


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HEADMASTER'S REPORT

Presented on Speech Night, 5 December 1997

Your Grace, Guest of Honour The Hon Colin Barnett, Minister for Education, Chairman of Council, Distinguished Guests, staff, parents, friends and boys.

In an autobiography called *Holding the Man* Timothy Conigrave writes about his school days at Xavier College, Melbourne. I am sure that many here tonight can relate to his descriptions of hot, broken asphalt quadrangles, and peppercorn-tree hiding places for the secret society of smokers. At Kerang Primary School in Victoria's Mallee I, too, tried to be more sophisticated than was right and proper for my age. Like Conigrave I filled a paper tube with lawn clippings and nearly set my lungs on fire as I drew back the burning grass.

Amongst other things Conigrave describes Friday afternoons. They sound much the same as mine, whether at Kerang Primary, Warrnambool High School, or later when I was packed off to board in the provincial city of Geelong.

Friday afternoons were a bludge. Mr Steed the science teacher would show us documentaries - about Campbell's attempt at the land-speed record in his futuristic Bluebird, or the development of the Merino by CSIRO. It was a strategy to stop us sleeping our way through the last period of the week, but it gave us a chance to play up as the excitement of the weekend loomed.

The assembly hall was a fibro hut, painted pale green like a public toilet. The carpet was a splotchy synthetic red. It resembled pizza and smelt like pizza. Black curtains were drawn across windows that were wide open. The roof was corrugated iron and even in winter the heat could be smothering. On this summer day the room was an oven filled with boys basting in their own juices.

I could make out the short figure of Mr Steed fumbling at the projector. We sat totally still until he squatted down beside the machine, and then the room became a snowstorm of paper balls and planes. Mr Steed stood up and the storm abruptly stopped.

The projector threw a white square of light onto the screen, which immediately came alive with rabbits, dogs, thumbs-up, and peace signs. Someone did the VO-5 symbol from the television ad. The rabbit became a two-finger salute.

Things didn't get any better. When the projector jumped into life the title read *The Prickly Menace* ... it was something about a cactus getting out of hand somewhere and the moth that was helping to get it under control. Mr Steed went to sleep, the boys talked, and the heat rose.

Depending on your point of view you can label that muggy filmshow a riot or you can celebrate the triumph of the human spirit over boredom.

I subscribe to the latter view, mainly because I have a very short attention span. That is why I am a Headmaster. What other job has such rapidly changing demands? I am perfectly suited to changing tack every two minutes; indeed rather look forward to it.

Teachers here are much the same. They are full of ideas, and they have a restless kind of energy. They keep thinking of new things to do, over and above their fundamental teaching, coaching and pastoral responsibilities. They keep trying to improve the place and its programmes.

That is why so much happens. We do our best to counter your sons' natural inclination to rebel against boredom by planning, writing, programming, teaching, coaching, listening, disagreeing, encouraging and generally making it impossible for each boy to draw breath. No long, hot Friday afternoons watching *The Prickly Menace*.

Challenges

1997 has been quite a year. Philip Roff, amongst others, warns against a school's council and staff taking on too many major projects in any one year, whether a significant or complex building, or strategic planning, or industrial relations reform, or ambitious fundraising, or organisational restructuring, or involvement in the wider world of curricular reform ...

In spite of Roff's warning we have embarked upon not one but several major projects over and above our shared core responsibilities and programmes.

Our ground-breaking Non-Teaching Staff Enterprise Bargaining Agreement has led through extensive consultation to the development of an innovative work practices review process. The Foundation Board and staff have launched a major fund-raising campaign, the best start in life, and, just this afternoon, received a gift taking the grand total beyond the \$1,000,000 mark! This milestone gives us the confidence to keep purposefully working on our exciting Master Plan.

A good number of staff have been deeply involved in another huge project, State-wide curriculum development, And we implemented our review of pastoral care for boarders, enhanced staffing and programmes, and completed the major part of our Boarding Houses Redevelopment Project.

We have been busy, but we have managed. For that I thank members of Council for unstinting support, wise guidance and hugely energetic and time-consuming involvement at Council and sub-committee level. And I thank all members of staff, whether teaching or non-teaching, all of whom are wedded to the same essential educational goals and all of whom play critical parts in this complex enterprise.

Planning

I am also thankful for the Christ Church tradition of strategic planning. Some members of the audience will know of Sydney Smith, English clergyman, writer and cynic, whose life spanned the late 18th and early 19th centuries. He dropped such pearls of wisdom as "I never read a book before I review it, it

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prejudices a man so". I hope, Archbishop, he read his bible before spouting about it. He also coined the saying "minorities are always right". Not a good thing to quote in the company of a Government Minister. Sorry, Mr Barnett. Less controversially, he proclaimed "what a pity it is that we have no amusements in England but vice and religion".

On the topic of planning, Sydney Smith believed it best to "take short views, hope for the best and trust in God".

We don't do it like that. We agree with futurist Peter Ellyard and New South Wales Director General of Education Ken Boston that "if we fail to create our own future we will have one thrust upon us". We don't treat strategic plans as tablets of stone, but we do take the trouble to decide upon a preferred future and define steps that might get us there.

That is why four years ago we made plans based on what we would like Christ Church to be ten years hence. That is why next year, halfway through that decade, School Council will initiate a review of our goals, plans and implementation steps.

In just four years myriad changes in our educational world mean that we are already engaged in projects undreamt of during our Strategic Planning workshops in 1993. Much that we planned has currency, but much requires review.

Implementing plans is not always a smooth process. We like to think that we can run our own show in response to change. But some external influences impact upon the autonomy, the independence, with which we translate goals into programmes, particularly in planning curriculum. Sometimes that impact is productive, sometimes it is not.

The Literacy 'Crisis'

Recent beat-ups of a so-called literacy crisis are symptomatic of the former. Dr David Kemp, Federal Minister for Schools, now Minister for Education, Employment and Training, has managed to alienate teachers and parents Australia-wide by aggressively manipulating literacy survey statistics in the context of subjective benchmarks. He needs to learn that Ministers for Education should support their people, not cut them off at the knees. He should applaud the track record of the vast majority of teachers, in every type of

school, who give considerable energy and expertise to the task of helping their pupils become literate. They are well aware of the challenges, and are doing a great deal about them. Indeed, some would argue that they are addressing them more effectively than did past generations.

Research lends support to the latter view. To paraphrase freely from significant recent studies: literacy problems are greatest amongst those who have less than six years schooling and those who are over sixty; health, background, school absence or attitudes to school are the reasons for low levels of literacy given by almost all individuals with literacy problems; about ten per cent of pupils are operating below expected levels, not thirty per cent as Kemp avers; and there is an upward trend in results which, although slight, hardly denotes a "crisis". In other words, schools make a difference. The longer you stay at school the more literate you are likely to be, and underprivileged students fare the worst.

Commentators like Sawyer² point out that it is interesting that the older generation have the biggest problem. These were the people at school during the "golden age" of literacy.

Perhaps we should take a ride in a time machine, drop in on some golden ages ...

and seek comment. " ... teaching of English in the present day schools produces a very limited command of the English language" (Submission to the UK Newbolt Enquiry, 1921).

"The average English schoolboy cannot write English. The boys who enter our public schools inarticulate, often leave them inarticulate." (Dr P J Hartog, Registrar, University of London, 1928).

"From all studies ... we hear complaints of the average Harvard graduate unable to write either correctly or fluidly..." (President, Harvard University, 1946).

"According to many of our witnesses, written English has suffered rapid deterioration in recent years and now falls below the standard required by university, employer and society in general ..." (Extract from Wyndham Report, NSW, 1957).

I congratulate our own Western Australian Minister for Education for standing up to Dr Kemp and for working so closely and effectively with all who give heart and soul to their work with that most precious commodity, our young people.

The Race 'Debate' and Reconciliation

Another external influence is the relatively recent, indeed unexpected, race debate. We thought we were past all that. However, two things were notable when earlier this year I spent a fortnight visiting parents and Old Boys in Hong Kong, Bangkok, Kuala Lumpur, Singapore, Brunei and Jakarta.

First, I found great positivity. Perth boarding schools are well respected in South-East Asia. They are in demand because parents want their children to get to know and understand young Australians; in other words, to have an Australian, not an ethnically cloistered, boarding experience.

On the other side of the coin, it was plain that Pauline Hanson, MP, has done a great deal of damage. The topic of "that politician" and Australian racism arose early during most conversations. Thoughtful parents and alumni did not necessarily take Ms Hanson seriously. They made it plain to me that they have their own race relations problems. And they know their Australian friends well enough to recognise that Ms Hanson's views are extreme. But they did feel that our Federal political leaders said too little too late and they did consider our press to have irresponsibly "beaten up" the issue. They were worried that people who did not know Australians would judge the country harshly.

There was a great deal of comment on the issue in larger metropolitan newspapers in South-East Asia. This is of concern to all working in an Australian Anglican school.

Nonetheless, in matters of race relations we have come a long way since 1916 when Mr John Kickett wrote to the Minister for Education claiming the right of his children to be admitted to the State School at Quairading.

My Children have not Been to School yet. I have a two room hessian Place Put up. I am living apart from my fellow members am mile away from this town. The Director of Education refused.

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 11th September addressed to the Hon. Minister of Education. Permission cannot be given for your children to attend the Quairading School, but I understand that you can, if you choose, send them to the Carrolup Native Settlement for the sum of 4s. each per week. There the children would be properly fed, clothed, educated, and generally cared for. There is, moreover, a native school at Beverly - 30 miles from Quairading - at which your children could attend.

I have the honour to be, Sir, Your obedient servant, DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION.

One of these two letters is not as elegantly written as the other. But the important question is ... which is most dignified?

At any rate, as mentioned earlier, we have come a long way since then. Now we invest as much energy in the education of aboriginal children as in that of any other child. The State Department, the Catholic Education Office and independent schools try hard to listen and, without being patronising, be of some use. There is an emerging sense of partnership, of equality.

However, when it comes to true reconciliation we keep forgetting that actions like the Kickett family refusal

letter are recent history. They still hurt. They oblige us to be properly generous of spirit rather than strictly legalistic when we consider questions of rights, whether to the use of land or anything else. For schools, they challenge us to plan curricula that help all young people to understand others, and they remind us to treat our pupils in ways that give them an abiding sense of the dignity of all people, whatever their differences.

The 'Problem' of Boys

A third external influence is the media frenzy about disreputable youth. We keep being told that young people are problems. Boys, in particular, are problems. We do not actually think so, but I guess it is fair to say that there are times when we can see why others do. Columnist Jane Fraser gets to the nub of the matter. It is all about communication.

I am not too sure exactly what it is about school that affects young boys in such an extraordinary manner, for judging by the evidence, which is not exactly thin on the ground when they return home from school, a hugely good time has been had by one and all. Of course, all evidence that they have not endured the most extreme hardships is circumstantial and hearsay because any two-way conversation between a mother and a schoolboy is largely unsatisfactory; regarded by her as distressingly monosyllabic on his part and by him as unnecessary and irksome maternal prying. She will ask him, in a bright, mother-bonding sort of voice, how was school, and he, kicking sand, and in a voice suggesting it was anything but, says: good.

She goes on:

Because a mother is a permanent and terminal optimist, she imagines, fleetingly, that if school was good it must be because her son, the fruit of her womb and the light of her life, has enjoyed a day of academic triumph, or been chosen to sing a solo at the Entertainment Centre the next time the Pope visits. Sadly, this is almost never the case. Good, at best, in the context of an average day at school, means disaster has been avoided, albeit narrowly....

The next thing a mother would like to know is what her son did all day at school. Jane Fraser hits the nail on the head:

> He will tell her he did nothing. This is possibly one of the most annoying rejoinders in the history of man and if a boy is allowed to get away with this it is more than likely that he will develop into the sort of man who, when his deeply devoted wife, who has spent the entire morning primping and the entire afternoon getting dressed and who, needing confirmation that she bears a striking resemblance to the younger Audrey Hepburn or Madonna, only with better dress sense, turns to her husband and asks him how she looks, says: fine.

We are used to this sort of communication. So what do we do about it? In short, we look for the nuances in each monosyllabic response. There are infinite variations of meanings in the words "good" and "nothing". And we look each boy in the eye, past the hair sticking out at all angles. Sometimes, believe it or not, we judge it best to ignore the shirt hanging out. We let our boys know that we value what they have to say, even if it is blunt, or a little inarticulate. We happen to know that there is a world of thoughtfulness and expressiveness just beneath the surface.

Furthermore, we pitch our instructions to different age groups in appropriate ways.

For example, not long ago I saw Canon Sheehan acting Pied Piper to an RE class of Grade Threes. He was in a bit of a hurry to get them into a classroom so he simply said; "Last one in is a heretic!".

They did not have a clue what heretic meant, but it sounded bad, so they rushed to the front.

With older boys we would use the same instruction if we wanted them to *stop* rushing into a room. Adolescents, too, probably do not know what a heretic is, but, like the Grade Threes, they think it sounds bad, and is therefore desirable, so they will not be able to resist moving to the back of the line ...

I am being unfair. The boys with whom we work give much to each other and to the School, in remarkably positive ways. This year's leavers are symptomatic. They have done much to make 1997 a great year. They have made it a happy place for most of the younger boys - particularly through warm leadership in Houses. They have been creative: the School has hummed with ideas. They have been thoughtful; raising and debating ideas about making Christ Church a better place.

They have had great spirit, and have displayed good humour in hard times. They have valued differences - they are young men with a fine sense of the dignity of people of different races, backgrounds, capacities and interests. There have been mistakes, but not from boys being hurtful on purpose. For example, one day I heard that a boy's tooth had been damaged. I checked the Medical Report.

How did it happen? In Matron's efficient scrawl I read:

Playing didgeridoo with S. Wray's help when latter dropped it knocking Trent's tooth.

But things were not out of control. Witnesses cited included not just S. Wray but also Canon Sheehan. Nonetheless, I admit I wondered why the injured lad was playing a didgeridoo in RE!

Another medical report hinted at our boys' commitment to sports training right up to the moment they go to bed. A young boarder came to Matron with "a painful loin area". How did it occur? "X was hit with a hockey stick whilst preparing to go to bed."

