THE YEAR IN REVIEW





PRINCIPAL

The 2021 school year was a remarkably successful one for Christ Church, commencing with the outstanding results of our 2020 Year 12 cohort. As a high performing academic and inclusive school, we enrol boys of all abilities. It was wonderful to see our graduating class, both ATAR and non-ATAR, achieve its goals.

COVID-19 remained a challenge and particularly for educational establishments who had to remain open. Our staff continued to be exceptionally resilient and highly committed as they moved from face-to-face to remote learning and then back to classroom teaching. The School proactively pursued the government to place all school staff on the essential service list to ensure they received vaccination priority and a fast track to fully vaccinated status.

We continue to provide one of the best co-curricular programs of any school nationally. This year we introduced new programs, including our On Board program for future boarders and the Cape-to-Cave Outdoor Education experience for our Year 8 boys and the Year 8 St Hilda's girls. Our Year 6 students explored economics in the Endeavour Project, a collaboration with MLC Year 6 students. Year 4 boys in our Little Queenslea Drive program had their first overnight learning

experience, with a focus on developing peer and teacher relationships and strategies to assist them to learn in groups.

However, it is attention on the core of our purpose that will ensure the School continues to shine. The Christ Church Pedagogy, formulated a decade ago and continually refined, aligns behaviours with expectations of our boys, parents, teachers and leaders.

Our pedagogy continues to improve the quality of our teaching and the way students learn, to gain a deeper understanding of fundamental material which has a direct impact on our students' academic success.

Given our success, it is not surprising that the greatest challenge for this fortunate community is complacency. I am pleased to say that in 2021 we began the next phase of our planning and development.

This year we revisited and confirmed the School's values – the values that guide how we live, act and are the foundation of our decision-making. Our four core values underpin everything we do as a community:

1. Respect – for self, people and everything around us
2. Integrity – having strong ethics and a true moral compass
3. Excellence – a commitment to being the very best one can be in all arenas
4. Care and Compassion – kindness and respect for self and others.

Every five years the School completes a Strategic Plan, and this year we launched our new master plan for 2021 to 2025. As part of this strategic process, the School examines every aspect of its physical and educational environment – past, present and future. This plan guides the development of property for the next five to 20 years, to ensure it aligns with the Strategic Plan, future enrolments and educational trends. A notable inclusion is the purchase of land, known as St John's Wood Phase 2, a parcel of land the size of three football ovals bordering our current

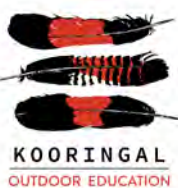

St John's Wood Playing Fields, as well as the John XXIII College and the University of Western Australia playing fields. The School has been looking at consolidating its playing fields for some time, as this will create a space similar to other PSA Schools, one from where parents can watch and move seamlessly between the sports with no travel and parking implications.

Maintaining student numbers is a constant focus for all schools and especially for those with a boarding community. Boarding schools play a unique role in the provision of schooling for families in special circumstances, such as those in our rural and remote communities, or those living and working overseas. We consider our boarders to be central to our diversity. To help prepare boys for boarding we launched On Board, a dedicated program for boys coming into the boarding community. The program, led by Mr Todd Harnwell, our Residential Year Group Co-ordinator for Years 7 and 8, involves strengthening connections the year before a boy enters boarding. The program includes interacting with the incoming boys, running through English and Mathematics concepts and exercises and, importantly, connecting them with our existing boarders so that they have a greater understanding of what is ahead. During the school holidays, Todd and his family travelled all around the State making contact with current, past and prospective families and sharing news of the program.



A fabulous milestone was reached this year as Koorungal, the School's outdoor education centre or 'a place by the water', turned 50. Since opening, Koorungal has contributed to the personal growth of more than 30 000 boys and this year welcomed boys from Years 4 to 10. To commemorate turning 50, a new logo was designed, featuring the symbol of the red-tailed black cockatoo, a dominant species in the area. I speak to many boys every day and without fail, they all love Koorungal and have only positive memories and a desire to return. I am sure this is due to the programs created and delivered by Director, Mr Ryan Myles and his team. The simple fact that all things happen under the sun or stars, ensure all boys have a direct personal connection with nature in enjoyable ways.

Another momentous milestone this year was that our incredibly talented Chess team won the School's 12th consecutive PSA Chess title. Chess is a very competitive game that requires skills such as memory and determination. For this to be an ongoing achievement for the School highlights the talent of boys and the commitment of teachers.

