As we approach the end of my third year at Christ Church, it is time to reflect on the many wonderful achievements and events of the past year.

We started off with the inaugural Principal's Bike Ride. On a stunning autumn morning, over 60 cyclists departed from campus, covering long distances along the Swan River; some energetic cyclists even ventured as far as Mount Henry Bridge. It was a fantastic experience for all involved, so enjoyable that we are repeating it in 2019. We are constantly encouraging the boys to 'walk a little way' or ride bikes to school, so it is incredibly positive when the school community demonstrates the mental and physical benefits of rigorous activity within a team.

Our new Preparatory School, which is home to 36 state-of-the-art classrooms and over 5000sqm of innovative learning spaces, will be ready for the boys in 2019. With internal temperatures, lighting and seating all designed specifically with boys in mind, everyone is looking forward to moving in. We are also very excited to be welcoming our youngest students into the new Early Learning Community (ELC).

The Swan River represents an important part of the School's history and current activities. It is where our Prep boys enjoy 'nature's classroom' and where we launch our rowing boats, enjoy stand-up paddleboarding and conduct Marine Studies. This year the foreshore underwent a significant facelift, which commenced with a Wadjuk ceremonial blessing, followed by the removal of the existing rowing ramp, shed and access way. Several months of redevelopment work has resulted in a fantastic River Precinct for our boys, offering safer access to this idyllic location.

This year, the boys delivered an outstanding season of winter sport, with two more PSA premierships adding to our already impressive summer winning streak. Following PSA wins in Tennis (Corr Cup), Water Polo (Dickinson Shield), Rowing (Hamer Cup) and Swimming

(Tregonning Cup) earlier in the year, the School's other trophy additions include the Ray House Cup in Hockey and Moyes Trophy in Cross Country. All our boys are to be congratulated on their efforts and the way in which they demonstrated great dedication, team spirit and sportsmanship in their respective codes. We maintain our philosophy regarding sport, that is, the educational benefits of playing sport far outweigh the winning of trophies.

In 2017, we embarked on a two-year accreditation journey to become a member of the Council of International Schools (CIS). This membership community includes over 1300 institutions from 116 countries and was chosen not only to help us benchmark ourselves nationally and internationally, but to ensure we are always delivering best practice education. In October 2018, we achieved global accreditation with CIS and incredibly positive feedback about many aspects of the School.

This year the School introduced The Making of Men program, specifically designed for Year 9 boys and aimed at building the inner man. The year-long program includes a three-week live-in experience (On Queenslea Drive or OQD), bringing the boys together at a time when they are experiencing significant adolescent development and exploring the range of new and exciting possibilities that life presents. It was wonderful to hear the raw feedback from the boys as they completed this 'rite of passage' program. Head of the OQD Program Jarrod Kayler-Thomson was instrumental in its design, delivery and management: a commendable job on all fronts.

Finally, thank you to our amazing staff, boys, parents and wider community. The success of any school is dependent upon its people, and we are extremely fortunate with the quality of the Christ Church Grammar School teaching staff, and blessed to have such an exceptional school community.

The House and tutorial system is the key organisational structure that is central to a boy's growth and development at Christ Church Grammar School. In my final Mitre report, I would like to capture some past and current highlights that typify the quality of care provided in the Senior School.

Essentially, it is the quality of relationships that are formed across the year levels and the sense of belonging that determine the strength of our tutorial system. There have been numerous influential staff members, student leaders, boys whose deeds inspire those around them, and many more who simply want to help whenever and wherever it is needed. 'Boys mentoring boys' is oft quoted to describe our vertical tutorial system; its effectiveness is evident from the very beginning of a new boy's time at the School.

In 2006, while interviewing a range of students, we asked them about the influence

older students had on their school life. They all stressed the significance of these boys as mentors: providing inspiration and motivation, sorting out problems, answering homework questions, helping with subject and sport selections, and even giving advice on how to behave in class! Influential tutors also play their part. It is frequently noted, when farewelling tutorial staff, that boys give their personal thanks and clearly state the considerable impact the tutors have had on them.

In recent years, the influence and relevance of student leadership has become a significant focus. The House and School Prefect groups engaged in a range of workshops during 2018 to identify the elements of school life they value highly, as well as the aspects of leadership most important to them. Their responses were certainly noteworthy. The boys valued diversity, acceptance of all, relationships, knowledge, happiness and

wellbeing, being treated with respect, provision of opportunities and willingness to provide support. They set out to provide a good example of leadership to inspire younger generations, promote a philosophy of service, and display an intention to succeed. Thus, leadership is another of the strengths of our pastoral care system.

As I conclude my time in this role, I must pay tribute to the incredible dedication and commitment of all staff at Christ Church to the pastoral care of the boys. I would like to thank all of the departing staff and, in particular, long-serving staff member, Mr Ben Hodsdon, who has provided outstanding care for boys across several Houses for the past 34 years.

Finally, I must convey my most sincere thanks to all members of the Christ Church community, who have supported me and given me the privilege of serving this great school over the past 31 years.

These boys were star footballers, good sportsmen and inspiring leaders. This is consistent with what we see across all our sporting codes, but special mention in my case, goes to our soccer coach, Mark Lee. I’ve been so fortunate to be coached and mentored by Mark. Nothing is more fun than joining the game when he is coaching the Peter Moyes Centre boys. Mark truly reflects the values modelled by our teachers here at Christ Church. During Year 10, he called me regularly to help me through the tough times. I owe him a special thank you and will always be grateful for what I have learnt from him, on and off the field.

To Mr Jones, Mr Bayly and Mr Morrissy, thank you for your leadership and continuous support of us as a cohort, and in particular to me, over the past 12 months. You advised me to ‘be myself’ and your ongoing encouragement has been humbling.

Mr Bayly, this is also your last Valedictory at Christ Church. I would like to recognise the huge contribution you have made over the past 31 years. The School will miss you greatly and I think your presence in the Christ Church community is irreplaceable. I personally feel very grateful to have had this final year under your wise and calm guidance.

There are so many good people at this School who have helped us in different ways, often going above and beyond to make a difference. I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge all the Christ Church teachers and support staff.

ACADEMIC RESULTS

MAHENDRA VASWANI / DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

The 2018 Year 12 cohort is to be congratulated for achieving 100 per cent WACE graduation, a median ATAR of 91.60, three maximum ATARs of 99.95, five General Exhibitions, three Subject Exhibitions, 17 Subject Certificates of Excellence, 34 Certificates of Distinction and 33 Certificates of Merit. In addition, Christ Church featured in 16 ATAR courses with highest performing students. This, along with the achievement of six PSA trophies in 2018, has cemented Christ Church as the top performing boys' school in WA. The graduating students of 2018 have certainly done themselves and the School proud.

William Hu, our Dux for 2018, achieved the triumvirate of a General Exhibition, the maximum ATAR of 99.95 and a Subject Exhibition in Music. This is no mean feat and William deserves all of his accolades. Amitabh Jeganathan and Matthew Hamdorf are to be congratulated for achieving a General Exhibition as well as the maximum ATAR of 99.95. Henry Pemberton and Charles Ruan also achieved General Exhibitions. Albert Smith won the Subject Exhibition for Mathematics Specialist while Akio Ho achieved the Subject Exhibition for Politics and Law.

In 2018, Ms Sharyn Bana ran Year 12 Study Skills seminars on Friday afternoons in the first semester. These were well attended and the boys who took the opportunity stated that the skills assisted them with memorising, note taking and examination technique. The use of Nexus as a learning management system also continued, adding value to the excellence of teaching and learning across all subjects. The Heads of Department are generally very pleased with the overall performance of students in their respective subjects in 2018.

In 2018, Christ Church Grammar School had 170 students who achieved an ATAR and 18 who followed a General Pathway.

- 16 students (9% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 99
- 28 students (16% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 98

- 56 students (32% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 95
- 98 students (58% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 90
- Mean ATAR for the year group: 88.37
- Median ATAR for the year group: 91.60 (State Median 81.80)
- 137 students (81% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR that would give them entry to UWA (greater than or equal to 80)
- 30 students completed certificate courses, mainly Certificate III in Fitness
- Christ Church was placed in the group of top performing schools in 16 courses (courses with fewer than 10 students are not included): Ancient History, Chemistry, Computer Science, Economics, Geography, Literature, Mathematics Applications, Mathematics Methods, Mathematics Specialist, Media Production and Analysis, Modern History, Physical Education Studies, Physics, Politics and Law, Psychology and Visual Arts.

WACE ACHIEVEMENT

One hundred per cent of students achieved their WACE by obtaining the required average of seven C grades or unit equivalence over Years 11 and 12, along with literacy and numeracy proficiency (OLNA) and an ATAR or Certificate II or higher.

GISELA ZUCHNER-MOGALL

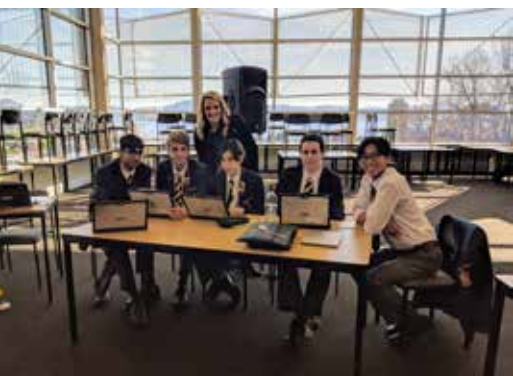
ROGER BAYLY / DEPUTY PRINCIPAL AND HEAD OF SENIOR SCHOOL

SAINT-QUENTIN

At the end of Term 1, 16 Christ Church boys flew to Saint-Quentin in Picardy, home to our French sister school. We were welcomed by our hosts and Mr Shane Mogan, a Christ Church old boy who was working there as an English assistant.

On the first Monday, we began to experience life as French students at Saint-Jean et la Croix. The lessons were hard, but the students were very welcoming. This was a very different experience to CCGS but was thoroughly enjoyed, especially the close to two hour break for lunch. We visited historical sites in the region with our host families, such as catacombs, a car museum and a cathedral, as well as a party hosted by the Mayor.

We travelled to nearby Villers-Bretonneux to attend the Anzac Day Dawn Service, celebrating the centenary of the last year of World War I; it was also attended by Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull and Tony Abbott MP, as well as Prince Charles. It was very moving, especially for tour member Aran Wheatley.

Aran said, "I have a picture of the gravesite of my great grandmother's brother, who died in 1917 during the Battle of Arras; he was buried close to the battlefield. My host family took me to the gravesite so that I could send a picture to my grandmother. I also took a photo of Villers-Bretonneux from the air in a plane, piloted by my host. He flew me over the coast and the mouth of the Somme, and I took a photo of the war monument."