And our boys have a wonderful sense of justice. On 27 October a Year Nine boy reported with a bruised eye. Jane Fraser would have been proud of the boy's first response. "What happened?" "Nothing."

In fact there was a heroic tale to tell. The report reads:

A accidentally bumped B who then slapped A hard on chest and the latter then punched B. B then punched A in the eye.

Escalation, I think it is called. All about fair play and justice.

So what is the fuss about boys being problems?

At any rate, as I said earlier, teachers put a great deal of energy into countering your sons' natural inclination to rebel against boredom. Mr Peter Stansbury's Solar Car Challenge workshop on Fridays and Sundays is a case in point. Day after day the enthusiasts analysed lux meter readings and refined pit changes on a wonderful track donated by parent Mr John Hughes. That led to State, then National victory, in spite of perverse weather. And to me, the best thing about it was the alacrity with which the boys kept coming in to School! When they could have been watching replays of Bart Simpson or Conan the Barbarian.

I could go on, describing great work done by staff and boys preparing for the Business Studies tour to Brunei and Indonesia, the Education Support Unit tour to Queensland, or the community service oriented tour to our friend Saibo Mabo's island in the Torres Straits. I

could elaborate upon the exciting music, or the work done by our Information Technology staff team, and the many boys in the big Web Site teams, both Preparatory and Senior School, whose work was judged third best in Australia in each category. I could list our Slazenger Cup-winning tennis players, representing Western Australia nationally, like our sailors do year by year, and so many boys do in Maths, Chemistry and Physics Olympiad teams. But these kinds of things are listed and honoured elsewhere, in Chronicle, in Newsletters, at Assemblies, in the Year Twelve Yearbook, in the Staff Professional Development magazine Pabulum, in the annual Mitre.

More importantly, now is the time to pay tribute, to say thank you, to the many, many people who make this place hum.

I thank all those staff members who give in myriad unsung ways; in classes, on sports fields, at Kooringal, night after night coaching debaters or Mock Trial teams, virtually living at the School as members of an utterly committed and very effective Executive, sharing challenges in wind and rain on Venture, giving time one on one with a boy in trouble, or like Mr Mike Hirsch, new Director of Cricket, quietly and effectively changing a school yard culture from bog ball to the game of gentlemen.

A number of members of Staff leave at the end of 1997: Mrs Jacqui Amundsen, who joined us on a one-month temporary contract and stayed several years, valued as exemplary teacher of Biology by staff and students alike, and whom we will do our best to tempt back from time to time; Mrs Leonie Maley, so effectively helping us out in the Mathematics Department since Term Three; Ms Gabrielle Fairclough, Midnite Youth Theatre Company member from way back, dramatist extraordinaire, and great director - I have never seen such tightness of direction in a junior play as in The Chicken Run - leaving us to tread the boards in England; Miss Julianne McCabe, so capable as temporary teacher of Japanese and so much else besides ... we wish her well in her full-time position at Frederick Irwin Anglican Community School; Mr Nick Pelling, our Charterhouse exchange teacher, and proper historian to boot ... we have enjoyed Nick's company and wish him well as he returns to the UK to run a Department;

Ms Rebecca Barber and Mr Tom Stow, our Kooringal Interns, Bec who broke her Melbourne University law studies to give a year to our programme, and who returns to the books in 1998, and Tom who is off to study outdoor education in 1998, both of whom gave much, with great good cheer; and Mrs Judith Mackie, for twenty-one and a half years a Housemother for our boarders, much loved by all, and leaving wonderful collections of framed memorabilia as well as donating, with Mrs Cheryl Freap, a wall clock for the foyer of the new Walters House. Judith is a legend in our boarding community. We will miss her, but have no doubts about the fact that she will return to keep us on the straight and narrow.

Others leave for short periods. Mr Dean Moore, to pursue a year of study, and Mr Peter Turkich, extending well-deserved long service leave so that he can gain experience beyond Christ Church walls. We wish them well.

Finally, I congratulate Ms Sharyn Bana on her appointment to the position of Head of Biology and I thank staff members who have so capably taken on a number of temporary posts or Acting positions of responsibility during 1997: Dr Romeo Charles, warm and effective Acting Head of Jupp; Mr Mark Morrissy, energetic and innovative Acting Head of Biology for some years, on top of his Headship of Moyes House; Mr Bob Peterson, Acting Senior Master, a big brief superbly addressed; Ms Eril-Jane Reid, Acting Head of Social Science for a second time, during a year when she took on the added challenge of being Supervising Examiner of TEE Politics and Law, a new course into which she invested so much energy and expertise during its developmental years; Ms Rosemary Cawley, capable and effective Acting Head of Geography; Mrs Alicia Gorey, within weeks a muchloved member of the Education Support Unit team; and Mrs Christy Barker, returning to the teaching of Biology at Claremont after a three-year stint as Assistant Director of Kooringal.

I thank our supporters, Friends of the Library and Archives, the Don Fraser Club, the Parents' Association, the Auxiliary, the Old Boys' Association, the Skills Development Trust, the Resource Register workers, Dance Committees, the Year 13 Club, ... to list a few. Not only do they help us to run innovative programmes, but they provide that most important element in the School family ... fellowship.

I thank School Council, the members of whom are ultimately responsible for the whole show. Apart from giving time and advice whenever we ask, at last count the number of meetings that all or many Council Members attended this year is forty-seven: monthly Council meetings plus Education Committee, Building and Grounds, Finance, Foundation Board, Superannuation, and Audit; not including fortnightly 7.00 am Master Plan Workin rty meetings for some, and a multitude of special purpose sessions for such things as Council selfeducation or Budget preparation. We are in their debt.

In particular, we are in the debt of two who retire from Council this year; Mr Denis Culley, Old Boy nominee since May 1986, and warm, thoughtful contributor, always supporting what staff think is important, never seeking the limelight but unstintingly providing well-tempered wisdom; and Mr John Saleeba, also an Old Boys' Association nominee, Councillor since 1977 and Chair from 1988 to 1996 - whom I thanked when he stepped down from the Chair last year and whom will not thank me for commenting again ... but I will, as we are in his debt more than any one person can say.

And now, a special thank you; to all who have helped realise our dream to do something substantial for our boarders, the boys who live here, who are at the heart of the School. I say that

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with feeling, as someone who with my four brothers boarded at school long ago, and who has been a boarding Housemaster, and run a totally boarding campus in a coeducational school in another State, and who has sent his children away to board.

Boarders add much to the character of a school. We have tried to say something about that in the commemorative booklet, prepared so well by Archivist and Assistant to the Head, Mrs Wendy Hillman, who also wrote the lively and informative history of boarding therein.

Walters is ready to be opened; and McClemans is ready for refurbishment. Thank you, Council and staff members of the planning committees listed in the booklet. Thank you, too, architects Hobbs Winning Australia and builders Cooper & Oxley; in particular two men who, metaphorically speaking, have lived at Christ Church for months now, the unflustered supervising architect Phil Skeels and that calm genial giant, site supervisor Graham Herrmann.

As for the landscaping: thoughtfully designed by TRACT (WA), then planted at incredible speed by Mr Dixie Joy's Grounds team. And what a team! At the drop of a hat they moved mountains and full-sized trees. Led by the unflappable Dixie who when I query the size or vigour of some plantings simply says: "Don't worry. Just wait a few months and you'll be laughing."

A little later this evening, just before the final blessing, the Archbishop will dedicate our new boarding house and

the Minister for Education will officially open it.

After that we can all troop up the front steps and explore it.

So much has been done this year because it has been a year of generosity of spirit.

At the Preparatory School this morning I told a story about that. I would like to repeat it now. It has particular relevance for the boys who are leaving the School.

A poor Scottish farmer was out walking one day when he heard a cry for help coming from the nearby swamp. He ran to assist and found a boy stuck almost to the waist in the black mud. Extending a pole the farmer pulled the boy out.

The next day a handsome team and carriage came up to the Scotsman's hut and an elegantly dressed gentleman stepped out. He offered a reward to the Scotsman, who refused it. Just then the farmer's young son came to the door.

Seeing him, the Nobleman made the Scotsman an offer: "Let me take your son and give him a good education. If the lad is anything like his father, he'll grow into a man you can be proud of."

The Scotsman liked this and shook hands on the bargain.

In time the poor Scottish farmer's son graduated from a teaching hospital in London. He later became Sir Alexander Fleming, the famous discoverer of penicillin.

Years later the Nobleman's son was stricken with pneumonia. He nearly died, but was saved through the use of penicillin.

The Nobleman whose son was pulled from the swamp many years earlier was Lord Randolf Churchill. His son was called Winston.

To our Year Twelve Leavers, indeed to all the boys here, I think the point is clear. All best wishes, leavers. Thank you, Captain of School Ben O'Brien, Prefects, and all of the Seniors who made 1997 hum.

To everyone, my warmest wishes for a happy and holy Christmas.

Master Plan

One outcome of the widely consultative strategic planning process in 1994 was a review of the School's physical facilities. In order to offer the best possible teaching and learning environment for present and future generations of Christ Church boys, a Master Plan has been prepared. It is arranged in three stages.

Stage One

The first stage consists of the highest priority projects.

Redevelopment of Boarding Facilities Walters House

Christ Church has been a boarding school since its foundation. Boys from the country and overseas have lived, worked, played and made friends at the School since 1910.

School Council is committed not only to continuing to offer boarding but also to ensuring that the experience is based on best practice. After careful, consultative planning and as an act of faith in the future of boarding at Christ Church, the School began to make substantial improvements to the boarding houses at the start of 1997. At the same time a review of pastoral care led to the reorganisation of our boarding houses and an increase in the number of families living with our boys, helping them to feel at home.

The major building project is the redevelopment of Walters House, completed in December, 1997.

Retaining the splendid original, twostorey limestone residence at the heart of the precinct, the design offers an improved sense of community and homeliness through the provision of spacious and well-defined living, sleeping, study and recreation areas linked by a generous foyer and House meeting place. The orientation to the river provides an attractive and expansive outdoor recreational area.

Residential accommodation has been expanded, providing for the families of the Head of House, Assistant Head of House and Housemother. Resident Tutors are accommodated in an apartment with private quarters and shared living rooms.

McClemans House

McClemans and Parry Houses will be linked and refurbished in 1998 to complete improvements to the boarding houses.

Library Resource Centre

To keep pace with changes inspired by the information technology revolution the Senior School Library will be redeveloped into a state-of-the-art Library Resource Centre to cater for student-centred learning. Planning is under way. Building is scheduled to commence as soon as is feasible after the completion of boarding redevelopments.

The design of the Library Resource Centre will be future-oriented, flexible and geared to collaborative, enquirybased learning. Services will include gateways to Internet resources, the provision of full text and image databases and document supply. There will be group meeting places, individual work spaces with data points and comfortable reading areas as well as generous display areas and a resource collection for academic staff.

Staff will train students to deal with the increasing complexities of global information access and retrieval. We are determined to empower our boys to take full advantage of an information-rich world in which, as life-long learners, they must know how to ask the right questions, research effectively, discriminate sensibly, argue their cases clearly and communicate with precision, elegance and force.

Pre-Primary Centre

In keeping with educational developments in Western Australia the School Council is committed to providing Pre-Primary facilities before the end of 1999.

Christ Church takes a holistic approach to nurturing young boys as they work and play together. The Pre-Primary Centre will be an integral part of an Early Learning Centre for boys aged five to seven. Their social, physical, creative and emotional development will be warmly and thoughtfully encouraged and monitored. Each boy will be able to proceed at his own pace. Depending on his learning needs he will spend two to three years in what might be called the "seamless robe" of our Pre-Primary, Year One and Year Two educational programmes.

The Pre-Primary Centre will play a key role in the exciting Early Learning Centre programme.

Medical Centre

The warm, welcoming and efficient Medical Centre serves both day boys and boarders. To ensure continued quality health care it requires refurbishment. Plans are already in place to provide a lift for injured people.

Sporting facilities and landscaping

The relocation of cricket practice wickets to the north of the grounds and the construction of a landscaped wall on the Stirling Highway boundary will improve the appearance and amenity of the Senior School oval. Physical Education classes will not be disrupted by traffic, the main oval will be in a pleasantly cloistered setting and an expansion of boundaries will allow us to use the Claremont grounds for Middle School as well as Preparatory School matches.

Stage Two

Multi-Purpose Sports Centre
An outdoor multi-purpose sports and physical education centre will be developed on the site of the top oval. It will be built over an underground parking area. The carpark will act as a Master Plan 'circuit breaker'. The space taken up by the many existing carparks

on our cramped campus will become available to be used in imaginative and necessary ways, for cost-effective extensions to existing buildings and for much-needed grassed areas and gardens.

Performing Arts Centre

At the gateway to the School, the Performing Arts Centre will provide flexible teaching, performance and rehearsal spaces for Drama and Music.

The Central Court

A central campus precinct will be created by the demolition of the old Music School and ancillary buildings. It will be landscaped to provide quiet areas for informal gatherings, discussion and reflection and games areas for our boarders and Preparatory School boys.



Stage Three

Sports Hall

Our gymnasium is a fine building, but cannot adequately cater for the physical education and sporting needs of over a thousand students, nor of those members of the wider School family who use its facilities. The building is to be doubled in size by the addition of a

Sports Hall on the site currently occupied by outdoor basketball courts.

Multi-Purpose Classroom Block for Mathematics and Languages


There is an urgent need to replace the recently refurbished but old classrooms known as S Block.

The Master Plan is both practical and

visionary. Each element makes particular educational sense when viewed as part of the total plan.


However, like all Master Plans, it is not a tablet of stone.

The Lord Bishop, Mr Barnett, Chairman and Members of Council, Mr Madin, staff, parents, friends and students.

I speak to you tonight having recently completed the Tertiary Entrance Examinations, as most of the Year Twelves seated here have done, and, after fulfilling my last commitments to study, I have had the long awaited opportunity to 'go hard', as it is known. During this period of celebration, and on contemplation of what I would say in this forum tonight, there has been much reflection on what Christ Church means to me, to us all, and on what I have learnt here over the past five years.

