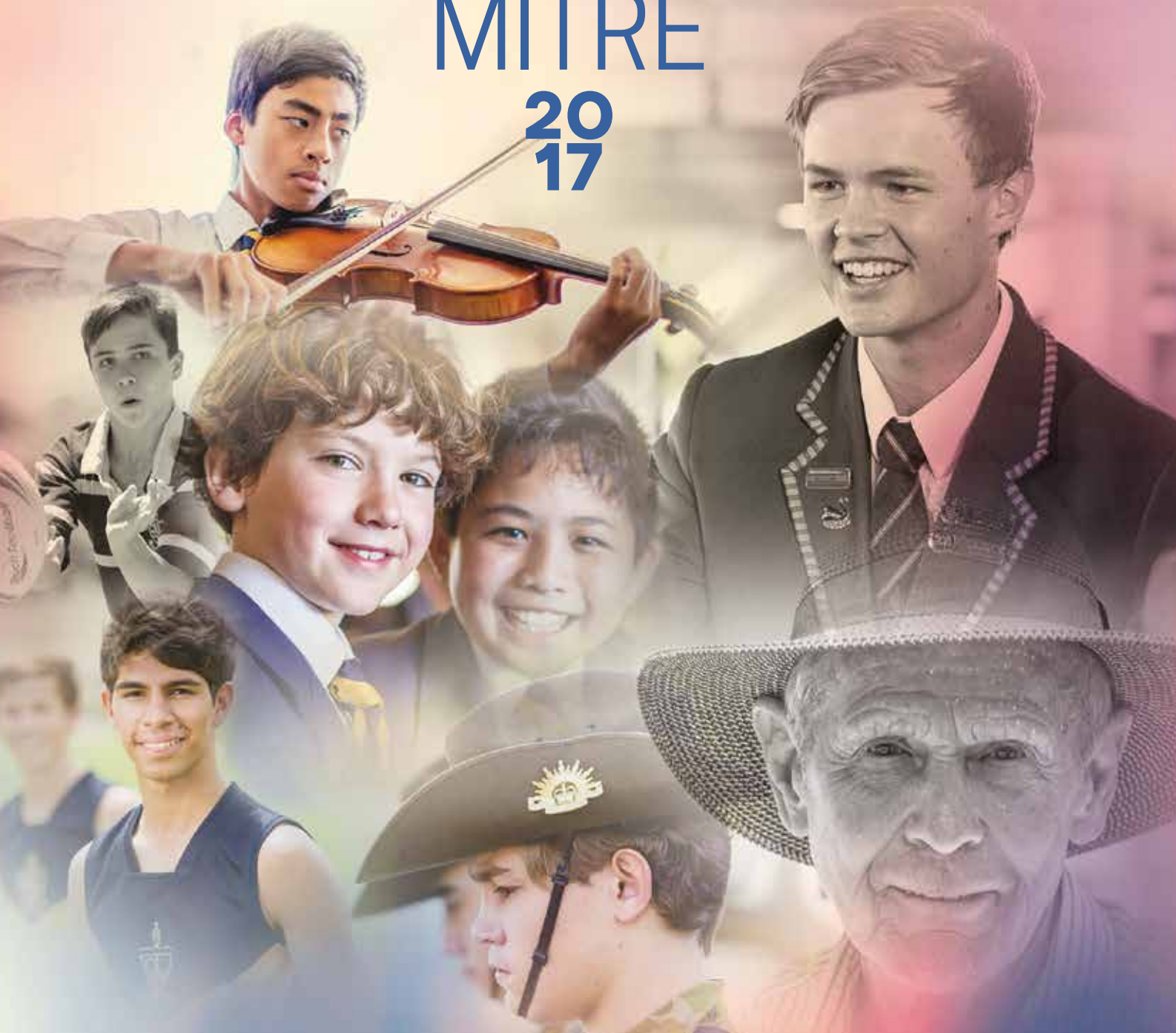

THE YEAR IN REVIEW



Principal



As I reflect on the past year, I am reminded of the wonderful events and moments we have shared as a community. The year has been one of challenge and change, and I am continually encouraged to see our community come together to support each other.

We started 2017 recording ATAR results, a culmination of the efforts of our hard-working students, extraordinary teachers, and supportive parents and family members. These outstanding results were particularly significant as we are a non-selective school, valuing inclusivity and diversity, and embracing boys of all abilities.

The St John's Wood Playing Fields were officially opened in May, after what had been a long evolution since the School purchased the land in 1999. The 8.63 hectares of spacious, green playing fields is a striking contrast to the former rubbish tip site located between HBF Stadium and St John's Wood residential estate. We thank the School Council of the time for its vision in purchasing the land, as the fields are not only a wonderful venue for sport but also a location to bring our community together.

2017 was a special year for the Midnite Youth Theatre Company, celebrating 30 years of joyous experiences for young

people. Established in 1987, Midnite has performed over 200 productions and held 12 international tours. I enjoyed watching each of the performances this year, and I know I share the sentiment of so many in the Christ Church community who value and treasure Midnite's continued commitment to exploring dramatic arts beyond the limits of school drama.

This year we also celebrated the centenary of the Old Boys' Association (OBA). There were a number of events organised to celebrate the association's history and achievements, culminating in a chapel service and dinner in July. The OBA also gifted the School a war memorial, situated outside the Collaborative Learning Centre. The memorial is a wonderful example of the connection and relationship between the Old Boys and the School, which we value highly.

An exciting initiative launched this year was the Making of Men program, which will commence in 2018 for all Year 9 boys. The rite of passage program will run the course of a year and include a three week on-campus residential component, known as On Queenslea Drive (OQD). OQD explores three key elements – identity, relationships and purpose. The program will better prepare our boys for the changing nature of their world, develop grit and challenge their thinking.

We also progressed on our journey for accreditation with the Council of International Schools (CIS) and in August, the School welcomed two evaluators who confirmed we were ready to take the next step. The self-study stage has commenced and will continue into 2018. This is a deliberate and planned shift for the School, and the rigorous evaluation against internationally-agreed standards will significantly benefit the boys, staff and Christ Church community.

The School initiated its largest construction project to date with the commencement of the Preparatory School build. This will consolidate all Preparatory School classrooms under one roof, and with the addition of Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten classes (2019), will provide a unique form of engagement specifically designed for boys. The project is progressing well and is on target to be completed towards the end of 2018.

We finish the 2017 school year with the best PSA results since 1957. With five championship titles – cricket, cross country, hockey, swimming and tennis – it has been an exceptional year. In addition, the School finished in the top three in rowing, soccer, surfing and water polo. This is a wonderful reflection on our staff and all the boys who competed this year. Well done!

Lastly, I would like to thank the team behind all that happens at the School – the staff. They are dedicated, talented and have done a phenomenal job this year. I am extremely proud to be part of the Christ Church community and look forward to another outstanding year in 2018.

The staff commitment and leadership to the pastoral care of boys is immense. This year we welcomed Ms Claudia Feldman to the pastoral team as Head of Craigie, having previously served as Assistant Head of Noake from 2012. As another year ends, we say thank you to all staff for their caring and exemplary leadership of their tutees for the past year. They have done a great deal to shape the lives of many Christ Church boys.

Academic Results

Towards the end of 2017, the Year 12 group proudly declared itself the GOAThort – the Greatest of All Time cohort, based on its collective sporting achievements, namely five PSA titles.

