Each year has its own unique story and while 2020 started out like any other, it quickly turned into something none of us had ever experienced.

The emergence and impact of the COVID-19 pandemic certainly was, and still is, disruptive to our way of life. We were introduced to the term the 'new normal'. Throughout 2020, I was both impressed and proud of how our community pulled together, as the effects of COVID-19 are still very real for so many around the world.

I believe that the success of the School in this unprecedented year lay in our readiness to listen and follow the advice of health professionals and the government. The School took decisive action very early to implement effective protective measures – educating our boys and community in new ways of socialising and the required hygiene measures, and mastering remote learning in preparation for an unknown future.

We anticipated the impact on the economy and made a pre-emptive move by supporting our families with a fee adjustment from Pre-Kindergarten to Year 12. By contributing to the stability in our community, I believe that we have advanced the School's long-term success. We provided families with clarity about our support for them and we demonstrated our commitment to providing continuity of the Christ Church education.

Our response to the pandemic can be directly attributed to the amazing team at the School. Success achieved by the boys is a consequence of the work carried out by an exceptional Executive team and teaching and support staff who work collaboratively to create an atmosphere of excellence.

During the year, I could not be prouder of the Senior School leadership of Isaac Yeo as Captain of School and Jason Lu as Vice-Captain, as well as Dux of the School. The combination of their leadership and the fine work of the Prefect group exceeded expectations and maintained a sense of intent, calm and normality around the campus.

2020 was a very special year as we celebrated the School's 110th birthday and the Chapel's 50th year. To commemorate 110 years, we held a poignant service at Christ Church Claremont,





which holds so many special memories for the School. A symbolic flame, lit at the church and carried by the Captain of School, made its way from the church to the Blue Gym where students and staff members had congregated to celebrate the occasion. The celebration of the Chapel's 50th birthday occurred in November and was attended by many community members and the Most Reverend Kay Goldsworthy AO, Archbishop of Perth. It was a moving occasion as we recognised

the Chapel as the spiritual centre of the School and acknowledged the many decades of service to the School and wider Anglican community by Father Frank Sheehan who retired as School Chaplain at the end of 2020.

The safety and wellbeing of students and staff is paramount and during the year the School engaged Child Wise to conduct a child safety review with the intent to become a Child Wise accredited organisation. This move is

in line with our current and future strategic plans and will ensure we create the safest environment for both students and staff. At the end of Term 2 we received the results and actioned recommendations, which are related directly to the National Principles for Child Safe Organisations.

During the year we introduced programs and initiatives, such as the launch of the Little Queenslea Drive program for Year 4, which encourages boys to develop the skills required for their next level of learning and education. We also shared plans for an amazing nature-based Preparatory School playground to be used in timetabled lessons, the scoping of a Parents' Association funded outdoor gymnasium for all year groups to complement the existing fitness facilities, and the launch of our On Board program for incoming boarders, with a focus on a smooth transition and building skills in both the academic and social sphere.

In the second half of the year Mr Mahendra Vaswani was appointed Deputy Principal, in addition to his existing role as Director of Studies. With two deputy roles in the Senior School, the incumbents represent the School in the broader community and work with

parents regarding pastoral care and wellbeing (Mr Angus) and the curriculum and academic program (Mr Vaswani).

Compulsory participation in sport is a central tenet of the Christ Church experience and 2020 proved to be a great year for the boys even in these COVID-19 times. We took home PSA championship cups in tennis, swimming, surfing and chess - the latter we have now won 11 years in a row. I would like to thank everyone in the community who helped make the 2020 sporting fixtures a reality parents, staff who coached the boys, and the boys themselves who made the most of the opportunities. There were plenty of challenges that threatened to derail the winter sports season and it was only due to the hard work of passionate community members that these events were able to go ahead.

2020 sees the conclusion of the School's current Strategic Plan, comprised of five inter-related intents:

- Affirm our unique identity and culture of excellence
- 2. Deliver a rigorous and engaging teaching and learning program that motivates boys

- Advance global citizenship through our international-minded culture
- 4. Attract, develop and value high quality staff
- Secure and sustain our school for future generations.

Throughout this year and the five preceding, it has been pleasing to witness programs, practices and outcomes reflecting these strategic themes that positively impacted our boys and the wider community. At the start of the 2021 school year, we will launch our new Strategic Plan, which builds on the existing intents and will guide our programs and practices for the next five years.

Although the year ahead will be marked by uncertainty, the School Council and Executive team are very clear about the role of the School and are focused on supporting our boys to achieve their goals through the delivery of excellent educational opportunities. Having been immersed in our community for five years, I know that at every opportunity we will continue to demonstrate cohesion, kindness and strength and I am looking forward to embracing the new year and walking shoulder to shoulder with you in 2021.

Year 10s find moments of great challenge within Venture, as the rain comes down after long days covering significant kilometres with heavy packs. They begin to look inward, mustering the strength to journey onwards. This was also the inaugural year of the Senior

School's Student Representative Council (SRC), a body that represents student interests and acts as a conduit between students and staff. Leaders of the SRC should be proud of what they achieved this year.

ACADEMIC RESULTS

MAHENDRA VASWANI / DEPUTY PRINCIPAL AND DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

In a year characterised by adjectives such as 'unprecedented', 'disrupted' and 'uncertain', the Class of 2020 maintained a business-as-usual approach to once again position Christ Church as the best boys' school in Western Australia.

With a median ATAR of 92.50, the Beazley Medal: WACE, three General Exhibitions, three perfect ATARs, six Subject Exhibitions, 19 Subject Certificates of Excellence, 17 Top Performing courses, 25 subjects with mean scaled scores higher than those of the State, 34 Certificates of Distinction and 48 Certificates of Merit, the graduating Class of 2020 has certainly achieved exceptional academic outcomes.

Josh Green is to be congratulated for being awarded the Beazley Medal: WACE, recognising his performance as the top ATAR student in the State. He also won a Subject Exhibition for Mathematics Methods, three Subject Certificates of Excellence for Literature, Mathematics Methods and Modern History, and a Certificate of Distinction.

Jason Lu, the CCGS Dux for 2020, attained an ATAR of 99.95 and was awarded a General Exhibition, two Subject **Exhibitions for Chemistry and Philosophy** and Ethics, three Subject Certificates of **Excellence for Chemistry, Mathematics** Methods and Philosophy and Ethics, and a Certificate of Distinction. Kartikeya Kaushal was also awarded a General Exhibition, two Subject Exhibitions for Mathematics Specialist and Physics, four Subject Certificates of Excellence for Chemistry, Mathematics Methods, Mathematics Specialist and Physics, and a Certificate of Distinction. Of particular note is that it is the third consecutive year the Subject **Exhibition for Mathematics Specialist has** been awarded to a Christ Church boy.

Two boys on Indigenous Scholarships – Kalani Brooks and Sebastian Wells – also completed their time at Christ Church in 2020, while Digby Forshaw completed his Year 12 studies after having spent some years in the Peter Moyes Centre.

In 2020, Christ Church Grammar School had 175 students who achieved an ATAR and 17 students in a non-ATAR pathway.

- 18 students (10% of ATAR candidates)
 obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 99
- 36 students (21% of ATAR candidates)
 obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 98
- 66 students (38% of ATAR candidates)

- Christ Church was placed in the group of top performing schools in 17 courses (courses with fewer than 10 students are not included): Accounting and Finance, Ancient History, Chemistry, Computer Science, Design, Economics, Geography, Human Biology, Literature, Mathematics Applications, Mathematics Methods, Mathematics Specialist, Philosophy and Ethics, Physical Education Studies, Physics, Psychology and Visual Arts.