Diversity and inclusion are central to how we operate. Every year, our Aboriginal students share an aspect of their culture with the whole community when we celebrate NAIDOC Week. This year the boys worked diligently on their art pieces, wooden totem shields, for their exhibition. They were quite spectacular, revealing animals and symbols significant to the boys' culture and regions. Another aspect of this celebration was the creation of a walking trail, starting at the river and weaving its way through the campus, with the shields visible at various points along the trail.

Embedding philanthropy in the curriculum has been a gradual process over the past decade and we are now seeing the benefits. For the past two years, the students have successfully raised funds for the Students' Scholarship. Their fundraising efforts allows the school to offer a scholarship, all tuition paid, to a boy who in other circumstances would not be able to attend. This initiative is driven by the boys, and clearly demonstrates the concept of philanthropy.

We are a school that suits the needs of all family members. The School community continues to be one of Christ Church's greatest and most significant asset, as evidenced by the constant support it receives from the parents and past students.

I wish to congratulate and thank all staff and students for a wonderful year and again thank the parents for their ongoing support.

We started the year with a sense of optimism and a tinge of uncertainty. All was well as the School hosted a successful Orientation Day for new boys on Saturday 30 January. However, the COVID-19 cloud descended the following afternoon and all the plans for the first week of school were placed on hold. Most of us wondered what 2021 was going to look like as we implemented our remote learning strategies. It was at this point that I first thought about the importance of courage and what we needed to do to ensure the best outcomes for our school community, in particular the boys and the staff.

Week 2 started and although masks were uncomfortable, the opportunity to get face-to-face learning back on track was exciting. The buzz of the boys around the campus was palpable and the opportunity to commence the year was rewarding for those planning broad educational opportunities for the boys.

A boy's House is his home while he is at the School. It is the place where he develops a sense of attachment, a sense of belonging; a place where he can forge friendships and be cared for by key staff who, over time, get to know him very well. There is no doubt that this organisational structure and, most importantly, the staff and student leaders within it, make our School a leader in pastoral care.

There are numerous events in the pastoral calendar, one of which is the Beatty Cup competition. Boys have the opportunity to contribute and participate in activities which foster House spirit and shape their character. Perhaps one of the most celebrated and keenly contested events is the House Shout. This year, many engaged all members of their House to sing and perform. This resulted in an extremely entertaining assembly, with staff and students trying to match wits with the judges to determine the winner. In the end, Craigie prevailed, followed by Jupp and Moyes. Other notable winners in the major House sporting competitions were Wolsey in Swimming and Cross Country, Hill in Team Sports and Craigie in Athletics. It was great to have these events back after being cancelled

last year due to COVID-19 restrictions. These results and others led to the 2021 Beatty Cup being one of the closest competitions for many years. The final result saw Wolsey win by two points from Queenslea, with Jupp only a point behind in third place.