The title gained further credibility once the ATAR results were released in mid-December. With a median of 92 and numerous awards ranging from six General Exhibitions to a slew of Certificates of Merit and Distinction, the boys could certainly lay claim to an extremely fine academic performance. Of particular note was the Subject Exhibition for Mathematics: Applications, awarded to Thomas Williams for the top mark in the State in the subject.

A number of subjects were recognised as Course leaders, reflecting teachers' consistent efforts to uphold our standard of excellence. General Pathway students almost all achieved their WACE and the requisite certificate courses and are now set for further study or employment. Four boys from the Peter Moyes Centre (PMC) also completed Year 12, with a variety of qualifications and interests. Their moving speeches at the PMC Leavers' Dinner made it clear that they viewed their time at CCGS as worthwhile and productive, and they had clearly laid strong foundations for life beyond school.

2017 also saw the introduction of Nexus, the School's new learning management system, which will continue to develop and mature; it is commendable that this new focus did not detract from the excellence of teaching and learning. The cohort of 2017 will inspire the Year 12s of 2018 and we wish all of the recent graduates well in the next phase of their lives.

In 2017, Christ Church Grammar School had 165 students who achieved an ATAR and 22 who followed a General Pathway. An additional four students successfully completed their Year 12 education in the Peter Moyes Centre.

- 17 students (10% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 99
- 28 students (17% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 98



- 61 students (37% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 95
- 97 students (59% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 90
- Average ATAR for the year group: 88.36
- Median ATAR for the year group: 92 (State Median 81.40)
- 131 students (79% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR that would give them entry to UWA (greater than or equal to 80)
- 15 students obtained A grades in a General course
- CCGS was placed in the group of top schools in 18 courses (courses with fewer than 10 students are not included): Accounting and Finance, Chemistry, Computer Science, Design, Economics, Engineering Studies, English as an Additional Language or Dialect, Geography, Human Biology, Mathematics Applications, Mathematics Methods, Mathematics Specialist, Modern History, Philosophy and Ethics, Physical Education Studies, Physics, Politics and Law, and Psychology.

WACE achievement

98.40% of students achieved their WACE by achieving the required average of seven C grades or unit equivalence over Years 11 and 12, along with literacy and numeracy proficiency (OLNA) and an ATAR or Certificate II or higher.

HINTS ON PLAYING FOOTBALL.

A large number of players of this game are already proficient, but a few hints would no doubt improve the general standard. They apply more particularly to those occasions when the player has been chosen to represent his School.

1. Be careful to appear in a jersey of different colour from that of the rest of your team. This will cause your opponents to become confused.
2. See to it that half of the springs are missing from your boots. You will the more easily slip past the opposing players.
3. Roll your socks well down. It improves the appearance.
4. Arrive on the battlefield several minutes late. You will then be the freshest man on the ground.
5. If you are told to play at left half-back, take up your position at right half-forward. There will then be two of your side to one of theirs in this position, thus creating a substantial advantage.
6. However, when you do desire, you may wonder to any part of the field, and by so doing cause the play to become congested, thus preventing your opponents from scoring.
7. If you see the ball descending overhead, do not attempt to mark it, but lightly step aside and leave it for your opponents. This is only polite.
8. When you have a free kick ten yards from the goal mouth, do not have a shot. Kick it to a team-mate on the wing; he will then be able to gain glory by a gallant attempt at an angle shot.
9. When you get the ball, trot slowly along with it, preferably across the field or in the direction in which your opponents are kicking. A bounce every two yards will relieve the monotony. At least you have the ball, which is more than anyone else can say.
10. When grabbed by an opponent, do not on any account kick or punch the ball. Drop it gently in front of you, or, if this manoeuvre meets with no success, fall over and lie on it.
11. When tackling an opponent, grab him round the neck or legs with both hands and hang on. He will be much disconcerted.
12. Soccer the ball as much as possible. This will seem cause opponents to remove themselves from your path.
13. If you should happen to desire to kick the ball, then the

At last her front gate was reached. A session of mine was said, "in my day we didn't bang over the front gate crying good night." For once I wanted to be old-fashioned but it was no good. She said in a sweet tone, "Haven't you forgotten something?"

Home at last. I climb into bed, weary from the stress of a night's dancing. I think to myself as I nestle between the sheets, "Never, never again."

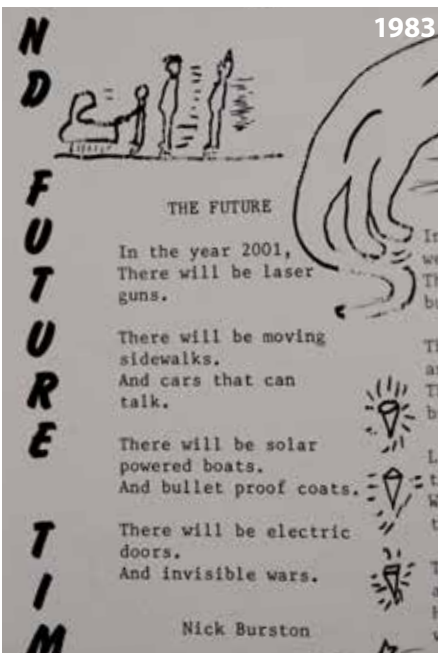
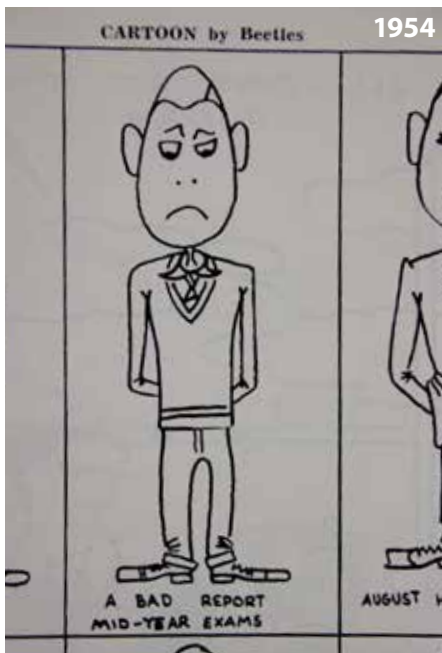

The 2017 Art Tour was an electrifying experience. The boys were consistently immersed and dazed by the tangible energy and positive atmosphere of phenomenal New York City.

RoboCup - Japan

RoboCup, this year held in Nagoya, Japan, is a global competition divided into three key sections – the soccer league, the home appliance division and the robot rescue league, in which we competed.

We had to use rapid prototyping techniques, such as 3D printing and laser cutting, to build a remote-controlled robot. Through a camera, the robot then had to be navigated across rough terrain in a simulated rescue situation, controlled by the driver (Tristan Chandraratna) who sat facing away from the course.

After a sightseeing day, teams arrived from across the globe to compete. They included Brazil, Mexico, America, China and Japan, along with another Australian team. They all had a wide range of designs, ranging from a Brazilian spider bot to an American and Australian flip-able speed bot.

The first part of the competition was the qualifying rounds, in which each team had to prove they could cross at least one terrain. All teams passed easily, bar the Brazilians. Our earlier decision to add another camera to the spare robot ended badly when we overheated our two spare control boards, but we were comfortable in passing the qualifiers.

The next day was the preliminaries and we started off well, scoring highly on the easier terrains. However, a sudden camera malfunction saw us missing out on several rounds of competition, leaving us low on the scoreboard. With only one round left to go, we had to beat the top score for one of the roughest terrains to get into the finals. Fortunately, we were able to finish two runs in the dying seconds to take the top spot.