FRANCIS XAVIER SHEEHAN

SIMON HUNN I DIRECTOR OF THE CENTRE FOR ETHICS

What can you write about a man named by one of Australia's foremost historians, Manning Clark, as one of 10 great Australians, in the company of Gough Whitlam, Nobel laureate Patrick White and Barry Humphries, among others? This writer will attempt to do so and probably fail.

2020 will be remembered for many reasons, but coronavirus aside, within the Christ Church community it will always be recalled, with some sadness, as the year Father Frank Sheehan retired after 35 years of incredibly meritorious service to the school community. In this time, Frank was Chaplain, Director of the Centre for Ethics, broadcaster on religious affairs for ABC Radio, football coach, friend to all and the quiet conscience of the School, providing for us all a luminous, ethical window on the world.

Francis Xavier Sheehan was born in 1950 in Donald, in rural Victoria, to an Irish Catholic farming family. As a young lad with love for family, farm work, reading and with vast intellectual curiosity, Frank swore allegiance to the Essendon Football Club, undergoing conversion in the team's changing shed before his first game; thus began, as Bruce Dawe put it, "a lifetime's barracking". Soon after leaving school, Frank entered a Catholic seminary and during nine years of study, some at the Australian National University, he developed a special interest in history and philosophy.

In 1984, after some years as a Catholic priest, Frank left the Church and converted to Anglicanism. He spent time working at a men's shelter for the homeless and

alcoholic, as well as a Vietnamese refugee centre where he met his future wife Cam Ha and her daughter Lina. This was a tumultuous time in Frank's life and must have involved considerable courage and soul searching.

After this "exceedingly difficult year", Frank married Cam Ha and to our great benefit was recruited as Christ Church's Chaplain by then Headmaster Tony Hill. Armed with references from his friend and teacher, Professor Manning Clark and Australian poet Judith Wright, the Sheehans moved across Australia and took up residence on the School campus at Claremont, next to the Chapel and Swan River that would come to mean so much to him.

Over the next 35 years, Frank, armed with what former Headmaster Jeremy Madin described as a "cultivated, faintly seedy appearance - the slightly shiny, baggy suit matched with the Archdiocese of Perth or Essendon Football Club tie", engaged the boys (and staff) in an ongoing religious conversation. In this conversation, Frank always told the boys in his understated, almost laconic way, stories designed to probe mysteries rather than provide answers; stories that kept alive "the rumour of God", challenging people with the idea that there might be something more and providing a few clues about this. This would often be illustrated by an eclectic assortment of examples, from the literal leap of faith 'Indy' takes in the movie Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade to religious painting, philosophy, poetry, short stories, the Bible and AFL football. Frank was never one for certain certainties; he never imposed, he suggested. He was a sower of seeds that have and will continue to bear fruit

Equally engaging were the opportunities Frank provided the boys and the wider

community, especially from 1996 in his role as the foundation Director of the Centre for Ethics, assisted so ably by the late Mrs Teresa Scott, to engage with the thoughts of those worth listening to. In this way we were exposed to experiences such as a residency from Tibetan monks who, in the Chapel, grain by grain, painstakingly made a beautiful sand mandala with Christ in the centre and then, in a simple ceremony, consigned their beautiful art work to the waters of the Swan River where it dissolved, illustrating the impermanence of all things. Along with this there were talks from speakers such as David Malouf, Tim Winton, Bruce Dawe (who spent a week's residency at the School), Helen Garner, Craig Silvey, Geoff Gallop, Ayaan Hirsi Ali, Pat Dodson, Tim Fischer, John Howard, Kerry O'Brien, Brenda Niall, Anuradha Koirala, Hugh Mackay and that is the tip of an iceberg.

Despite his formidable intellect and sparkling oratorial skills, Frank was always a humble man, eschewing fuss and shunning the limelight. This notwithstanding, his outstanding contribution over three decades was recognised with a number of awards. In 1990, in recognition of his work with the wider community and with religious broadcasting, he was made a Canon of St George's Cathedral. He was also recognised as a Face of Claremont for his contributions to the community and in 2018 he was awarded the OAM. The School recognised Frank's contribution through the creation of the prestigious Frank Sheehan Service Award and the naming of the Frank Sheehan and Teresa Scott Bell, which every boy rings when he enters and leaves the School. Sadly, at the end of 2020, Frank rang that bell, cementing his status as one who made an indelible mark on the history of the School.

Thank you, Frank, and farewell.

The 'dream team' of Year 12s of 2016, who achieved a School Curriculum and Standards Authority mention for their exceptional results, was also a career achievement for Linda. She will be remembered for her passion for French education, her friendship in the department and her natural ability to connect with and get the most out of the boys. The Languages Department is forever in a better place for having had her part of the team for 20 years.

LEO BROWN I TOUR PARTICIPANT


In January 2020, the Midnite Youth

NASA SPACE SCHOOL

In December 2019, an intrepid bunch of Year 10 and 11 students departed for Houston, Texas and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Space School. The boys experienced rare access to NASA's facilities as our visit coincided with the 50th anniversary of the first Apollo mission.

The tour involved completing a universitystyle course in which space exploration experts assisted us in planning a space mission within budget limitations. The immersive program was designed to develop individual leadership, project management, resource allocation, crisis management and teamwork skills. The travel through Sydney, Dallas and eventually a late-night arrival into Houston set the tone for what was to become a fast-paced series of challenges. These would include making friendships with students and mentors from New Zealand and the east coast of Australia as part of team CASE B-34. We were split into two CCGS teams named Rosetta (Year 11s) and Voyager (Year 10s). Our teams then tackled a series of challenges, competing against 28 other teams from across the planet to win the coveted Space Centre University's Challenge X Prize.

Just as NASA is fond of its acronyms, we threw ourselves into having fun and learning through hands-on tasks. Highlights included visiting the original NASA Mission Control Centre, the Neutral Buoyancy Lab – where we watched future astronauts

learning to work on a scaled International Space Station (ISS) model - the University of Houston, a NBA Rockets game, the Museum of Natural Science and the Ad Astra Rocket Company - where we conducted varied experiments surrounding exothermic and endothermic forces (our astronauts would have perished). We also met a variety of famous and inspirational figures, such as retired astronauts Nicole Stott and Tom Nolan (Space Shuttle missions and ISS residents). The boys also tried new activities like scuba diving, shopping amongst local Texans, surfing the Houston city bridges while singing bus karaoke, and a formal dinner and dance event.

We would like to thank Mr Lloyd Haskett for piloting the mission and getting all members of the team happily back to Perth.

CAMBODIA

In December 2019, a collection of Christ Church and St Mary's students travelled to the city of Phnom Penh for the annual Service in Action trip to Cambodia.

Staying in the epicentre of this povertystricken capital, the group worked 16-hour days with the Cambodian Children's Fund, founded by the former president of 20th Century Fox International, Scott Neeson.

The organisation gifts struggling children the opportunity of an education they would not normally receive, with every student being either homeless, an orphan, terribly sick, abused, a foster child or living on Cambodia's infamous rubbish tip, thus in desperate need of a helping hand.

Our group assisted with the teaching of English, Mathematics and computer skills across the three campuses.