Next came Puy du Fou theme park, which had pageants and visual spectacles. The horse show and revolving stage were highlights. Later we visited the beautiful Palace of Versailles and its gardens.

JUNIOR YOUNG PHYSICISTS' TOURNAMENT – HOBART, TASMANIA

Asia-Pacific JYPT champions

This year marked the first time that CCGS has competed in the Junior Young Physicists' Tournament (JYPT), a year-long competition in which students research and investigate a series of topics related to their physics understandings. They conduct experiments, compile their findings and present these to other schools during the tournament. Their findings are then rebutted by another school's team, which critiques the investigation and results, and begins a discussion on the physics behind the problems, in a 'Physics Fight'. The tournament consists of five rounds of Physics Fights and then a final.

In the first week of school in Term 4, the Year 10 team of Declan Barrett, Lucas Kailis, Kartikeya Kaushal, Jason Lu and Adam Robbins went to The Hutchins School in Hobart to take part in the JYPT. Throughout the competition,

we lived in the Hutchins boarding house and ate, slept and bonded with competitors from other schools all around Australia and New Zealand. We also enjoyed the Salamanca Market, visiting a radio telescope and eating Tasmania's famous scallop pies.

As this was the first year we have participated in the competition, we all went in with absolutely no clue as to what to expect. The competition began with some shaky presentations and rebuttals, as we tried to get the hang of the format. However, as we progressed through the rounds, we found ourselves gaining a greater understanding of some theoretical concepts and becoming familiar with the competition format. Astoundingly, thanks largely to Adam's destructive rebuttal, by the end of the five rounds we were in first place.

This put us into the final against our friends from Hutchins, in which Lucas rebutted and

Jason presented. However, our flight home departed before the presentation ceremony, leaving us to sit through an anxious journey home waiting to find out the results. Finally, arriving at Perth Airport around 12 hours after the final, we crowded around Ms Owen's phone and opened up a text from the event organiser. We had won, 31.9 points to 31.6, giving Christ Church the title of Asia-Pacific JYPT champions in its first year of competition.

Overall, this was an incredibly rewarding experience for all of us. We learnt a lot of physics, improved our scientific and presentation skills, and were really proud of our results as a team. Although it was a relief to return home at the end of an exhausting week, it was difficult for us to leave behind the friends we made, and the experiences shared. The competition was hard but rewarding work and an incredibly educational and enjoyable experience.





ROBOCUP

MONTREAL, CANADA

The CCGS Robotics Club is driven by a diverse group of passionate student engineers, working together on solutions to real-world problems in rescue situations. Since our formation, our primary focus has been on engineering robots for competition in the RoboCup.

The first RoboCup was held in 1997 and started as a simple soccer challenge with one goal, “that by the middle of the 21st century, a team of fully autonomous humanoid robot soccer players shall win a soccer game, complying with the official rules of FIFA, against the winner of the most recent World Cup.”

The competition has since grown into the world pinnacle event for robotics, with various categories of competition including soccer,

rescue, industrial and home automation. This year’s RoboCup was hosted in Montreal, Canada, with teams from 35 countries, totaling over 4000 participants and 5000 robots, all pursuing victory in highly competitive arenas.

CCGS Robotics once again took part in the RoboCup Rescue Rapidly Manufactured Robot Challenge (RMRC), a competition for high school and undergraduate students. Our team consisted of Will Harris, Sam Hoffmann, Callum Koh and Ben Lane, accompanied by old boy mentor Mr Felix King and teacher Mr Patrick Loudon.

Over four days of competition, we put our robots to the test on a series of challenges, including: physical challenges in which robots traverse various types of terrain; sensing challenges in which robots detect movement, hot spots, and recognise images such as QR codes and Hazmat symbols; and manipulation

challenges in which robots touch, pick up and rotate various items in the environment.

These tests proved worthy challenges for our team, which competed strongly against 12 others from China, Japan, Brazil, Mexico, USA and Slovenia to qualify for the finals in fifth place. Unfortunately, on the last morning of competition we suffered a major system failure and were unable to improve our score any further, finishing in fifth place overall.

Our preparations are already in full swing for RoboCup 2019, which will take place in Sydney. With the stakes now higher than ever, we are on the hunt for talented young software and mechatronics engineers who will carry us to the next level, where we can take on more complex challenges in areas such as object manipulation, computer vision and autonomous ‘driverless’ technology.

CAMBODIA

Tuk-tuks, bikes and scooters flooding the streets, dense tropical air carrying the smell of fried bananas and all manner of exotic street foods, a tangle of power cords and cables streaking across roof lines and little children walking around in their bright blue Cambodian Children's Fund (CCF) uniforms. This was the sight that greeted 25 CCGS boys and St Mary's girls as we exited Phnom Penh International Airport. For the better part of two weeks, we were fortunate to participate in the Service in Action Trip to Cambodia during which our team collaborated with the CCF.

The tone of the trip and the historical context of modern Cambodia were quickly established as we learnt about the Khmer Rouge regime by visiting the Tuol Sleng Genocide Museum and the Choeng Ek Killing Fields. With this cultural awareness in mind, we began working in small groups to assist and teach classes of primary school aged children. We prepared lessons in Maths, English and Coding, played

games and told each other our stories. Within a short period of time, we established a real connection with the children.

When walking around the local communities during the evenings, we often bumped into some of our kids. They would call our names and then run up to us with a smile and a hug. During the evenings, we interacted with Cambodian youth leaders our age and helped them with their community food program. We also took part in dance lessons where we learnt traditional Khmer dances. During our dinners and debriefs, we shared stories about the day and despite being exhausted, we would still be eager to go back the next morning to spend another day with our classes.

What began initially as adolescent awkwardness soon transformed into rich and lasting friendships. In our nightly debriefs, we repeatedly described the trip as a 'reciprocal experience'; what we tried to give and teach to the Cambodians, they returned in kind. The team returned with fond memories, renewed passions and refreshed perspectives.

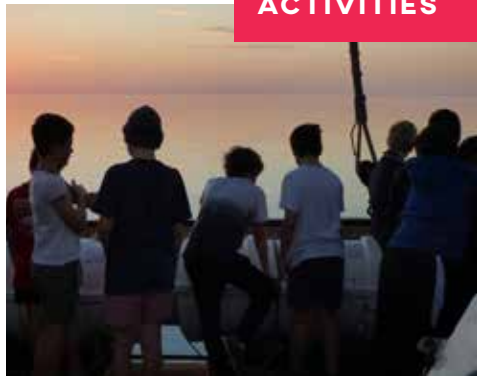

2018 was yet another successful year for the Christ Church Grammar School Army Cadet Unit (CCGSACU). We started the training year well, with excellent results from the Brigade Cadet Under Officer (CUO) and Cadet Warrant Officer Class 2 (CDTWO2) courses and five Year 12 cadets giving up part of their January holidays to gain promotion. The appointments were finalised, with CUO Rohan Maloney as Platoon Commander for 1 Platoon, CUO Jackson Rocchi for 2 Platoon and CUO Lachlan Zhou for 3 Platoon. CDTWO2 Harrison Kay and I were then posted to Company Headquarters.

Term 1 saw a significant intake of Year 10 cadets, with the company growing to a posted strength of 75. As the term progressed, cadets were taught the basics of drill and introduced to the navigation and first aid components. The Term 1 camp was held at Northam Army Camp. The camp acted as a recruit training weekend with the company learning camouflage and concealment, basic survival skills and field signals. The night activity proved an enjoyable experience, as the cadets were required to use their knowledge in tactical movement and radio communication to complete an assigned mission without enemy detection.

Term 2 saw a significant focus on Anzac Day as the company commemorated the occasion by supporting numerous activities. Activities included the 10km Gallipoli Run in Kings Park, a service at Dalkeith Primary School and the Anzac Day Parade in the city centre.

The unit continued training with an emphasis on navigation, first aid and radio skills. Cadets learnt how to work out bearings,

distances and grid references on a map. The Term 2 field exercise arrived, and despite some unfavourable weather conditions, the boys persevered. Throughout the weekend, the cadets were exposed to a 'bullring' of instructive activities as well as a more hands-on navigation exercise. The highlight of the camp was the excursion to the paintball arena, where the boys were able to practise section attacks, movement and communication.

During the Term 2 holidays, 19 Year 11 and 12 cadets successfully participated in the Brigade Senior Leaders Course (SLC). Senior cadets volunteered as instructors and boys who participated gained the qualification for promotion to the rank of Sergeant. Special acknowledgement must be given to CDT CPL Edward Elias, winning Dux of the Course for his efforts.

Term 3 camp was the most challenging of all. The major goal was a navigation exercise in which cadets patrolled with their packs through the bush for 16km. Year 11 cadets participated in a first aid course run by St John Ambulance, providing them with a nationally accredited qualification. Running concurrently with this was the F88 Austeyr training for the Year 10s, in which cadets learnt how to strip and assemble the rifle, and the weapon training test to qualify them to 'live fire' the weapon on the annual camp.

On the first week of the Term 3 holidays, the unit was finally off to the much-anticipated Annual Field Exercise (AFX). The Year 10 cadets were divided into a range of courses on Tier 2, including adventure training, catering, survival and engineering. The Year 11s participated in Tier 3. This was the most difficult and strenuous course, with highlights

including working with Bushmaster Protected Mobility Vehicles from 10th Light Horse, the cordon and search of a village, and abseiling at the Battle Simulation Training Facility. The Year 12s were divided into various courses taking on leadership responsibilities, with many in instructional roles on the Brigade Junior Leaders Course. Competition day arrived; morale was extremely high, and the unit was both excited and nervous. In general, we had a successful day. We finished first in the senior first aid, first in rogaining and first in the drill competition.

Late in the year, CCGSCU was informed that it had been awarded the Unit Efficiency Shield – meaning that we were the best performing Army Cadet Unit in Western Australia for 2018.

Congratulations to all involved. It was a demanding year, but we acquitted ourselves extremely well. To the outgoing Year 12s, your leadership over the year never faltered. INFORMATICS

As has been customary for a number of years, a loose collection of individuals gathered in the ICT Centre every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Here we attempted to solve algorithmic programming problems, gaining valuable practice in the skills required for Informatics.

In December 2017, Ben Davison-Petch, Marcus Handley and Albert Smith were invited to the Australian Informatics Olympiad Committee (AIOC) School of Excellence. After this training, they sat two more exams. Based on the results of these Olympiads, students were chosen for the Team Selection School. At the school, the final selection exams were tackled and the Australian International Olympiad in Informatics (IOI) team was selected. Albert Smith made the team and Marcus Handley was given the reserve position. Albert put up a stellar performance at the IOI, ranking 32nd out of 335 students, earning a silver medal.