First and foremost, the thing which I will take from Christ Church will be friendships. I have, just as all others at Christ Church, made many, many friends by attending this school: people to talk to, people to 'goof around' with on weekends, people to sit next to in class, people without whom one's stay at Christ Church would have been very hard indeed. I can recall a time at this school when I did not know many people; I essentially had no friends. This was my first day as a Year Eight student, and I spent it wandering through the corridors alone, returning to my locker every ten minutes to make it look as if I actually did have something to do. But this did not last for long. I made a friend on the first day of school here, in the last period of class for the day, and to this day he is still one of my closest friends. Over the years new friends emerge, old friends move on and, overall, it seems

that gradually everyone becomes a friend in some way. Such is the community spirit of this school.

The second thing we will all take from Christ Church will be an education to aid us in later life. For most of us, this education culminated in mid-November this year with the TEE, from which we will, hopefully, gain entrance to universities and colleges to pursue higher learning. However, the options for a Christ Church graduate are endless. Some of us left early to pursue apprenticeships, others will move interstate for university, and some of us will travel overseas for university or to reunite with family. The education received here has not just come from what we were able to learn from books, it is the life skills that we have developed here over the years which will aid us most. Communication skills, literacy, a sense of responsibility and compassion: all of these have been honed over the years at Christ Church. For these skills we have to thank our teachers, without whom our paths through all walks of Christ Church life would be much harder.

The third thing we will take from Christ Church is a store of great memories - memories which we have accumulated over the years, personal triumphs and tragedies, regrets, happiness and sorrow, are all great assets, and ones which we will no doubt look back upon as grumpy old men and smile. These memories we have gained from the sporting field, from the classroom, from the outdoor

education centre at Kooringal, from our Year Ten Venture, and just from school life in general, are those which will remind us that, yes, our school years were some of the best years of our lives.

The image I hold of Christ Church, and always will, embodies these three characteristics: friendship, education and memories. Over the years here, I have seen considerable change within the school environment. To my recollection, in Year Eight, things appeared to be quite different from what they are now. Back then, school prefects looked like men, school spirit was never lacking, and Christ Church always held its position at the fore in PSA sporting competition. Maybe it was through naive eyes that these things were assumed, for now through the eyes of a Year Twelve, a school leader, this environment has, at times, failed to resemble what I once thought it did. There have been many times this year when Christ Church has been as foreboding a place as any I have known, yet it has not really changed. The sporting successes of years past have somewhat disappeared, to be replaced by successes in the academic side of life. Debating, science and maths competitions, solar car challenges, all areas in which Christ Church has found itself to be a leader, have come to replace the more prominent sporting field glories. As for the school prefects resembling men, well, we may not have ascended to that level yet, but interestingly enough, the Year Eights in our eyes are now a little smaller. School spirit, although waning on occasion, has never disappeared. This year holds fond memories of war cry competitions in the chapel, and prefect skits designed to promote such events as the swimming and athletic carnivals. We may not have recreated past successes this year, but surely we have created new ones by which future years will remember us.

On a final note, I would like to express my thanks to my family, my housemaster, Mr Bayly, my tutor, Mrs Browne, and all of the staff and friends who have supported me this year, as they have supported all of the Year Twelve year group. We thank you. Finally, we must thank the school which has brought us here tonight, Christ Church, for its role in our lives over the past five years. Thank you.

We welcome his youthful exuberance and know, instinctively, he will prove a wonderful addition to the English Department and the School in general.




Tina Kingshott

Gabriel Fairclough


Gabrielle Fairclough has been working with Christ Church Grammar School for the past five years, although it is only this last year that has seen her a member of the staff.

Harold Woodall

Although known to most of the present Christ Church community as the School Registrar, Harold Woodall started his career at CCGS as a mathematics teacher.

He was born in Woodsetten, England in 1927. After moving to Perth he began his schooling at East Claremont State School and then attended Claremont Central State School to Form Three when he gained admission to Perth Modern School for Forms Four and Five. He graduated with distinctions in Mathematics A, Mathematics B and Physics. His tertiary education was completed at UWA where he gained his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1952 and a Diploma of Education in 1959.

Harold Woodall has had a long and interesting career in education. He taught upper primary grades at the Boulder Central State School from 1949 until 1953, before transferring to the Eastern Goldfields High School at the end of 1953. He taught there until 1955 when he resigned to serve in the Anglican Mission Schools in Sarawak, Borneo. From 1956 to 1958 he was Deputy Headmaster and in 1958 became Acting Headmaster of St. Augustine's Anglican Mission School. This was a co-ed primary-secondary school mainly for Dayak children.

He returned to Australia in 1959 as Assistant Housemaster of St. George's House at Guildford Grammar School, where he taught for a year before returning to Borneo. From 1960 to 1965 he taught at St. Thomas's Anglican Mission School, Kuching and returned to Australia in 1966 as Mathematics master at St. Peter's College in Adelaide.

In 1967 he left from Australia once again to become Headmaster at the Nauru Secondary School, Nauru. Here, he was responsible not only for day schooling, but also for organising evening tuition sessions for those who had left the group.

In 1969 he joined Christ Church as a teacher of Mathematics and Head of Craigie House. Ten years later, in 1979, he became involved in school administration and was appointed as the full-time registrar in 1990, a job which he held until retiring at the end of

Term One in 1997.

In his twenty-eight year service at Christ Church, Harold Woodall has made significant contributions as a teacher, Head of House and Registrar. He is regarded with particular affection by very many families of overseas students. He was their first contact with Christ Church and his caring and generous approach was much appreciated. When visiting centres in South East Asia in Term One 1997, with the Headmaster and the Director of the School Foundation, he was warmly farewelled by numerous friends who made a point of seeing him.

on the delicacy. That night we were treated to a banquet of a variety of turtle dishes and other delights. After dinner the island's council chairman told us some amusing anecdotes about Warraber life.

The next day we were unhappy to be leaving the island, but at around eleven o'clock we flew to Bamaga Aboriginal Community. There we met our tour guides, Alan and Darryl. We dropped in at Bamaga High School but, after seeing the size of the students, opted out of a rugby match. Later we were treated to shredded coconut and watched an amazing corroboree put on by the locals as part of the National Aboriginal and Islander Day of Celebration.

Our next stop was Punsand Bay, at the tip of Cape York. The beach was beautiful, however we were disappointed to learn that saltwater crocodiles inhabited the area. We then visited the northernmost point of Australia and the Pajinka resort.

For the next six days our huge 4WD bus drove us down the Cape. On the way some interesting stops were at Twin Falls, where we spent many hours in the waterfalls, jumping off five metre high cliffs into foaming fresh water; Wenlock River, where Miles Menz and Peter Van Bockxmeer caught a Saratoga fish with their hands and Mr O'Sullivan started a very competitive water volleyball game; and Split Rock, where we saw the oldest Aboriginal art in Australia. That night we stayed at an Aboriginal Ceremonial Ground with such luxuries as cold showers. On our way to Cooktown we

stopped off at Black Mountain where Mr Norris had his hair sprayed by competitors of the Botany Bay to Barrier Reef Bash. Once in Cooktown we visited the statue of Captain Cook and toured the souvenir shops. Our destination that night was Home Rule Farm in the middle of the rainforest.

Our final day in the wilderness was spent at a huge waterfall, with extremely cold water. Some boys made the dangerous ascent of the face of the waterfall where an underwater tunnel was discovered.

That night, Mr Norris treated everyone to dinner at the Hog's Breath restaurant. We said goodbye to tropical Cairns at 5am and boarded the plane for the flight back to Perth. We were sorry that the tour was over, but it had been most enjoyable. We had experienced Aboriginal culture, done many exciting things and made new friends. The boys would like to thank Mr O'Sullivan, Mrs Alvarez and Mr and Mrs Norris for organising the tour, and the parents who helped with the fundraising.

Bali Surf Tour

In the second week of the first term holidays Mr Hunn and Mr McGurk led a group of eleven students on the first overseas surf tour ever from CCGS. The crew consisted of Jeremy Dermer, Seon Verios, Luke Nolan-Wyllie, Karsten Volzke, Don Bothwell, Chris Box, Anthony Dermer, Al Smith, Tav Bates, James Pearce and Dane King.

After a three hour flight to Denpassar, Bali's capital, the plane pushed through the clouds and we finally got a view of many of the famous surf breaks. At this moment Mr Hunn was quick to point out that this would also be a good opportunity to experience the many cultural differences that Bali had to offer.

Our first surf was in two to four foot waves breaking on the shore of Legian Beach directly outside our hotel. Everyone enjoyed this even though it was only a small taste of what was to come.

Later that day we met up with our surf guide, Soody, who had previously worked with a large surf company and had a very good knowledge of all the surf spots in Bali. The next two mornings we had six o'clock starts to surf a wave called Canngu. This place was made up of three different peaks consisting of left and right handers with varying shallowness levels. The main peak was controlled by a large Balinese surfer. Not only did he get any wave he chose, but also decided who else was allowed to surf there. This was bad for everyone except Mr Hunn who was lucky enough to make friends with him and caught more waves in half an hour than he probably ever has before.

On the second and third nights Soody took us to eat at some of his favourite restaurants around Denpassar. It was on the third night that Anthony renamed him "Shoddy" as we ate dinner on an outdoor table with homeless, mangy cats eating our scraps.

As the swell had risen to a solid four to five feet, we ventured out to some of the outer reefs of Bali, the next day. The cost of the boat trip there and back was five thousand rupiah which is about \$3 Australian. The boat rides were not the only cheap services in Bali. A three course meal at most restaurants would not cost more than \$10 Australian. Everyone also purchased many goods from the Balinese salesman on the streets for a "special morning price" or "special evening price", depending on the time of day.

On Day Five we surfed a break called Airport Lefts. This wave is a long left hander stretching in front of the airport about eight hundred metres out to sea. It was an enjoyable surf despite the less than perfect conditions, with planes flying about a hundred metres over our heads.

Although the surf so far had been good, most of the tour members were hanging out to surf some more exciting waves. The teachers were convinced by the students to break from the more conservative routine and head straight to Uluwatu. As we had lunch overlooking perfect left hand barrels we knew we were in for the best surf of our trip. Little did we know we were surfing this already shallow water wave on an outgoing tide. The reef over which we paddled to get out was completely exposed on the way back in. This did not stop any of the tour members, other than the too old and too tired Mr Hunn and Mr McGurk, from going out and charging the perfect barrels. The surf was made even more memorable by the cuts and grazes with which most returned home.

The next day we departed up the coast to Balian where the waves were the biggest we surfed on our trip. They broke on a cobblestone bottom and peeled left to right at about double overhead.

Everyone was excited at the thought of surfing Medewi, the famed, longest lefthander in Bali. However, when we arrived the wave was an onshore two footer that broke in sections. It was more of a thrill watching the local boys ripping apart the waves than actually surfing them ourselves.

The second last day began with only half the group waking up for a surf at the famed Bingin, which was not that impressive with two to four foot waves which did not have good shape.

On the final afternoon we all went to Waterbomb Park, the greatest water slide park in Indonesia. The speed slide was the most exciting thing and presented Dane with an opportunity to reinforce his position as group "psycho" by launching huge airs on the end of the dip and nearly missing the slide completely.

Sadly, we had to leave the warm water paradise of Bali and return to Perth. I am sure the relaxed and friendly atmosphere was missed by everyone on the tour, but it was also great to be back home again.

Reunion Student Exchange

Our journey into the unknown began at Perth International Airport as sixty French students from around the state (including Oliver Augustyniak and David Exham from CCGS) with four teachers trundled through emigration at 1am.

The flight was a shocking eight hours long, and we were happy to disembark at Mauritius International Airport. There we changed to a small island-hopper which took us to our final destination. On our approach to Reunion we were all expecting some dirt runway with a little shack at one end as a control tower, but we arrived to see an Air France 747 taxi to the terminal, where many other large planes awaited. With this came the realisation that this was not some God-forsaken French outpost in the Indian Ocean.

Meeting our host families for the first time was the hardest part of our whole trip. It was the anticipation and not knowing who or what to expect that probably made it that way. One by one my companions were plucked from our little group and taken to a new life for a month. When my turn came, my fears were instantly allayed. My host family seemed pleasant and I was to stay in St Leu, which proved to be a nice little town by the sea, at the foot of a huge mountain (the whole island is basically one huge mountain rising out of the ocean). However, I could not take in more than the basic facts as I had been awake for forty hours and desperately needed to sleep.

The next week went by very quickly and I soon got a feel for the lifestyle on the

island. First of all, it is an island of great contrasts. You can be down at the beach at Bucan Canot in the morning, in 28°C sunshine, and then drive into the mountains that afternoon and within two hours find yourself way above the clouds where it is about 15°C with the wind blowing hard.

I soon found that the fact that we could not speak French very well, or understand everything, did not really matter. As long as we were willing to try, then they were willing to be helpful and hospitable. In this way, I made many friends.

There are plenty of things to do on Reunion, and life for young people is much more liberal; teenagers are not so restricted by their parents. You can ride a motorbike by the age of fourteen, get into a nightclub at the age of sixteen (legally); and you can drive when you are sixteen too. On the other hand, their schooling system is more challenging and longer; it is compulsory to learn at least two foreign languages by the age of thirteen.

The island is a tropical paradise. The winter temperature averages about 25°C during the day on the coast and the water is always warmer than it is in WA in summer. The interior is covered by thick forests, and the geographical layout of the island means that not many roads can be built. In some places, the only access is by foot. This means that much has been left unchanged. The scenery in the mountains is really spectacular and waterfalls are a common sight, sometimes up to fifty metres high. The island also has a long history, and as its primary industry is sugar, there are old sugar factories scattered all around the island. Also there are many museums dedicated to how the island developed into the bustling French department it is today.

I had many great experiences in Reunion and I was very unhappy to leave, a sentiment which, I discovered, was shared by most of the Australian students. My host family who had looked after me so well for a whole month had become like a real family to me and as I left I wondered if I would ever see them again. On the flight back to Perth we all shared our experiences and many vowed to return in the years to come.

I would highly recommend this trip for anybody studying French in Years Ten or Eleven, as it was really an experience of a lifetime. My French has improved vastly, it was a great holiday and I learned a lot about myself.


I think the members of staff were even more exhausted than the students when we landed in Perth.


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The House is a pivotal point for a boy's school career. It is the boy's "home base" for five years, and through the House the partnership between home and school is built and sustained.

In turn, each boy's progress and development as a person and as a member of the community is nurtured and monitored in the House.