The staff commitment and leadership to the pastoral care of boys are immense. This year we welcomed Mr Daniel Cadby to the pastoral team as Acting Head of Craigie while Ms Claudia Feldman was on maternity leave. During the year, Mr Jamie Foster was promoted to the role of Director of Planning and Co-curricular, resulting in Mr Digby Gibson stepping in to oversee Noake for the remainder of the year. Mr Cadby takes over as Head of Noake in 2022. In particular, I would like to thank Mr Foster for his exceptional leadership of Noake House for the past seven and a half years. 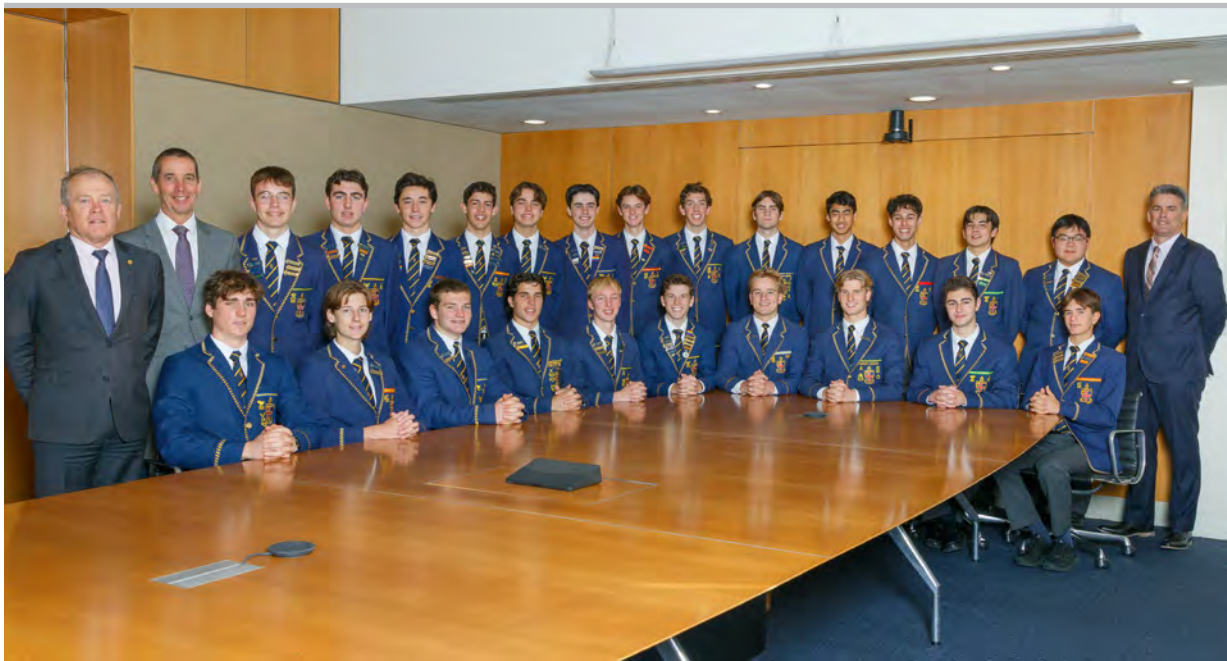

ACADEMIC RESULTS

MAHENDRA VASWANI / DEPUTY PRINCIPAL AND DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

The Class of 2021 is certainly deserving of the title of the GOAT: Greatest of All Time.

Notwithstanding disruptions due to COVID-19, remote learning and unconditional early offers from universities, the cohort managed a feat yet unachieved by previous graduating classes – the highest median ATAR ever recorded for the School. The Year 12 class of 2021 worked collaboratively to, once again, position Christ Church as the highest performing boys' school in Western Australia.

The numbers speak for themselves: a median ATAR of 92.80, five General Exhibitions, four Subject Exhibitions, 11 Subject Certificates of Excellence, 21 Top Performing courses, 27 subjects with mean scaled scores higher than those of the State, 38 Certificates of Distinction, 41 Certificates of Merit, 100 per cent of the non-ATAR boys achieving the WACE, and 61 per cent of the ATAR students achieving an ATAR of 90 and above. The graduating Class of 2021 is to be congratulated for its fine efforts.

Harry Davison-Petch, the CCGS Dux for 2021, attained an ATAR of 99.9 and was awarded a General Exhibition and Subject Certificates of Excellence for Chemistry. Nicholas Tan was also awarded a General Exhibition, a Subject Exhibition for Ancient History and Subject Certificates of Excellence in Ancient History and Literature. Ed Stoddart earned three Subject Exhibitions for English, Modern History and Philosophy and Ethics, while also being welcomed into the School's 99 Club.

Three boys from the Peter Moyes Centre completed their Year 12 studies at Christ Church – Tommy Andrews, Ben Rock and Ben Shields.

In 2021, Christ Church Grammar School had 168 students who achieved an ATAR, 16 students in a non-ATAR pathway and three students in the PMC.

- 16 students (9.5% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 99

- 27 students (16% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 98
- 67 students (40% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 95
- 103 students (61% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 90
- 148 students (80% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 80
- 182 students (98.9% of eligible candidates) achieved the WACE
- 30 students achieved a VET qualification of Certificate III/IV
- Christ Church was placed in the group of top performing schools in 21 courses (courses with fewer than 10 students are not included): Accounting and Finance, Ancient History, Business Management and Enterprise, Chemistry, Computer Science, Design, Economics, Geography, Human Biology, Literature, Mathematics Applications, Mathematics Methods, Mathematics Specialist, Media Production and Analysis, Modern History, Philosophy and Ethics, Physical Education Studies, Physics, Politics and Law, Psychology and Visual Arts.