Teaching children a second language, without knowing how to speak their first, was a task that proved very difficult to most. However, the children's sheer determination to learn, made every small inkling of success that much more satisfying.

This journey to Cambodia certainly enlightened us. Many children had only one pair of shoes and one school uniform; they had never seen a river as clear as the Swan, beaches as beautiful as those of our coast and streets as clean as Perth's.

Even given their dire circumstances, each day we were showered with affection by children no taller than our waists. We felt blessed.

Every night, we attended a debrief session. We wrote down our thoughts and shared them with fellow team members. This was a special time for all of us. It allowed us to

reflect on what we had seen, what we were doing and how we could effect change in ourselves and our community, both locally and internationally.

It was hard to say goodbye. We were humbled by handmade gifts such as cards, bracelets and photos as mementos and a sign of gratitude. This was the hardest part for all of us because we made such close connections.

This trip is really a once in lifetime opportunity and it really put into perspective how much we take for granted in our everyday lives. Whilst away, I came across this Buddhist quote: Before giving, the mind of the giver is happy; while giving, the mind of the giver is made peaceful; and having given, the mind of the giver is uplifted.











NULLAGINE

a population of about 250, four hours'

We joined Nullagine Primary School,

differences.

During school hours, we were outside doing experiments around the students' science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) focus for the term and in the classroom, we worked on reading, mathematics and art. We also explored the local sights, ate witchetty grubs and learnt about the rich culture of the local Martu people. We observed how in tune the

students were with their land and culture, how easily they navigated the dense scrub, and how passionately they explained the thousands of year's old rock art.

It was inspiring to see the joy and confidence of the children and humbling to know that this comes from the strength of their community and teachers, not from materialistic possessions. We were impressed by the students' ability to communicate and learn English, considering this was their second language.

After damage inflicted from the water slide, water guns, numerous games of bump, footy and dodgeball, we were shattered but elated by the time we boarded the return flight home. Our gratitude goes to Mr Mark Tait, Ms Sam Charlwood and the staff at Nullagine school for putting together this unforgettable experience.

Our conversations with the children gave us an insight into their lives and a new outlook on how Indigenous people live. We faced some challenges at the start but as the children become more relaxed with us, we were accepted as part of the community.

A highlight was taking the school bus to the Indigenous community of Goodabinya, just outside of town, with one of the elders named Arnold. Others included visiting the local natural pool, playing basketball and footy and doing virtual reality in the classroom. Outside of the classroom we spent most of our time playing basketball or hanging out in the rec shed, not only because it had the best air con in the town but because it was the place where the children go after school to hang out, play table tennis and chasey. We visited the police station and nursing post where we met some interesting characters and learnt how remote workers adapt.

After countless games of basketball in the near 40-degree heat, we were drained of all our energy by the end of each day, but the excitement of each new opportunity kept everyone's mood up and made time fly.

Saying goodbye was hard for us all. It was a life-changing experience we will never forget.

CUO DAVID JONES I ADJUTANT

2020 was a challenging yet fruitful year for the Christ Church Grammar School Cadet Unit (CCGSCU). In January, prior to COVID, five senior cadets attended the recently introduced combined Cadet Under Officer and Warrant Officer course, qualifying for promotion to Cadet Under Officer (CUO) and Cadet Warrant Officer Class 2 (CDTWO2).

Following the successful results of all attendees, appointments for the 2020 training year were then allocated, with platoons being allocated to CUO Sam Duncan, CUO Nicholas Hamdorf and CUO Liam Colligan. Company Headquarters was to be staffed by CUO David Jones and CDTWO2 Tom McGrath as Adjutant and Company Sergeant Major (CSM) respectively.

The first major activity conducted was the Term 1 Recruit Induction Course held at Northam Army Camp. In the field, the unit was joined by the Guildford Grammar School Cadet Unit and St Hilda's Anglican School Cadet Unit. CCGSCU enjoys a close association with Guildford and St Hilda's and their presence brought attendance in excess of 100 cadets and adult staff.

First year cadets learnt skills such as basic drill, fieldcraft, movements at night, camouflage and concealment, and first aid. A 'lantern stalk' night activity was planned and executed by the freshly trained cadets, in which they had to mark a given target while avoiding detection by senior cadets, confirming their skills in camouflage and concealment as well as tactical movement. This exercise also challenged the junior leaders, providing them with crucial experience in command and control in a field environment.

Following this, training resumed on campus with refinement of drill and ceremonial skills as well as an introduction to navigation and radio communications. However, in the

closing weeks of Term 1, the nationwide impact of COVID-19 resulted in the unit ceasing its activities. In the unit's final parade for Term 1, the company conducted a brief Anzac Day ceremony at the School's war memorial, including a minute's silence.

The balance of Term 1 and most of Term 2 saw no cadet parades as the School shifted to online learning. The boys of the company, disappointed but with spirits undaunted, stowed their uniforms and prepared to weather the COVID-19 storm.

During this time, there was only one cadet activity: the Anzac Day dawn service. With support from the unit's senior cadets and officer commanding CCGSCU, CAPT (AAC) Conrad Scott, a memorable service was held at the School, consisting of a guard of honour, a minute's silence and a rendition of the *Last Post* and the *Rouse*. The service, conducted in a socially distanced manner, was a true testament to Australia's commitment to honour her fallen.

Although disheartened by the impact of COVID-19, spirits were quickly restored when the unit gained permission in the closing weeks of Term 2 to parade once more.

Training resumed and smiling faces saw cadets don their uniforms for the first time in three months.

Term 3 started with the unfortunate news that the WA Brigade's Annual Field Exercise (AFX) was cancelled, and that in its place the brigade would conduct the Senior Leaders Course (SLC). To balance this, the unit received the news that it could conduct its own field exercise with Guildford and St Hilda's towards the end of Term 3. Buoyed by this, the company honed its fieldcraft skills for the camp at the Northam Training Area.

Training periods, as well as a three-hour long night observation post exercise, saw cadets establish camouflaged locations from which they could observe the opposition forces without being detected. Cadets completed a seven-hour long navigation exercise with multiple stands assessing section level first aid competence, patrolling and camouflage skills. The camp ended with a film night and an open canteen of hard-earned soft drinks and chocolate bars.

In the Term 3 holidays, in place of AFX, the Year 11 cadets who had achieved the rank of Corporal or Lance Corporal attended the brigade SLC. This course prepared cadets to fill the role of Sergeant and provided practical lessons on instructional techniques, leadership, personnel management, issuing orders and conducting platoon level operations. 2020 saw eight CCGS cadets successfully complete the course, emerging ready to become the future leaders of the CCGSCU

To round out the training year, the Headmaster's Parade was held on the Friday of the first week of Term 4. In the final parade, an inspection was conducted by the Commander of the WA Army Cadets Brigade, COL David Jones and various awards were presented for outstanding performances throughout the year. Congratulations to 1PL for achieving Best Platoon, with 11 Bravo being awarded Best Section. The parade also farewelled the Year 12 cadets. That evening, Year 11 and Year 12 cadets were invited to attend the unit's Dining-in Night. This is a formal event where the unit thanks the Year 12 cadets, their parents and the wider defence community for their enduring support, which has been particularly important in this trying year.

Congratulations to all cadets for their efforts in an extremely challenging year.