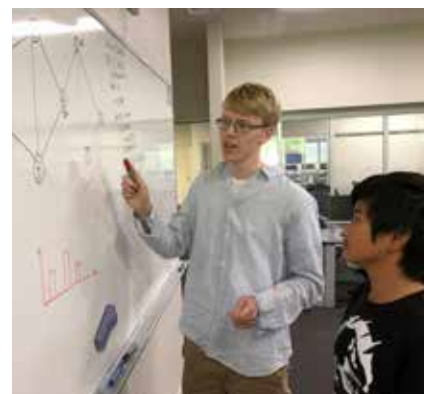
In Term 2, many CCGS teams competed in the University of New South Wales ProgComp. The Year 8 team, consisting of Joshua Chen, Roman Green and Jason Liu, outperformed all other junior teams by 11 points. Furthermore, two of our teams qualified for the grand final. One team comprised Year 11s Ben Davison-Petch, Marcus Handley and Nicholas Patrikeos. Rohan Maloney competed alone, as his main-round teammates were unavailable.

In September, the next season of IOI selection began with many students gathering in the ICT Centre to sit for the Australian Informatics Olympiad. This is the Olympiad exam that is used to invite the top 25 students in the country to the School of Excellence. As a result, Marcus Handley, Alistair Parkinson and most impressively, Year 8 student Joshua Chen, were invited to the 2018 School of Excellence in December at the Australian National University.

Throughout 2018, many of our students competed at the University of Western Australia (UWA) in the university-level Anzac competitions. They also attended the UWA Programming competition training sessions. We additionally competed in the Canadian Computing competition and the University of Melbourne's Codemasters. In Codemasters, the same Year 11 team achieved first place, ahead of the Year 12 team of Caleb Cheng, Rohan Maloney and Albert Smith, with a perfect score and by five minutes.

Notably, Informatics has begun to filter down into the Preparatory School with many Year 5s and 6s achieving impressive results in the National Computer Science School Challenge.

While this year's achievements have been pleasing in themselves, by far the most exciting aspect is the large pool of up-and-coming talent within the School. We would like to thank Mr Honnens for his tireless work in leading Informatics.





MOCK TRIALS

The Christ Church Mock Trials club, led by teacher and former lawyer Ms Vanessa Badaraco, as well as lawyer and old boy Mr Alex Mossop, enjoyed yet another compelling season.

From the outset of the competition, there was an unprecedented turnout of Year 11 boys, with over 100 applying for the potential places. Consequently, CCGS Mock Trials once again boasted the maximum number of teams possible in this year's Law Society competition, with the initial contest for positions strengthening the group overall.

Through the Mock Trials program, students participate in simulated court cases in which they battle fictitious legal matters, engaging in a back and forth contest with the opposition school. Mock Trials not only provides an insight and greater understanding of the law but is also a mechanism through which boys can develop skills such as teamwork, flexibility, rhetoric and the ability to think on one's feet. This season the Year 11s formed their own teams as they were introduced to the demanding environment of Western Australia's Supreme Court, while the Year 12s reprised their teams from 2017.

The standard of competition was high from the start as we faced a strong St Hilda's outfit. There were several victories in this first round, and similar performances were seen against Rossmoyne Senior High School and our rivals, Scotch College. Although many teams won two of their three rounds, this was not enough for Christ Church to continue into the finals. Despite this, our cohort has enjoyed two thrilling years of Mock Trials, and the future looks strong in the hands of a highly capable Year 11 group; their attitude characterised no better than by the example of William Thomas, who stepped up to fill a witness position at the very last minute.

On behalf of the departing Year 12 Mock Trials teams, I would like to thank Ms Badaraco and Mr Mossop for their belief in us, and for the work they put in to make this activity run as smoothly as it did.



OUTDOOR EDUCATION

This year was as busy as always at Kooringal. Term 1 began with staff training for new assistants Ms Jessamy Case and Mr Auguste Sheehan, and Outdoor Education camps for Years 5 and 7. The camps held at Kooringal are a mix of outdoor activities, such as bushwalking and canoeing, environmental activities, personal development and Indigenous awareness.

Community living, care for the environment and the development of resilience are key components of the Kooringal program and we hope to promote these aims in all our camps. Much has been written recently about our increasing disconnect from the natural environment and over-reliance on technology. While at Kooringal, boys cannot help but be literally immersed in the environment and must often rely on themselves and each other to succeed.

Earthkeepers is a curriculum-based program that we are excited to provide for our Year 5 students. It involves imagery, theatre and magic to help students engage with the natural environment, using their head, heart and hands. The Kooringal experience is followed through back at the main campus, with the boys required to complete a number of tasks during the year to earn keys and become qualified Earthkeepers in the first weeks of Term 3.

Year 7 Camps are very much community-living focused and are conducted in House groups. Students participate in a range of outdoor activities, including an overnight expedition, canoeing, climbing, abseiling and Indigenous workshops. The Year 11 students who volunteer to come as leaders act as mentors to the younger boys, a role that continues back at the main campus.

The Year 8 cohort once again journeyed to Shark Bay to experience living and sailing aboard the tall ship STS Leeuwin II. The varied weather provided an excellent level of challenge and the ship itself gave the sailors a chance to develop their leadership, teamwork and community living skills. Climbing to the top of the 33m-main mast to read the inscription was the highlight for most boys and while it is a long way up, the view is well and truly worth the climb.

The nine-day Year 9 Camps are designed to be an opportunity for challenge and leadership, as well as a preparation for Venture. A rogaïne, covering about eight square-kilometres and 20 checkpoints, followed an introductory day on the ropes course and canoes. On the third day, the boys began a five-day expedition of walking and white-water canoeing. There were many spectacular spills in the canoeing section, especially from those who were paddling through the 'washing machine' and 'shark's tooth'. In the final two days, boys were back at Kooringal to help with work around the centre, including firewood collection, track construction and maintenance, and general repairs. The highlight for many was the last activity, the 15-hour overnight solo experience.

The last camps of the year were for Year 6 students. Many hours were spent in Scarp Pool canoeing, swimming and investigating the waterway. The overnight camp was the first introduction for many to sleeping in a tent in the bush. Working to identify the local flora and understand the unique jarrah forest environment helps boys to develop a sense of place. The task of building a bush shelter for the whole group proved to be a significant challenge, but also a highlight.

Much has been achieved at Kooringal this year. Credit must go to the dedicated members of the Kooringal team who work long and hard to help students extend themselves in a challenging, often uncomfortable, but always safe environment. This year we bid farewell to Miss Laura Burt who, after four years of service, is returning to Victoria to continue teaching outdoor education in the High Country. We thank her for her service and commitment to our boys and Kooringal.

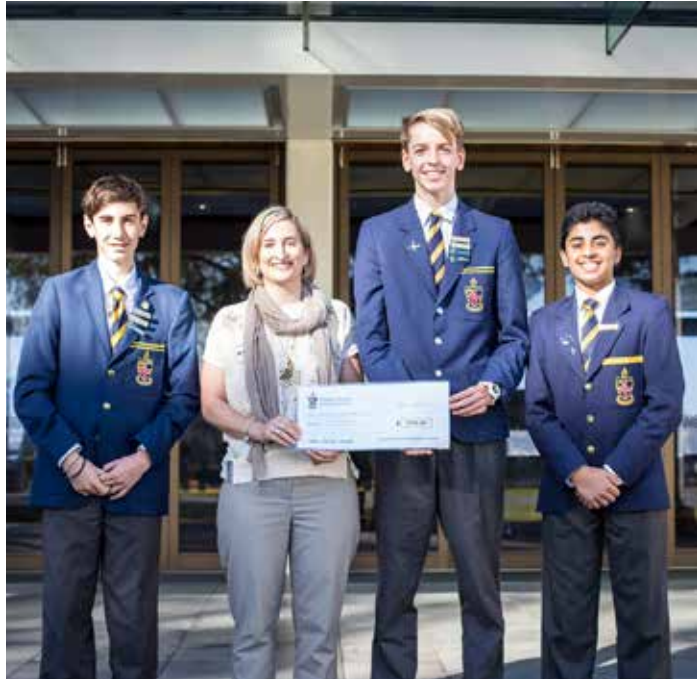
PHILANTHROPY

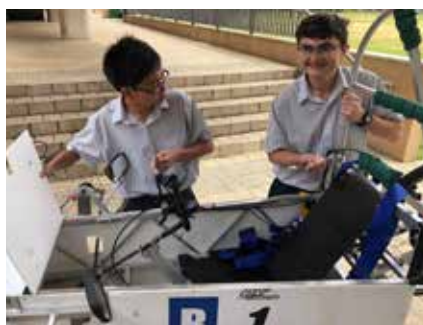

BEATTY CUP HOUSE COMPETITION

After a very strong final performance in House Athletics, Craigie was the Champion House this year, securing its first Beatty Cup win in five years. With several age group champions in its ranks, Craigie will continue to be a strong contender in the Athletics Carnival in future years. However, its win came from many consistent performances across the House competitions during 2018.

Prior to the Athletics Carnival, five Houses were within just two points of each other, illustrating how competitive the Beatty Cup competition has become. Queenslea improved the most in 2018, finishing fourth overall, with great efforts in the Teams Carnival as well as House Shout, in which its

performance of *Wonderwall* by Oasis scored an excellent 86 out of 100 from the judges. The House with the most movement in the competition was Moyes. After winning the Beatty Cup by half a point in 2017, it slipped to fifth this year.

2018 was another successful year for sailing at Christ Church Grammar School. The senior recreational sailors had a fun season sailing Puffin Pacers and BW8s, with ample opportunity for the junior boys to get out on the river on a regular basis and master the skills of both helming and crewing. This allowed all the boys to really improve their sailing skills and build strong friendships with other members of the sailing fraternity.

The teams racing squad also had a solid year, with CCGS sending two teams to the WA Secondary Schools Teams Racing Championships. Training started in Term 4 2017, so the boys were well-drilled in team building, competitive sailing, boat speed and the rules of racing. The States were held in the Term 1 holidays, and our two teams endured a challenging three days of racing to go into the finals in second and fifth place. Christ Church sent a team of eight boys, consisting of Aidan Lee (Captain), James Bougher, Cooper Hatton, Jasper Jones, Sam Rose, Max Shannon, Zachary Sprunt and Barney Woo, under the guidance of coach Mr Brendon Wright and manager Mr Geoff McGillivray. Twenty-three teams from all states competed in the regatta, which involved four days of intense racing and finals on the last day. Unfortunately, after going into the finals in fifth place, we lost the first race of that series, relegating the team to finish a disappointing eighth and with the championship title going to Westminster School from South Australia. However, with such a young team and a lot of promising young talent, CCGS Sailing is well prepared to be very competitive in teams racing, at both the State and national level, for the next couple of years.

