertaining and talking to the elderly; Unigym, helping children with co-ordination difficulties; Anglicare and Save the Children Op. Shops, sorting and serving in the shop; Nedlands Aged Support Service, doing gardening and cleaning work for elderly people in the area; Riding for the Disabled Association, grooming horses and cleaning up yards and stables; Australian Trust for Conservation Volun-

teers (ACTV), working on environmental restoration and re-afforestation; and Paper Recycling, collecting used clean paper for the Good Samaritans to sell for recycling.

During the year, when the Cadets and Adventure Unit had their camps, we undertook a programme of varied activities. On 23rd April, we spent the day at the Claremont Museum emptying gutters of leaves, digging trenches for drainpipes, laying slabs, cleaning windows and carrying out other domestic chores which the volunteer staff have little time for. The following day, we were taken on a tour of two sheltered workshops, Paraquad Industries and The Good Samaritans, and learned a great deal about the good work being done by these two institutions.

On the week commencing Saturday, 15th August, while a few boys worked with ACTV at Kambalda or Rottnest, the majority of Community Service students

ventured forth to the wilds of West Midland to work with The Men of the Trees, a previously unknown organisation to most of us. We had a busy five days weeding, constructing and reconstructing tables, building shadehouses, and most importantly, planting nearly two thousand seedlings. Our work was much appreciated and the week was certainly a valuable experience for all of us.

During the year, all excursions were successfully arranged by Mrs Ife, and thanks must also go to Mrs Matthews, who organised the students attending Unigym. We are sure that all the boys who opted to do Community Service in 1987 gained more than they had expected, and we recommend it to the present Year 9's as the activity to choose next year.


## **DEBATING**

of which is yelled in a threatening manner from the floor). In practice it resembles the verbal equivalent of Rock 'N Wrestling, where one must deal with booing, hissing and the odd projectile. The most memorable of

As a result of this learning process and experience, it seems the Christ Church debater of the future is going to comprise elements of arrogance, pride, spontaneity, decadence, irreverence and caustic individualism. Yes, things are certainly looking up for Christ Church Debating in the future.

## DRAMA AND MEDIA

1987 is the first full year of operation for the new Drama and Media Department at the School. (Prior to this year Drama and Media was a separate unit of the English Department). Intentionally, this has meant a healthy blurring of the previously rigid line between classroom and out of class activity. Also, it has demanded that the "staffing" of the department undergo radical change. The writer, Anthony Howes is the Director of Drama and Media, new staff member Michael Tasker (formerly stage manager at the Hole in the Wall) became Production Assistant with some teaching responsibilities, and the joint Captains of Drama, Peter Campbell and Philip Sparrow (both in Year 12) assumed real administrative roles alongside other staff members like John James, Ian Edwards, Simon Gipson, Gwyneth Ife, Bob Woollett, Andrew Tait and David Rhodes, who cross departmental barriers to assist in the work in various capacities. For this to happen successfully is a tribute to them all.

Changes in the classroom have been significant. First, all Year 8's participate in Drama and Media as part of the Creative Arts Programme. In Years 9 and 10 a full year elective is run, in two separate groupings, in a combined Drama and Media Course. In Years 11 and 12, Theatre Arts may be taken and Media Studies, in two separate courses. In all this, some fine tuning is necessary, but changes have happened smoothly and some excellent pupil work has resulted. An encouraging beginning has been made.

In line with the above, the production schedule has changed from that of previous years. This programme has been designed to allow maximum participation in performance and direction work to be possible for any boy, should he desire it. Thus, in drama, four major seasons were planned. The Bicentennial production

of Midnite at His Majesty's Theatre came first (Years 10 to 12) and then the classic farce Charley's Aunt (Years 10 and 11). This was followed by the House Arts Festival (all Years) and finally, A Christmas Carol (Years 8 and 9).

In video production, development is hampered by the lack of some very expensive, but necessary equipment, however, progress has happened there also.

The annual Video Awards have attracted a much higher standard of entries this year and the weekly production of *Hallucinations* has given way to a more carefully prepared production with the name of *Day Seven*. Mr Tasker is to be congratulated on the work with his production crews, here.