Much of what goes on in tutorials and through house activities can be collectively understood in terms of the above. However, every tutorial and each house activity has a more specific purpose and a life of its own. Above all else, time spent in the House is intended to be enjoyable.

Houses have been busy in 1997, and individual houses highlight some of their activities on the next few pages. The Beatty Cup Competition pits the houses against each other - this year Romsey, with its new Head of House Mr Roger Bayly, won the cup. It was a close competition, with Hill, last year's winner in second place. At the end of Term One, Hill farewelled Ms Lorraine Day who left to take a Deputy Principal's position in Hobart. Ms Sheryl Gardner has settled in quickly as the Head of Hill House.

The Peer Support Programme continues to be a valuable asset. Each year boys in Year Eleven who have been through the experience as Year Eights, now participate as leaders. Much of the credit for the success of Peer Support goes to the Tutor Co-ordinators in each house. In 1997 the Co-ordinators consulted and revamped both the leadership training and the Year Eight activities programme.

During the year the Home-School partnership was emphasised. Of note were the discussions of issues about the School's policies on bullying and harrassment, and the presentation of boys at school and in public.

The Pastoral Committee reviews matters within its domain each year. This year it initiated two programmes to further identify boys needing assistance and help them devise better management strategies. One of these was particularly targeted at increasing the help available to Year Eight boys in their transition to the secondary school.

A major innovation this year was the introduction of the School Testimonial for each boy who completes Year Twelve. It is written as a mark of esteem for him in recognition of his achievements and contribution to the School community. It is a tangible demonstration that we value each boy as an individual as well as a member of a team.

MEDICAL CENTRE

1997 has been another busy year for the CCGS Medical Centre. This year Christ Church had the distinction of being chosen by the Asthma Foundation as one of the five pilot schools to show the way in asthma management in WA schools. We were involved in the Asthma Friendly Schools Model, with Sister Cahill and four boarding students, Jeffrey Pearse, Campbell Paterson, Ray Deutscher and Shenton French, attending the launch which was extensively covered by the WA media.

Asthma management at CCGS began in response to the number of students presenting with the disease and the recognition of its debilitating effect when badly controlled. A protocol for asthma management, commenced approximately eight years ago, was developed to teach boys how to manage their own asthma through a continuous education and support programme.

The Medical Centre was involved with the Respiratory Unit at P.M.H. in 1994, researching and evaluating peak flow meters and lung function. The Parents' Auxiliary supported this work by very generously donating a spirometer to the Medical Centre. This enabled us to check the peak-flow of boarders twice a day and adjust their medication accordingly.

Our current management of asthma at CCGS reflects a comprehensive programme. The registered nurses in the Medical Centre note whether the boy has a history of asthma. This information is obtained from his entrance medical form. The asthma history is then investigated as to its severity and treatment. This information is noted and is available to teachers. Boys with asthma are also issued with an action plan, which is then completed by their general practitioners and kept with their medical records. Boys have become aware of the need to recognise the early signs of asthma and the necessity of seeking help immediately. Boys not responding to the administration of Ventolin are nebulised and referred on to a doctor or parent. The School has purchased nebulisers that are run off

their own power source to cover the school camps and the Kooringal Outdoor Education Centre. All first aid boxes carry Ventolin.

Asthma week in October was another time of involvement for the nursing staff and boys as the control of this condition at the five pilot schools was on show for the whole State.

The Opening of Walters House

The 5th of December saw the official opening of the redeveloped Walters boarding facility by the Minister for Education, the Hon. Colin Barnett, MLA. Parents, teachers and boys were able to take the opportunity to tour the inside of the buildings after the annual Speech Night. Everyone was enthusiastic in their praise of the finished product.

The buildings which have been replaced had become inadequate and did not provide the modern facilities necessary for the technological age. Fortunately, careful planning meant that the splendid original 1890s two storey limestone residence could be retained, whilst adding many up-to-date features to Walters House. These include the spacious, well-defined living, sleeping and study areas, library and other recreational facilities with many of these overlooking the tranquil Swan River. The new section boasts a handsome frontage that truly accentuates the character of the building. From the outside it is difficult to tell where the old ends and the new begins as a wonderful flow has been achieved. Walters House also includes such features as fiber-optic networking and has ISDN connections to most rooms, enabling high-speed internet access on the world-wide web.

The construction of this building marks the first of many improvements, which will be carried out in the near future, beginning with the refurbishment of the other boarding house, McClemans, and additions to the Preparatory School. The McClemans House redevelopment is expected to be completed by mid-1998 and aims to lighten the well-organised, solid (but somewhat gloomy) accommodation wing with special attention being paid to highlighting the views of the river.

After a year living in cramped quarters with McClemans House, the Walters boys are looking forward to transferring into their new accommodation at the start of the new school year.







To the tutors Ms Cawley, Mr Mailes, Mr McGurk, Ms Bishop, Ms Kaye and Mr Pelling, who have to put up with us every morning - thank you. In conclusion I would like to quote last year's captain, "Our golden era lies just around the corner."





The Year Nine social was extremely successful, gaining a \$200 profit. Casey McCann should be congratulated for attaining a ratio of three girls to one boy on the night and also for organising a most enjoyable event.

Jupp continued with its now traditional sausage sizzle on House Arts Day. The efforts of Hayden Bartrop, who ran the stall with the help of Jason Tee and Nathan Bartrop, assisted in the House gaining a \$600 profit. The \$800 raised by the House was donated to Anglicare who used the money to support the aged in the Housing Advocary Support Service (HASS). Jupp also supported Anglicare in its Christmas Appeal by setting up a collection bin under the stairs in S Block.

Unfortunately, all this work did not assist in gaining points for the House in the race for the Beatty Cup and sadly Jupp finished last this year. The boys tried hard in all activities and if the award was for courage and determination, we would easily have achieved the top spot. However, we simply lacked the talent of the other houses and our efforts were often in vain. The results obtained were not a true reflection of the boys' endeavour. The spirit of the House was epitomised in the senior football competition in which Donald Bothwell attacked 1st XVIII players with tenacious tackling and courageous running. Donald refused to quit even though the odds were stacked against him. The boys received constant encouragement from the tutors, the prefects and Mr Peterson and this gave them the courage they needed to conquer every challenge presented to them.

1997 was the year in which Jupp changed from a house which relied on individuals to succeed to a house which relies on teamwork. The continued development of Jupp House spirit and an increased passion for the Jupp green should lead to success in the future.

Another innovation is the introduction of the Thompson/Prosser Award which is to be given to the boy who is judged to be the best citizen in the House. The inaugural winner of this award was Jason Tee. This award marks the end of an era for the Thompsons and the Prossers in the School and particularly in Jupp House. The two families have been involved in the House for over fifteen years and the award has been donated by the families to recognise the boy who gets involved at every opportunity presented to him.

Finally, I would like to thank David Thompson for his support throughout this year. The commitment and enthusiasm shown by him added strength to the House. To Mr Peterson and the tutors of Jupp - your support during this past year has been invaluable and I thank you for all your efforts. I would like to wish Phil Singh, next year's captain, the best of luck. Hopefully, the spirit that was created this year can be translated into Beatty Cup points in 1998. It is only a matter of time before the green rises again. The 'gentlemen' from Jupp will once again show the other houses how things should be done.






support of the Australian Brain Foundation an achievement of which I am sure everyone is proud.



front of the entire year group and their parents. It is this spirit of individuality that has made Noake such a strong and irrepressible house.



follow will see Queenslea once again being high on the leader board where it undoubtedly belongs.






The Cross Country was when we really bottomed out, but we learned some lessons that will certainly be applied, so the new guard tells us, in 1998!

Finally it was House Arts Day and again we were in our element. We offered a Page and Schaffer production of a play about rugby players even more hopeless





Everyone enjoyed the day and the high level of sportsmanship was maintained.



ACADEMIC









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In 1953 Sir Edmund Hillary conquered Mt Everest. In the same year Roger Bannister broke the four minute mile for the first time. In 1996, forty climbers reached the summit of Mt Everest in just one month, whilst over three hundred and fifty athletes ran the equivalent of a sub-four minute mile during the year.

Mt Everest is still as tall as it was in 1953, and a mile is no shorter than it was forty years ago. The demise of what were once regarded as "ultimate

barriers" to human endeavour can largely be put down to improvements in training, technique and technology. We recognise today's mountain climber or athlete as one who is superior in so many ways to his or her predecessor because the benchmarks that once represented superior performance are still obvious.

In the academic domain our Everests change their height; our miles have grown longer. The information explosion of the last few decades ensures this will continue. The benchmarks for academic excellence are not obvious. Indeed the dominant strategy for establishing academic excellence, the Normal Distribution Curve, demands that 50% of the population will be below average on every test of academic performance. Despite improvements in training, technique and technology, it appears that our students at the end of the century are no better than those who were at school when Hillary climbed Everest. It is on this flawed logic that those who decry the drop in standards base their arguments for a return to the "basics" of education. However, there was no golden age of

education to which we might go back. Students today are academically more able than they were forty years ago.

Whether it is international olympiads, national competitions and quizzes, local tournaments or in the conventional classroom, our students are demonstrating that the academic issues which were a significant challenge to the previous generation are amenable to increasing numbers of students now, and this despite an exponential growth in knowledge. Some of the evidence for the superior performance of our students in the 90s can be found in Mitre, others have been presented elsewhere in School publications. At a time when some of our educational leaders seek to focus only on problems of lack of basic knowledge, let us remember that Plato advised that education is not about the filling of vessels, but the lighting of lights. At Christ Church we can see many shining examples of Plato's philosophy.

STAFF PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Grappling with the Post Modern: Staff Professional Development in 1997

It has long been recognised by both staff and management at Christ Church that professional development is inextricably linked to school improvement. This recognition is, in itself, a crucial one for prompting teachers' learning at the School. Nevertheless, perhaps a greater challenge than acknowledging the importance of professional development is to ensure that the nature of the enterprise is appropriate to the contemporary environment of teachers' work. In this respect, it may be contended that the waves of change are becoming rougher and higher; in other words, teachers' work is changing dramatically along with the world in which it is performed. In these circumstances, traditional notions of professional development, which tend to be centred on the received wisdom of outside experts, are being questioned. Instead, teachers are increasingly

turning toward each other for professional learning on a collegial basis. At Christ Church, this trend is rapidly emerging and can be illustrated by two events that helped to characterise the professional development scene in 1997. The first was an annual staff seminar dealing with curriculum matters. The organisation of the seminar according to workshops presented by departments, ensured that the occasion was not only embedded in the life and work of the School, but also enabled the core area of teaching to be the focus of discussion and action.

Furthermore, collegial professional learning has been enhanced by the introduction of teaching portfolios. These portfolios are designed to encourage teachers to think more reflectively about their teaching so that improvements in practice can be identified as well as the means of achieving them. It is also envisaged that the compilation of portfolios will be exercised in collaboration with peers so that professional learning becomes a collegial undertaking.

Given both the strong commitment and the collegial approach to teachers' professional learning at the School, it might be asserted that Christ Church is beginning to perceive itself more as a learning organisation than a teaching institution. It could also be claimed that the School is embracing a contemporary notion of professional learning which is appropriate to the 'post modern' context of education.

Mr Howard Moore returned from a year in Canada to resume his role as Head of Department and Mr Ron Jensen departed for six months on the Canadian sail training vessel *Concordia*, travelling from Malaysia to Sweden, stopping at many ports along the way. His role on board was the teaching of navigation and seamanship and he has returned with a wealth of experience to pass on to his Nautical Studies and Marine Studies

students. During his absence we had the excellent services of Mr Roger Smith.

There has been some interesting and innovative work done by boys in Years Ten, Eleven and Twelve, and some very unusual art work on some of the many sand boards that were made. The best piece of woodwork was David Thompson's walnut coffee table which has not only an interesting and attractive design, but also a finish of the highest standard. Greg Lloyd, who narrowly beat David, Jonathan Brooksby and Russell Cook for the Applied Industrial Arts prize, designed and constructed a hoist for loading equipment on to the back of a truck. This was a complex project which turned out very well. Russell's giant "esky" was beautifully built but, even if he can afford to fill it, he will never be able to lift it! Jonathan challenged himself with a very difficult pine chest which has taught him a lot about working in curved wood. There were many other excellent pieces of work such as Karsten Volzke's pool cue and box and Chris Stokes's corner table. It is a pity that all the projects could not be put on show, but lack of storage space makes this too difficult to arrange.

Next year Applied Industrial Arts will no longer be offered at the Year Eleven level and Applied Technology will take its place. Also Technical Drawing has not attracted enough numbers to continue to be viable and will be offered only to Year Twelve. This will require some rewriting of teaching materials and a slightly different approach for 1998.

1997 has been a year of review, evaluation and modification within the English Department both in terms of existing offerings and new statewide initiatives. It has also been a year of frenzied, frantic and feverish activity for staff and students alike.

The year started with the warm afterglow of the 1996 TEE which saw our students performing well above state norms in English and Literature. The highlight was surely the performance of Ken Tee in the Literature Exam which saw him as the only male in the state to receive a Certificate of Distinction in that subject.

While the subject English was pursued with vigour in the classroom, it was also wrestled actively without, especially by our Year Ten group who took part in excursions to various cinemas, the Fremantle Children's Literature Centre and to His Majesty's Theatre to view the David Williamson play *The Club*.

In similar vein our upper school students gained exposure to the wider academic community through a series of lectures by visiting speakers. Year Twelve Literature students heard: Associate-Professor Chris Wortham from UWA lecture on "Turning Turk; the Morality of Evil in Othello"; Dr Jenny de Reuck from Murdoch University speak on Conrad's Heart of Darkness; and poet and academic, Fay Zwicky, muse on the poetry of William Blake. Year Eleven literature students received a background lecture on the Athenian context to Sophocles' Oedipus Tyrannus from Mr Mike Hughes, a tutor from the Classics Department at UWA, and heard an insightful talk on Malouf's Fly Away Peter from Dr Kateryna Longley from Murdoch University. Our Year Twelve English students were lucky enough to listen to the lively Dr Ann McGuire talk on Intertextuality and Dr Carol Brands speak on Documentary Film; both these speakers are lecturers at Curtin University of Technology.