FOOD RESCUE

Although we had an interrupted year due to COVID-19 restrictions, the boys at Food Rescue turned up each week with enthusiasm and effort to help those less fortunate than ourselves.

Each year, we partner with two organisations, SecondBite and PortCare. SecondBite provides fresh, nutritious food for people in need across Australia. Every week, a truck from SecondBite collects food from local supermarkets that would otherwise be thrown away. This is then dropped off at Sandover Dining Hall, where, on a Wednesday afternoon, we sort through it. We organise the fruit and vegetables, packing good produce into boxes, and placing spoiled, inedible food

into the compost bins. We weigh what we have saved at the end of the session, before a PortCare truck collects the boxes. PortCare then gives the food to the people, as well as clothes and other essentials. They often make large meals out of the food we salvage to feed the less fortunate at their community centre.

In Term 3 we received 2509.5kg of produce and saved 95.5 per cent, leaving 2396.88kg of fresh fruit and vegetables saved. Given the circumstances of this year, this is an incredible outcome. I would like to extend my thanks to Ms Rouhiainen, who provided us with mentorship and guidance throughout the process.

This year we had the opportunity to learn from some talented and experienced first responders as part of the St John Ambulance Cadets program.

We arrived with practically no first aid experience and left with critical knowledge that will allow us to volunteer at future events. We learnt procedures and skills that enabled us to undertake full conscious and unconscious patient assessments. This involved going through the primary survey of DRSABCD (Danger, Response, Send for help, Airway, Breathing, CPR and Defibrillation), and taking vital signs such as blood pressure, temperature, and oxygen levels in the blood using equipment such as the pulse oximeter. Along with these helpful skills in patient assessment, we mastered manoeuvring people on stretchers (which involved doing an obstacle course), dealing with spinal injuries and IMPACT CPR.

To pass the course and become a Level 1 volunteer, we were required to accurately perform in both the unconscious and conscious patient assessment practical exams, in which we were granted only two chances in each. After some of us did not meet the requirements the first time round due to careless errors, we managed to muster up courage and pass the second time. Now, as a group of 11 dedicated boys, we are confident and qualified to help our community as Event Health Services volunteers.

We would like to extend our gratitude to St John Ambulance WA and their dedicated volunteers for giving us this amazing opportunity.

Enigma was amazing this year!


















ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY GROUP

WILL WARDLE / YEAR 12

Commencing our second year, Christ Church's Student Environmental Committee (SEC), under the guidance of Mr Daniel La Galia, was eager to make a positive impact in the School's commitment to environmental sustainability.

In Term 1, before school life faced a year of interruptions, the SEC collaborated with the Wellbeing Committee to launch Ride to School Week.

The success of this initiative was continued in Terms 2 and 3 as we worked with the School's Canteen, grounds staff and WRITE Solutions Australia to introduce a new four-bin waste system. Most plastic in the Canteen was replaced with biodegradable alternatives. These were processed into compost for the School's grounds, completing the renewable cycle. A group of Year 10 ENCOMM boys visited the Red Hill Waste Management Facility to witness part of the waste process.

We also encouraged boys to bring reusable lunch boxes to school as part of Plastic Free July. A letter was sent to parents, but the real success was the Humanities versus Physical Education departments basketball game held one lunchtime. To watch, boys had to show their lunch box on entry to the blue gym. Some exceptions resulted in a few push-ups as an entry fee. The Senior and Preparatory school spectators packed the gym and witnessed an eventual win by the Physical Education Department team.

Other highlights included creating the SEC Nexus page, instigating a water fountain survey leading to the installation of new fountains, a battery collection, stationery collections for the charity Give Write, which collects new and pre-loved school supplies to regift to children in need in Western Australia, and another successful Art Committee collaboration.

The SEC enjoyed a jam-packed year of productivity thanks to the tireless work of the committee, and we are excited to see what the future holds for such an important cause as it gains more global and local awareness.

MAX GODFREY / CAPTAIN OF INFORMATICS


Informatics is best introduced as a mind sport for those who enjoy solving challenging problems and coding up solutions to them.

This year, members of the Informatics Club participated in a series of competitions with some outstanding results. Notably, we had almost all of our 35 Australian Informatics Olympiad participants receive a medal, and two of our teams competing in the University of New South Wales ProgComp qualified for the grand final. However, the trip to Sydney was cancelled due to COVID-19. Additionally, there were two distinctions in the Oxford University Computing Challenge, four perfect scores in the Bebras Australia Computational Thinking Challenge, and a bronze medal in the Asia-Pacific Informatics Olympiad awarded to Joshua Chen (Year 10).

The Australian Informatics Olympiad is a particularly important component of the Informatics season, as the nation's top 25 participants are invited to attend the Australian Informatics Olympiad Committee School of Excellence at the Australian National University over the summer holidays. Joshua Chen and Max Godfrey (Year 11) participated remotely in December.

These achievements are not only indicative of the work that club members put into their algorithmic thinking, but also the strength of our Computer Science Department, especially Mr Jan Honnens who worked tirelessly to bring everything to fruition.



ATHLETICS

Like many facets of school life in 2020, the PSA Athletics season was disrupted by the impact of COVID-19. The delayed winter season meant there was little time for the CCGS Athletics Team to prepare for the carnival held on 11 September.

With neither the House Athletics Carnival nor the annual Quadrangular meet able to proceed, the team was brought together quickly with a limited number of trials. Given the cancellation of all competitive meets in the lead up to the PSA carnival, it was very difficult to predict how the team would fair. Despite the steady improvement in results over previous years, CCGS faced a big challenge in bettering its performance in 2020.

There were many outstanding individual and team performances throughout the day, with the highest number of School records broken in a single meet. Some of these highlights included:

UNDER 13

William Kempson led both his age group and CCGS, scoring 64 individual points. He broke the School's record in the High Jump and Triple Jump, winning the Division 1 events. He also finished first in Division 2 400m and Long Jump and was a member of the School's record-breaking 4x100m team. Jackson Anderson scored 60 points with top three placings in five events. Alfie Mill broke the Under 13 80m Hurdles school record whilst Cameron Bills finished second and third in his two distance events. The Under 13s took first place overall in their age group, a fantastic achievement.

UNDER 14

Massey Doolan had two first place finishes in Division 1 events, winning the 200m and 400m and finishing second in the 100m. He combined with Kalani Chong Sue, Aaron Goh and Calvin Teoh to win the 4x100m Relay in a School record time of 48.55 seconds. A School record was also broken by the winning 4x400m Relay team consisting of Jakob Akhlil, Tom Grylls, Lincoln Hobbs and Alfie Mill. Many of these boys featured strongly in individual events, with the Under 14 age group placing second overall.

UNDER 15

Dylan Calderwood competed in five events, placing second in three and finishing with 35 individual points. Matthew Tan also scored strongly in what was a demanding day on the track. James Appleyard and Lucas Koh combined well in the middle distance events, with three top-three finishes between them. The Under 15 4x100m team, consisting of Mayowa Afolabi, Dylan Calderwood, Daniel Hales and Tom Sergeant, was also impressive – finishing second.

Several boys stepped up and competed admirably in a year group which was impacted by injury. 



CENTRE FOR ETHICS

SIMON HUNN / DIRECTOR FOR THE CENTRE FOR ETHICS

Like everywhere worldwide, 2020 proved a challenging year for the Centre for Ethics. The year started promisingly with plans to present some interesting talks to the wider community. Of particular interest here was a scheduled talk by The Australian newspaper foreign affairs editor Greg Sheridan, whose subject was his book's title, God is Good for You. In a similar vein, would have been a talk from American quantum physicist academic and nun Kathleen Duffy, who was scheduled to talk on 'Evolving Spirituality: The Intersection of Science and Religion'.