98.9% of eligible students achieved their WACE by achieving the required average of seven C grades or unit equivalence over Years 11 and 12, along with literacy and numeracy proficiency (OLNA) and an ATAR or Certificate II or higher.

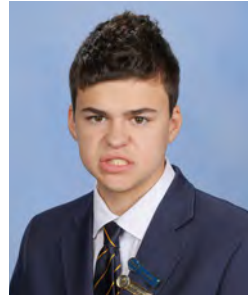

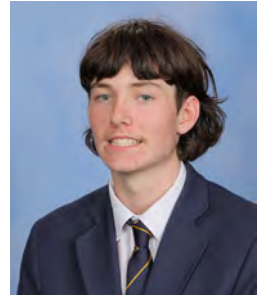

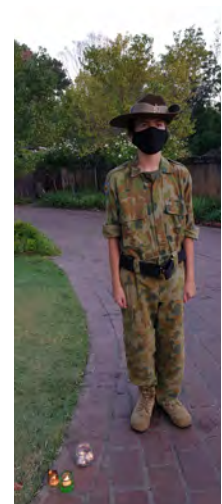
Term 1 was truly a test for those promoted into leadership positions. With 69 new recruits, most of the unit headed off to Northam Army Camp for the Recruit Induction field exercise, focusing on basic cadet field skills to test the proficiency of the recruits. Simultaneously, the Year 11s remained at CCGS to attend the Junior Leadership Course, which was cancelled in 2020 due to COVID-19, to develop the skills necessary to lead a section.

By Term 2, all the cogs in the unit were whirring and spirits were high despite the cancellation of the much-anticipated Anzac Day parade. The unit participated individually in the Driveway Dawn Service instead. Our second field exercise took place at Bindoon Training Area, which upped the intensity. Cadets had their navigation and radio skills tested as they traversed Bindoon in the pouring rain. The event finished on a high note with the unit enjoying an excursion to the paintball grounds, competing as a team in exciting scenarios.

Term 3 continued with training in radio communications, first aid, navigation and drill, supplemented by our final field exercise. This revolved around a rogaining exercise, which added a competitive element to a navigational task, the cadets' efforts paying off with a much-deserved movie night. The following day we relocated to Irwin Barracks for weapon training on the EF88 rifle. On Friday afternoons, the unit also practised marksmanship at the Weapon Training Simulator System (WTSS) and the Year 11s visited Special Air Service Regiment (SASR).

The highlight of the year, without doubt, was this year's Annual Field Exercise (AFX). Having been cancelled in 2020, AFX 2021 was a first for many. We operated entirely within our battalion, which this year consisted of CCGSCU, St Hilda's, Guildford Grammar School, and Karratha and Geraldton Senior High Schools. The cadets had the opportunity to take part in three courses: the Command Post (CP) course, the Recon course and the Junior Leadership course (JLC). The CP course focused on the management of designated command areas in the field, with skills like radio operation and battle tracking. The Recon course worked on observation, camouflage and movement by night and day, culminating in a mission to gather information on an unsuspecting battalion near the airfield. Finally, the JLC aimed to bolster the fundamental skills of our cadets, while also equipping them with the leadership skills needed to take charge of a section the following year.

The AFX also signalled the end of our training year, and it certainly was a job well done and a fantastic experience. Of course, none of this would have been possible without the toils of the staff. Thank you to CAPT (AAC) Scott, MAJ Nurse, WO1 O'Sullivan, LT Barbour and LT Gibson. The unit wouldn't function without you.

CADETS: SURF LIFE SAVING

This year, Christ Church continued its partnership with North Cottesloe Surf Life Saving Club to help cadets from Year 10 learn important skills, which may be used to save someone's life.

During first term, the boys were taught basic surf lifesaving skills using rescue tubes and longboards, making surf craft rescue ready and important fundamental medical components, such as DRSABCD. Fitness and discipline were also worked on, with the boys completing regular run-swim-runs and having a gruelling introductory fitness session with old boy Guy Mouritz.

Second term saw a shift away from North Cottesloe Beach with the sessions being conducted on campus during the winter. Cadets learnt first aid treatments,



such as dealing with asthma and anaphylaxis as well as slings, bandaging and oxygen therapy. But the real challenge for the cadets was braving the freezing cold river water to learn unconscious and conscious spinal.