The Year Nine cohort continued to "interface" with Information Technology, primarily as a tool for story, newspaper and radio advertising productions, but also to gain access to the internet in order to find information on writers and books. The "Net" also proved useful for the Year Ten and Eleven groups who have embarked on a "pen-pal" (or should I say "net-mate") programme with students from high

schools in Texas, South Africa, Germany, Sweden and Brazil.

English staff, along with their very active classroom roles, have immersed themselves in professional development, attending seminars and in-services in a number of English associated areas. We have sent representatives both to state and national English Teachers' Association Conferences.

Much of this professional development activity has been focused on evaluation of the statewide Curriculum Framework Draft and the associated English Learning Area Statement. While it is pleasing to report that the English Learning Area Statement encapsulates much of what we already do at CCGS, it has set us challenges in terms of reviewing the sequencing and assessment aspects of our programme, especially in

Years Eight, Nine and Ten. This review process should see some modifications to our lower school svllabus next year. Another area for review has been our approach to students "at risk" in English, in particular at Year Eight level, and this too is likely to result in some modifications to syllabi in the year ahead.

In terms of upper school syllabi we have been constantly monitoring changes to syllabus and text lists in Literature and TEE English as well as immersing ourselves in the on-going evolution of the CAT Framework Senior English courses in Years Eleven and Twelve. This will see continued fine tuning of our approach to these subjects in 1998.

This plethora of activity is, in reflection, only the tip of an ever expanding iceberg but is, nonetheless, vital to the two way educational process that makes English at CCGS an integral part of a continually dynamic and evolutionary learning community.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Academic

This year has been one of continual development and progress tempered by the occasional frustrating set back.

We continue to have a huge demand for the use of our computing laboratories. So much so that we have outfitted the small room that was originally intended to be the technician's work area, as a small computing room to accommodate the overflow from classes. This has proven to be a success as it has enabled each student using the department to have individual use of a computer.

Halfway through the year we started to have problems with our server as the demand was quickly out-stripping its ability to cope; with a user list of over a thousand names and file sizes becoming larger as students started to explore the development of multimedia documents. Also we discovered that a 4G hard drive, that seemed impossible to fill last year was quickly running out of storage space. Having three classrooms full of students all trying to log onto the server at the same time was also taking a heavy toll, causing the server and network to crash numerous times. All these problems created frustrating times for the IT staff, academic staff and students alike. Numerous 'work arounds', cunning plans and solutions were thought of and tested, and eventually we were able to implement a sound and stable solution. By adding a 100 Base T switch and faster ethernet card the server can now process requests about ten times faster than previously and the bottleneck, created by ninety students trying to log on

simultaneously, has disappeared. The plans we have in place for 1998 promise to improve this performance even more.

We have made extensive improvements in the structure and content of our Intranet site with the aim of making it a valuable and dynamic educational resource for both staff and students and to integrate it with the day to day life of the School. The daily bulletin and blue newsletter are now published on the Intranet and the latest edition of Impressions is also available to read on line. We have spent a considerable amount of time adding useful links to valuable educational resources to the site with the development of an integrated database of just under 1200 URL references. We have also added an

extensive resource of over nineteen thousand documents downloaded from the Web for our students to access directly from our site rather than having to find such resources for themselves. This resource is known as the Digital Curriculum Modules and was produced by staff at Scotch College, Adelaide. A number of CCGS staff have expressed interest in adding to these modules and modifying them for our own curriculum.

Next year we hope to publish the contents of the school diary on our intranet so that everyone will have up to date access to the latest on what is happening in the School.

SENIOR LIBRARY

The new circulation desk, the domain of Library Assistants Sonia Chillino (during the day) and Gerard Kelly (during the evening), was a welcome addition to the library space. It made the library look larger and airier (well, not quite, but every little bit helps), and it has become the very efficient hub of the resource centre.

Alison Hewson, Teacher Librarian, relocated to a reference desk next to the IT section of the library, from where she provided students and staff with a valuable reference service.

Rikta Hawkins, the Library Technician, again ensured that students and staff had easy and efficient access to the extensive audio-visual collection.

With nowhere else to go because of the redevelopment of Walters House, the Year Ten boarders used the library for their prep each evening. Although some students saw fit to abuse their increased access to resources, others made full and good use of their extra time in the library. It is hoped that evening hours will continue in 1998.

The seminar room, which has variously housed archival materials, extra classes and the Senior Librarian's office, was transformed into the Periodical Reading Room during 1997. Although the name sounds daunting, the room has become a haven for those who enjoy a daily browse of the papers or want to check out the latest copy of magazines such as White Dwarf.

A major project during the year was a seminar on selecting reading material for the parents of Year Eight students. The seminar, repeated to ensure as many parents as possible could find a suitable time slot, was organised by Alison Hewson and provided some excellent ideas for parents of boys who are either reluctant or non-readers. We hope to repeat the seminar in 1998 and hold a similar one for the parents of Year Nine boys.

The Friends of the Library and Archives volunteer group, which is administered from the Senior Library, has gone from strength to strength. Members may now choose to work in either the Senior, Preparatory or Music Libraries; the Archives; Éducation Support Unit; Drama Department; or the Centre for Ethics. As well as an enormous amount of work done by the Friends during regular working bees and weekly library visits, they also support both the curricular and co-curricular programmes in the Senior School through their excellent displays. A particularly memorable one marked the handover


of Hong Kong and featured a bowlerhatted civil servant and the full-size head of a Chinese paper dragon.

MATHEMATICS

Academic

In the Mathematics Department, staff and students have been thoroughly involved in implementing new ideas and technology. Competitions: (Just a few of the many competitions can be noted here.)

Four of our boys were invited by the Australian Mathematical Olympiad Committee to be some of the one hundred and twenty senior mathematics students in Australia tackling the Australian Mathematical Olympiad in February this year. That competition consisted of two four-hour papers. Kevin Ho received a Certificate of Participation, while Daigo Miyata and David Thackaberry received Certificates of Credit (until this year this was called a Bronze Medal), placing them in the top sixty in Australia. Peter Andrewartha received a Certificate of Distinction (previously called a Silver Medal), placing him in the top thirty-six in Australia.

The Maths Challenge was conducted after school again this year, with some sixty CCGS boys and fourteen girls from MLC taking part. We hope the girls join us again next year. The difficulty of the Challenge was soon apparent, and success was hard to achieve. However, Sek-Loong Tan and Robert Olivier (Year Eight); Paul Chia, Shaun Haskey and John Ding (Year Nine) were very successful, earning High Distinctions placing them in the top four percent of candidates in Australia. Chris Heyes (Year Eight) and

Michael Perrett (Year Nine) were in the next four percent.

The MAWA/IBM Inter-School Teams Competition was won again by our senior team of David Thackaberry, Tobias Locsei and Daniel Suan of Year Twelve with Tony Ma, Ryan Chua and Hsien-Wern Chan of Year Eleven. CCGS has won this competition in all five years since its inception! We were pleased to hear that Hsien Wern Chan was also selected as the MAWA Scholar to attend the National Mathematics School of Excellence in Canberra.

Twelve of our students won Prizes in the Australian Mathematics Competition, along with thirty-one High Distinctions, one hundred and twenty-eight Distinctions, and one hundred and ninety Credits. This was a great result from our five hundred and twenty-four entrants.

Maths Extension Weekend

In March, a group of twenty-one Year Nine students from CCGS and MLC attended a Mathematics Extension weekend. Activities included the creation of a Maths Page on the CCGS Web, detailed investigation of mathematics sites on the Internet, and several sessions of Problem Solving. Following the success of this weekend, we hope to continue to build links with MLC mathematics staff and students.

Mathematics Conferences

Mike Ristovsky and Jane and Graham Ferguson attended the Biennial Conference of the Australian Association of Mathematics Teachers in Melbourne in June. The theme of the conference

was 'Creating the Future', a source of a great deal of interest to mathematics educators from primary, secondary and tertiary institutions. Several overseas speakers outlined advances in mathematics education in America and England. The impact of new technology has promoted a revision of what mathematics teaching should involve. Australian delegates were keen to participate in discussions about the future of mathematics education, especially with regard to designing an appropriate curriculum.

Nine teachers also went to the State Mathematics Conference over a weekend in Bunbury, and many other in-service courses have been attended.

I.T. and the Maths Department

In January 1997 Mike Ristovsky was appointed in-charge of IT in the Maths Department, focusing his attention on the implementation and use of graphic calculators and the internet in the current Maths courses. Years Ten to Twelve are now using graphic calculators to their full capacity in all aspects of assessment and Year Eight and Nine students are gradually being introduced to these powerful tools.

The Mathematics Department now has its own home page on the CCGS intranet for use by both the staff and students. You can view the courses available and pathways one can take leading into Years Eleven and Twelve, access sites such as The Curriculum Council, The Sharp Graphic Calculators, Australian Universities or merely take a walk back into the History of Maths. The links and diversions available through this site and others are infinite!

1997 was a challenging and exciting year for the Department as we endeavoured to provide an education in Science which will carry the students into the twenty-first century.

With respect to staffing, it was with great sadness that we said farewell to our previous Head of Biology, mentor and friend, Kerry Clarke. We shall miss his great zeal and expertise in Biology, his innovative thinking and course development, his inimitable style of teaching, his concern for staff and students and his fantastic sense of humour. Mark Morrissy carried on the good work over the period of Kerry's illness and Sharyn Bana has been appointed Head of Biology from 1998. This year we welcomed Megan Bishop and will say farewell to Jackie Amunsden. Next year Christy Barker will return to the Department after her time as Assistant Director at Kooringal.

Our boys have achieved in a number of areas. We have continued to do well in the Australian Schools Science
Competition with the top award of the Esso Medal being received by David Thackaberry (Year Twelve). Ten boys received High Distinction awards which placed them in the top one percent of the state - David English (Year Eight); Eu-Jinn Teh (Year Nine); Michael Collin, Ben Woffenden, James Andrewartha, Paul Tilbrook (Year Ten); Michael Molinari (Year Eleven); Tobias Locsei, David Thackaberry, Tim Hollingsworth (Year Twelve).

Staff professional development continues to be strongly pursued by all staff members. Don Morrissy had the good fortune to attend a two week placement at the Parkes Radio Astronomy Observatory in NSW, funded by the Parents' Association.

Biology

The Biology Department remains a thriving and dynamic area of the School. This year has seen the continued development of curriculum packages, organisation of Biotechnology workshops, Marine Studies excursions and trips, visits to the Zoo, Scitech, Underwater World, Ocean Farm Aquaculture Centre and many more.

A substantial curriculum development programme has continued during the

year. The Year Eight curriculum underwent a significant editing and the Year Nine curriculum was totally rewritten to incorporate a wider perspective on organisms and living systems. In Year Ten the Biotechnology curriculum was rearranged to improve the flexibility of the trimester system, and a section on Ethical Issues was incorporated. Marine Studies continued to be a strong cross-curriculum initiative between the Science and Design and Technology Departments.

The camping programme in Year Eleven and Twelve Biology continues to be a feature of the strong ecological perspectives of these courses. In Human Biology, the diverse range of perspectives covered is enhanced by the fine departmental resources.

A highlight of the year for the Department occurred when Mr Andrew Baker kindly donated a cloned tree, "The Dwellingup Mallee" to the School. The tree represents cloned stock from a species of which there is only one known example in the wild.

Chemistry

1997 has been a big year for the Chemistry Department. It has seen significant changes to the Year Eleven course with the introduction of graphics calculators.

This year just over a hundred CCGS students sat the RACI National Chemistry Quiz, with ten Christ Church boys being awarded plaques as a result. Six of these scored 100%: Justin Ng, Simon Baldwin, Luke Dunlop, David Thackaberry, Daniel Suan (Year Twelve) and James Andrewartha (Year Ten). The following students also received plaques: Tobias Locsei (Year Twelve), David Hng, Tony Ma and Luke Somerville-Brown (Year Eleven).

This year saw the record number of twenty-one CCGS students, including some Year Nines, sit the Chemistry Olmpiad examination, resulting in three being offered places at the preparation camp for the International Chemistry Olympiad: Michael Molinari (Year Eleven), James Andrewartha and David Solomon (Year Ten).

Physics

1997 started with the good news that David Liaw had won the Physics Prize in the TEE at the end of 1996, and that the overall results were excellent. The Department has high expectations of the students and they always seem to rise to the challenge.

During the year several boys were involved in preparation for the Physics Olympiad selection examinations and Tony Ma, Hsien Wern Chan and Michael Molinari were all selected for a further training camp. At time of writing Michael and Hsien are in Canberra, where a two week camp involving intensive study will culminate in the selection of the final five students who will represent Australia in Iceland.

Christ Church entered a record eight teams in the Australian Physics Quiz Night held annually at UWA. We unfortunately failed to win this elusive trophy, coming second yet again! All Year Twelve physics students attended the AIP annual Youth Lecture at Curtin University, which in 1997 was appropriately on the nature of the electron, it being one hundred years since J.J. Thompson's famous discovery. The Physics Department was also heavily involved with the preparation of the Champion CCGS teams in the Solar Model Car Challenge.

I would like to end with a quote from Albert Einstein: 'There is such a thing as a passionate desire to understand, just as there is a passionate love for music. Without it, there would be no natural science, and no mathematics."

The Year Eight Social Science course in Geography has been a scene of cooperation between Christ Church Grammar School and the local area. The boys have mapped Queenslea Drive and Bayview Terrace in a study that contrasts between residential and commercial land use whilst developing mapping skills. This activity has been particularly successful because, not only is it 'out of the classroom', it also helps boys to relate skills taught to familiar environment.

All Year Eight classes have spent one period per cycle in the Information Technology Department this year. Peter Murray has introduced the e-mail penpal programme to the classes and the boys are communicating with other school students from all over the world! This has been a great opportunity for cultural exchange and very much enjoyed by the boys.

Each class has visited the Fremantle Maritime Museum where they have been able to experience a 'hands-on' introduction to the methods of maritime archaeology, including searching for wreckage via snorkelling, slide show presentations as well as talks from experienced maritime archaeologists.

Year Nine students have been fortunate enough to visit Parliament House and/or the Electoral Centre which is now part of the Constitutional Centre in the Old Hale School building at Parliament House. Those students taking the Law

elective in Year Ten have observed the Courts in action and have also had an interesting talk regarding Rights and what happens if one is arrested. Boys taking the Year Ten Politics elective saw WA politicians in action during Question Time.