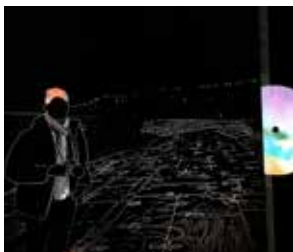

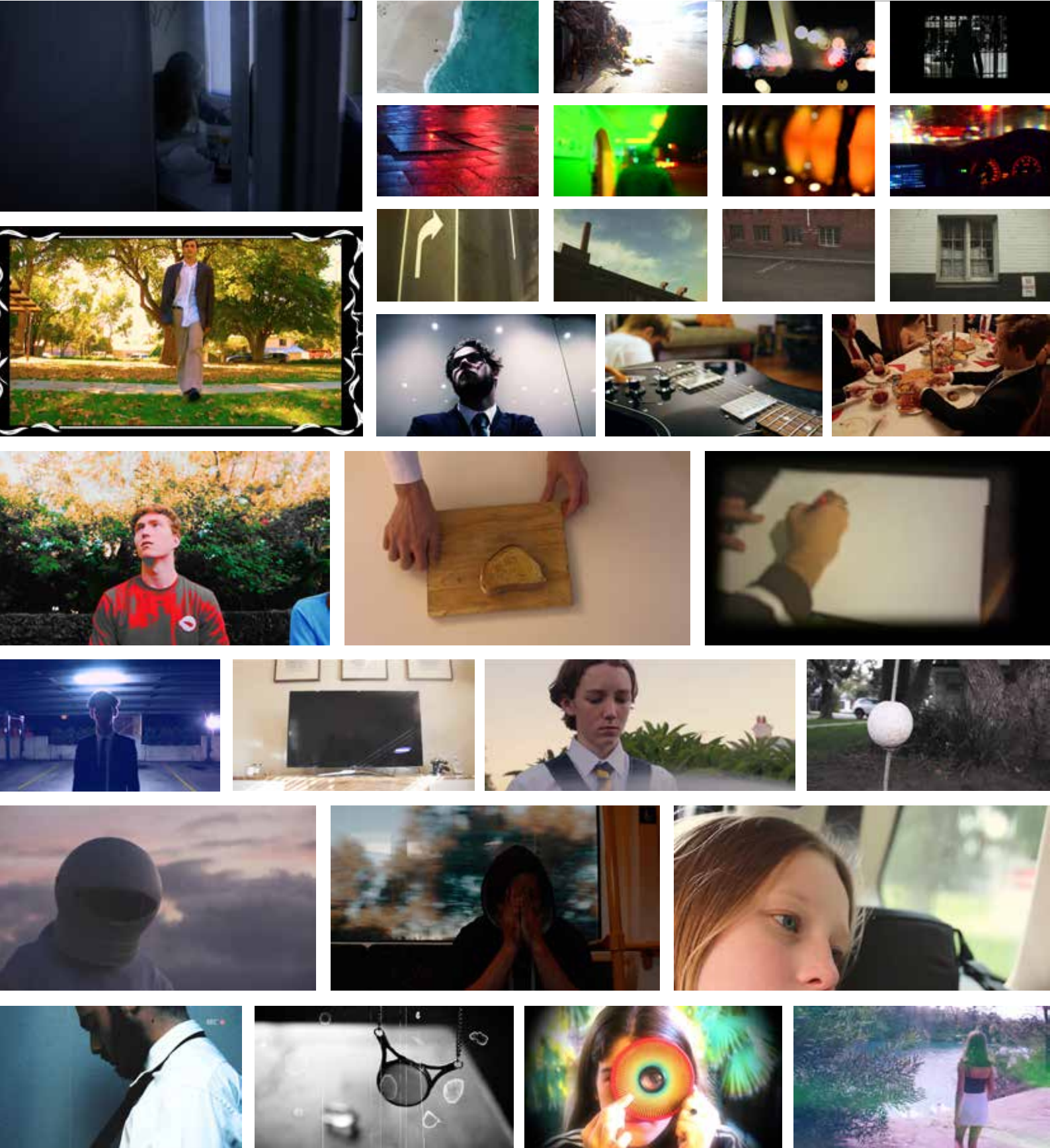

This year the Student Wellbeing Committee, led by inaugural Wellbeing Prefect Amitabh Jeganathan, built on its successes of 2017 and focused on improving mental health awareness and destigmatisation.

After hosting an open meeting in Term 1, attended by students from Years 9 to 12, we designed and completed a range of activities and posters.

Lunch and Learn mindfulness sessions were hosted on Thursdays for Year 12s, and House Dodgeball and Soccer tournaments raised awareness about the role that sport and team

activities can play in wellbeing, with over 70 boys participating in each tournament. A student support group provided a safe space for both LGBTQI and non-LGBTQI students.

Mental Health Week marked the culmination of the hard work of the committee, with great success throughout the School. Activities included live music performed in the Refectory, a stress ball-making station that distributed over 200 stress balls, and, thanks to the library's support, both a lunchtime mindfulness session and a board game lunch, in addition to a display. The Prep School also held similar activities.

CENTRE FOR EXCELLENCE

Boys of high academic potential and achievement are catered for by each academic department through classroom extension, enrichment and varied co-curricular offerings.

The Centre for Excellence runs two additional programs directed at providing these students with learning challenges and opportunities: the Enigma Program and the da Vinci Decathlon.

The da Vinci Decathlon is a competition in which teams of eight students compete across 10 different academic disciplines. It is a frantic and exciting day of competition, with students completing several very challenging tasks at once and allocating their time accordingly.

Christ Church's strongest performances were in the Mathematics, Code Breaking and Cartography rounds. Our Year 10 team finished first overall, with a first-place finish in Code Breaking, and the Year 8 team finished sixth overall, with a first-place finish in the Mathematics round.

The Enigma program runs throughout the year and involves 10 to 20 students of high academic potential from each year group in Years 7 to 9. The program has two main aims: it provides a forum for gifted and talented boys to pursue an area of passion and enables them to collaborate with like-minded students of different ages, developing leadership and teamwork skills.

Teams of students across Years 7 to 9 worked together on high-level, open-ended projects throughout the year. Several students in Years 10 and 11 were also involved as mentors for each group.

Group projects covered a range of different topics. Boys worked together to:

- design an electric vehicle
- build a water-saving garden
- design an energy-efficient house
- build solar-powered and electric boats
- develop an education program to encourage healthy nutrition
- design a small-scale vertical farm
- build a three-dimensional printer and
- propose a redevelopment plan for Melvista Oval.





COMPUTER SCIENCE

The Computer Science Department has enjoyed an exciting year, with students exploring many different aspects of computing through a variety of activities. From building their own computers, to designing and creating their own Windows-based apps, it has been pleasing to see boys embrace the opportunities they have been given.

Our Digital Thinking course has been in place for several years, so we were well prepared for the introduction of the compulsory Digital Technologies curriculum for Years 7 and 8 in 2018. More than just teaching boys how a computer works, the thrust of this course is the development of algorithmic and computational thinking skills through analysing problems and coming up with step-by-step solutions. These important skills are transferable across disciplines and it has been pleasing to see steady improvement in these key areas.

The introduction of new Microsoft Surface devices to senior classes has created an opportunity to introduce new programming initiatives. Moving away from iOS development, boys have had the chance to develop apps for their Windows devices using C# and the Windows Presentation Foundation framework.

In an exciting development, the Year 10 Computer Science class completed an Introduction to Cyber Security unit, which included an excursion to Edith Cowan University in Joondalup. This is the leading cyber-security research centre in Australia and we are looking forward to working with them to bring this growing area to our boys.

HS1511 is a course run by the University of New South Wales (UNSW) based on a first-year university unit. The course gives students a holistic introduction to computing, teaching fundamental computing concepts through the use of the programming language of C. The course is targeted at Year 11 students but at CCGS, the best and brightest Year 10 coders are invited to take part. Being a university course, it requires many hours of hard work and commitment, building the essential skills of organisation, time management and work ethic. This year we enrolled a record number of Year 10s, with eight students completing the unit.

Every week, they watched about four hours of lectures online, completed numerous programming activities, and worked on assignments consisting of sections on time management, teamwork, coding craftsmanship and their own pet project. For the first time, the regular Wednesday afternoon tutorials were run by Year 11 mentors – a highly successful innovation that allowed the older boys to develop their leadership and presentation skills.

To successfully complete the course, the Year 10s juggled their normal academic subjects, other co-curricular commitments and the massive workload the course placed on them. Completing the course is a huge testament to their prowess, and has given them excellent preparation for Year 11, Year 12 and university.

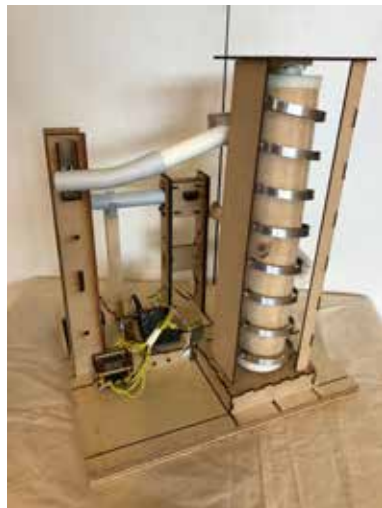

We began 2018 celebrating another year of improvement in our ATAR English results and, in particular, a Certificate of Excellence for Julian Tonkin. In Literature, marks remained strong across the cohort.

The English Department is constantly striving for improvement. This year we continued to work on provision for composition at all levels in order to strengthen boys' understanding of this element of the ATAR courses. Scope and sequence work, undertaken by Mrs Sharyn Flinn and the department's leadership team, is ongoing to ensure our programs are consistent in providing challenge and incremental learning. Teachers continue to work with Nexus to provide greater interactivity, and a significant number of new texts have been taught this year in the interests of keeping our courses vibrant and up-to-date. Mr Neil Walker was a member of the organising committee for the Australian Association for the Teaching of English/Australian Literacy Educators' Association National Conference and worked with a small number of our students to create a video to promote Perth and the Literacy Teachers' Conference, held in July at the Perth Convention and Exhibition Centre. Mr Simon Hunn continued to serve on the School Curriculum and Standards Authority's Literature Course Advisory Committee.