We did, however, manage to provide some strong speakers for English classes with an early March visit from well-known musician and crime writer, Dave Warner. This visit was followed by another doyen in the art of crime fiction in Western Australian, novelist and academic Dave Whish-Wilson. March also saw the first of a triumvirate of class visits to our Year 12 Philosophy class from UWA Philosophy academics. The first was from Dr Remco Heesen who addressed the boys on scientific realism and anti-realism.

We did manage to attract speakers during the lockdown period. Prominent here was old boy and novelist Jon Doust who 'zoomed' into the Year 12 General English class from his Albany study. Jon discussed his first book in the Jack Muir trilogy, Boy on a Wire.

As we emerged from lockdown, our Year 12 Philosophy boys heard talks from two more UWA Philosophy academics in Dr Michael Rubin and Dr Lachlan Umbers. Shortly after their visit we managed to get biologist and science-fiction writer, HM Waugh, to talk to our Year 5 and Year 8 Science Extension students during Science Week.

In August we held our biggest event to that point, which was an address to the wider community, in conjunction with the Wynne Centre for Boys' Health and Wellbeing, from retired veterinary surgeon, cave diver, 2019 Australian of the Year and OAM, Craig Challen. Craig spoke to a COVID-19 restricted audience of 300 in the Chapel, about his role in the 2018 Thai cave rescue of 12 boys and their soccer coach.

In late August, the Centre for Ethics again hosted the Empty Bowls Lunch. As in previous years, it was a huge success and saw a record \$19 000 raised for Foodbank on a sunny, late winter Sunday; the late Teresa Scott must have been smiling down at the event.

In the early weeks of Term 4, we were fortunate to receive another visit from a well-known local writer, Curtin academic and poet Dr Lucy Dougan. Lucy addressed the Year 9 Creative Writing class about poetry, specifically how to write a French form of poetry, the pantoum. The boys all attempted their own based around their experiences of lockdown.

In mid-term we had a visit from the author of the highly successful young adult novel *Invisible Boys*, Holden Sheppard. Holden spoke passionately to a Year 10 Health and Wellbeing class about masculinity and sexuality, following this up with a discussion session with student members of the Health and Wellbeing Committee.

Our final big event for the year was held for the wider community in the School's Chapel. This was a 'conversation' between award-winning writer Craig Silvey and Canon Frank Sheehan. They sensitively and insightfully discussed Craig's recently published novel, *Honeybee*, in front of a crowd of over 300 people. This event was held in conjunction with The Lane Bookshop and publishers Allen and Unwin.

It would be remiss of me not to mention that at the end of 2020, Canon Frank Sheehan, founding Director of the Centre for Ethics and former CCGS Chaplain, retired from the School for which he has done so much since his appointment in 1985. 

DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY


ALEC BARBOUR / HEAD OF DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY



DRAMA ROMEO AND JULIET



2020 was a year in which to love your fate ... maybe it was fate, or just a series of unlucky events! Nonetheless, working on *Romeo and Juliet* during our own modern-day plague makes me feel closer to William Shakespeare. Here was a man whose life was shaped by plague; he lost siblings and children, while his parents saved him by barricading their house when he was a baby.

A year before he wrote *Romeo* and *Juliet*, a powerful plague struck London killing thousands and closing theatres. Shakespeare wrote some of his finest plays during this time – *King Lear, Macbeth* and *Antony and Cleopatra* – yet he stayed in London because his words gave comfort to the people.

Rehearsing during our modern-day plague was an experience. We had disappointment, sadness, uncertainty, isolation, sickness, hope, frustration and fear. We halted halfway through a rehearsal process and came back weeks later to a new world of hand sanitiser and social distancing. Rehearsals were something to look forward to when so much had changed. Yet here we were, about to perform our play, in a theatre, with a beautiful set and great costumes, to an audience, when theatres all over the world were waiting in darkness for their turn to provide joy and comfort.

When I embarked on Romeo and Juliet, I wanted to make it contemporary to reflect the chaos and youth violence appearing in the news headlines and on social media. Romeo and Juliet begins with chaos and hatred between two feuding families and ends with the death of their children who fall in love in the midst of it all; in that grief, the families found a new way of existence and hope. I wanted the students to connect to the story, to the characters, to the beauty of the poetry, to be brave and truthful in their performances. I was very proud of these students from MLC, St Hilda's and Christ Church, for their courage, energy and enthusiasm.















DRAMA THE FIRES OF MUSPELL

On 26 July, 32 eager performers gathered for the first rehearsal of the Midnite Youth Theatre Company's Year 7 and 8 production of Tony Nicholls's The Fires of Muspell. The afternoon brought together boys and girls from six schools, introducing them to the design team and welcoming many to their first production with the company. Nervous glances soon turned to laughter and excitement as the cast read the script aloud, embracing the wild and wonderful characters of Nicholls's play and beginning a threemonth journey of creativity, courage and comradery.

The Fires of Muspell, drawn from Norse mythology, follows the devious outcast Loki in his destined battle against Odin, the father of the gods, as they hurtle towards the Ragnarök. Equal parts comedy and tragedy, this spectacular tale of giants, dwarves, humans, gods and a host of other supernatural creatures, celebrates the true nature of its colourful characters and honours the part the Fates have given each to play.

In Term 4, rehearsals moved into the theatre and the cast and crew were introduced to the great mountain, central to the set designed by Ms Stephanie Cullingford, the whimsical and wacky costumes created by Mrs Jay Waugh and the dynamic lighting of Mrs Tess Reuvers. Inspired and supported by these extraordinary design elements and the guidance of director Miss Kalika Duck, efforts redoubled and characters burst from the page onto the stage. A four-performance run in early November passed in a flash, delighting audiences both young and old. ENGLISH

We began the year celebrating the success of the English ATAR and Literature ATAR cohorts of 2019, both of whom were recognised as being among the top performing schools in their respective courses: a rare distinction for any school. We are particularly proud of the boys and teachers for their work towards this tremendous achievement.

A series of boys saw their work recognised in the wider community throughout the year. A highlight was Tom Edibam (Year 9) being shortlisted for the Red Room Poetry Object competition, making the final cut of 20 in a field of over 12 000 applicants across Years 7 to 12 nationally. While Morgan Klug (Year 12) was recognised by *The West Australian* as a Young Travel Writer for 2020, spotlighting the diversity of creative writing interests of our students.

From poet Dr Lucy Dougan and crime novelist David Whish-Wilson in Year 9 Creative Writing classes, to ever-engaging old boy Jon Doust speaking to our Year 12 General Students via Zoom about his own take on CCGS in *Boy on a Wire*, the diversity of local speakers in English classrooms was appreciated by staff and students alike in 2020.





Term 3 saw Head of English Neil Walker appointed as Deputy Principal at Presbyterian Ladies' College. We would like to take this moment to thank Mr Walker for his contribution to the lives of both CCGS students and staff over the past eight years; he shall be greatly missed for his humour and compassion.

HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION

It has been an exciting year with all boys involved in physical activity and Health and Wellbeing classes from Kindergarten to Year 12.