Another vital area has seen an increase in both activity and participation. Theatre visits have included the following: Lydie Breeze (The Octagon) Emerald City, The Alchemist, What the Butler Saw, The Seagull (at the Hole in the Wall) The Firebird (WA Ballet-His Majesty's Theatre) Phoenix Dance Company (The Quarry Theatre) Golden Valley, Lewis Essington-I am Work (Playhouse) — and others are planned. Invited to CCGS for our boys to see and talk with were the five members of The Melbourne University Revue who discussed satiric writing for the theatre and performed in the Drama Centre. Other visitors included Choreographer-Actress Trudy Johnston. who conducted workshops and created the routines for Midnite. (Miss Johnston "piloted" the artist-inresidence scheme which I would like to see developed in future years).

This year, over 300 boys have been directly involved with out-of-class work in drama and media. (Others have been involved as audiences, of course). For non-compulsory education this is a great encouragement! Add to those numbers the classroom component and the drama and media education at the School should find much to plan for in 1988, given the support and encouragement of the school community.

As Director, I would close these notes with special thanks to my colleagues who have supported the changes made and the work done. Gratitude is expressed also to the parents who have assisted, to Mr Tasker, Peter Campbell and Philip Sparrow, and most

willingly in the Drama and Media programme 1987. The musical play adapted by Richard Tulloch from Randolph Stow's novel of the same name, *Midnite* was chosen as Christ Church Grammar School's main contribution to the Australian Bicentennial celebrations. It was endorsed by the Britain-Australia Bicentennial Committee and the Australian Bicentennial Authority and will tour for the month of January 1988 throughout Great Britain. It was staged at His Majesty's Theatre in May 1987 to allow our supporters the opportunity of seeing it and to raise funds for the tour. It has received considerable publicity in Australia and the United Kingdom. A full report will be found in MITRE 1988 when the Bicentennial Tour has been completed. The idea for the Bicentennial Tour came

from a discussion the Director of Drama, Mr A. O. Howes, had with Sir Peter Gadsden, the Chairman of

the Britain-Australia Bicentennial committee and was encouraged and supported by the Headmaster, Mr

Hill and the School Council.

#### **MIDNITE**

When Tony Howes first fronted the English Department at the beginning of 1986, he mentioned to me that while he had been in the UK the previous year he had discussed the possibility of taking over a touring show from Christ Church. Visibly, I blanched. Having been involved with Theatre and Drama at the school since 1983, and having directed and produced a number of shows, the thought of the sheer logistics involved in such a venture was mindboggling. It was difficult enough mounting an "ordinary" show at the school, let alone a touring show which had to travel twelve thousand miles before the tour really commenced.

Tony, naturally, was casual. "No problems," he said. "I've already got the promise of sponsorship under the Britain-Australia Bicentenary Committee, the Queen's Private Secretary on-side, a theatre in the West End lined up, the Space Shuttle there and back,

impending beatitude from a variety of religious and non-religious organizations, and coverage by Channel 7."

"Oh," I replied. What else could one say except: "What show are you going to take?"

"There's the rub!" said Tony. "I'm not sure."

However, as the cliché goes, fortune always smiles on the brave. At the time Tony was considering his mammoth, the Playhouse was running the stage adaptation of Randolph Stow's classic "children's" book, *Midnite*. Supposedly a musical adaptation, this rather tired professional production which did little to reflect the real character of the book — though Juniper's sets were marvellous — appeared to be the ideal vehicle for a touring student production from Western Australia. Only one problem, though: the music was pretentiously operatic, boring and un-Australian.

Tony, of course, secured the performing rights from Richard Tulloch, the playwright, and then wisely jettisoned the music.

"Good move, Tony," I said, "but who's going to write your music for you? You've got to have music."

"No problem," he replied (I should have known!). "We have a resident composer here: John Bates."

So, the Howes bandwagon got on the road. With the enlisted help of the ladies from across the fence at MLC, the unlimited and enthusiastic help from parents and staff from both schools, and the undying envy of every other drama teacher in the State, *Midnite* commenced work.

"Looks good," I commented, "but surely you're not going to put it on in the Memorial Hall or Bosisto?" Of course, casual as ever, and delicately stroking his fourth private school tie of the day, Tony said, "No." "Well, where then?"

"Perth Theatre Trust has given us the Maj."