The boys have been lucky enough to be visited on a number of occasions, in a number of different year groups, by a range of speakers. Ms Tracey Rouhiainen's Year 11 General English class was treated to a talk from old boy 'legend' Matthew Gabriele, the first ever CCGS old boy to reach the summit of Mount Everest; Ms Margi Shipley's Year 8 students were humbled by a visit from Holocaust survivor Hetty Verolme, timed to coincide with their study of John Boyne's *The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas*; and Perth theatre director, actor, writer and old boy Stuart Halusz spoke to Mr Spencer Davis's Year 12 ATAR English class about representations of politics and homosexuality within the world of theatre, by way of contextualising Tony Kushner's drama *Angels in America*. Old boy Yannick Spencer also spoke to this class about the difference between the reality and representation of being a management accountant to tie in with the boys' study of *The Reluctant Fundamentalist*. Ms Medhavi Karu's

Year 9 Creative Writing class was inspired by performance poet Jakub Dammer. Fresh from her success in Los Angeles, we once again welcomed AJ Betts back to fan the flames of creativity in the lower school. In Term 4, Mr Walker's Year 12 Literature students were inspired by a visit from Lucy Dougan to discuss her own work, *White Clay*. Dr Lorraine O'Brien returned to give a lecture to Year 12 Literature students on Joseph Conrad and we welcomed Bride Phillips and Kieran Dolin to lecture on Shakespeare's *Othello* and William Blake's poetry respectively. We are extremely grateful to the Centre for Ethics for their assistance in organising such a rich and diverse range of speakers for the boys. All Year 12 ATAR students attended the English and Literature Conference at Curtin University and the standard of lectures was higher than ever, with something for every student to take away.

This year we welcomed Ms Sarah Downes, initially replacing Ms Claudia Feldman for her maternity leave, and Ms Rouhiainen, who joined us to replace Ms Shipley for the

duration of her long service leave. We are delighted that they will both be staying on in the English Department in 2019. Ms Clare Macfarlane left us at the end of the year to take on a role at Churchlands Senior High School. Ms Macfarlane made huge improvements to our provision pastorally and academically for our English as an additional language or dialect students and was an excellent ATAR English teacher. We wish her well for the future. Mr Hunn is moving from his role of Assistant Head of English to the Director of the Centre for Ethics. We thank Mr Hunn for his huge contribution to the development of the English Department and are glad that he will continue to teach English next year. We also said a fond farewell to Ms Margaret Brophy who will not be returning from leave. Ms Brophy was the architect of the lower school courses that still remain in the English Department today. Mr Hunn and Ms Brophy's legacy, from their years as Assistant Heads of English and Heads of English, will live on for some time and we are extremely grateful to them both.

Following the 2017 WACE results, Christ Church was named as a top-performing school in the subject for the sixth consecutive year. Year 12 Physical Education Studies teachers Mr Tim Chaney and Mr Tom Jerram also received awards, in recognition of having taught Certificate of Excellence recipients.

Mr Jeremy Power was the mastermind behind Physical Education Week in 2018. His enthusiasm for all things active and good for the mind was on display during Term 2. The PE staff continued to work closely with Mr Liam Casson, Director of the Wynne Centre for Boys' Health and Wellbeing, to promote a positive mindset, happiness, stress management and optimism in all of our boys. This was a particular focus during Mental Health Week in October.

The Humanities at Christ Church have enjoyed another productive year in 2018. Our 2017 ATAR results were most pleasing and provided a positive springboard for a dynamic beginning to the new academic year. Our students were recognised by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA) as among the best performing in the State for all our ATAR courses – Accounting and Finance, Ancient History, Economics, Geography, Modern History, Philosophy and Ethics, and Politics and Law. Some notable individual results, receiving Certificates of Excellence from SCSA for finishing in the top 0.5 per cent of candidates who sit the ATAR course examination, included Daniel Robbins and Liam Tien in Economics, Harry Vijayasekaran in Modern History, Jesse Zhou in Philosophy and Ethics, and Edward Galluccio in Politics and Law.

It was also a pleasure to welcome some new staff members into the Humanities Department this year. Mr Matthew Smith, an old boy of Christ Church, specialises in Philosophy and Ethics as well as teaching Year 7 and 8 Humanities, and Mr Jon Wyllie specialises in Geography and teaches Year 7 Humanities. We have also benefitted from the expertise of some short-term staff members – Mr Thomas Goodbourn (another old boy) for the year and Ms Laura Del Rosario in Term 3. The knowledge and skills these new staff members brought to Christ Church were greatly beneficial to the Humanities Department and enriched the teaching and learning programs for all our students.

The Humanities encompasses a diverse range of subjects and topics. In Years 7 and 8, the boys delve into four broad subjects with their teacher – Civics and Citizenship, Economics and Business, and Geography and History. In Years 9 and 10, the boys have different teachers for each unit to undertake more specialised learning programs in preparation for the senior subjects of the Humanities. This year saw the continued consolidation of the Western Australian Curriculum with the development of our Civics and Citizenship units, work which will continue in 2019. In this regard, the Humanities Department is at the vanguard of assisting our students to embrace the conceptualisation of citizenship, to help them become active and informed citizens in society, committed to social justice and social

cohesion, with the capacity and motivation to engage with their communities, be they local, regional, national or global.

There have been many exciting educational opportunities for our Year 7 to 10 boys to engage with their subject disciplines beyond the confines of the classroom and the Claremont campus. Year 7s used an app on their iPads to collect data and complete field work in and around Claremont as part of their liveability research. The Year 8s visited the Supreme Court of Western Australia, engaging in a mock trial and observing an actual trial. Year 9 students visited the Parliament of Western Australia, seeing the Legislative Assembly in action during Question Time and completing other activities around elections and the Commonwealth Constitution. They also attended the Perth Zoo in their studies of biomes, looking at the interrelationship of flora, fauna, soil and climate. The Year 10s embarked on field trips to Point Peron and Port Coogee, examining coastal processes in action, including natural systems as well as the human interventions in managing coastlines. Year 10 Investing and Enterprise students attended the University of Western Australia's Rosemarie Nathanson Financial Markets Trading Room for a presentation from Winthrop Professor Raymond Da Silva Rosa of the latest market analysis.

In the senior years, the boys here at Christ Church continue to impress by the level of dedication they have to their studies and their genuine commitment to academic excellence.

This is strongly complemented by the capacity and commitment of staff to provide the stimulus and depth of knowledge necessary to maintain this culture of achievement. Along with their excellent teaching, the staff have organised opportunities for Year 12 Economics and Politics and Law students to attend the PwC Federal Budget Breakfast; Economics students also attended the Student Economic Forum through the Western Australian Chamber of Commerce and Industry; journalist Gemma Tognini spoke to the Year 12 Politics and Law class about the media and politics; the Year 11 Philosophy and Ethics class benefitted from two old boys, Mitchell Barrington and David Graieg, coming back to share their knowledge and experience. Mitchell is studying Philosophy at UWA and is currently researching epistemology. He presented on the different theories of knowledge. David, a PhD student at Murdoch University, presented on Descartes' rationalism and Locke's empiricism. Both speakers were highly engaging and the boys profited from their expertise.

Some further achievements by Humanities students included:

- Akio Ho (Year 12) and Daniel Ling (Year 11) were the State winners of the Senior and Junior divisions respectively in the Australian Economics and Business Studies Competition.
- In the Australian Geography Competition, Matthew Bailey (Year 8) did particularly





well this year, finishing in the top one per cent of students for his age nationally.

- James Pike (Year 11) came second in Western Australia for the ASX Schools Share Market Game.
- Noah Keleman (Year 11), Rafferty Maher (Year 10), Mark Morris (Year 10), Alec McDonald (Year 10) and Matthew Sisson (Year 10) took part in the Murdoch University Economic Indicators Forecasting Competition: Noah Keleman came second in the Senior division across the State, winning \$500; in the Junior division, Mark Morris also came second, earning himself \$500; the team of Rafferty Maher, Alec McDonald and Matthew Sisson came first in the State with a prize of \$1000.
- Tom McGrath (Year 10) was selected as one of 10 ambassadors to go on the 2019 Premier's Anzac Student Tour to Vietnam.

Finally, I would like to recognise and thank all the staff in the Humanities Department for their hard work and commitment. In any given year, staff members in Humanities might teach across any number of subjects and even, occasionally, different learning areas. The Humanities is a challenging multi-disciplinary learning area, which demands much of our staff. We have a knowledgeable and accomplished faculty whose collaboration and co-operation reflect their commitment and desire to provide wonderful learning opportunities to their students. I would like to offer our gratitude to all our teachers on behalf of myself and the boys.

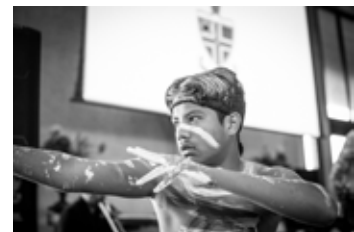

Always a centre of ethnic and cultural diversity, this year the Languages Department welcomed assistants from France, China and Japan, as well as the return of Madame Curlewis from long service leave. 2018 was marked by a range of activities and some outstanding achievements by students, who appreciate the importance of learning a language. We are thrilled with the number of students who continue their language studies at university, with a number of old boys coming back to the School during the year to talk to students about effective language learning. This input from past students has been very well received.

In Chinese, we began the year celebrating the arrival of the Year of the Dog. Throughout the year, the boys have been engaged in a variety of different activities to expand their cultural understanding and experience. Year 7s, 9s and 10s all had day excursions to the Confucius Institute where they learnt some simple kung fu, painted Chinese opera masks and learnt some of the basics of Chinese calligraphy. The Year 9s and 10s finished their excursion with a dumpling lunch, which they very much enjoyed.

Year 8s practised their skills of reading and typing Chinese characters and created animal stories on their iPads, which they then read to Year 1 and Year 2 classes in the Preparatory School. They also performed a few songs and a poem in Chinese and enjoyed interacting and sharing their knowledge with the younger boys.

Term 3 saw the arrival of a group of students from the Huijia school in Beijing, who spent three weeks attending classes and partaking in school life. This exchange has now run successfully for eight years and one of our Year 10 students, Harry Stevenson, spent five weeks at

Huijia in Term 2, returning with greatly increased confidence in using the language.

The Chinese Speaking Competition was held at the University of Western Australia in September, with four of our Year 7 and 8 students competing. Sivan Sharma took out first place for Year 7 with a dramatic and entertaining speech, and James Newton impressed in the Year 8 competition to take out second place. Hawk Hughes and Noirit Seal also spoke and all students are to be commended for their hard work in preparing for this competition.

In French, the boys enjoyed a variety of activities offered. In March, Year 10 students watched a French movie during the French Film Festival at Cinema Paradiso. In Term 3, Year 12 students shared a delicious meal with MLC girls at Bistro des Artistes in Subiaco. In Term 4, Year 10 and 11 boys were fortunate to share a meal with MLC girls at the same restaurant.