1997 has seen the Year Eleven Geography students travel to Fremantle and Coogee to develop mapping, observation and data collection skills. The second excursion (Coast to Scarp) starts at Swanbourne Beach and finishes in the John Forrest National Park. Quite a range of landscapes are explored including coastal, wetlands, fluvial and sclerophyllous forest environments. The boys were required to explore landforms and associated vegetation.

The Year Twelve course was focussed more on the field of Human Geography. This year the outings included a trip to Alcoa's Huntly mine site, Mr Ian Eckersley's dairy farm in Harvey and a nearby newly planted vineyard. Apart from very inclement weather the day was valuable because it assisted students, particularly foreign students, to observe what they had been studying.

The second excursion took the Year Twelves to the end of the Mitchell Freeway as far as the Rural-Urban Fringe and then back through a variety of urban functional zones to finish in East Perth. This excursion marked the final part of the course and it was particularly interesting for the boys to see the construction sites for the East Perth tunnel.

1997 was the first year that Practical Geography has been offered at Christ Church Grammar School. The aim of the course is to develop a geographic viewpoint through an emphasis on laboratory activities and fieldwork. The activities of work and leisure are used as a basis for developing an individual's understanding of his own position and that of others in the environment.

Students at the Year Twelve level in both History and Political and Legal Studies have been experiencing the dimensions of new courses of study which, it is hoped, will improve both their understanding and skills within the two subjects.

1997 is the first year that Christ Church Grammar School has been involved in the Geography Information System Schools Competition. The boys involved were Michael Collin and Phillip Anderson. The winner was Lesmurdie High School, whilst Christ Church Grammar School and Presbyterian Ladies' College achieved equal runner-up with 'Traffic Problems on Stirling Highway'.

We continue to have boys participating in the National History Challenge. Ian Marshall wrote an essay about the life and contributions to public life of Old Boy Senator Allan Eggleston, and Michael Collin produced a museum display to convey the experiences of Mr Keith Flanagan on the Burma Railway. Michael's display was Highly Commended and he was awarded a prize for 'Interviewing a person about his Military Experience'. Several Year Nine classes also participated in the Asia Wise Competition.

Students have been fortunate to attend important and interesting forums. Joel Hunter and Nick Larkins participated in the Youth Earth Summit and Jeremy Bond and Michael Geelhoed represented the school at the Western Australian Schools Constitutional Convention where the republican issue was under the microscope.

The Department has had a very interesting and fulfilling year. We have been fortunate having Nick Pelling on exchange from Charterhouse whilst Allan Hallett has been ensconced there. Rosemary Cawley has been acting-head of Geography and Eril-Jane Reid has been acting-head of Social Science. Geography and all Social Science excursions have been made easier with the presence of our two Rentas, Kyle Jess and Nick Heathcote.




Activities


















1997 marks the end of the first phase of the Archives Project. At Speech Night in 1991 Mr Madin announced that the School Council and Old Boys' Association had agreed to fund jointly a five year Archives programme. A parttime Archivist was to be appointed and the aims of the project were to collect, preserve, arrange and describe the School collection; to help research and write articles on the School's history and its personalities; to support investigative History and Social Science class work and to prepare a School Register. Ultimately the aim of the project was to make possible the writing of a formal history of the School.

The project proceeded in June 1992 with the appointment of a School Archivist.

Much has been achieved in the last five years. Initially the Archives was housed in the seminar room in the Library. Storage space was limited to two metal filing cabinets and two metal stand alone cupboards. In October 1995 the Archives moved into refurbished rooms in L Block. The facility comprises a spacious well-appointed office and a separate temperature controlled workroom which houses a large compactus.

The first task of the Archivist was to assess the records and draft a School Archives Policy. Accessioning, describing and preserving the records followed. As work took shape the importance of a register for staff and students became apparent. The preparation of such a register is an exacting task. Much research has been done on the period 1910-1956 and the early 1970s. During the next two years the Archives will focus on the development and publication of a register.

The promotion of the Archives and what it stands for is one of the key objectives of the project. Displays of photographs and items of memorabilia in the Library, on notice boards, in classrooms, at House and School functions, at Mount Claremont and at Old Boys' functions have done much to generate interest in the history and traditions of Christ Church.

Boys and parents are aware of the need to exhibit some of the School's archival resources so that the history of Christ Church can be shared with as wide an audience as possible. In 1993 boys raised \$2,000 to conserve and display two School flags and in 1995 they raised

\$2,200 to purchase an archives display cabinet. Parents of cricketers who toured England in 1996 decided to fund a number of display cabinets for the Mount Claremont Pavilion. The inaugural cricket display was opened at a sundowner in October 1997.

1995 witnessed the introduction of an Archives unit as part of the Year Eight Social Science curriculum. As well as learning about the importance of record keeping and the necessity of preserving historical documents and items of memorabilia, each boy completes a research essay on one aspect of the School's history. The best research projects are linked to the Christ Church Website.

During the last three years great emphasis has been placed on the recording of oral histories. It is people's memories of their time at the School that will make the history of Christ Church live. So too the Archivist has undertaken numerous research projects. The most detailed include A History of Boarding at Christ Church 1914-1997, A History of Walters House and Parry House, A History of the School Crest and A History of Cadets 1936-1992. The History of Boarding was included in the brochure that was produced to commemorate the opening of Walters House on 5 December 1997.

Last year the Archives prepared a Record section for *The Mitre*. It is an appendix which summarises the boys' major academic and sporting achievements for the year. It is envisaged that such an appendix will be prepared for all future volumes of *The Mitre*.

Mid-way through 1996 the Friends of the Library Support Group was expanded to include the Archives. Since then a number of committed parents have volunteered to work in the Archives - some on a weekly basis. Much is being achieved. Sarah Dobb has begun indexing the *Chronicle*, Rhondda Tilbrook has painstakingly recorded all the sports results for 1997 and Peta Day, Deborah Bauert, Chris Prosser, Barbara Waldon and Sue Wilson have spent hours developing various databases and naming photographs. Their work is invaluable.

The joint funding of a five year programme was an expression of confidence by the School and the Old Boys in the value of archives. That confidence was not misplaced. During the last few years members of staff, students, parents and Old Boys have increasingly become aware of the value and diversity of the records. Admission registers, minutes of meetings, cups and trophies, photographs, school magazines, press clippings, letters and speeches, honour boards and memorial plaques are important in creating a sense of identity and tradition.

The value of the Archives programme to the School is widely acknowledged. As a result the School has decided to fund fully the next phase of Archives development from its own resources. All those involved in the Archives project acknowledge with gratitude the foresight of the Old Boys in funding what was considered to be an ambitious task.

The Archivist is also most appreciative of the ongoing contribution of Sarah Dobb and Rita Willard.

Activities

1997 was a victorious year for the Christ Church Cadet Unit; one in which hard work and discipline once again saw us striving towards and winning the title of Best Cadet Unit in the state.

The morning of the 18th April saw them breaking camp and boarding the bus for Irwin Barracks where they arrived after an unscheduled detour to Leeuwin Barracks. The participants of the course would like to thank Col Peterson, WO1 O'Sullivan and Mr Madin for making this hard but worthwhile trip available to us.

Cadets enjoyed Term Two training and the camp much more because it is at this time that most of the drill training finishes and they start to learn about the other aspects of being a cadet, such as how to shoot a rifle, the history of cadets and navigation. The night activity runs

Training for the rest of the term (before the annual camp) was based on reinforcing drill movements and combining to perform company drill.



The annual camp at Bindoon saw a change as it had traditionally been



Activities

Given the close relationship between the Chapel and the Centre for Ethics it is our practice to combine the reports for *The Mitre*.

Chapel activities in 1997 began in January with the Anglican Summer School. The guest speakers were Canon John Peterson, Secretary General of the Anglican Communion, and Teresa Poole, dual gold medalist at the Atlanta Paralympics.

The Gideons were along in February to distribute bibles to Year Eight students. The students are intrigued by the fact that there are people who care enough about the Bible to ensure that it is widely distributed. The address that accompanies this event is always interesting and gives both staff and students cause to reflect. We greatly appreciate the work of the Gideons.

One of our first guests was the 1996 winner of the Nobel Prize for Peace, Jose Ramos Horta. We then welcomed Professor Ross Garnaut, former Australian Ambassador to China, who spoke about the need to understand and respect cultural differences when relating to Asia. Given some of the mindless and insensitive approaches taken by various political figures in recent times, it was a particularly important contribution.

Our next speaker was Father Hilary Greenwood who spoke to us about the Christian understanding of Easter.

Hill House held its annual service in April as it welcomed its new Head of House, Ms Gardner, and farewelled Ms Day. Soon after that, Hill House sent along several representatives to the Anglicare Launch in St George's Cathedral where the Archbishop and the Premier reminded us all of Anglicare's extraordinary service to the vulnerable in our community.

In May we were visited by the Reverend Tim Costello, the minister at the Collins Street Baptist Church in Melbourne. Mr Costello was in Perth to warn against the social dangers of gambling. His address was insightful and suitably disconcerting. Later in the month the Chaplain at Hale, the Reverend Richard Pengelly, addressed the Senior Assembly and then our Year Eleven students on the subject of "Manhood". Both talks were very well received.

Students from Christ Church and St Hilda's came together for a wonderful evening on "Young People and John Marsden". This was led by Year Ten students from both schools. We were deeply impressed at the high level of the discussion.

In June, members of the Music Department joined with Methodist Ladies' College to lead the singing of Evensong at the cathedral. Then in July, the Uniting Church of Australia held its concluding liturgy for the National Assembly in our chapel. We were delighted to welcome visitors from all around Australia.

Around this time, a particularly interesting seminar on Ethics and the Media was held in the chapel. This was a joint project between the Media Alliance and the Centre for Ethics. Media students were fascinated to see well known media figures debating delicate questions with considerable vigour.

A number of fathers participated in a weekend workshop run by Steve Runciman and Wes Carter on the topic "Fathering of Sons". Steve and Wes have made an invaluable contribution to the Centre for Ethics and we were pleased to welcome them back for a seminar with members of staff on "Images of Manhood" later in the year. On a similar topic, when Steve Biddulph talked about his new book *Raising Boys*, the chapel was packed out.

Elizabeth Jolley spoke about her new novel *Lovesong*. It is such a pleasure to have Elizabeth Jolley as a guest. She dwelt on Flaubert's remark that "fiction is the response to a deep and always hidden wound".

Mrs Alvarez organised an evening for parents on "Adolescents and Drugs". Her work in this often bewildering area is deeply appreciated.

Dr Craig Turner addressed our Year Eleven students on the topic of "Body, Mind and Spirit". It was an open and sensitive exploration of an holistic approach to life which included an acknowledgment of the soul. Dr Turner returned to the Centre for Ethics later in the year and spoke to parents on this same theme.

At our Senior School Assembly on Founders' Day, Mr Arthur Pate took us on a marvellous exploration of the school hymn. Mr Pate wrote the words for this hymn and Mr Bates composed the music. They worked as a team as Mr Pate explained his talk.

In August, we heard from Rebecca Matheson on the work of 'Uni Camp for Kids'. Many Old Boys are involved in this splendid organisation and we hope that Rebecca's talk will inspire students from our school to take up the rewarding challenge when they are at university.

As we remembered Hiroshima Day we also welcomed two Russian visitors to the school. Natalia Dicun and Andrei Krychtop came to us from Novozybkov, a township near Chernobyl. They told chilling tales about the price we pay when nuclear accidents occur. As well as speaking and answering questions, they exhibited art by the children of Chernobyl; art that told of the suffering brought about by the accident.

In case we were all taking ourselves too seriously, John Doust came back to his old school to discuss life and ethics. Bishop Philip Huggins tackled the question "Should the Church be involved in Politics?". Leader of the Opposition in the State Upper House, Tom Stephens,

spoke about politics and passion. The Reverend Dr Elizabeth Canham spoke about Hildegard of Bingen.

We also heard from Bishop John Spong (described by Andrew Denton as "the grooviest bishop I know"). Stephanie Dowrick spoke on "Forgiveness and Other Acts of Love", the ABC's Robyn Williams on "Science, the Media and Ethics", Canon John Morgan on Euthanasia, Professor Fiona Stanley on Medical Research, and Moira Rayner on "Living with Hope: Growing the Society We Want".

The end of year saw wonderful liturgies associated with saying goodbye to Year Twelve and the always glorious Advent Service. We were also joined by five hundred students for a "Liturgy of the Light" which included some modern church music, the lighting of candles and a superb address by Rachel Maughan on the need we have to serve and to build community.

Apart from the regular communion services there were many weddings, baptisms and the confirmation of eighteen students, including two students from MLC. Our good friend Bishop Murray was once again on hand for the confirmation service. He brings such warmth and kindness as our regional bishop and reminds us of the healing connections between faith, hope and love. In the end, these are the important values that the Chapel and the Centre for Ethics stand for and seek to nurture.

Two characteristics best describe Debating at Christ Church in '97 - participation and success. The number of opportunities for students to 'have a say' seems to grow each year with the WADL, AHISA, State and House competitions in debating and the Rotary and Lions Youth competitions for public speaking. Our school now has one of the largest speaking faculties of any school.

The main feature of the debating year was the success of all teams in the WADL competition. Of the twenty teams that Christ Church fielded, six made the final rounds - an exceptional effort by all involved. One Year Eight team, two Year Ten teams, a Year Eleven and a Year Twelve team all progressed past the initial five rounds.

Of the teams that made the final, two debated their way into the Grand Final. They too, were unable to come away with a win. Nonetheless, their success at making the Grand Final typified the depth and excellence of the Debating Academy.

One of the highlights of the year was hosting the State Debating Competition at Christ Church. Sam Allen was part of the four member WA team and he debated brilliantly against the ACT in front of a home crowd inside the school chapel. The enthusiasm following the State debates continued through both the final rounds of the WADL and the AHISA competitions.

The AHISA competition provided some relief from the relatively serious WADL

debates. Aravinda Selvarajah's 'convoluted octopus' stories seemed to take some adjudicators by surprise, but emphasised the value of the comic element in any speech. Most debaters who participated in the WADL competition also debated in the AHISA rounds, and it was encouraging to see others join the latter competition mid-way through the year. Again Christ Church demonstrated its dominance, with five AHISA teams winning their divisions.