We started the finals convincingly, doing well on some of the rougher tracks on which the faster robots had trouble. Unfortunately, our lower score multiplier hurt us badly, and when the Thai major league robot caught fire and billowed out toxic smoke, we had to evacuate the building. The organisers cancelled the last few rounds and this eliminated our chance to catch up to third. So we ended up finishing in fourth place.

Thank you to Mr Nolan who accompanied us on this trip. We look forward to the 2018 RoboCup, to be held in Montreal, Canada.

Service in Action

CAMBODIA

Scott Neeson's Cambodian Children's Fund (CCF) is truly remarkable in its ongoing commitment to the Cambodian community, from offering leadership opportunities to students, to its outreach programs that help rebuild a culture ravaged by the Pol Pot regime. This trip impressed on me the invaluable role youth can play in making a difference.

In December, 2016 12 CCGS boys, 12 St Mary's girls and eight teachers left Perth to immerse ourselves in a 10-day experience. Our mornings started at around 7.00am, always eager for the challenges that awaited us. The satellite school where we worked was called Toul Ampil and was on the edge of a rubbish dump. It was known as the goat school owing to the numerous goats roaming near its entrance.

My first memory is of the nursery where the children, no older than three or four, were bouncing off the walls and climbing all over us. Instead of collecting rubbish scraps, they were dropped off by their parents to be washed, fed and cared for day and night. School was a sanctuary for these children, away from an unpredictable and unstable world. Lessons in the classrooms consisted of mainly Mathematics, English and occasionally Science. A language barrier existed; at first it was challenging but over time we adapted by using our conversation booklet.

We had many cultural experiences, helping us to reflect and bond, such as the visit to a Buddhist temple and hour-long meditation session, taking a tour of the Royal Palace and finding bargains at the many Russian markets. We were also fortunate to dine at restaurants such as Friends, a not-for-profit organisation, and the Black Bamboo, a CCF-run restaurant.



Culturally, we learnt a traditional Cambodian dance, the coconut dance, and performed it at our goodbye concert. In the evenings, after a hard day's work, Father Pengelly would gather us for a reflection on the day's events.

A confronting experience was our visit to the Killing Fields and camps where the Pol Pot regime imprisoned three million Cambodians. Many were forced to admit to crimes they did not commit. It was a reminder of Cambodia's dark and horrifying past. We further understood why CCF values the Granny program, which cares for the elderly who then pass on their valuable cultural knowledge to CCF children.

TOMS Shoes is a program that works on the principle that every pair of its shoes purchased in a developed country, such as Australia, provides a pair of shoes for a disadvantaged child in a less developed country like Cambodia. We distributed 1500 pairs of shoes, which help protect the children's feet while walking.

The CCF Food Program fed the more seriously malnourished children. It was common to see older sisters and brothers feeding their younger siblings before themselves. This was a true reflection of their nature, their unconditional love for family and sharing what little they had.

Service in Action Cambodia put our lives into perspective and made me grateful for and appreciative of our CCGS education.

World Challenge - Nepal

EVEREST BASE CAMP EXPEDITION

After arriving in Nepal via Singapore, our guest house exceeded all expectations and we couldn't wait to explore the surrounding town of Thamel. The boys were immersed in a street culture so dissimilar to that of Perth, with narrow winding lanes consisting of small street shops and hawkers selling confectionery and SIM cards.

The next adventure came quickly as the following day we flew from Kathmandu to Tenzing-Hillary Airport, Lukla, necessary to access the trek to Mount Everest. The scenery was breathtaking, however, landing on the runway's 100m inclined slope was nerve-racking.

The first few days of trekking involved some moderate uphill walking with the aid of four cows that carried our main backpacks. We were also fortunate to have the expertise of three sherpas and our walking leader Ganjin, who had summited Everest three times. At an altitude of 2860m, we noticed a significant drop in temperature and at this point began taking our medication to combat the effects of altitude sickness. While in the lower valley, we stayed in teahouses, maintaining a vegetarian diet

due to the lack of refrigeration, as well as a high carbohydrate diet for energy replacement.

It wasn't until Namche Bazaar, at an altitude of 3200m, that we reached the cloud line and started to get a glimpse of the white-capped peaks of the Himalayas. We experienced tougher days on the steeper inclines and some boys started to develop headaches and drowsiness from the lower oxygen density. At 4800m, the tree line halted and we began to walk along barren rock and dirt paths. The natural environment now added a greater level of difficulty to our trek with temperatures that froze water, and sun and wind that burnt exposed skin in minutes. For a daily trek we needed four layers of clothing plus a beanie and face mask. These would then be slowly removed as the effort of the climb progressed. At Namche Bazaar we met a group returning down from Base Camp who had experienced minus 30-degree temperatures. Yet the ground was dry after months without rain, and dust was a constant problem.

After nine days of walking we reached Gorakhshep, the final village before Base Camp, where we rested before making our final ascent. This was our most difficult stretch of the walk and we

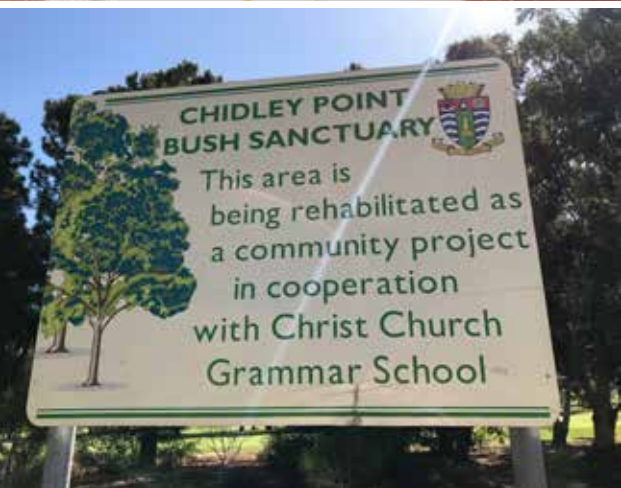
witnessed several huge avalanches on Mount Everest's neighbouring mountain, Lhotse. Arriving at Base Camp instilled a great sense of achievement and joy in the group. It appeared to just be a cluster of rock and ice, resting on the ever-moving Khumbu Glacier. As yet, no groups had made camp, as the climbing season hadn't started. The attraction of Everest to adventurers from all over the world was driven home on seeing the cemetery on the plateau below the camp and a monument built in a small village to honour the memory of lost climbers.

Mount Kalapathar stands at 5500m and was the highest point we would climb. Some members of the group succumbed to altitude sickness so unfortunately only half the group made it. The summit offered an amazing view of Everest as well as a 360-degree view of snowcapped peaks towering over the Khumbu Glacier. It also left us exposed to the full force of the wind and at times, the group had to shelter in rock crevices to maintain safety and warmth. The group then made good time on the descent, shaving off two days. We then returned to Kathmandu for a long-awaited and well-earned hot shower and fresh food.

Cadets: Army

Christ Church Grammar School Cadet Unit (CCGSCU) kicked off the year strongly, with the senior leadership team performing well in the Cadet Under Officer (CUO) and Warrant Officer Class 2 (WO2) courses.

We then organised the company structure for 2017, appointing Platoon roles as well as Company Headquarters roles. This saw the appointment of CUOs Narendra Gammanpilla, Thomas Hage and Ryan Zare as Platoon Commanders of 1, 2 and 3 Platoons respectively, with their appointed Platoon Sergeants being SGT Max Goldie, Andrew Lawrance and Jia-Wei Loh. The Company Headquarters group comprised Company Quartermaster (CQMS) SGT Adam Di Tullio, the Company Sergeant Major (CSM) WO2 Luke Wheatland and myself as the Adjutant (ADJT).