I might have known. Tony would not have settled for anything less. Only the premier theatre in the town would be suitable for *Midnite*. He was right.

And so, on Wednesday, the 20th May, after unheard of publicity in the media — to the undying envy of every private school Headmaster/mistress in the state — *Midnite* opened. Once the formalities were over (and the penguins had left the stage), Tony's vision and efforts were justified. Without doubt, *Midnite* was an unprecedented and well deserved success.

I have seen many school productions, but the thing that made *Midnite* shine was the sheer fusion of all aspects of good theatre, student or otherwise. It had energy and it had commitment; it had style and it had entertainment. And, importantly, unlike the professional production I had seen at the Playhouse, it remained true to the tone and intent of Stow's original work. I suppose three aspects particularly stick in my mind about the production: the ensemble character of the cast; the delightful directorial touches; and the stylishly theatrical music.

I think that the one thing Tony really achieved with his company was the sense of belonging together as a team, and that really showed through in the production. The obvious co-operation between the students and the supportive interaction leant so much to a production that relied on the warmth generated by such a performance.

But, Tony helped achieve this by giving the students sensible direction. Too often in school productions students are given roles or direction which are inappropriate to either their years or their experience. Tony avoided these traps. His direction reflected the sense and tone of the play and gave the cast tangible humour to work with. I mean, who can forget Greg Mycock's surf lifesaver, Gavin Loughton's John Brown, or Cameron McNeilage's soft-shoe shuffle to

"Tea for Two".

Finally, the witty theatricality of John Bates' delightful score. Tony was more than fortunate to have such a talented muso on campus — particularly in that he also looks the Hollywood matinee version of a composer/conductor. John's music, I feel, was one of the highlights of the whole show. Having seen *Midnite* with a poor score, it is apparent how much John's music had to do with making the show such a success.

And now, we can but wait for the Company to tour the UK. Given the energy, commitment, professionalism and talent of cast and crew, and the support of both schools and parents, I feel sure that it will be nothing short of successful.

"So," I said to Tony, "What's next on the agenda? I mean, how can you top this one?"

Casually, he leaned back in his chair, steepled his fingers, and looked me in the eye. "I'm taking an entirely new show about Australia that hasn't been written yet, with an entirely new score, with a cast of two hundred drawn from the private schools of Australia and New Zealand, on a two year round the world tour, taking in such exotic ports of call as Barbados, Rio, the Lebanon, Canada..."

I had to ask, didn't I?

## **CHARLEY'S AUNT**

With a five week rehearsal period it might have been thought that Mr Howes was expecting too much of his cast of players from Christ Church and Saint Hilda's. Expecting too much, that is, for them to achieve a highly polished, incredibly fast moving, continually hilarious interpretation of Brandon Thomas' classic farce. The four night season in the Drama Centre of the Memorial Hall proved he wasn't and that they could do what he asked of them and more! The cast told this reviewer that the experience was exceptional in that they really felt that much was being demanded of them, yet they also felt exhilarated when the demands vielded so much success.

The three settings, designed by Michael Tasker, set the mood of the 1890's well. It is a tribute to the crew that the tiny stage of the Drama Centre was able to cope with the changes required. Music and lighting were unobtrusive, but exactly right, as were the costumes, loaned, I understand, from the WA Opera Company and The Hole in the Wall.

Charley's Aunt demands good ensemble playing to succeed. This was achieved right from the opening moments between Jack (played by Rod Palmer) Charley (Tony Brooks) and Brassett (John Richards). These three were excellent foils for each other with Tony playing up the naivete of his role and John the wisdom of the all-knowing slightly superior servant. Rod Palmer is an excellent actor indeed, and his portrayal of Jack deserves the highest praise. Jack, technically, holds the play together, and any faulty pacing or timing from this character and the whole play stumbles. Rod did more than cope; he played Jack for all it was worth and gave us a wily, romantic young man who caught the sympathy of the audience night after night. A superb performance. Dimmity Walker and Penny Arrow, as the girl friends of the two "heroes" were bright, energetic and pretty. They succeeded in portraying the young prim Victorian misses and yet allowed them to have a reality that is sometimes missing in portrayals of these roles. Marnie Hume as the 'real' Donna Lucia d'Alvadorez and Rebecca Angus, as Ella the orphan, provided a change of pace and characterisation which gave the play its proper "quiet" moments. It is never easy for young actors to portray middle aged men. James Rippey as Sir Francis Chesney and Blair McGlew as Stephen Spettigue rose to that challenge very well indeed. James really was middle aged and Blair became a crabby older man - and a beautifully asthmatic one at that! There is no doubt that Lord Fancourt Babberley is a role that most actors would give their eye teeth to play. It is also true that unless it is handled with the utmost skill, it can become a tiresome, overdone, hamfisted piece of amateurism that would make any audience squirm in their seats! Yagan Millett played "Charley's Aunt, from Brazil where the nuts come from!" with a professionalism