A number of students took part in the Alliance Française Poetry Competition. Congratulations to Finn Lip (Year 8) for being awarded first prize, an outstanding achievement. We also completed the Alliance Française Examination for Year 9, 10, 11 and 12 students in Term 3. Edward Elias (Year 11) and Henry Pemberton (Year 12) were among the top 20 best performing French students in the State for their respective year groups and were invited to the second round for a chance to finish in the top three.

In April, 16 students participated in the French Tour. Students visited our sister school Saint-Jean et la Croix and had the opportunity to partake in the Anzac Day dawn service, a memorable moment for a number of students with historical connections.



LANGUAGES

In Term 3, we welcomed the French exchange students back to Christ Church, putting on a football match in which we competed against the French team. We also enjoyed some pancakes, thanks to the services of Crêpes de Paris from Claremont.

Japanese students have been involved in a variety of excursions and incursions including a Japanese tea ceremony, kite-making and an excursion to the Hyogo Prefecture, in which they had fun wearing sumo outfits and practising their wrestling skills. Year 7 students enjoyed an excursion to the zoo, following their unit studying animals. Throughout the year, students had the opportunity to taste a variety of traditional Japanese food, which enhanced their cultural experience.

Several competitions also engaged students across the language areas with this year's OzClo (Australian Computational and Linguistic Olympiad) team having its best year ever. Our top team of Year 12 students, including Akio Ho, Ben Kempson, Albert Smith and Daniel Stark, was ultimately placed third in Australia, narrowly missing the opportunity to compete in the International Olympiad.

Student across all languages again enjoyed competing in the Language Perfect Competition, with Finn Lip (Year 8) achieving an Elite award, awarded to the top 0.2 per cent of students globally.

Another event enjoyed by students of all languages was the annual Languages Quiz with MLC held in the Refectory. As always the event was hotly contested and students enjoyed a fun afternoon of challenges about their linguistic understanding and general knowledge.

In Term 4, we were thrilled to learn of the success of Japanese and French students in the Side by Side competition run by the Modern Language Teachers' Association of WA. In French, Jack Landau and Finn Lip were winners in the Year 7/8 French competition; Joshua Chen and Jason Liu in the Year 7/8 Japanese competition and Daniel Jones and Jason Lu in the Year 9/10 Japanese competition.

At the end of Term 2, Madame Nicky Griffin-Appadoo stood down from her role as Head of Department for family reasons and Madame Elisabeth Rosinel and Ms Yang Zhang shared the role for the remainder of the year. We thank Madame Griffin-Appadoo for her work in the department and wish her well for the future.

MATHEMATICS

The year started well, with excellent results in the 2017 ATAR Mathematics examinations. Christ Church boys also achieved seven Certificates of Excellence in Mathematics Applications and one Certificate of Excellence in Mathematics Methods. These certificates are awarded to students in the top 0.5 per cent of candidates, based on their examination marks.

NAPLAN results were very strong again this year. All students who sat the Year 9 NAPLAN paper are at or above minimum standard and almost all meet the Band 8 requirement in Numeracy. These results highlight the strength of our Mathematics program. Our Year 7 students also achieved impressive results, with our boys placed well above the State and national average in this year group.

Success in competitions continued throughout the year, with the Australian Mathematics Trust naming Christ Church the 2018 Champion School for our contribution to Mathematics and Algorithmic Thinking Competitions by the. One of the many highlights of the year was the selection of William Hu (Year 12), for the second consecutive year, to the Australian

Mathematical Olympiad Team. He competed in Romania in July, in the 59th annual competition, in which he was awarded a Bronze medal.

The annual Mathematics Association of Western Australia's Have Sum Fun competition saw our Year 7 to 12 boys pitting their wits against other like-minded mathematicians, in a series of timed questions, over the course of an evening. One of our senior teams finished second, narrowly beaten in the final round by Scotch College. Our junior team, consisting of Year 7s and 8s, finished first in its competition at Trinity College.

The Computation and Algorithmic Thinking Competition in March saw many of our boys test their problem-solving skills to identify computer programming potential. This year, we achieved three High Distinctions, 35 Distinctions and 71 Credit certificates: an excellent result for this competition, which incorporates unique three-stage tasks.

We also continued our involvement with the Primary Mathematics World Contest in Hong Kong in mid-July. The four boys selected represented Western Australia with pride and performed well against strong competition from other nations.

In the main competition for the year, the Australian Mathematics Competition, Christ Church was awarded five prizes across Years 7, 8, 10 and 12. Joshua Chen (Year 8) won a medal, one of only two awarded in WA this year. Joshua and William Hu (Year 12) were announced as Best in State for their respective year groups and Albert Smith (Year 12) as a

High Achiever at the Australian Mathematics Trust Award evening. We also achieved 30 High Distinctions and 87 Distinctions across Years 7 to 12. Several students went on to compete in the Australian Intermediate Olympiad. Jason Lu (Year 10) and Joshua Chen were awarded High Distinctions in this very tough competition.

We rounded the year off with our annual participation in the West Australian Junior Mathematics Olympiad (WAJO), in which teams from Years 7 to 9 compete against other schools in an individual and team competition. We won several awards, both individually and in the team competition. Matthew Bailey (Year 8) received a Merit Award of Excellence; Krish Mall won Best Year 8 Student and Joshua Chen won Best Overall Student. The WA Mathematics Olympiad Committee Special Award for excellence was awarded to our Year 9 team, consisting of Isaac Ching, Emil Ong Ee Zy, Isaac Tan and Daniel Zhou. The David McDougall Award for Excellence for the Most Outstanding Year 8 Team went to Joshua Chen, Krish Mall, Jin Shen Lim and Sean Morgan.

Students in the Peter Moyes Centre (PMC) have enjoyed another busy and successful year, with a number of highlights and valuable experiences. Our Year 11 students, Julian Pizzino and Ben Strong, began work experience in places such as ParaQuad, Coles, Bunnings and Dome; Digby Forshaw, our Year 10 student, tackled the challenges of Venture like a champion and Year 9 boys, Thomas Andrews, Ben Rock and Ben Shields, wrote an incredibly entertaining book for the boys in the Preparatory School. These are just some examples of all the exciting projects undertaken during the year.

We began with the opening of the 'Dirt Away Car Wash' as our Enterprise project. The boys planned what was needed to open a business, estimated expenses and learnt about words like 'revenue' and 'profit'. By mid-Term 1, Dirt Away was ready to open its doors. Every Tuesday, during Terms 1 and 4, the car wash was in full motion. Dirt Away was a very popular initiative among members of staff and the boys took on this new venture with a great sense of responsibility and a strong work ethic.

Due to weather conditions, Dirt Away closed its doors during Term 2 and Term 3. This time was used on a Community Access program in which the boys were exposed to planning trips to the shops and understanding public transport. Life skills, such as independently ordering a meal, finding the right item in

the supermarket and knowing how much change they should receive, were some of the targets. During these community trips, the boys shared a few coffee dates with girls from Mercedes College's Educational Support Centre. These encounters gave them the opportunity to further develop their social skills as well as forming new friendships.

A highlight from this year was the boys' participation and leadership in both the Senior School and Prep School Principal's Food Drive. Digby Forshaw, Julian Pizzino and Ben Strong led these two initiatives with commitment, resulting in more than 800 packages of food for the homeless that were donated to St George's Cathedral. The Dean of Perth, The Very Reverend Richard Pengelley, commended the boys and they were the first three students in the School to receive The Principal's Award for their service.

Another important event was the creation of the book *Power Man*. Thomas Andrews, Digby Forshaw, Ben Rock and Ben Shields worked really hard over two terms to write, edit and illustrate a wonderful story about a superhero called Power Man. The four students hosted a book launch to present their book and answer questions about the story. It was a lovely afternoon that was attended by several members of the school community. The boys decided to donate the book to the new Prep School for the younger students to enjoy.

LEARNING SUPPORT AND PMC STAFF

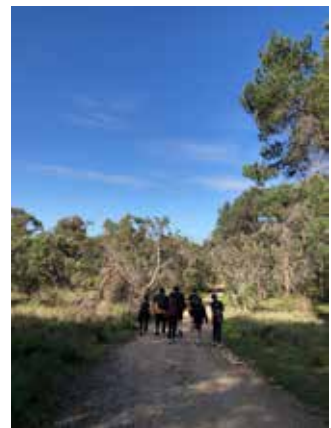

The Science Department remains an influential and crucial part of the lives of all students at Christ Church. This year saw many successes, as the boys were able to explore their interests and measure themselves against students from across Australia.

SCIENCE OLYMPIAD

Olympiad results in 2018 continued to showcase the exemplary quality of the boys at Christ Church, with a number of Year 10 and 11 students sitting the Science Olympiad Qualifying Exams. Christ Church received 10 High Distinction certificates among many other notable achievements and we are extremely proud of these students' performance. To put these achievements into perspective, this places our students in the top 10 per cent of students in Australia. In addition to this success, Marcus Handley and Ben Davison-Petch (both Year 11) were among the top 24 students in Biology and Physics respectively, receiving invitations to the Olympiad Summer School at the Australian National University. Selection for the Australian Olympiad teams will be based upon students' performance at the summer school.

SCIENCE WEEK

Staff and students celebrated Science Week with a variety of activities, including the now famous Big Science Quiz. This year's National Science Week theme was Game Changers and Change Makers with a myriad of events across Western Australia to raise awareness. A series of science-related documentaries and films were shown to promote understanding of the many issues we currently face and the week culminated in a photography competition. Technology also played a key role, with students enjoying the virtual world of coral reefs and the human body.

JUNIOR YOUNG PHYSICISTS' TOURNAMENT

For the first time, Christ Church sent five Year 10 students to the Junior Young Physicists' Tournament (JYPT) held in Hobart. Christ Church students Declan Barrett, Lucas Kailis, Kartikeya Kaushal, Jason Lu and Adam Robbins represented the School with distinction, bringing home the JYPT trophy.

NATIONAL ICAS SCIENCE COMPETITION

Continuing our strong association with UNSW Global, all students in Years 7 and 8, along with a number of students from

Years 9 and 10, took part in the National ICAS Science Competition. Traditionally our boys perform extremely well, and this year was no exception. Many boys received High Distinctions for their efforts, placing them in the top one per cent of students in Australia.

INDO-PACIFIC ERA IN SPACE CONFERENCE

Selected boys from Years 10 and 11 had the opportunity to attend the Indo-Pacific Era in Space Conference held at Optus Stadium in October, highlighting the incredible science, research and innovations required to underpin the newly-formed Australian Space Agency. As well as politicians, eminent professors and leaders in their fields, the boys were exposed to many speakers committed to making Western Australia the home of the Australian Space Agency and associated industries.