We then commenced the training year, integrating the new Year 10 cadets. They undertook the Recruit Induction Course at Northam Army Camp where they learnt new skills in fieldcraft, first aid, communications and drill. The remainder of the Term 1 focused on reinforcing these skills, with a focus on drill, to familiarise the cadets with the large array of commands and movements.

Term 2 commenced with building towards the Field Exercise, historically the most gruelling camp of the training year. Once again, there was a focus on fieldcraft and navigation. However, boys still found the time to participate in charity events such as the Len Hall Tribute Game and the Bankwest Gallipoli Run. A highlight was the Anzac Parade through Perth city.

Due to a fortunate change of circumstances, the Term 2 camp to Bindoon Training Area (BTA) saw the boys participate in an Army exercise. Our cadets provided role players for a 13 Brigade Exercise. The boys conducted a navigation exercise as platoons, before engaging in a tactical scenario to infiltrate 'a village' at night without being seen.

Year 11 cadets attended the Senior Leaders Course in July, held at Leeuwin Barracks in Fremantle. Boys learnt management and leadership skills to qualify them for the rank of Sergeant. Historically, CCGSCU has performed outstandingly in this course and this year was no exception with all boys passing. CDTCPL Thomas McQuillan was Dux and was also awarded best coursemanship. Old boy Sam Elias ('16) finished off his term as Regional Cadet Under Officer of Western Australia.

Term 3 began with high morale as boys prepared for the most significant event of the year, the WAAAC BDE Annual Field Exercise (AFX). Once again, the focus was on navigation and fieldcraft, these skills having been reinforced in the term's field exercise. Cadets participated in a 17km navigation course across BTA. Thankfully the gruelling camp ended with soft drinks, chocolates and a movie! For the remainder of the term, the boys prepared for the AFX. A bullring was conducted, which saw boys honing their first aid skills, their drill and their shooting at the Weapons Training Simulation System (WTSS) system at Irwin Barracks.

At Brigade AFX the unit was divided into groups, with the Year 10 cadets attending Tier 2 courses including catering, adventure training, roping and survival. The Year 11s attended Tier 3, a six-day tactical scenario, emulating infantry operations, and the Year 12s assumed instructional and operational roles within the different tiers. Some Year 10s attended the Brigade Junior Leaders Course, which qualifies them for the rank of CDTCPL or CDTLCPL. Again, CCGSCU performed strongly with CDT Edward Elias being awarded Dux. The final competition day saw CCGSCU placing first in five of the six competitions, an outstanding result.

The final day of the training year was the busiest, beginning with a physical training session headed by army physical training Instructors and attended by the Commander of the Australian Army Cadets, Brigadier Michael Ashleigh. That afternoon, the boys conducted their march-out parade, their honed dress and drill skills on display. The Principal's Parade, hosted Mr Alan Jones and with Brigadier Ashleigh as special guest, was attended by CCGS old boys from as far back as 1945. The day concluded with the Regimental Dining-In Night to farewell the Year 12s.

Cadets: Surf Life Saving

This year, the Christ Church Surf Life Saving Cadet program continued to flourish, with cadets gaining crisis response skills, both on land and in the water. Year 10 students underwent training and assessment for their Bronze Medallions while Year 11 and 12 students attained the Advanced Resuscitation Techniques (ART) qualification. All boys gained significant knowledge in radio communication, first aid, resuscitation, beach awareness and rescue procedures.

In Term 1, with the assistance of Year 11 and 12 Surf Cadet Leaders, Year 10 cadets were put through a gruelling but rewarding fitness program on top of learning patrol signals as well as board and tube rescues. Term 2 saw boys honing these skills further as well as learning surf patrol radio protocol and first aid, treating everything from dislocations to tropical jellyfish stings, as well as being able to provide water safety for public events. Finally, Term 3 allowed the boys to prepare for and complete their Bronze Medallion exams, revising all the skills built on over the year.

For the first time at Christ Church, Year 11 and 12 boys were able to complete the ART qualification, allowing them to assess oxygen tanks and perform more advanced resuscitations. These boys are now recognised as having the highest available resuscitation certification for patrol.

Unfortunately, even in this developed nation, many people are still not competent in life-saving first aid, with only five per cent attesting to having had first aid training. The Surf Life Saving Cadet program at Christ Church ensures that at least a third of our senior boys will have a qualification that can help them save lives. The boys would like to thank Ms Gould, Ms Fricke and Mr Hodnett, as well as Christ Church old boy instructors Aidan and Julian and their team. It is their dedication and expertise that has made the program possible year after year.

Chaplaincy and Centre for Ethics

It was another very positive year at the Chaplaincy and Centre for Ethics.

Ashlee Harrison spoke about *zero2hero*, the organisation she established as part of her commitment to the nurturing of better mental health in young people. ROC (Resilience Optimism Confidence) mindset specialist Claire Eaton gave lively and helpful classes promoting student wellbeing. The renowned poet and academic, Dennis Haskell, gave classes to Year 12 students on the poetry of Bruce Dawe.

The former Vice-Captain of the West Coast Eagles, Beau Waters, spoke about his involvement in Ride for Youth.

Abby Maldon visited classrooms to speak about the work of World Vision. The psychologist, author, broadcaster and academic, Andrew Fuller, spoke about Resilience Across the Life Span and Creating Resilient Families. We had a wonderful afternoon with elderly dementia patients who were led in reminiscence and song by members of AgeLink, with some of our Environment and Community (ENCOMM) cadets adding valuable support. This event, a creation of the actor Jenny Davis, was suitably called Magic Moments.

Members of the Gideon Society spoke about the Bible and distributed them to those Year 7 students who wished to receive them. We heard two splendid addresses from the Reverend Nick Russell. Nick will become the Chaplain in 2018.

The Pakistani poet, Zainab Syed, spoke to various English classes about her work of healing and the empowerment of women in prisons and refugee camps. The novelist, Amanda Betts, and performance

poet Jakub Dammer provided Ethical and Literary Insights. Mitch Productions led students in the formulation of Big Audacious Goals.

The Dean of Perth, The Very Reverend Richard Pengelley, came back to the School to accept gifts of foods for the homeless and to encourage us to care for those on the margins of society. He was accompanied by Paris Mitchell who spoke about the ways in which a person may reclaim his life after setbacks. Anglican priest and scientist, the Reverend Chris Mulherin spoke to the staff and then to students about the question 'Can Science and Religion be Friends?'. Chris is the founder and Director of the Institute for the Study of Christianity in an Age of Science and Technology (ISCAST), a network of people, from students to distinguished academics, exploring the interface of science, technology and the Christian faith.

Former editor of *The West Australian*, Paul Murray launched *Other Times: Life, Journalism and the Arts* by well-known journalist Ron Banks. There was a special service in the Chapel for the 100th anniversary of the Old Boys of the School. John Harriott spoke about the significance of the Sanctuary Cross and provided an exegesis of the passage in Ephesians, which inspired the sculptor of the work. Duncan MacLaurin, legendary English and Religious Education teacher, spoke about his approach to education.

Baptist Minister and former CEO of World Vision Australia Tim Costello gave classes on Global Perspectives and Inequality

and Poverty. In conjunction with Mr Liam Casson and the Wynne Centre for Boys' Health and Wellbeing, we showed the film *Screenagers*. In another collaboration, we hosted Maggie Dent who spoke about the Importance of Calmness, Silence and Stillness in the life of young people. Ross Ashton's book *Ochre: I Want to Paint* was launched. Proceeds from sales of the book go towards the funding of another Indigenous scholarship at Christ Church. The Ashton family already sponsor one of these scholarships.