2020 was certainly different and while there were many challenges, we found there were equally as many opportunities. Of particular note was the introduction of the trick shot competitions, championed by Mr Jeremy Power, during the period of remote learning, old boy tutoring, the Christ Church 1K – a running

track through the School, frisbee golf, and underwater hockey.

I am particularly proud of the manner in which my department prepared for remote teaching and the improvement in Nexus assessments and learning for the boys. Another highlight was Mr Tom Jerram being recognised for his outstanding teaching in the ATAR Physical Education course and his presentation at the annual Physical Education Studies Teachers' Association Conference.











HUMANITIES

One of the many joys of teaching in the Humanities is the ability to draw on real-life events and issues to bring practical elements into the theoretical and conceptual learning that occurs in the classroom. Our early planning was quickly superseded by the outbreak of COVID-19. The natural tendency to capitalise on current events, however, meant we were well positioned to pivot our focus to make sense of the situation, through economic, historical, geographical and political lenses. The rapid adjustment to remote learning meant that we too became learners as we adapted our pedagogy.

Some specific subject highlights from the past year include:

ANCIENT AND MODERN HISTORY

In Year 7, the boys' study of Ancient History saw them create their own museum displays of Ancient Greece. They engaged with the study of archaeology, palaeontology and historiography, critically and creatively applying these skills to create their own 'artefacts'. The Year 7s took to this task eagerly, with interesting replicas of architecture, weaponry, currency and clothing being manufactured. Some boys reimagined the past by recreating Ancient Greece using Minecraft.

In Year 11 and 12 Modern History, students drew parallels between our experience with

the pandemic and subsequent economic downturn and similar crises in history, including the influenza pandemic at the end of World War I, the catalysts for the Wall Street Stock Market Crash and the subsequent Great Depression, and the political reactions to these significant events.

ACCOUNTING AND FINANCE, BUSINESS MANAGEMENT AND ENTERPRISE, ECONOMICS AND INVESTING

It was another terrific year for students in the 'Commerce' subjects. Early in the year, the Year 12 Economics students were invited to an investor briefing by Magellan Financial Group, joining over 1500 investors to hear Chairman and Chief Investment Officer Hamish Douglass, a member of the Commonwealth Government's Foreign Investment Review Board, and former CIA Deputy Director Michael Morrell. That evening, attendees were encouraged to download the Magellan app and submit questions. Finn Retallack won a \$5000 managed share portfolio with Magellan for his efforts.

Our good fortune did not end there. Over the course of the year, Andy Wu in Year 8 won the ESSI Money Challenge run by the Financial Basics Foundation. ESSI Money stands for Earning, Saving, Spending and Investing Money and students do each in a computergenerated simulation. The challenge is a

competition based on the simulation. It is open for two weeks in Term 3 and all CCGS students in Year 7 and 8 are registered to play the game. As the national winner of the competition, Andy won \$1500 as well as \$1500 for the School, with the latter prize money going towards The Students' Scholarship for 2021.

All students in our Year 11 Economics classes and Year 10 Investing and Enterprise classes participate in the Australian Stock Exchange Sharemarket Game. This involves students investing \$50 000 in the Australian Sharemarket across a 10-week time period. Hugh Vines in Year 10 won the game, growing his initial \$50 000 investment by 23 per cent (outpacing the market which only grew by 1.9 per cent during the game) to \$61 420.86 – an incredible performance. Hugh won \$1000, which he has sagely decided to invest in the sharemarket.

2020 also saw the introduction of Business Management and Enterprise ATAR and General courses. These practical courses are an excellent fusion of theory and practice. Both classes visited the Paramount Nightclub (at 9.00am in the morning), 303 MullenLowe (the Perth division of a multi-national marketing firm), McNally Group (designing and fabricating modular buildings in Henderson), and North Street Store and Sal's Pasta Deli in Cottesloe.







GEOGRAPHY

In Geography, after the restrictions were relaxed, we resumed our field trips. Year 10 students went to Point Peron and Port Coogee to examine natural coastal processes and human management of coastlines, while Year 11s journeyed to Rottnest as part of their study of sustainable tourism, looking at recent changes and innovations on Rottnest, including waste treatment, wind power, eco-tourism and 'glamping'. We are grateful for the assistance provided by one of our CCGS parents, Mr Guy Bailey, who organised access to different facilities on Rottnest.

In Year 12 Geography, fieldwork is a critical component of the course. At the peak of the pandemic, the Year 12s were greatly assisted by the implementation of a virtual field trip focusing on Point Walter and the ways humans attempt to manage responses to climate change. Fortunately, the second field trip went ahead, with the Year 12 classes covering a great range of the Perth Metropolitan region, from Yagan Square in Perth all the way up to Butler. Once again, we benefitted from the wisdom of urban planner and old boy, Mr Tim Dawkins ('98). Innovatively, students accessed a video on the Perth to Butler train line through Microsoft Stream.

Geography in Years 7 to 10 is also going from strength to strength, demonstrated by the performances of boys in the Australian Geography Competition.

Over 70 000 students from 780 schools entered the competition in 2020.

Aiden Lim in Year 7 and Max Pearse in Year 8 finished in the top one per cent for their age nationally, while Andy Wu (Year 8) was the national winner of the competition for his age group.

We had two boys win their divisions in the Geography Association of Western Australia Young Geographer of the Year Awards. Eduardo Caceres-Sandoval won the Year 10 competition with his report on the future of coastal management processes at Port Beach in Fremantle. Luke Annear won the Year 9 division with his investigation into weeds in the Wheatbelt of Western Australia and the increasing use of new technology, known as 'weed seed destructors', to manage their spread.

PHILOSOPHY AND ETHICS, POLITICS AND LAW


In Year 8 Civics and Citizenship, the boys ran mock trials, determining whether Harry Potter was guilty or not of the murder of Professor Quirrell. Year 11 Politics and Law students engaged deeply with the US elections, examining the issues around the US electoral system, including the Electoral College, plurality voting systems, issues of democratic representation and the policies of each of the candidates.

UWA lecturer Dr Remco Heesen spoke to our Year 12 Philosophy and Ethics class on the 'Philosophy of Science'. Dr Heesen addressed the question of whether the success of scientific theories can tell us anything about the existence of unobservable entities, such as electrons, gene, and quarks. He presented an argument for and against the existence of unobservable entities – the 'No Miracles Argument' and the 'Pessimistic Meta-Induction Argument'. Christ Church Philosophy students again took part in the annual Philosothon and Ethics Olympiad, performing well.

The Humanities staff are outstanding educators and on behalf of the boys, I would like to offer our gratitude to them.











INDIGENOUS PROGRAM

This year we welcomed three new boys to the Indigenous Program, Jackson Anderson (Year 7), Wesley Thein-Soe (Year 8) and Simon Poelina (Year 10). The boys were excited, and the older boys ensured that the new boys settled into life as a student at CCGS.

Unfortunately, due to COVID-19, the boys weren't able to create the PSA Indigenous Round First XVIII Football jumpers this year. However, the boys did celebrate the Indigenous Round with Kalani Brooks (Year 12) captaining the football team and Tyrell Stewart (Year 11) and Jonah Brooks (Year 10) also playing.

We celebrated yet another successful NAIDOC Week at the start of Term 3. This year, Year 10s Amaaron Davis and Simon Poelina made videos and Revis Ryder (Year 9), Tyrell Stewart and Jonah Brooks made profiles explaining their family heritage and the regions in

Australia where they grew up. They also shared stories from their communities, their connection to country and to family to help educate other students at school.