On the public speaking front, Michael Geelhoed, Michael Molinari, Hsien Wern Chan, Chris Edwards, Matt Porter, Michael Page and Grant Schaffer participated in the Rotary Four Way Public Speaking contest and Lions Youth of the Year. Michael Geelhoed triumphed in the Rotary Competition.

Our thanks go to Ms Gardner and Ms Davies, who for the second year have organised the complex debating calendar and ensured the success and cohesion of all the teams. To the senior debaters, I thank them for their support.

Finally, good luck to captains-elect, Gareth Gregory and Grant Schaffer, as well as to all the debaters and public speakers for the '98 season. In three years, we have seen the number of debaters treble and, no doubt, the future holds even greater things for debating at Christ Church.

DEVELOPMENT AWARD SCHEME

Friday afternoons are abuzz with activity at Christ Church. While boys in Years Eight and Nine take part in sports matches, students in Years Ten and Eleven are kept busy with a variety of activities.

Year Tens who are are not involved in *The Mitre* production or Cadets participate in the Development Award Scheme which includes basic first aid training, outdoor skills, bush cooking, techniques to improve communication and community service. Year Elevens can choose from activities such as art and music workshops, computing, golf, umpiring or assisting with middle school sport, photography, the solar car challenge, video work and strategy games. This year two of these are featured on these pages.

Solar Car Challenge

Months of preparation on Fridays and Sundays culminated in one of the Christ Church teams winning the Australian National Solar Model Car Challenge.

In the State section of the Challenge two CCGS teams consisting of Alistair Murchison, Peter Packer and Tristan Ward; and Brad Rees, Ben Marshall, Matthew Kuo, Aravinda Selvarajah and Andrew Hutchison did extremely well with the latter becoming State Champions and winning the right to represent WA at the Nationals in Brisbane.

On the first day of the contest we missed the morning's time trials on a twenty metre track, but we were finally scrutineered ending up seventh overall, which was a bit disappointing. The team looked forward to the next day when we would get an opportunity to prove ourselves on a full track. However, on the second day, disaster seemed to have struck when the scrutineers told us that we were not eligible to continue on to the next day's races as we had not been scrutineered a second time. Fortunately, this was soon cleared up, but it had not been a good day!

The race day was humid and overcast with rain threatening. We arrived at the venue late after missing the first bus and were greeted by the sounds of a ballet dancing class that was to keep us company throughout the day. We were organised into a round-robin format of eight with four cars in each according to rank. We easily rode through this first stage and then started our climb. The next races were best of three each and the weather was behaving rather erratically, jumping from 300 to 1400 lux in a minute. This proved our ability to work as a team in preparing the car for the next race and getting the correct gearing. Tension was building as the quarter and then semi-finals were run. We defeated Hampton College in the semi-finals without too much trouble and we were into the Grand Final, but had to wait as

Hampton raced off for third place, defeating a Queensland car.

Our time had come! It was about 1:30 pm and some rain had fallen, leaving the track full of puddles. Like Hampton, we were against a Queensland team and bent on beating them in their own state. Fate, it seemed, was not going to make it easy for us as the opposition won the first race narrowly, passing us at the last bend of the figure eight track to cross the finish line first. We were not too phased by this as there was plenty of time left to make a come back. This race took place in about 450 lux and we did not make any changes to the car for the second race. Once again, the cars were set down and took off. We led at the start and had built up a lead, but as in the first race, Queensland came back with the crowd cheering as they crossed the line. Unbelievably, the announcer then mistakenly informed us that for the first time a Western Australian car had not won the Australian National Titles. We stood there shocked as we knew the finals were the best of five races.

Our attitude had changed slightly from feeling that we were sure winners to feeling that coming second would be good enough. We just did not feel that it would be possible to win the final three races. We would be complacent runners-up. We were looking for a pinion that we did not have. In a

All was silent as the cars were placed down. This race, as we had hoped, was won quite convincingly as our car once again fended off the come back by Queensland.

The final race, in which the national titles were to be decided, had arrived. Once again, tension filled the air as a coin was flipped to decide on which track the cars were to be travelling. Ben chose the inside that had seemed to be the better one throughout the day, though it would be the more difficult to hold off a challenge at the end of the race as the other car would have the inside lane around the last corner.

The cars were placed on the track and the gate lifted. Once again, our car went to the front and remarkably had a reasonable lead around the final bend as it came through to take the championship. In contrast to the second race in which Queensland had won, there was no real cheering and celebration as the daunting thought of

WA taking the trophy back "home" for the sixth consecutive time sank in. No matter – we had won and that was all that counted for us!

On behalf of both teams that represented the School I would like to thank Mr Madin for his support of our activity and for allowing us once again to miss a few days of school to compete in the Nationals; our sole sponsor, John Hughes Mitsubishi, for the very large and much appreciated sum of money; and Mr Rees and Mr Stansbury for their endless time and effort - their support, vital knowledge and experience was invaluable. We hope that those in Years Ten and Eleven who are interested in the competition will be able to continue Christ Church's success in the future.

eager to make our way to the driving range, a place with which we were to become familiar over the next few weeks as we perfected our drives.


By this stage we yearned for the challenge of the course, but, as our putting skills still left much to be desired, the following weeks were spent honing our chipping and putting.



It was in May of 1987 that the School's youth theatre company made its first appearance. It was at His Majesty's Theatre and the production was the stage adaptation of Randolph Stow's Midnite - hence the Company's choice of name. Since that time much has occurred in Midnite's ten years of existence: international tours, representing Australia; overseas and Australian professionals coming and working alongside staff and pupils; and the distinction of staging world premieres of new plays, in such distinguished venues as The Playhouse and Saint George's Cathedral.

Equally important, though less spectacular, has been the development of drama (with its media component) in the classroom. This year there have been significant advances in the work of Years Eight, Nine and Ten, with 'student-centred learning' seeing tangible and practical outcomes within a more discernible, disciplined frame of operation. Gabrielle Fairclough and Jody Clarke joined the Director in teaching middle school this year. The 'collegiality' of the teaching programme thus enhanced, the resultant new initiatives allowed for a far more productive year. Year Nine and Year Ten playbuilding skills were much in evidence, while the basis of creativity was more pronounced than previously in Year Eight. Years Eleven and Twelve have achieved greater results with a creative output in film/ television performance allied

to the Curriculum Council syllabus for Drama.

In classroom, and stage and screen production, the work of the boys' Drama Council has been pivotal. It is the members of the Council who observe, report, initiate and suggest ways of improvement in all aspects of the Drama work. Under the leadership of Chris Edmonds, Haslett Grounds and Nic Rohrlach, the Council has greatly improved communication between staff and boys and been instrumental in the reorganisation of how the drama office operates. Their work as production and front of house staff in the busy production schedule of MYTC is invaluable.

Early in the year we decided to work into our own production schedule the opportunities for the boys to accept the many invitations that come from outside the school for them to participate in others' productions. Thus, our actors appeared in Oliver at MLC, The Pyjama Game at PLC and Pride and Prejudice for Saint Hilda's at the Octagon Theatre. Also, when our Midnite associate director Jenny Davis was asked to direct the dramatic sections of The City of Perth International Tattoo in November, more 'guest roles' became available. Although this meant restricting our own production schedule a little, it is

invaluable for our actors to experience the talents of as many directors as possible, and this has happened in '97.

Our own production schedule began with the world premiere in March in Saint George's Cathedral of *Rosie Fishman*, by WA playwright Elizabeth Backhouse. The Company was joined by a veteran actor Edgar Metcalfe in the role of Joseph Meyer, a victim of the Holocaust. Chris Edmonds, who played opposite him as the younger Rabbi, Abraham Mendelsohn, said: "All of us learned so much from working alongside Edgar. That he treated us as equals was a great compliment."

Rosie Fishman was a great challenge for the cast. The conflict between Jew and Christian, being Australian and Jewish, devout in Christianity and Judaism and the need for forgiveness under the one God, were just some of the themes to be tackled. That the cast succeeded, and succeeded well, was borne out in the reviews, especially in the words of the Anglican Messenger theatre critic, who said: "The Midnite Company showed us not just good youth theatre, but first rate theatre." In a letter to the Director playwright Elizabeth Backhouse expressed her gratitude for the standard of the production and said she had been correct in asking us to present her new and difficult play. The magnificent setting that is the Cathedral was again both a challenge and a joy in which to work.

Bob Woollett returned to Midnite as director of Terence Rattigan's *A Bequest to the Nation*. This play, the story of the love affair between Admiral, Lord Nelson and Lady Hamilton, was a marvellous contrast to MYTC's earlier production. A uniformly strong cast, led by Sally Jasper as the ultimately tragic figure of Emma, Lady Hamilton, proved

that young Australian performers are more than capable of playing the rich dialogue attributed to the last century English of all classes.

The use of the stage revolve allowed for the swift change of scenes needed to maintain the pace essential in this play. As in all the MYTC's productions this year, stage management was unobtrusive and excellent.

Again, a contrast of style followed with two one-act plays. Both plays are by modern writers, both were directed by Year Eleven pupils, Michael Taylor and Terry Vaughan. *The Crash of 1937* by A.T. Spinks concerns the struggle to survive after a light plane crash and *The Interrogation* by C.T. Dockrill examines the difference between power and authority within the law. Both plays gave a good cross section of experienced and inexperienced actors and technicians the opportunity to design, stage manage and perform.

At the end of each year, two major drama events occur. One is the play in which actors from Years Eight and Nine are given 'exclusive' rights. This year, Aidan Chambers' play The Chicken Run was staged. Fast moving and colourful, the play explores a wide range of issues peer pressure, bullying, the need to conform and the need to be an individual - all against the background of young lives at school and after the school day. The play is at times very funny and at other times very moving. Director Gabrielle Fairclough allowed her large cast full rein, yet instilled a marvellous theatrical discipline which resulted in pace and timing one might expect from actors many years the senior of those

who brought *The Chicken Run* so expertly to life.

The Drama Dinner was slightly different this year, as the Midnite Award for 1997, though announced, was not presented. The Award is given to that person who has given outstanding service to the Midnite/CCGS and the wider arts community. This year it goes to Sir Peter Gadsden, our UK Vice-Patron, who was instrumental in the setting up of the Company in 1987 and has encouraged its international touring. He will be presented with his award at a special dinner in Bath when MYTC is on tour there next January. At the dinner, Companions of the Order of Midnite were given to three people who have made valuable contributions to drama teacher and director, Gabrielle Fairclough; Drama Councillor, Simon Baldwin (Year Twelve) and Old Boy, Simon Holt.

As the year draws to its close, rehearsals are well under way for the two plays which will tour England in January 1998, to mark the tenth anniversary of the inaugural MYTC tour for the Australian Bicentenary of '88. David Williamson's Dead White Males and Tony Nicholl's Urbs, Urbis will be presented by the Midnite Company of thirty young people and five adults; the plays are directed by Tony Howes and Trudy Johnston, with production management by Dean Morris, tour co-ordination by Ina Herman and musical direction by Simon Holt. But...news of all that is for next year's Mitre.


Team Three won the first round of the finals after Rossmoyne forfeited and proceeded to the quarterfinal. This time they had to defend a hockey player

1997 was another busy, exciting and successful year for the Christ Church Music Department. With more than thirty ensembles, Music has grown to be one of the most active of all the cultural activities at the School. The focus to enjoy music, discover music and share the gift of music with those in and outside the School is the key to this department's success. The friendly, relaxed atmosphere and strong work ethic give music-making at Christ Church both an informal and formal element.

The year was made particularly exciting by the now cemented relationship established between Christ Church and MLC. This link has broadened the possibilities of music-making for both schools and two new ensembles have been established - the joint symphonic Winds and joint Chamber Choir. Both are now up and running and have had great success. The Symphonic Winds, conducted by Mr Williams, recently won the prize of Outstanding at their first attempt in the WA Education Department's Annual Wind Band

Festival. With this remarkable result the Symphonic Wind Band is clearly set for a very successful future.

The focus of Term One was the preparation for the annual All Groups Concert. With Mr Rimmer on sick leave, yet remarkably visible around the campus, it was Mr Bates who undertook the daunting task of preparing both the Concert Band and Orchestra for the evening. Mancini Magic by the Concert Band set the scene for an exciting night of entertainment. The programme included music from the Jazz Flutes, Yahoos, Jazz I and II, Rock Groups, Guitar Ensemble, Saxophone Ensemble and Clarinet Ensemble, providing a wide range of sounds from rock to the more sombre classical pieces. The finale Russian Sailor Dance, performed by the school orchestra capped off a sensational evening.

The next event on the music calendar was a trip to Toodyay for the Christ Church Concert Band, Jazz Bands (I and II) and the MLC Big Band. It was bright and early on a Sunday morning

that we arrived in Toodyay eager to make some music. Although this was the main objective of the day many students could not help taking part in the Toodyay festivities. Jonathan Brooksby and Haslett Grounds gave into the urge to try boot-scooting under the watchful eyes of many spectators in the main street.

The highlight of Term Two was the Choral and Orchestral Concert performed for MLC's 90th Anniversary. Bach's *Brandenburg Concerto No 3 in G Major* was the curtain raiser conducted by Mr Rimmer who was "back in the action". This was followed by Rachmaninoff's *Piano Concerto No 2 in C Minor*, which involved over a hundred and twenty musicians from both schools. The flourish of the last note ended a concert that will be remembered for many years.

Preparations began for the arrival of Melbourne Girls' Grammar towards the end of Term Two. For many of the boys it was a new experience having a young lady in the house and special thanks must go to the many families who billeted the girls over the one and a half week period.

This year we created history with the first CCGS, MLC and MGG combined concert. The night included such pieces as Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No 3 in G and Grieg's Piano Concerto, with the climax of the evening being excerpts from Vivaldi's Gloria for full choir and orchestra. The wind-up social for the three schools can not be forgotten. The relaxed atmosphere of the evening gave students a chance to socialise and some even took the opportunity to dance! The climax of the night was the musical offering of the joint eighty member jazz band which literally (well almost) lifted the roof!

Term Three began with hectic rehearsals as preparations began for the Concerto Night. This would prove to be a most difficult task as musicians in the orchestra had to adapt to the role of accompanists, unselfishly supporting the soloists.