Outdoor Education

Our relationship to the environment, self and each other has always been the guiding focus of the Koorungal Outdoor Education program.

In 2017 this was ever present, as we continued to provide CCGS boys with a unique and holistic education.

The year started with Year 5 Earthkeepers program. The Outdoor Education staff spent many hours transforming Koorungal into an Earthkeepers training centre. This hard work ensured that each Year 5 student met some very interesting characters and had a magical journey, earning their 'K' and 'E' keys and strengthening their relationships with the natural world along the way. After leaving Koorungal, the boys worked steadily for the rest of the year, finally gaining their 'Y' and 'S' keys and becoming fully-fledged Earthkeepers in Term 4.

Teamwork and building relationships is the focus for Year 7 and the many and varied activities included a journey on foot to an overnight campsite; cooking bolognaise on a Trangia stove; and sleeping in hoochies by the Murray River before canoeing back to Koorungal.

Orienteering, cooking scones and the abseiling activity at the conclusion of camp were highlights.

In Term 2 the Year 8 boys set sail for Shark Bay – a truly unique opportunity aboard the STS Leeuwin. Each student spent a week training and sailing in one of the world's most beautiful areas. The program is one of a kind and allows the boys to learn about and experience the many natural wonders and history of the area.

The nine-day Year 9 camps provide an opportunity for challenge and leadership, as well as preparation for Venture in Year 10. A rogaine of eight square-kilometres and 20 checkpoints followed an induction day, which included a ropes course and canoeing skills. Day 3 saw the boys off on a five-day expedition of walking and white-water canoeing. There were many spectacular spills in the canoeing section, especially from those who were paddling through the 'washing machine' and 'roller coaster'. In the final two days, boys were back at

Koorungal helping around the centre, including firewood collection, building and maintenance.

The last camp of the year involved Year 6 students. Many hours were spent at Scarp Pool building rafts and swimming. The overnight bushwalk and camp are often the first introduction for many to sleeping in tents. Boys participated in the Ribbons of Blue health study of the river while the task of building a bush shelter for the whole group proved to be a significant challenge for many.

Much has been achieved at Koorungal this year and credit must go to the dedicated members of the Outdoor Education team, including Mr Jay Freap, Miss Laura Burt and assistants Ms Kate Mullet and Mr Brett Jorgensen, who work long and hard to help students extend themselves in a challenging but safe environment.

eV Challenge

The Electric Vehicle (eV) Challenge is designed to test students' ability to plan and construct an electric powered car.

The Electric Vehicle (eV) Challenge is designed to test students' ability to plan and construct an electric powered car that fully utilises the potential of a 36 volt, 16amp hr battery pack. This year, 13 Year 11 students worked in three groups to modify and develop two existing chassis to produce one new car.

The design phase started early in Term 1. Groups brainstormed ideas for streamlined body shapes and chassis assembly, with the goal of creating a strong structure with minimal weight. Potential chassis configurations were all drawn on paper, with calculations of the required material also listed. Groups voted to choose the most suitable design that could be achieved within the limited working time of a Friday afternoon.

Students learnt skills such as welding aluminium, which is more difficult than conventional welding, as well as many other proficiencies involving teamwork. With a rush to finish the cars in the last week, groups worked tirelessly to produce top-performing vehicles.

The effort throughout the year paid off. On Saturday 4 November at Wundowie Go Kart track, Christ Church placed first, fourth and 10th in Class B, winning the best performing school entry. Our winning team demolished the eV Challenge record for the greatest distance covered in one hour by a staggering 4.5km. The experience of working in teams to build a working car was well worth it.

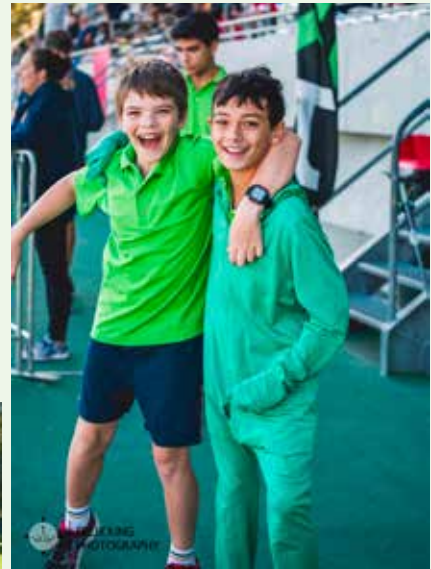
Jupp House has also taken measurable steps in support of initiatives around mental health. The implementation of the 'chill-out zone', along with Year 11

Centre for Excellence

Boys with high academic potential and achievement are catered for by the respective academic departments through classroom extension, enrichment and varied co-curricular offerings.

The Centre for Excellence runs two programs, which provide additional learning challenges and opportunities – the Enigma program and the da Vinci Decathlon.

The Enigma program runs throughout the year and involves 10 to 20 students of high academic potential in Years 7 to 9. The program provides a forum to pursue an area of passion, and enables collaboration with like-minded students of different ages while developing leadership and teamwork skills.

Teams of students across Years 7 to 9 worked together on high-level open-ended projects throughout the year. Year 9 students chose a problem to solve in an area of their interest and acted as group leaders, working to find an innovative solution. Several students in Years 10 to 12 were also involved as mentors.

Group projects covered a range of different topics:

- design and build a rescue robot
- design and build a water-saving shower
- design a novel generator using a fidget-spinner
- redesign the Year 7 to 9 PSD program to incorporate greater drug education
- reimagine the education system
- write an app to predict the likelihood of a bushfire and then direct residents to safety
- build a website to assist new businesses and prevent bankruptcy
- write an app to assist the police – capturing film and audio in emergency situations
- write an iBook guide to assist students and teachers who are using group work tasks.

Several Year 10 students also took part in the Senior Enigma program, which involved them undertaking a first-year, university-level Computer Science course.

The da Vinci Decathlon is a competition that sees teams of eight students competing across 10 different academic disciplines in one day. It is a frantic and exciting day of competition in which students need to complete several, highly challenging tasks at once while allocating their time accordingly. Our strongest performances were in the

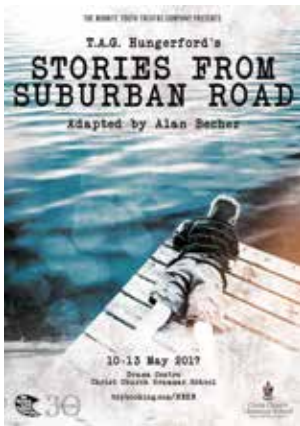

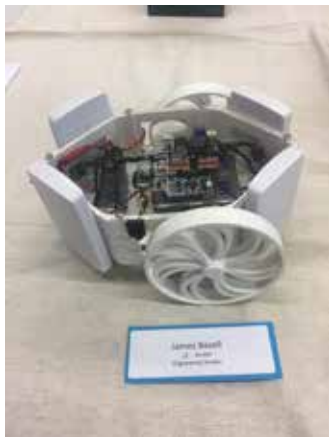
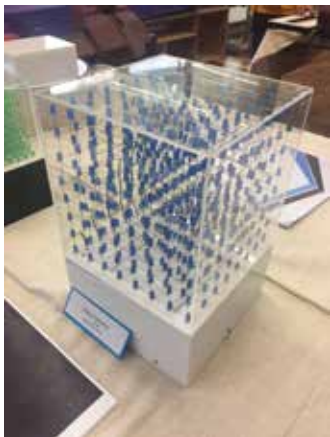
- Engineering:** Years 9 to 12. Students developed skills in rapid prototyping, using CNC machinery and programming in Arduino and Raspberry Pi.