YEAR 11 BIOLOGY

Year 11 Biology students found themselves in the bush at the Forest Heritage Centre in Dwellingup to conduct fieldwork related to population ecology, sampling techniques, forest recovery and conservation. The diversity of flora and fauna provided a very rich and rewarding experience for all those involved.

YEAR 7 HERDSMAN LAKE

The WA Gould League at Herdsman Lake Wildlife Centre again featured in the Year

7 curriculum. Students were given the opportunity to enhance their ecology knowledge with hands-on fieldwork, participating in the Mud N MiniBeasts and Swamp Safari programs. They scooped invertebrates from the lake and tested the water quality using a number of methods. Some students were even fortunate enough to interact with rescued long-necked turtles. As the largest wetland ecosystem in the inner metropolitan area, the lake plays an important role in educating boys about their roles and responsibilities towards the organisms we share the planet with, as well as reinforcing the importance of being a global citizen.

FAREWELL

In Term 1 we said farewell to Dr Romeo Charles, a much-loved Chemistry teacher and stalwart of the Science Department. His many years of dedication and guiding influence upon the lives of the boys he taught cannot be underestimated. We thank him for the many years of hard work and excellent results, which are truly appreciated by students, staff and parents.

Science continues to positively impact the world we live in today and this is something the Science Department is clearly aware of, providing an innovative and dynamic learning experience for our students. We look forward to the exciting challenges of 2019.

FUTURE PROBLEM SOLVING PROGRAM INTERNATIONAL

A group of boys from the Preparatory and Senior Schools travelled to the United States to compete in the Future Problem Solving Program International (FPSPi). The 12 boys, comprising three Year 6s and nine Year 7s, participated in the Global Issues Problem Solving (GIPS) component of the competition, held in Wisconsin, in which participants in teams of four research a series of global topics and learn a six-step creative problem-solving process. They then apply knowledge of their topic and creative problem-solving to address an imagined situation, termed Future Scene. On final placing, our teams ranked 22, 32 and 43 out of a total 63 international teams. While in the US, the boys also enjoyed the opportunity to visit the city of Dallas and its local attractions including the Dallas Art Museum, Texas School Book Depository, Six Flags theme park and a baseball game.





FUTURE PROBLEM SOLVING PROGRAM AUSTRALIA

Six Year 6 boys from the Preparatory School spent a weekend in Melbourne at the Future Problem Solving (FPS) Program National Finals. 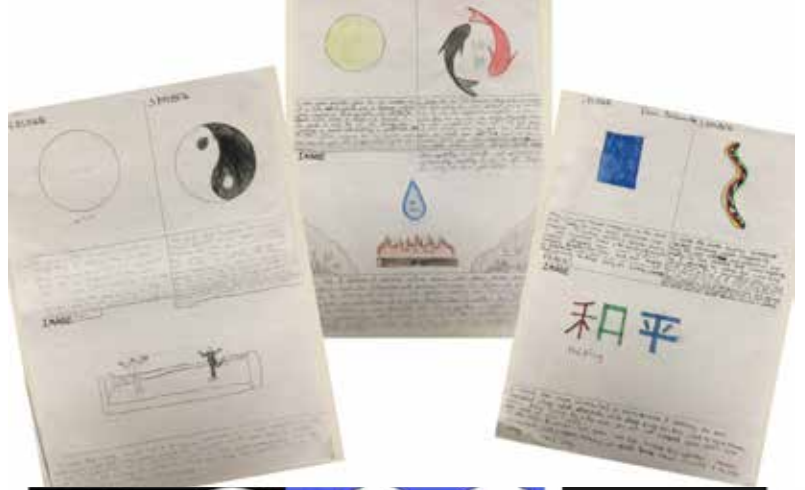

CLUBS

ART CLUB

In Term 1, a small group of boys learnt the stitching methods necessary to create their own piece of embroidered wall art through our A Stich in Time classes. They were offered a contemporary approach to embroidery, taking it out of the past and into the 21st century with modern designs and a relaxed attitude. The boys really enjoyed the meditative process of sewing and walked away with a wonderful piece of contemporary art. During Term 2, our Artrageous class explored artists and artworks from around the globe. Using their research as inspiration, the boys designed, collaged, sculpted and built a series of artworks. Particular focus centred on the work of Juan Chavez – a skateboard ramp designer. The delight on the students' faces was immense when they combined their artwork with their Tech Decks in the final lesson. In Term 3, inspired by the work of Steve Wintercroft, students created their own geometric, three-dimensional paper mask in Mysterious Masks. Using a variety of materials and design ideas, they built, painted and modelled their wearable art forms.

BOOK CLUB

This year's Book Club was lots of fun. Keen readers from Years 4 to 6 met every Wednesday lunchtime to read, talk about books, play games and share delicious snacks brought by one of the members. A highlight this year was the Readers' Challenge competition, in which Christ Church finished second. Other highlights were making our own puddings to celebrate the 100th anniversary of *The Magic Pudding* by Norman Lindsay and creating mood boards (visual representations of books).

BOYS KNIT TOO CLUB

This year the inaugural Boys Knit Too Club was launched. All of the boys were brand new to knitting but showed great persistence and creativity in learning how to knit their own chunky scarves and beanie hats. The boys (and staff) also enjoyed taking time out to chat, breathe and relax during their busy and energetic days at school.

DRAWING CLUB

Drawing Club is for boys who love to draw. There is no need to be an expert. Some boys choose to follow step-by-step instructions to draw things of interest, while others like to let their imaginations flow with free choice drawing. It is always fun and creative.

DUNGEONS AND DRAGONS CLUB

Helping students to immerse themselves into worlds of storytelling, this club is fuelled by their imagination, working together to solve the quests described to them by the Dungeon Master. Each student learns the skills to take their games from the classroom to their own games at home.

FIRE TECH CLUB

The Years 4 to 6 Fire Tech Club was a blast this year! We learnt so many cool technological skills. We particularly enjoyed learning about game design using Unity software, as well as looking at the elements of flight through building and flying different types of drones.

DANCE AND DRAMA

The Drama and Dance program is centred around the boys having fun while learning the base skills required for Drama in the Senior School. We aim to create a relaxed environment in which they are free to explore and express themselves as well as developing the elements of drama and dance through various activities and projects.

Terms 1 and 2 are devoted to all things drama. The boys presented a short monologue at the end of Term 1 as a dress run for their work in Term 2. The Year 5 and 6 boys were given the challenge of writing their own monologues, while the Year 3 and 4 boys worked on two-person scenes. Also, in Term 1, boys from Years 3 to 6 were able to participate in a modern musical theatre dance club after school. DANCE AND DRAMA

Term 3 is all about dance. Classes are run much like a formal dance lesson. We begin with work on flexibility, strength and co-ordination. This is followed by activities based around the elements of dance. The final project is a short dance routine that the boys choreograph themselves. Term 3 is also the time we put together the big Year 6 musical production. This year's all-singing, all-dancing spectacular was *Ali Baba and the Bongo Bandits*. PHILANTHROPY

Philanthropy has been a big focus for the Preparatory School in 2018. Boys in Years 5 and 6 participated in the Young Philanthropist Project, choosing a charity to research and then writing about the impact the charity has and why its work should be supported. We considered what it means to be philanthropic and why it is important to give time, treasure or talent to a cause you really believe in. Donating treasure (your money) is as important as donating your time and volunteering, as the more people who help, the more people will be helped.

For the second year in a row we celebrated NAIDOC Week with a poster competition. Special guests Olman and Alton Walley came to the School and gave us an insight into traditional nomadic lifestyle, as well as their innate understanding of the Earth and its origin. Learning about the Indigenous people's use of traditional knowledge to sustain the country for over 40 000 years was fascinating. We used what we learnt about Indigenous culture to create our posters, incorporating traditional techniques and using symbols for animals and people. Three winning posters were displayed in the NAIDOC Art Exhibition in the Old Boys' Gallery and the winning students received a personal art lesson with some of the Indigenous Scholarship students from the Senior School.

The Preparatory School has raised over \$50 000 this year for causes that are really special to us. Our biggest fundraisers were the World's Greatest Shave for the Leukaemia Foundation and our annual Lapathon for the Cambodian Children's Fund. We also donated to The Fred Hollows Foundation (where just \$25 can save someone's eyesight!), wore red to school for Redkite and had a bake sale for the RSPCA Cupcake Day. The generosity of Christ Church families was exceptional: everyone in the Preparatory School contributed in some way to the many worthy causes. Most importantly, we learnt that having compassion, raising awareness and helping others is all part of being philanthropic.



VISUAL ARTS

PAULA BOXALL AND CLAIRE DONALD / SPECIALIST ART TEACHERS



Visual Arts at Christ Church is an integral and important component of a boy's education. In 2018, we urged the boys to reach into their souls and tap into previously unknown wells of creativity and self-expression, releasing a wealth of new ideas, initiatives and innovations. The following is a synopsis of some of the wonderful work from each year group.

PRE-PRIMARY

Sharing the Planet (mixed media collage)
– Sarah Amoss's work served as inspiration for interpreting and expressing the West Australian landscape. The boys' final print and collage landscape work is characterised by underlying structures of the natural environment and the luminescent colours of the outback.

Walk in My Shoes (paper, paint and pen)
– the artistic approach for this work is mark making and is rooted in the need for young children to produce art as a means of comprehending the world around them. Students embarked on an expedition of their school grounds, intermittently

stopping to document their route and kinesthetics through drawing.

Submerged (polymer clay, plasticine) – The boys were introduced to the idea that architecture is a fundamental element of our existence. They were encouraged to recall the places they visit and inhabit, the hustle and bustle of traffic, the green pockets offering open spaces to run, or quiet places to hide. They constructed their own version of an underwater city using polymer clay.

YEAR 1

Making the Cut – the boys explored the art of cut-paper collage. They looked to artists Henri Matisse and Tom Abiss Smith for inspiration on how to assemble artworks from a collection of parts. They began by drawing and cutting out simple shapes, then assembled their collection of shapes to create their own abstract collage.

Travelling Up – following on from the great success of their Matisse-inspired cut paper collages, the Year 1s created a collaged landscape. This time we used some of the

more muted tones from the Making the Cut project to assemble a landscape inspired by the work of the Kew Gardens illustration team.

Artomology – this project was inspired by the children's television series *Minuscule*, which combines three-dimensional characters, animation and live footage to present a bird's-eye view of an insect's day-to-day existence. After watching the short films, the boys set about designing, drawing and creating their own insects.