that gave us a most unforgettable characterisation and a truly wonderful evening of first class entertainment. His Donna Lucia was superbly timed, his/her mannerisms refined to the minutest detail and his/her sense of fun (which alternated with panic and anger) quite outstanding. The sheer energy of his portrayal gave us a unique experience. Yagan Millett as Charley's Aunt will long be remembered!

Christ Church can be justly proud of this production -

direction, settings, acting, technical backup — showed a production of quality and vastly superior entertainment value . . . it wasn't just a fine school production, it was a fine production! This reviewer returns to the United Kingdom having seen standards of theatre in CCGS he would search far and wide to find in comparable schools in Britain. Thank you for the experience.

# GEOGRAPHY EXCURSIONS AND FIELD STUDIES


As a subject area, Geography studies a vast range of topics including climate, mapping, urban and industrial studies and landforms. Interrelationships which exist between components of the human and natural environments are very important as is the need for fieldwork. The excursions and field studies provide a major source of information and interest necessary for the understanding of the classroom theory. Our field studies are designed and co-ordinated to support the work done at school. This year there are sixty Year 11 and eighty-seven Year 12 Geography students.

The Year 11 course has an emphasis upon physical geography, e.g. mapping, weather, climate, the water cycle, ecosystems, resources and landform studies. This year there were two main excursions. The first was to Fremantle covering mapping, a land use study of High Street, a cruise of Fremantle Harbour and a visit to Fremantle Museum — a full day's programme involving all the field study techniques of observation, recording and later interpretation of the data. The second excursion was a one day coast to scarp study looking at coastal and river landforms and processes of erosion and weathering between Cottesloe Beach and John Forrest National park. In both cases a field report was compiled and assessed.

The Year 12 course places an emphasis on human geography and includes map reading and interpretation, agricultural landuse, the study of settlements and

urban and industrial studies. The fieldwork is assessed and forms 20% of the school based marks. Two main field studies were undertaken this year. First was the Dwellingup-Mandurah region study, a two and a half day camp based at Kooringal which covers market gardening at Spearwood and Harvey, bauxite mining and alumina production at ALCOA, Pinjarra, the study of Dwellingup, Pinjarra and Mandurah as rural settlements, dairying, a coast to scarp transect and "beef processing" at E.G. Green and Sons, Harvey. The boys were most impressed by the meatworks, a definite highlight of the camp. In addition to the field studies the students work on a roster basis to cook food and keep Kooringal clean. The staff found the boys this year to be especially co-operative in doing camp duties. Special thanks must go to the Kooringal staff, ALCOA, Mr Peter Green and Mr. Bill Russell.

Our second excursion for Year 12 was to Perth city. This involved a one day intensive exploration and analysis of the Perth Central Business District, including the Hay Street Mall, North, West and East Perth. We estimated the students covered between 10 and 12 km. Activities included pedestrian and traffic surveys, landuse mapping and vertical zonation of high rise buildings. The boys worked in groups of 3-5 and collected vast amounts of information on the form and structure of Perth.

The Geography Department would like to thank the staff at Christ Church for their co-operation in our field study programme. My thanks also to the Geography staff. Allan Hallett and Richard Wait for their efforts.

# **KOORINGAL**


This year's Outdoor Education programme has been highlighted by the unusual fine, warm winter conditions, which have been made bushwalking and camping out a pleasure, but unfortunately the Murray River was well below its usual winter height, and this spoilt the kayaking for most of the year. Mr Saggers was joined on staff by Mr Froude, full time ("so what's new", said the staff in Perth, "he used to spend most of his time there anyway"), and Mark Tait as the intern. Their enthusiasm was obvious from the start as they set about organising new equipment maintaining

and repairing the old, and stocking the pantry, ready for the very full programme ahead.