From coding camps, trips to Sydney and lots of engaging projects in the classroom, there was plenty to interest everyone.

We were excited to give the boys the opportunity to try a number of new courses while enhancing our existing offerings with several new projects. The constant evolution of courses ensures the boys have the best opportunity to engage with computers in a way that interests them, learning valuable skills needed in the future. Courses on offer included Bioinformatics, Systems and Networking, and Advanced Software Development, in which our Year 10 boys designed and built complex apps for their iPads.

The Informatics program continued to be highly successful, with boys meeting three times a week to learn about new algorithms and to discuss solutions to problems from past competitions. Mr Jan Honnens worked tirelessly, introducing Year 7 boys to competitive programming on overnight camps, through to mentoring the senior boys on their Informatics journey.

Of course, it is the boys who ultimately compete and their extraordinary success in a range of competitions was testament to their dedication and hard work. Special mention must go to the following boys:

- Two CCGS teams made the UNSW ProgComp grand final in Sydney (Team 1: Caleb Cheng, Rohan Maloney and Albert Smith. Team 2: Ben Davison-Petch, Marcus Handley and Nicholas Patrikeos).
- Three boys were invited to participate in the Australian Informatics Olympiad School of Excellence in Canberra (Ben Davison-Petch, Marcus Handley and Albert Smith).
- CCGS teams placed first and second in the University of Melbourne's Code Masters competition.
- The team of Marcus Handley, Callum Koh and Albert Smith placed second in Australia as unofficial entrants in an international university programming contest.

Other notable achievements by our Humanities students included:

- David Lind – State winner of the Australian Economics Competition;

Each year, Humanities teachers organise a range of experiential learning opportunities that complement and enhance studies in the classroom. Examples have included Geography students exploring biomes at Perth Zoo, Investing and Enterprise students meeting and interacting with business leaders, and Economics students attending the PwC Federal Budget Breakfast to listen to political leaders.

Civics and Citizenship is a new subject mandated under the Western Australian

Humanities and Social Sciences Curriculum. As part of their studies into our legal system, Year 8 students took part in the Francis Burt Law Education Program, which enabled them to attend a court session.

In addition, Year 9 students visited the State Parliament, the Constitutional Centre and the Electoral Education Centre as part of their studies into political systems. and Rahamat Bin Baker. This year, the First team included five of our Indigenous students who all played exceptionally well. Unfortunately, Wesley College was too strong, winning the contest by six goals. Future star and Indigenous player Ian Hill, from Wesley, won the Best on Ground award.

We celebrated yet another successful NAIDOC Week at the start of Term 3. As always, the highlight was the art exhibition. Titled *Our Steps Forward*, this year the Indigenous boys transferred their artwork onto footballs and football boots. As always, there were special guests in attendance including Sharna Ninnette, from Australian Indigenous Mentoring Experience (AIME),

and Irwin Lewis Senior (1956), the first Indigenous student to attend Christ Church. It was great to see so many people enjoying the boys' work. This year, two pieces were sold at the CCGS football wind-up auction with half of the proceeds donated to Beyond Blue, focusing on Indigenous mental health. Languages

We had a positive start to the year in Languages as we reviewed our 2016 WACE data.

The median score for all four languages was exceptional. Thirty students graduated with a language at Year 12 level. James Blaxill was ranked 11th in the State for French and two students scored 100 per cent in their practical exams.

In February, we enjoyed celebrating Chinese New Year – the Year of the Rooster. We also had a visit from the restaurant La Crepe de Paris to celebrate Mardi Gras, a carnival held in some countries on Shrove Tuesday.

As in previous years, our Year 9 and 10 students participated in the Australian Computational Linguistics Olympiad (OzClo). Teams of four students worked online to solve a series of mathematical problems involving various languages, looking for patterns and trying to decode them. The University of Western Australia (UWA) was a great supporter and organised training and practice materials. 2017 was the first year that Christ Church also entered a senior team. For our debut at this level, our crack team of Year 11s made it to the nationals. Congratulations to Tristan Chandaratna, Rohan Maloney, Akio Ho and Alex Thornhill. We had four teams who made it to the Gold level, including our Year 11 team. Special mention goes to Jonathon Chew and Tristan Porter who managed to achieve a Gold medal even after two of their team members dropped out.

At the end of Term 1, Mrs Yang took a group of Christ Church boys and Methodist Ladies' College (MLC) girls on a tour to China.

In May, our boys competed hard in the Language Perfect World Championships. We were the top ranked PSA school in WA, pulling ahead of Wesley on the last day. In French alone, Christ Church placed third in State. For the first time we achieved not one, but two Elite awards. Well done to Mitchel Rocci and Ashley Porter who scored over 10 000 points each. Akinwale Ayonrinde was the first Christ Church Year 12 student to ever achieve a Language Perfect Gold

award, remarkable as the championship coincided with the Year 12 exams.

In Term 3 our French students competed in the WA Alliance Française Poetry Recitation Competition. The top 20 students in each year were invited to perform at the Alliance Française. In Years 7 to 9, out of the 60 students chosen, 18 were from Christ Church. Jack Landau (Year 7) and Daniel Zhou (Year 8) both came third in the State. First prize was awarded to Finn Lip (Year 7) and Ashley Porter (Year 9).

This year we participated in a new competition and were awarded prizes by Mr Chris Tallentire MLA at a celebration to honour the winners of the inaugural Side by Side competition. In this competition, students were asked to chat in pairs in a different language and submit a video of their conversation. Christ Church won several prizes, including first place in the Prep School in various age group categories for Mandarin, and first place in the Senior School in Years 7 and 9 for Japanese and Year 9 for French. The first-prize winners were Ashley Porter and Harris Borman (French); Krish Hall and Kenneth Lo (Japanese); and Jason Lu and Daniel Jones (Japanese).

On 24 June, Year 9 Chinese classes attended a Chinese cultural excursion at the South Perth Community Hall. The aim was to mix with students from other schools, using language learnt in a meaningful way, and to participate in a number of Chinese cultural activities. The day was organised and run by the Chinese Language Teachers' Association with help from the Confucius Institute.

For the WA Chinese Speaking Competition in June, our students presented speeches about their lives and families. Scott Caporn (Year 9) placed second in the State. Then in September, four students from Years 7 and 8 participated in the State Mandarin Speaking Competition at UWA. First prize went to Noirit Seal (Year 7).



Languages

In Term 3, we had visits from exchange students from China and Hong Kong, as well as four French students from our sister school in St Quentin. The Japanese WACE students completed their ACER (Australian Council for Educational Research) examinations. The boys performed very well at the Advanced level. The Year 12s had a combined average score of 97.5 per cent and in the reading section three of them scored 100 per cent.

We have enjoyed Languages excursions and incursions. Japanese students participated in a Japanese tea ceremony, were taught how to make kites and went on an excursion to the Hyogo Prefecture Government Cultural Centre in Perth, where they had fun wearing sumo outfits and practising their wrestling skills. Year 7 Japanese students visited the zoo. Our Chinese students had a day of cultural activities, making Chinese food and learning Chinese exercises. French students played pétanque, enjoyed French films and learnt how to make crêpes.