Feathered Finery – the boys viewed work by artist Jesse Breakwell. Students discussed lines, shape, movement and colour. They were encouraged to create their own Breakwell-inspired owls and flamingoes, complete with loose lines and fluidity.

Budgie Bonanza – in Term 4, students explored the work of Pete Corner, inspired by his budgie prints and sculptures. The boys used painted papers to cut and collage their own work. The completed designs encompassed incredible colour, shape and line.



YEAR 2

Animal Antics (pencil, markers, digital printing) – the boys were introduced to the idea of mark making as vocabulary, then encouraged to be mindful through exploratory drawing practice with a focus on tempo, frequency, speed, pressure and energy. Their final artwork of an animal was inspired by the colourful works of UK artist Ashley Percival and *Where the Wild Things Are* illustrator Maurice Sendak.

Forest of Dreams (wire, paper, paint, straws) – the basis for this project is the whimsical work of artists Terri Chiao and Adam Frezza. The boys worked across various media, learning aspects of drawing, painting, collage, sculpture and design, as they crafted images and objects that represented their experience of the natural environment.

YEAR 3

CCGS Voyager (collagraph, etching, paper collage) – Sidney Nolan habitually used other forms of creative expression to explore ideas and inform his work, poetry being one of his most preferred. Based on this concept, the

boys were inspired by poetry based on the trials and tribulations of being at sea. They responded by creating seaworthy vessels and landscapes that retold the story of desolate shores, whistling winds and harrowing waves.

Native Botanicals (graphite, paint, markers, plywood) – the boys' artwork embraced Australia's native flora and was based on the work of South Australian artist Dana Kinter. Students used a subdued mixed media palette to produce a multi-layered mixed media painting.

Multiple Views (digital media video) – the boys deconstructed plants and reconstructed them applying principles of balance and emphasis. They used magnifying glasses to observe minuscule details and a labyrinth of mirrors to simultaneously draw multiple perspectives. All this went to create a graphic, nature-inspired banner that they photographed and manipulated to create a digital kaleidoscope.

YEAR 4

Growing Beneath – for this project, the boys explored the organic lines and forms of

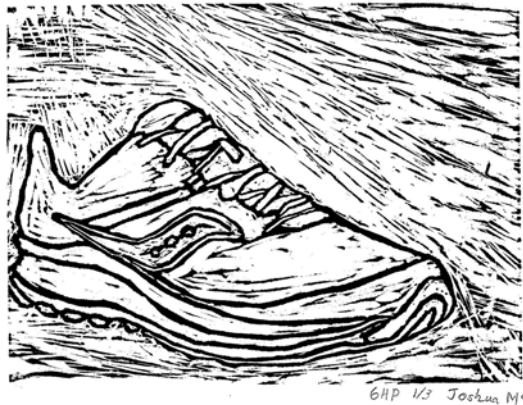
botanical still lifes. They used the work of artists Jonas Wood, Anya Brock and Leah Bartholomew as inspiration to create their own mixed media piece.

The Lost Thing – for their major sculptural project, the boys examined the work of prominent West Australian artist and author Shaun Tan. They began by responding to his short animation and book, *The Lost Thing*. From there the boys sketched their own 'lost things', then sculpted their own three-dimensional creature.

Swoop Regalia – to create these feathered fashionistas, the Year 4s began by researching and drawing different types of bird forms. They then used their two-dimensional designs as a guide for carving a three-dimensional bird form out of florist foam, then dipped them in adhesive and covered with patches of soft denim.

Discard – in Term 4, the students combined their drawing and art making skills to create a two-dimensional cardboard portrait. They were inspired by the work of artists such as Andy Quilty and Amedeo Modigliani.

VISUAL ARTS



YEAR 5

Etched in Place – the Year 5 students pondered the important question of ‘Who Am I?’ Early in Term 2, the boys were introduced to the life and art of Andy Warhol and Banksy as a way of considering photography as a self-portrait medium.

Worlds Apart – this project was inspired by our Cambodian Children’s Fund fundraising initiative and the sculptural work of Alfredo Juan Aquilizan and Isabel Gaudinez-Aquilizan. Students viewed the exhibition *In Habit: Project Another Country* and watched an interview with the artists. Using the images to springboard their ideas, students designed and built their own village.

Imagine Yourself – the Year 5 students were encouraged to imagine their own tiny world that beckoned them to form a new artwork, an unexpected love, a half open door, a beginning, a secret, a misunderstanding, a disappointment, a sunrise, a celebration. They explored a new journey through mixed media and imagined themselves tiny enough

to become the key to all the doors they want to open.

Still Life – in Term 4, the Year 5 students learnt about colour and how it simulates emotional responses. The artwork they created was rich in colour, form and tone, inspired by the still life drawings of Paul Cézanne and Georges Braque.

YEAR 6

Royal Troopers – in Term 1, the Year 6 boys created a mixed media piece that encapsulated proportion, mood and the energy of a *Star Wars* character of their choice. They explored line, colour, shape, pattern, unity, balance and contrast to complete a collaged work. Students were inspired by viewing images by artist Sacha Goldberger.

Stepping Up – this project followed the concept of ‘walking a day in my shoes’. The boys explored the complex social history and cultural significance of the footwear worn by billions of people throughout the world, then completed design drawings and transferred

their work onto lino before completing a series of prints of their shoe design.

Samurai Army – in Term 3 last year, the then Year 5s collaborated in teams to design and build a life-sized samurai warrior out of box card and hot glue. The project was such a success that, this year, we decided to extend it and have the boys create their own mini samurais out of clay. First, they perfected the art of clay-slab construction; the suits of armour are composed of separate pieces and assembled onto a drawing manikin. Once fired, we applied a special wax-based metallic paint to highlight the forms.

Taxidermy – in Term 4, students created a mixed media piece that encapsulated proportion, mood and the energy of an animal of their choice. The boys reflected on the concept of what is real and what is fake, authenticity, what value is, and how value relates to the world today. They discovered how to apply contemporary mixed media and monochromatic painting techniques to develop their artwork.

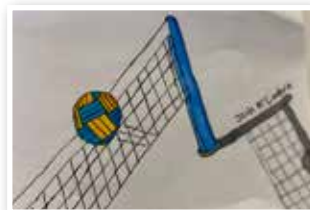

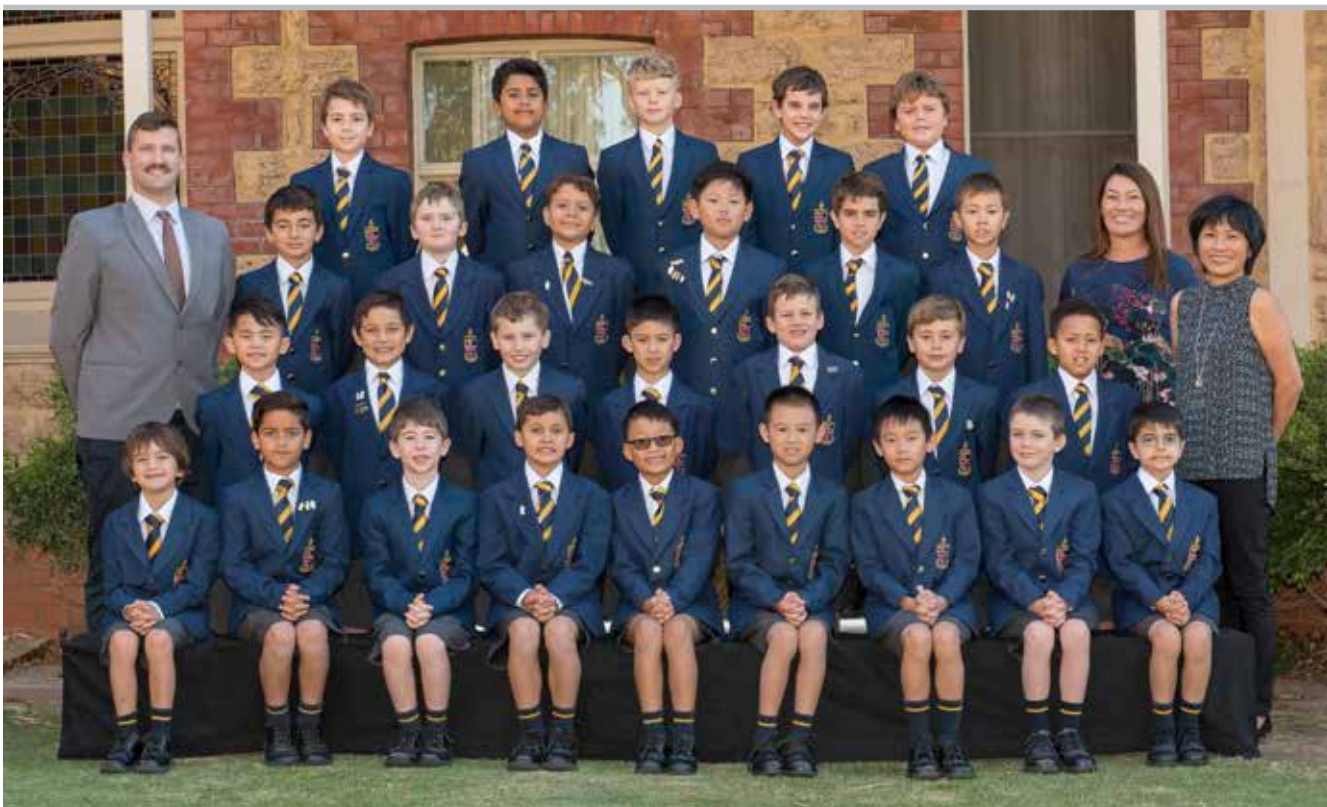

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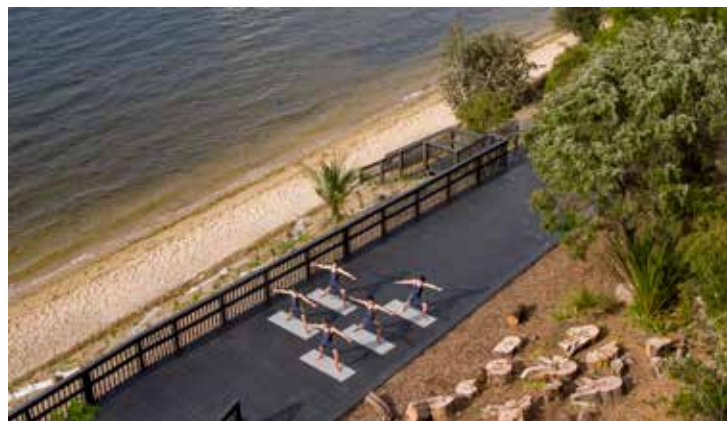