Unfortunately, the annual NAIDOC Week Art Exhibition did not take place, however, the boys still created an amazing piece of art – a mural, with the help of local artist Jade Dolman, based around the Nyoongah Six Seasons. The piece had animals representing each season. A huge thank you to Ms Pam Yordanoff and to Jade for all their help. Without the Art Department, this project would not have got off the ground.

Finally, we said goodbye to two graduating Year 12s. The boys are very proud of their achievements and are looking forward to big things post school. Congratulations to Sebastian Wells and Kalani Brooks. Well done, boys.





LANGUAGES

COMPETITIONS

Our Year 8 Japanese and French classes participated in two competitions launched via the Lens on Languages podcast. The Year 8 Japanese students had the chance to come up with their own haiku – a form of poetry based on a five-seven-five syllable structure. We saw a range of entries, but the prizes were awarded to Callum Chin and Wesley Peh (equal first), Kalani Chong Sue (second) and Alexander Young (third). The Year 8 French classes battled it out in a verb conjugation rap battle. Although there were several worthy entries, prizes went to Oliver Campbell and William Mayne (first), Dylan Johnson and Matthew Wong, and Noah Rucklidge and Joshua McCoubrie (equal second).

SAMPLING AUTHENTIC CUISINE

Food is a vital cultural asset when it comes to languages education. The Year 9 Chinese classes enjoyed a day out in Northbridge, participating in a character hunt and enjoying lunch at Endless Delight Chinese Cuisine where they needed to order all their meals in the language. The Year 10 Japanese class ended its year with a fine dining experience at KiRi Japanese in Shenton Park, where the boys were able to converse and order in Japanese and try an array of new and delicious items.

DOCUMENTARY EVENING

As the Year 12 French syllabus touches on the topic of film, our boys enjoyed an evening in the Senior School Staffroom watching a documentary with the Year 12 French class from Methodist Ladies' College. Although the documentary *Les Bleus* centres on the French national football team, the film explores the more deep-seated issues of immigration and xenophobia in modern day France. The night finished with a workshop which delved further into the topic.

LANGUAGES WEEK

As COVID-19 meant the planned tours to Japan and France were cancelled, it was paramount that our students were still able to have an enjoyable week celebrating all things languages. We had an array of activities, beginning with hosting over 90 students at the annual Languages Quiz with the girls from Methodist Ladies' College. With plenty of food eaten and prizes won on the day, the quiz kick-started the week. All Year 8 languages classes were treated to movie nights hosted at the School. The Year 8 classes were also treated to cultural activities. Japanese classes participated in a calligraphy session as well as an Aikido workshop. Chinese classes enjoyed an eventful session of Kung Fu, lion dancing and participating in a weapons

demonstration. The French boys went in a slightly different direction – getting a chance to enjoy the sunshine and try the popular French pastime of Pétanque (boules).

ALLIANCE FRANÇAISE POETRY WINNERS

Students from Years 7 to 10 once again competed in the annual Alliance Française Poem Recitation Competition. It was our Year 10 students who had the most success this year, with Finn Lip and Jack Landau achieving first and third places respectively with their rendition of *L'Albatros* by Charles Baudelaire. Finn has competed in this competition every year since entering the Senior School, and we were thrilled to see him not only achieve the state prize but also show such a sustained degree of passion and enthusiasm.

EXCURSION TO THE JAPANESE SCHOOL IN PERTH

We continued the picture book project in 2020, with the Year 9s visiting the Japanese School in Perth in November. This year we had the chance to share our picture books with the combined Year 3 and 4 class, where the boys and girls listened attentively as our students shared their stories. Our boys also got the opportunity to interview the students and share a few facts about each in

the Japanese language. Our time there was short yet eventful, but we look forward to continuing this strong link into the future.

VIDEO MATSURI SPECIAL MENTION PRIZE

We aimed to go back-to-back in the annual Japan Foundation Video Matsuri competition as our Year 8 team put together an incredibly funny and original short film. *Kanningu* (translated as cheating) was completely scripted, edited and filmed by the boys and once again, Christ Church showed schools across Australia of what we were capable. Although the boys did not take out the national top prize, our submission was still in the top five and was given a special mention on the Japan Foundation website.


YEAR 10 PICTURE BOOK PROJECT


















MATHEMATICS

MEGAN WEST / HEAD OF MATHEMATICS

Competitions in 2020 were a little different this year due to COVID-19. We were unable to run the Computational and Algorithmic Thinking (CAT) competition as normal but were fortunate that all other competitions ran online. There were even some new competitions.

The year started with the Year 11 and 12 Have Sum Fun competition held as normal in March. The boys performed very well and finished fourth and sixth respectively, our position determined by tiebreaker questions. The remaining Have Sum Fun competitions were held in October. Both the Year 7 and 8 teams and the Year 9 and 10 teams performed very well. The younger team of Cameron Baker (Year 7), Edward Hadi (Year 8), Kenny Hao (Year 7), Aidan Lim (Year 7), Jeremiah Wang (Year 8) and Andy Wu (Year 8) finished first with a perfect score in all four rounds. The second team finished sixth. The older team achieved a perfect score after the four rounds, alongside two other teams. It came down to the tiebreaker questions and we took the title with a perfect score and in the fastest time. The team consisted of Matthew Bailey (Year 10), Joshua Chen (Year 10), Ben Kao (Year 9), Aaryan Mandal (Year 9), Sean Morgan (Year 10) and Tom Pickering (Year 9). Our second team also performed strongly, finishing sixth.

The Kangourou sans Frontieres (KSF) was a new online competition in which boys answered questions in a 75-minute period. Twenty-eight boys took on this new challenge and we received some excellent results. The boys achieved six High Distinctions, nine Distinctions, 10 Credits and a number of participation certificates.

Joshua Chen was our only participant in the CAT competition, which took place online in April, achieving a perfect score.

From April to September, boys competed in the Mathematics Challenge and Mathematics Enrichment programs over a four-week and 16-week period respectively. Excellent results were achieved, an outstanding achievement as the demands of the program are very high and the content covered is two to three years beyond the school curriculum level. This year five students competed in the Euler competition, two in Gauss and one in Neother. Results were excellent and placed us among the top students in Australia. Flynn Holthouse and Aidan Lim, both in Year 7, achieved a High Distinction, placing them in the top ten per cent. Jeremiah Wang also achieved a High Distinction for his work in the Gauss Enrichment, placing him in the top 11 per cent. Aaron Goh (Year 8), William Rogers (Year 7) and Harold Smith (Year 9) also all performed admirably in their respective competitions, receiving Credits.

The Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC) in Term 3 saw 212 boys sit the competition over the course of the day. We achieved outstanding results with seven boys finishing in the top 0.3 per cent of all WA students. Prizes were awarded to Aidan Lim (Year 7), Jeremiah Wang and Andy Wu (Year 8), Eddie Gao and Zean Zhang (Year 9), and Joshua Chen and Junjie Chen (Year 10). CCGS boys also achieved 24 High Distinctions which placed them in the top three per cent of students in Years 7 to 10 and the top five per cent for students in Years 11 and 12. Eighty-nine boys achieved a Distinction which ranks them in the top 25 per cent of WA students in Years 7 to 10 and the top 20 per cent of Year 11 and 12 students. They achieved higher than the state mean, across all year groups. Joshua Chen also received a medal for the top Year 10 result in the State.