As a department, we participated in some cross-school collaboration with Languages students from MLC and others. In May, the Year 9 and 10 Languages students from CCGS and MLC joined together in a Languages Quiz Night held at MLC. The Year 12 boys joined the girls from MLC for a French meal at Bistro des Artistes. UWA invited some of our Year 10 students to a languages forum where we enjoyed catching up with former students now studying at UWA. Several of these students assisted the Languages Department by making motivational videos, speaking to our students and assisting as tutors.

Finally, students worked with the new Nexus portal to assist them in their language learning. They used Quizlet, Language Perfect and the NiHao app for Chinese to improve their vocabulary retention.

For Languages Week in September, Oscar-nominated actress Dame Kristin Scott Thomas recorded a personal video message for Christ Church boys to encourage them in their language-learning journey.

It has been a wonderful year for Languages with fabulous student participation in competitions and cultural activities, as well as the development of relationships with students from other schools in Australia and overseas.

Mathematics

The year started on a fabulous note for the Mathematics Department with excellent results in the 2016 WACE examinations.

Christ Church students in all three ATAR Mathematics subjects – Applications, Methods and Specialist – appeared in the State’s top performing schools’ list. To top it off, a record number of 13 Certificates of Excellence, for students who achieved in the top 0.5 per cent of candidates, were awarded in all three subjects. This was indeed strong affirmation for both staff and students, and even more so as this was the first WACE examination of the new ATAR courses.

In the lower secondary years, the NAPLAN results were equally impressive, testament to the outstanding teaching and learning that takes place in S-Block. This was best illustrated by the Year 9 results in which almost all students achieved Band 8 and above in Numeracy.

Four Year 7 boys were selected to take part in the Primary Mathematics World

Contest in Hong Kong in mid-July where they pitted their knowledge and skills against strong global competitors. Joshua Chen was awarded Third Class Honours for his outstanding work in this individual competition.

The annual Mathematics Association of Western Australia’s Have Sum Fun competitions saw two Friday nights lit up with neurons and excitement. After four rounds and a tiebreaker, Christ Church narrowly clinched first prize from Perth Modern in the Senior Division, while the Intermediate and Junior teams both won third prize. The boys also dazzled in the Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC) with William Hu (Year 11) winning his fifth AMC Medal, four boys winning prizes and 42 others awarded High Distinctions.

William Hu headed off to the 58th International Mathematical Olympiad

(IMO) in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in July, and came back with a Bronze medal from the world’s toughest mathematics competition. He made history as only the ninth West Australian to make the Australian IMO team.

The year rounded off with a stellar performance at the West Australian Junior Mathematics Olympiad held at the University of Western Australia. Joshua Chen (Year 7) and Jason Lu (Year 9) both achieved a rare perfect score and won the Most Outstanding Student Award for their respective year levels. Declan Barrett (Year 9) won a Merit Award and the Year 7 team, comprising Joshua Chen, Sean Morgan, Matthew Bailey and Jin Shen Lim, achieved the highest Year 7 team score.

SCIENCE WEEK

This year's National Science Week theme was based around Future Earth. Christ Church staff and students celebrated with activities including the famous Big Science Quiz in which 21 teams of three students from Years 7 to 12 competed to answer challenging questions. Year 7 and 8 students were also involved in a treasure hunt and around the School, technology informed the boys of local and international science advancements.

NATIONAL ICAS SCIENCE COMPETITION

In May, Years 7 and 8 as well as a number of students from Years 9 and 10, took part in the National ICAS Science Competition. Fourteen boys received a High Distinction, placing them in the top one per cent of students in Australia. This was a fantastic achievement, demonstrating the quality of Science students at CCGS.

SCIENCE OLYMPIAD

In August, a number of Year 10 and 11 students sat the Science Olympiad Qualifying Examinations. Hard work, combined with teacher dedication, saw

our continuation of high achievements, with 10 boys attaining High Distinctions. This places them in the top 10 per cent of students in Australia. In addition, four of these boys placed in the top 24 students of their respective subjects and as a result, received invitations to the Olympiad Summer School at the Australian National University in 2018. Selection for the Australian Olympiad teams is based upon performance at this summer school. Marcus Handley (Biology), Matthew Hamdorf (Chemistry), William Hu (Physics) and Rohan Maloney (Physics) were invited to attend this year.

EXCURSIONS AND CAMPS

YEAR 11 BIOLOGY

Year 11 Biology students found themselves in the bush at Forest Heritage Centre in Dwellingup to conduct fieldwork related to population ecology, sampling techniques, forest recovery and conservation. The diversity of flora and fauna provided a very rich and rewarding experience for all.

YEAR 7 SCIENCE

The WA Gould League at Herdsman Lake Wildlife Centre again featured in the Year 7 curriculum. Students were given

the opportunity to enhance their ecology knowledge with hands-on fieldwork, participating in the Mud N MiniBeasts and Swamp Safari programs. They scooped invertebrates from the lake and tested the water quality using a number of methods. Some students were fortunate to interact with rescued long-necked turtles. As the largest wetland ecosystem in the inner metropolitan area, the lake is important in educating boys about our roles and responsibilities towards the organisms with which we share this planet.

YEAR 12 PSYCHOLOGY

As part of the Year 12 Psychology course, a dog trainer from Guide Dogs WA shared insights on how to best train animals and the psychological theory behind these training methods.

The visit provided the boys with a real-world example of operant and classical conditioning, covered in the Psychology course. Key concepts of different learning techniques were reinforced through a demonstration involving interactions between the trainer and the dog.

Jamie Fagan's association with Christ Church has spanned close to half a century. He commenced his time as a Year 7

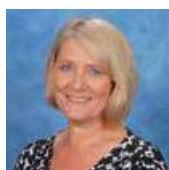

The meaning of philanthropy, in the eyes of a Preparatory School boy, is to think about other people who need our help.

Each term we had a focus on learning about a charity that gave us awareness about other people.

In Term 1, through the Fred Hollows Foundation, we understood how difficult it is to have impaired eyesight. Fred Hollows was a person who demonstrated philanthropic and humanitarian deeds, giving his time as an eye surgeon to assist thousands of people with avoidable eyesight diseases such as cataract blindness. He was shocked to learn that many Indigenous Australians do not receive medical treatment to avoid blindness.

In Term 2 we reflected on men's health. As young men, we need to look after ourselves and this can be done in our everyday lives by following a few achievable goals. We need to be aware of how important diet is for our growing bodies. Exercise is something that we always do at school but exercise should be an essential part of our daily routine. Keeping relationships healthy by connecting with others and also understanding the importance of family time needs to be a priority. Lastly, sleep is important. We hate to admit it, but we do feel much better when we get some good quality shut-eye! To appreciate the importance of this charity, we wore moustaches and a 'tacky tie' to Friday's assembly celebrating Men's Health Week, and donated a gold coin to the Adolescent Mental Health Unit at Princess Margaret Hospital.

Our largest fundraiser has always been helping the Cambodian Children's Fund. This involved each boy running laps of the Senior School Oval with sponsors pledging donations towards their efforts. Mr Tait took the proceeds of our hard work, in excess of \$30000, to Cambodia in December to assist many children in Phnom Penh.

As we progress through the Prep School, we have learnt that it is not just about raising money. It is about developing compassion and helping others in the world around us.

Visual Arts

PRE-PRIMARY

The boys' creative energy produced artworks that demonstrated newly-taught skills, combined with uninhibited self-expression. Weekly workshops placed value on experimentation and encouraged students to create free and unexpected outcomes.