Six new "Roto" moulded plastic kayaks were purchased, and proved excellent replacements. The boys found them very forgiving, and the staff loved the low maintenance requirements. The Parents' Association has most generously purchased twelve rugged Mountain Bikes for bush cycling and touring. The boys have enjoyed the excitement that the bikes offer. and look forward to wider range expeditions on two wheels in the future.

... The duties we did were very good for experience because when we go back to Perth we could help around the home.

... On the last night of the hike it poured down, we had a stream running through our tent. My sleeping bag only *just* survived.

During the canoe trip I felt frightened and insecure; during it I felt exhilarated and excited. After, I felt proud that I had done my best.

... It was simply a matter of finding your way through your inner fear and taking the plunge!

## PILBARA EXPEDITION

The purpose of the Expedition to Carawine Gorge in the East Pilbara centred on field studies in Biology and Geography and on Art and survival activities. All of these pursuits provided an extension of their classwork for thirty six Year 11 and Year 12 students from Methodist Ladies' College and Christ Church Grammar School. Information collected through the various field studies and activities was then collated and published. The Expedition also involved the cooperation and social interactions necessary when living in a camp situation with fifty other people. And, as an extra we got to see the 1700km of Western Australia from Telfer to Perth.

After hectic preparations in the final weeks of Second Term, the convoy of five vehicles and trailers departed Christ Church at 6.30am, 2nd July. The first day involved covering 750km to Meekatharra with a great sense of anticipation and non-stop conversation. We refuelled at Wubin on the edge of the wheatbelt and lunch was taken in the mulga beyond Wubin — our first taste of outback living. After another refuelling stop at Mt Magnet and restocking of essential junk food, we arrived at a fairly late hour at Meekatharra. Excellent accommodation and facilities were enjoyed at Meekatharra High School with a communal "sleep in" in the School Library.

The stunning impact of bright lights started the day at 5 a.m., followed by breakfast and departure from Meekathara by 6.30 a.m. We witnessed an excellent sunrise on the road and at Capricornia took on more fuel and junk food. Mt. Newman Mining provided us



with an informative and spectacular tour of the Mt. Whaleback open cut iron-ore mine, enormous in every dimension, including the pay. With a salary of \$40,000-\$50,000 to drive a Haulpak and with board at \$78 per month, who needs to pass T.E.E.? On then to Marble Bar over a dirt road and through a carpet of bull dust, with fifth gear running out on the Christ Church bus just as we arrived at the "hottest spot" in Australia.

Having enjoyed the sights and sounds of Marble Bar, and with mechanical repairs expertly executed by Mr Jensen, the convoy departed for a tour of the Bamboo Creek Gold Mine where we also had lunch. The final leg of the journey to Carawine was then made and camp established.





Carawine Gorge is on the Oakover River — a tributary of the De Grey. The gorge is spectacular with an 80 metre bluff, a wide shingle beach and a permanent waterhole 100 metres wide and 2 km long — an ideal setting for our seven day stay.

The biologists started early each day to check animal traps. Specimens were later classified and then set free. Geography studies included weather recording, map making using plane tables, cross-section construction, bushwalks and cave exploration. Survival proved popular with interesting information being supplied about plants, animals and folklore by Micky Dans and his assistant, Tony Kelly. Mr Nowak did experiments in collecting fresh water using solar stills in the arid environment. The biologists also constructed a raft using tyre tubes and planks so that samples and measurements of the Carawine Gorge could be obtained. Artists sketched and painted their impressions of the spectacular Pilbara landscape and collected local ochre which was ground and used as colouring. A video of these activities and other aspects of camp living was made by Mrs Leather of M.L.C. Communications were in the excellent hands of Sue Challinor. Scheduled radio contact was made with Perth using High Frequency radio and the Royal Flying Doctor network. While in transit the convoy was in constant radio contact which proved very useful for co-ordinating lunch stops, refuelling, keeping a running commentary on the flora, fauna and landforms of the environment and generally keeping the group together.