We ran the International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS) Mathematics competition for the first time this year. Extension students in Years 7 to 10 took part and the results were fantastic, with Aidan Lim (Year 7), Jeremiah Wang (Year 8), Harold Smith (Year 9) and Joshua Chen (Year 10) winning medals for the highest score in each year group. We also achieved 12 High Distinctions and 38 Distinctions. All students in each year group performed better than the national median.

The Australian Intermediate Mathematical Olympiad (AIMO) took place at the end of September with only 1539 students across Australia competing. We had 11 boys participate, with six being invited to compete. Joshua Chen (Year 10) achieved a perfect score and was recognised with a Special Excellence Award from the Western Australian Mathematics Olympiad Committee. Zean Zhang (Year 9) also achieved an excellent result and was invited to attend the Junior School of Excellence Camp over the Christmas holidays. Other significant results included Andy Wu (Year 8) who achieved a Distinction, and Junjie Chen (Year 10), Aidan Lim (Year 7) and Jeremiah Wang (Year 8) who achieved Credits. Junjie and Jeremiah missed out on a Distinction by just one point.

We finished the year off with the Western Australian Junior Olympiad, normally held at UWA but run remotely this year. This competition is open to Years 7 to 9 students and we entered six teams. Our mixed team of Year 8 and 9 boys came third overall. The team consisted of Harold Smith, Jeremiah Wang, Andy Wu and Zean Zhang. We also received five individual prizes: Zean Zhang for achieving a perfect score in the individual round, Eddie Gao, Jeremiah Wang and Andy Wu, and Aidan Lim for achieving the highest score for a Year 7 student.

We look forward to 2021 and all the competitions that follow.

SCIENCE

At the end of a challenging year, I find myself reflecting on the achievements only possible through the hard work and dedicated commitment of our talented team of teachers and the resilience of the boys at Christ Church.

The shift to remote learning was met with enthusiasm and resolve as lessons taught in a well-resourced Science Department were adapted for online learning.

Our Science staff created videos and demonstrations of practical activities including acid base titrations, energy transformations, dissections, DNA electrophoresis, in addition to exploring practical options for experiments to be conducted at home. At the beginning of Term 2, we were fortunate to bring the boys back into the classroom, knowing we could continue to deliver engaging and practical content should the situation arise.

CCGS boys continued to excel on the national and international stage. The International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS) includes 20 countries and involves over 980 000 students. Our boys improved on last year's results with nine achieving High Distinctions, putting them in the top one per cent of students in Australia. Congratulations to Grant Hogarth in Year 10, who was awarded a gold medal for ICAS Science for achieving the highest mark in his year level. Our boys also participated, online for the first time, in the Science Olympiads, once again performing strongly.

Science Week in August saw us dive into the 'Deep Blue'. We had our annual Science Quiz and an online media competition which saw over 70 video and photo entries showcase the boys' affinity with our oceans. Our guest speaker was author and environmental scientist Heather Waugh and students enjoyed a VR ocean experience in the library.

With changes required to the way we operate, we made significant use of the river precinct, exploring abiotic and biotic factors, food webs, salinity and general water and environmental health. Our Year 6 boys visited our Chemistry laboratories and participated in activities in preparation for Year 7, experiencing a taste of Physics, Chemistry and Biology.

We continue to provide a hands-on, practical approach to Science, encouraging our students to think locally and globally. I challenge all ECGS students to consider what they can do to leave their positive mark both on the School and the global stage.

HEAD OF PREPARATORY SCHOOL

STEVEN MALES

Christ Church was founded 110 years ago, and over this span of time, countless memories have been forged. 2020 will be remembered as the year the School had to deal with a worldwide pandemic. Quickly, our vocabulary changed with the phrase, 'these unprecedented times', repeatedly mentioned. Terms such as COVID-19, quarantine, lockdown, social distancing and remote learning became the norm. As a school community, preparation commenced for a remote learning experience with a trial, and the BigBlueButton became more than just a button. Within a rapid timeframe we prepared our boys, worked closely with our staff and on 26 March we transitioned to remote learning.

Staff preparation was truly amazing, from helping every boy in the School to better understand the BigBlueButton platform, developing structures in OneNote, creating take home packs, to deploying 522 iPads for every boy to continue their learning. A remarkable achievement.

2020 also saw the introduction of the researched-based School Wide Positive Behaviour Framework. Our Preparatory School boys focused on the development of core values – care and compassion, respect, responsibility and understanding, and inclusion. Learning about what these values looked like in their day-to-day behaviours and interactions was a focus, which closely aligns itself to our overall approach to social and emotional learning. Our focus on the House system saw a new level of connectedness across the School, helping each boy to be part of a broader team.

Highlights from 2020:

With a hard border closure, our Year 6
boys were unable to travel to Canberra.
However, they took part in an alternate
Canberra Experience which involved guest
speaker, Dr Carmen Lawrence, visits to
State Parliament and virtual tours of the
Australian War Memorial.







- The Have Sum Fun Mathematics teams competed and finished first and fourth.
- Many of our boys competed in the various ICAS competitions, with seven medal winners, 19 High Distinctions and 115 Distinctions awarded.
- Year 4 students Tobias Iddrisu and Henry Stobie finished in the top 10 in a national short story competition, as voted by students across the country.
- The hosting of our first Sports Awards
 Assembly with old boy and Olympic gold medallist Bill Kirby as our guest presenter.
- The Future Problem Solving (FPS) team,

- as part of the Centre for Excellence, participated in the national FPS competition.
- The expansion of the Year 7 transition program, including a study skills session and an academic activity, further prepared our Year 6 boys for the Senior School.

This year, Preparatory School boys were also busily learning about an approach to writing, known as Talk for Writing. The term not only describes all the talk that surrounds the teaching of writing but also the wider learning within a unit. It helps the boys become better speakers, listeners, readers, writers and thinkers.

House activities continue to provide opportunities for boys to be involved in learning how to make a difference to those in need through philanthropic actions. The World's Greatest Shave raised a staggering \$40 000 for the Leukaemia Foundation, and the annual Lapathon for the Cambodian Children's Fund raised \$27 000 to support students who found life a struggle this year.

2020 has been a rewarding year and I would like to acknowledge and thank all the students, staff and parents for their support. Our 110th year will be remembered for years to come.

Next, we uncovered problems then identified the most prominent one (which we called the Underlying Problem or UP), and devised solutions to solve the issue. Lastly, we selected the most relevant solution and developed that into a plan of action that would solve the UP.

A week later, our brilliant coach Mrs Wisker invited our team to her room at recess to reveal how we had fared in the competition. Let's just say, I thought fourth in Australia wasn't too bad!

MATHEMATICS EXTENSION ANTHEA FEAVER / CO-ORDINATOR

In Measurement and Geometry, the Year 4 boys learnt about the parts of a circle and the ratio between the circumference and diameter of a circle, which is the special number pi. The Homework Challenge for the week was to learn as many digits of pi as possible. Some of the boys really excelled at this, with the champion, Fergus Khoo, committing 180 decimal places to memory. 





Cricket Prize this year, for his leadership and sportsmanship in addition to his excellent batting, bowling and keeping skills.














SOCCER



My favourite moment was sailing. I liked it because I got to help everyone with my sailing knowledge.





STEPHAN SHEN