Highlights included printing on paper clay with found objects to create a textured plaque; using artist Sarah Amos's work as a stimulus for a layered mono print; expressing basic colour theory principles; and being inspired by John Olsen's energetic and distinctive painting style to depict their own interpretation of an aerial view using paint and embroidery.

YEAR 1

In Year 1 students developed their skills and ideas centering on their strengths, abilities and interests. The boys loved taking walks to the Christ Church construction site: armed with drawing boards, cartridge paper and fine line pens, their excitement at capturing the excavators was palpable.

In Semester 2, they experimented with techniques, skills, processes and styles using a variety of materials. Each boy created a ceramic pull toy from paper clay and copper carbonate.

YEAR 2

The creation of imagined worlds and environments underpinned all aspects of art learning for this cohort. The year began with storytelling that challenged the boys to see alternative possibilities when writing a storyboard and capturing images for a digital photo story.

Australian contemporary artist Emma Kidd's wonderfully quirky articulated creatures served as inspiration for the boys in Term 2. Using hand-painted and hand-printed paper, they translated observational drawings into whimsical imaginary circus animals.

The boys learnt that the narrative is an important part of artistic expression and used hand skills to fashion a ceramic sailboat.



Visual Arts

YEAR 3

Year 3 boys responded to the work of artists Andy Goldsworthy and Kumi Yamashita, experimenting with conventions to develop representations of time and place. They built structures from found materials and mapped shadow movement over time.

An exhibition held at the Art Gallery of Western Australia, entitled *The Rise of Sneaker Culture*, allowed the boys to examine the social history and cultural significance of the footwear now worn by billions of people. Students created dual

colour thermal prints after viewing film footage, interactive media, photographic images and design drawings exploring technical innovations, fashion trends, and marketing campaigns over the past two centuries.

YEAR 4

The Visual Arts team's promotion of individuality, enjoyment, creativity and independent learning was demonstrated in a self-portrait screen-printing project entitled *A Few Good Men*.

In Term 2, the boys formed ideas from works by Robert Knaus and Henrietta Shore. They used stimuli such as live cacti and images of the artists' works as springboards. Students then worked with paper clay to create ceramic cacti. They decorated their plants with acrylic paint and varnish, and cemented the finished pieces into pots.

The boys were also introduced to fundamental drawing and painting skills to develop their confidence in realism. They created their own observational drawings of insects, as well as sculptural collages.



Visual Arts

YEAR 5

The Year 5 program promoted problem solving, creativity and collaboration. The practical sessions, which included making samurai warriors, painting pet portraits and creating collages, provided students with stimulating and hands-on experiences.

YEAR 6

Students in Year 6 were introduced to the fundamental skills involved in communicating visual ideas. They developed their skills through activities, such as observational drawing and design development, leading to artworks in two and three-dimensional forms.

Each student completed a lightbox that connected production values with conceptual thinking. They examined self-portraiture and the work of artists such as Andy Warhol, Paul Gauguin and David Alfaro. In Term 3, students explored the work of Luigi Prina. They planned and created a unique band of Flying Ships.

The success of students' work was celebrated in the annual Visual Arts Exhibition. The quality of each student's artwork was truly incredible. Evident in the works were the development of problem-solving skills, high levels of media manipulation, skill and technical proficiency. Well done, boys.

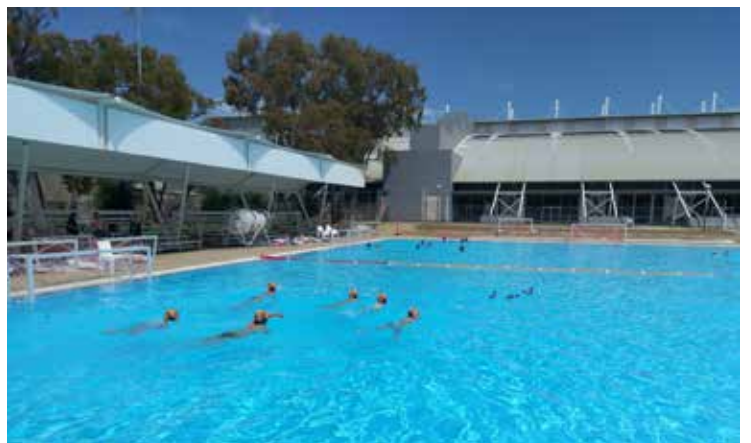

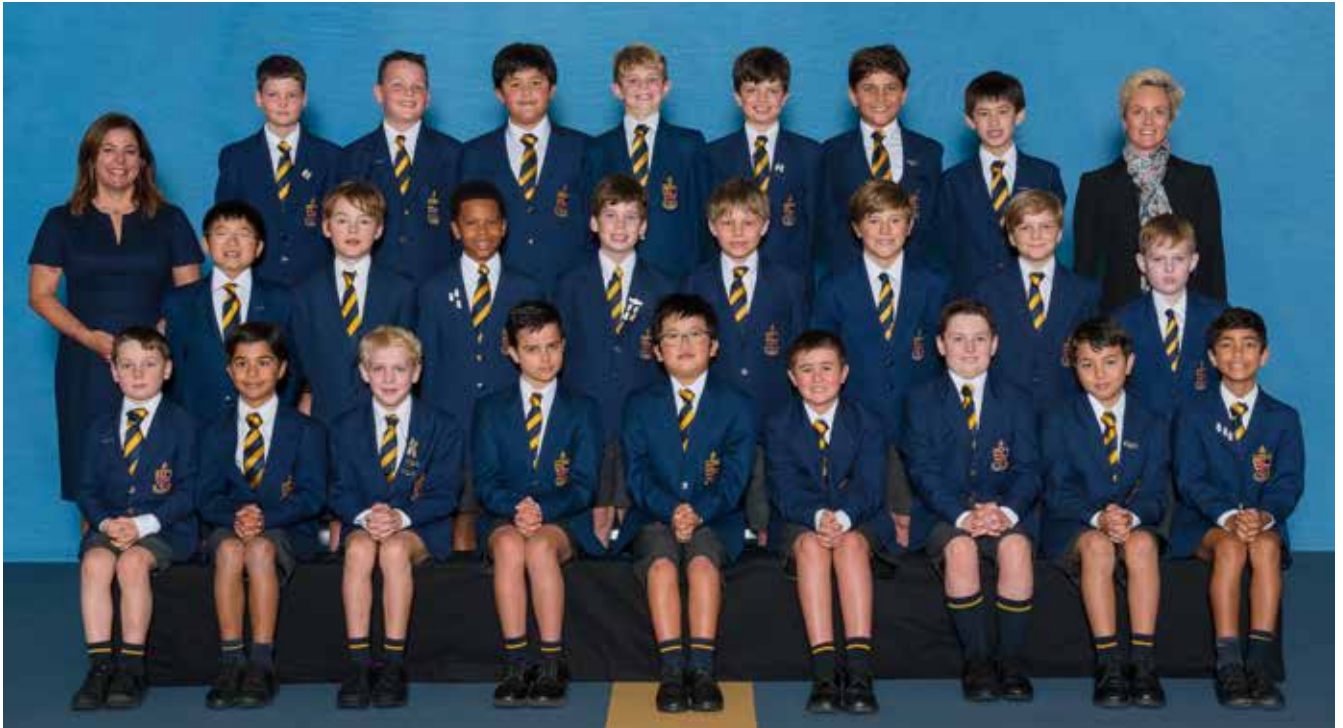