The night provided the opportunity to showcase the immense talent of Christ Church musicians. Boyce's *Symphony No 1 in Bb Opus 2*, conducted by Sek Loong Tan (a Year Eight boy!), began the musical feast. Solos from Jason North (Senaille's *Andante and Allegro Spiritoso arranged for Euphonium and String*

Quartet), Tony Ma (Monn's Concerto for Cello and Strings in G Minor), Alex Chen (Chopin's Barcarolle) and David Thompson (Stevie-Ray Vaughan's Riviera Paradise) followed, with each performance having its own individual flair. Other significant efforts included Corelli's Christmas Concerto (soloists Simon Chan and Wesley Brandli), Bach's Double Violin Concerto (soloists Reuben Samuel and Darrell Jackson) and the same composer's Double Piano Concerto in C in which the two Year Nine soloists (Paul Chia and Ping Hsu) played with a distinguished assurance beyond their years.

However, undisputed highlight of the night was Aiden Jackson's performance of Gershwin's *Rhapsody in Blue for Piano and Orchestra*. Aiden's dedication and insight provided a masterful presentation of this complex work. The music was passionate, providing an emotionally charged finale to a successful concert.

There is no doubt the success of the 1997 musical programme is due to the efforts and support of all music staff and students. Special thanks must go to our director, Mr Roy Rimmer, and to Mr John Bates, Mrs Elizabeth Greenwood and our librarian Ms Carmelia MacWilliam, who are the core of Music at Christ Church. It is through their hard work and dedication that Music is so enjoyable, exciting and a resounding success at the School.


For me it was an exciting and rewarding year that I will always remember, made so much easier by the constant support of Andy and Christy and the generosity of the Madin family.

In 1997 the coaches and athletes at Christ Church faced the challenge of rebuilding a competitive spirit and moulding together a close knit team, one that would proudly represent the school come Inters day. The challenge began midway through Term One when Houses began thinking about their selections for the House Athletics Carnival. The early signs were quite promising with a number of Year Eight boys showing considerable talent in the trials and a good number of senior athletes demonstrating an enthusiastic commitment in early training sessions.

The House Carnival, held in perfect conditions at Perry Lakes stadium on the last Wednesday of Term One, produced many fine performances. The Under 14 age group saw Andrew Pullinger win the 100m and 200m sprints, Tom Abrecht win the hurdles and 400m, David

Graieg's convincing wins in the 800m and 1500m and Alex Prince win the high jump with a clearance of 1.62m. In the Under 15 age group, Stuart Ackland completed the trifecta in the jumps, winning the high, long and triple jumps. The Under 16 age group saw Luke McPharlin excel in the 100m, 200m and hurdles (winning all three), backed up by his Moyes House team mate, Cameron Webb, who won the 800m and 1500m. This year's Vice-Captain of Athletics, Richard Howard, again won the 100m, 200m and discus events and Alistair Murchison, the State's Under-Age Triathlon Champion, showed his talents in the Under 17 age group 1500m race. In the Open section, Ben O'Brien won the 100m and 200m events with Robbie Venn close on his heels. Dave McPharlin once again dominated the distance events and this year's Captain of Athletics, Matthew Gabriele,

demonstrated his hurdling prowess, winning his event comfortably. The day, which was won by Moyes House for the first time, gave a very good indication of the range of athletic abilities and enabled Mr Bayly to select a comprehensive training squad ready for Term Two.

A sprinkling of athletes took advantage of the school holiday training programme held during the second week of the holidays, but the bulk of the squad took to the track on the first day of the second term. The spirit displayed in training was encouraging and it was with this spirit that a squad of one hundred and thirty athletes arrived at Hale School for the first competition of the season. Unfortunately, the weather curtailed the high and triple jump events, but nevertheless, several athletes performed creditably against athletes from Scotch, Wesley and Hale. They were Andrew Bransgrove, Stephen Chan, Guy Greer and Rob Olivier in the Under 14s; Angus Malcolm, Tristan Guest, Aaron Taylor and Matt Neil in the Under 15s; Luke Somerville-Brown, Chris Webster and Tim Kendall in the Under 16s; Greg Lloyd, James Dunn and Ashley Ward in the Under 17s; Heath Bentley, Chris Bingemann and David Hoppe in the Open section. The Hale meet enabled all athletes to rate themselves against other team mates and provided good preparation for competition.


The selection meet for all CCGS athletes was conducted the next Saturday at McGillivray Oval. The Challenge meet is used to select the team for the Quads on the following Saturday and gives athletes the opportunity to perfect their skills. Athletes who shone through at this meet were Tom Ching, Jack Lee-Steere, Rob Dempster, Jonathan Henderson, Michael Molinari, Andrew Prosin, Nick Calkin and Anthony Webb.

The selected Quads team was a courageous one, but could manage only 1711 points to come third behind a strong Scotch team with 2433 points. Despite this loss there were several gutsy performances, the most notable being Justin Lane's run in the Open 400m and Russell Cooke's determined effort in the 3000m. Other good performances on the day came from Campbell Paterson in the Under 14 discus, Bodi Ledwij in the Under 16 high jump and James Whittle in the Under 17 1500m.

Preparation for the Inters took place with several top athletes still unsure of whether

or not they would be fit for the day. As a consequence, several athletes were placed on standby and many relay squads were unable to finalise their running order. Nevertheless, an enthusiastic team of nearly a hundred athletes boarded the buses for their chance to perform at the PSA Inters Athletics Carnival.

Overall we were clearly outclassed on the day and came a disappointing sixth. It was, however, a memorable day with many highlights, one of which was Alistair Murchison's outstanding run in the Open 3000m which he won in the time of 9:22:6. He was ably supported by Marcus Drew who gained first place in Division 2 of the same race. Other great efforts came from Matt Milner who crawled over the line to gain third place in the Division 2 Under 14 hurdles race and Stephen Chan who blitzed the field to win the 800m in the Under 14 Division 2 race. David Graieg stamped




Pradyot Saklami storms home at the Quads.




narrowest of margins. The third relay was at Aquinas, and we had eight of our top fifteen runners out. Thus the second position was expected.






The first game was against Scotch. As the boys were not yet used to playing together, it turned out to be an individual rather than a team game, with spurts of brilliance from different players.





Later on in the week was a meet and sausage sizzle with St Hilda's. This gave the team a chance to have a good time and also build up some confidence by winning many of the races.

The second most important event on the swimming calendar, the Quadrangular,

contested by CCGS, Scotch, Trinity and Wesley, was held the next week. Christ Church had taken the John Ryan Shield home for the past eleven years, but a new force had emerged and everyone expected a showdown between Scotch and Christ Church. However, the expected battle turned out to be just a myth and once again the John Ryan Shield was returned to its home. The final scores were: Christ Church - 1271; Scotch - 1132; Trinity - 1082; Wesley - 701.

Unfortunately, we ran out of events, but finished only 35 points behind the victorious Guildford team.

Our sincere thanks go to the age group managers: Mr Moncur, Ms Bishop, Ms Kingshot, Mr Saggers, and, of course, our administrator, Dr Mackay, as well as to all the assistant coaches: James Hodgkinson, James Scovell, Nat Benjanuvatra, Jono Van Hazel, Matt Tilbrook, Richard Monahan, Matt Keys and Ed Smith, for all their help throughout the season. A special thanks goes to Mr and Mrs Meade who

opened their house for the end-of-season swimming party. Our final thanks must go to super-coach Mr Shane McGurk whose many inspirational words of wisdom such as "the colder the better" have guided us through the season.




The players would like to thank Mr McDonald for the time and effort he put into coaching us. We had a thoroughly enjoyable season, although it would have been nice to play a few more matches.

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HEADMASTER'S REPORT

Preparatory School

Headmaster, Mr Jeremy Madin; Chaplain, Canon Frank Sheehan; Deputy Head of the Preparatory School, Mrs Jenny Vincent; family, friends and most especially, students of the Preparatory School.

It is with much pleasure that I welcome you to our annual Speech Day and Prize Giving.

At this time each year as we draw towards Christmas and holidays there are many events, activities and tasks to contend with and one of mine is to write and present a Speech Day Report. Through Newsletters, Chronicle, Mitre and weekly Friday assembly reports from the boys, the activities of the school are quite well publicised so they will not form the basis of my talk.

My first step in preparing a Speech Day Report is to re-read my previous year's Report, and sometimes to my dismay, like this year, discover that much of what I am thinking is in print form before me. Does this mean that I have not moved in my thinking in the past twelve months, that nothing reportable has occurred in education and this school in that period that could become a theme?

Not so.

1997 has been a significant year for change for education in this state. We have a new Education Act, linked to a mandated Curriculum Framework document from the West Australian Government and a compulsory Civics Education programme entitled Discovering Democracy and National Testing for measurement and

comparison with Benchmarks in literacy and numeracy from the Federal Government. These events impact considerably on all schools and we are not exempt.

We draw funds from both State and Federal Governments that subsidise your fees and in return we must answer to both governments on how we expend that money. This school must meet various legislated requirements of Federal and State Parliaments that seek to control programmes, objectives and outcomes in return for funding.

Each year I suspect, we lose a little more of our autonomy and independence as failure to comply with Government legislation can lead to loss of funding.

Dr Kemp, the Federal Minister for Education, has over the past few months, given much publicity to the results of a survey conducted in 1996 that indicate that a considerable percentage of Australian schoolchildren is unable to demonstrate acceptable levels of literacy.

In his reports he states:

"It is essential that Australian schools take up the challenge and set in place strategies that will ensure that every child develops sound literacy skills. This challenge must be met for the sake of our children and Australia's future."

Was there ever a time when this did not happen?

There is no doubt in my mind, and there never has been, that the prime concerns of educators, particularly Primary School teachers, are precisely those two topics. There has been much political noise made about these two issues this year, and obfuscation seems to have been one of the main outcomes as various factions within this country promote and support their own objectives.

I do not believe that the findings of the National Literacy Survey would surprise educators. We have, and always will, know that there are children in our schools whose literacy levels are of concern. One of the important things we do is work to try and improve them rather than spend time and money measuring them.

There has been worldwide research that shows congruency of findings about literacy that identify the poor, ethnic minorities, single parent families and others as being in high risk categories. This is before we look at individual problems and differences.

One could put forward arguments about the value of survey results on literacy when there is not a clear and universally accepted definition of what literacy is or whether it is the same to and for all people, so that any attempt to measure it is fraught with difficulty.

My experience tells me that this community of children is doing quite well, possibly very well in the literacy and numeracy stakes. It has most of the positive factors identified for effective learning in its favour, but there is always room for improvement.

I am sure that every teacher could bring about improved standards of literacy and numeracy in their students if they were to focus exclusively on those two areas, but not a year passes without schools being asked, expected or directed to take on new areas of responsibility ranging from drug education to various safety issues.

Accountability, which is basically about explanation, calculation, reporting and measurement, seems to be foremost in the minds of government officers and parliamentarians responsible for the education of Australian youth. Once we get into the measurement regime there is an absolute minefield to be confronted.

We have, in most schools, moved from the days of publishing in reports a student's mark, the class average mark and the students numerical ranking in that group. Too often such information is used for negative purposes. At this school we are committed to the process of recording the developmental progress of each child rather than the recording of his position relative to other members of his class and age peers in the school, the state and the nation.

Each week, each day as I move about this school, I see ample evidence of the learnings of our students. Every Friday and on many other occasions we see boys, joining with others to demonstrate aspects of their learning. Our task is to ensure that such opportunities exist and to establish a culture where each lad feels comfortable to participate in his own way.

A few weeks ago many of us came together here in the Chapel to share and enjoy with the boys an evening of music

at a Prep School Concert. Although I would not be so presumptious to claim that what we saw and heard was solely the product of this school, we can be assured it was the product of the boys who presented it and that this school and their families are partners in the process that brings children to this stage.

Two weeks ago a Year Seven Class from Christ Church Grammar joined forces with a class of girls from MLC and they created an orchestra which played to a very receptive Friday Morning Assembly. One of the important factors about this group is that of the combined group of fifty five children everyone participated and their talents, large and small, came together to produce a lively and much appreciated musical performance.

The week before last all the boys of Year seven were involved through their class teacher, their dance teacher, their music teacher and their art teacher in a programme staged at Subiaco Theatre Gardens entitled AWESOME.

Many schools came together and participated in this Festival, some with selected performing groups of dancers and musicians, but the most telling part of the presentation by the Year Seven boys from Christ Church Grammar Preparatory School was the fact that all eighty six of them had a role to play and a talent to display and demonstrate.

It is my belief that the integrated programmes that my teachers produce here are of immense value as they place learning into a meaningful and understandable context. Some of the participants can read write, spell and speak better than others but we are here

to develop the skills of all in a pragmatic way so that without prescribing specific outcomes all boys are involved in functional literacy programmes and through the sharing of goals they support and aid the development of each other.

I am very pleased by the contributions of all students, and pay particular tribute to the boys of Year Seven who have led their school mates this year. I am neither naive nor blind and recognize that some have much progress to make in their quest to achieve that goal that I hold for all of them which is that they may go safely into the world, secure in the knowledge that they shall be recognized and valued for what they can do, and not denigrated or made to feel unworthy because of what they cannot yet do.

The diversity of nature, background, ability and origin of the students at

Christ Church Grammar School makes it a wonderful, vibrant, exciting and reactive environment in which to work. I congratulate all the boys for their efforts and progress this year and thank my teachers and staff for their untiring efforts in moving the boys from where they are at to the next stage. I thank you also as parents for the trust you place in us to carry out such an important, challenging and exhausting task.

The holiday period is upon us, or some of us, and the rest and recuperation opportunity that is offered is well deserved and essential so that renewal may take place and we may continue next year.

To the boys of Year Seven who are leaving the support and comfort of the Preparatory School, I thank you for your contributions, some for seven years, some for three years and some for one year. Don't ever forget or be slow to acknowledge the time and efforts of your teachers, as at this school it is not just a job, it is a calling. You may think that they have forgotten you as you move on through secondary and tertiary education and into the workforce, but we never forget someone who has been part of our class, our school, and our lives.

I thank you all for your attendance here today in support of what we stand for and what we do, and pass to you my best wishes for the Christmas Season and the vacation.


Awards. Stuart Nicholls "Porcupine" and Jonathon Wyber's "Helicopter" were selected by the judges for display in the Top 50.