The evenings were a time of feasting on the Carawine menus which included such delights as sweet and sour chicken, roast beef and vegetables, and biltong stew. Desserts and supper followed along with various forms of organised and spontaneous entertainment around the campfire. This was the time when the Holloway-Richards Duo, alias the Biltong Twins, made their regular appearance with songs such as Bill Tong Blues, Terry MacGill, King Bee, Haulpacking Mama and many more.

1500kg of food was transported on to the camp site, including a mountain of multigrain loaves, 40 dozen eggs, 200 litres of milk, 48 chickens and 10kg of rolled roast, all of which was consumed apart from a few remnants of the popular multigrain. All this stood for \$6 per head per day! Cooking and cleaning were organised on a roster basis. The Oakover River provided our water, supplemented by fresh, "real water from a tap" from Telfer. Telfer, 160km due east in the Great Sandy desert provided a base at which frozen and perishable foods were stored and so a re-stocking trip of 320km was planned to coincide with a tour of the vast Telfer open cut gold mine, where the relatively small coaster buses had to share roads with 75 tonne Haulpaks. Another day trip was made to Shull Springs on the Davis River about 40km south of Carawine Gorge. Here we enjoyed the beauty of the thermal springs - a warm 30°C compared with a chilly 20°C at Carawine. The expedition visited the abandoned manganese mine at Woodie Woodie where natural ochre was collected.



Saturday, 11th July, was our last day at Carawine. Most of the packing had been done for an early departure the next morning so everyone slept under the moonlit sky to save time in the morning. Fortunately, it was a warm and still night.

At 6 a.m. a rather reluctant group departed after a memorable stay at Carawine gorge and headed for Meekatharra via Nullagine. The river crossing at the Oakover River provided plenty of excitement with both buses getting bogged and trailers and vehicles having to be towed using the 4WD's. The dirt road to Nullagine had several stretches of deep bull dust which meant another bogged bus and another tow. On arriving at Nullagine the store was soon crowded with fifty ravenous travellers providing a turnover of \$400 in almost as many seconds. More food and fuel



were taken on board at Capricornia Roadhouse before reaching Meekatharra. The High School was again used for an overnight stay and scrub up before returning to civilisation.

Our final day started with another brilliant sunrise and the day was uneventful apart from a slight brush with a Haulpak near New Norcia. Our arrival at Christ Church was exactly on time at 6.30 p.m.

The Pilbara Expedition was a great success and thanks must go to the various members of staff for their work and enthusiasam and to the students, who were pleasant and co-operative and responded well to anything asked of them.

The effort can be attributed to an improving House spirit, and measures of aggression rarely seen at the House Carnivals, which were probably highly illegal.

The Chess and Debating teams weighed in strongly with a second in the Chess, and a second in the Senior Debating. Special mention should go to Daniel Caddy who participated successfully in both activities.

The Cross Country was an example of rats deserting a capable ship, thus causing it to sink. We had our high achievers such as Julian Butler, Adam Collins, the Robo twins, Peter Broun, David Hansen and Andrew Scolaro, but once again poor involvement let us down. Our result was irreparably damaged by a sudden inflow of Doctors' notes, ingrown toenails, colds, coughs, the 'ahem' bug, dishpan hands (etc.). Despite the efforts of "Dr. Watkins" to convince people they were fit to run we finished fifth, largely due to the new scoring system that penalised Houses for those who did not run. If everyone had put in Peter's effort, (minus the collapsing), we would have done superbly well. Our victory was due to the fact that, for the first time in the year, the better performances were supported and improved by the efforts of everyone in the House. Special mention must go to the performances of Chris Lawrence, Tim Cross, Andrew Scolaro, and Jeremy "Dexal" Keating who, although discovering that there's "nothing funny about a funny tummy", continued in spite of his illness to perform well.

I'd like to thank the whole House for their efforts over the year, especially in the Athletics, and I hope our success in that event will encourage more participation and involvement next year. I'd also like to thank the House officials, Andrew Spafford, Peter Broun, Adam Collins and Phil Sparrow for their assistance and to thank the House tutors and Mr. Watkins for their continued support. Finally I'd like to wish the House the best of luck next year in its attempt to markedly improve on this year's results and I encourage everyone to get involved in every way possible.

The Recorder Ensemble has performed both in chapel and on Open Day and has continued to make rapid improvement.