The unit moved back to North Cottesloe in Term 3, but a series of late season storms meant that cadets endured freezing winds and large swells. This ultimately prepared them for the culmination of the surf cadets unit, an all-day Saturday practice session and then the Sunday Bronze examination, in which 63 Year 10 boys achieved their Bronze Medallion. However, all cadets were now equipped to be effective first responders.

Term 4 saw the completion of the Surf Life Saving Cadets course, with 11 of the Year 11 leaders achieving their ART qualification, while the cadets learnt about different aspects of the club, such as the use of drones and beach set-up for patrols.

Overall, in the preliminary stages of the competition, Christ Church teams won five out of six cases, a commendable achievement. Our success was furthered by the three consecutive wins of the 'Usual Suspects' team, led valiantly by Year 12 and Co-Captain, Harry Davison-Petch.

As a result, the Usual Suspects placed sixth on the ladder and progressed to the finals. Winning the next three trials, the team advanced to the grand final judged by the Hon Chief Justice Peter Quinlan SC in Supreme Court 1.

The team consisted of Year 12 students Harry Davison-Petch and Stuart Everett, as well as four hard working and dedicated Year 11s, Eduardo Caceres-Sandoval, Tim Creed, Harry Della-Vedova and Jack Francis. Despite tremendous efforts and a stellar performance on the night, we were edged out by a strong St Mary's team who took the trophy.

Despite a disappointing result, being able to participate in so many trials and appear before the Hon Chief Justice in full robes was a reward in itself. The teams' hard work and commitment, alongside invaluable support from old boy Tom Robins and Ms Vanessa Badaraco ensured our success. Christ Church Mock Trials teams have a bright future ahead.

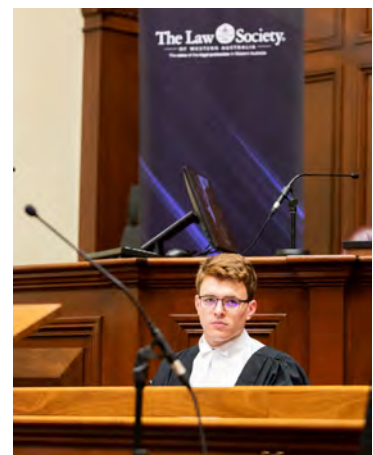

My thoughts? Venture was a challenging but extremely rewarding experience, and I can say I am a better person because of it. I also gained friendships I will take with me into Year 11.





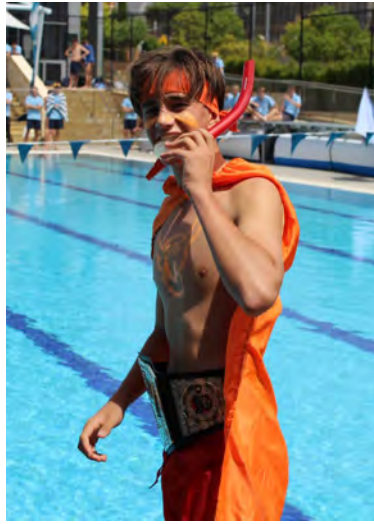

The CCGS Athletics Team continued to improve on previous performances, securing a fourth-place finish and achieving a score of 1429.5 points – the highest ever recorded. This result came on the back of many excellent achievements from students in all age groups.

The attitude and effort of students was outstanding, with many achieving personal best results at the PSA carnival. The team was well-led by Captain of Athletics Parker Robinson, along with a strong Year 12 cohort who gave much to CCGS Athletics during their time at the School.

There were many terrific performances, highlighted by age group results:

UNDER 13

Harrison Pazin ran second in Division 2 1500m and 800m and Rhys Oxley won Division 1 1500m in a School record time of 4:35.39, also placing second in Division 1 800m. Matthew Teh took out the Division 1 Triple Jump and Angus Read competed strongly in his sprinting and jumping events.

UNDER 14

Samuel Hicks had four top-three places and Samuel Brampton had two, both in middle distance events. William Kempson scored 41 individual points with top-three finishes in Long Jump, Triple Jump, 400m and the 4x400m Relay. Jackson Anderson had another great meet, finishing first in the 400m and Division 2 Long Jump, and third in the 200m and 4x100m Relay.

UNDER 15

Thomas Grylls ran a blistering 400m to finish first in his race. An exciting development this year was the new Data Science and Artificial Intelligence course for our Year 10 boys. This course gave boys the opportunity to explore how

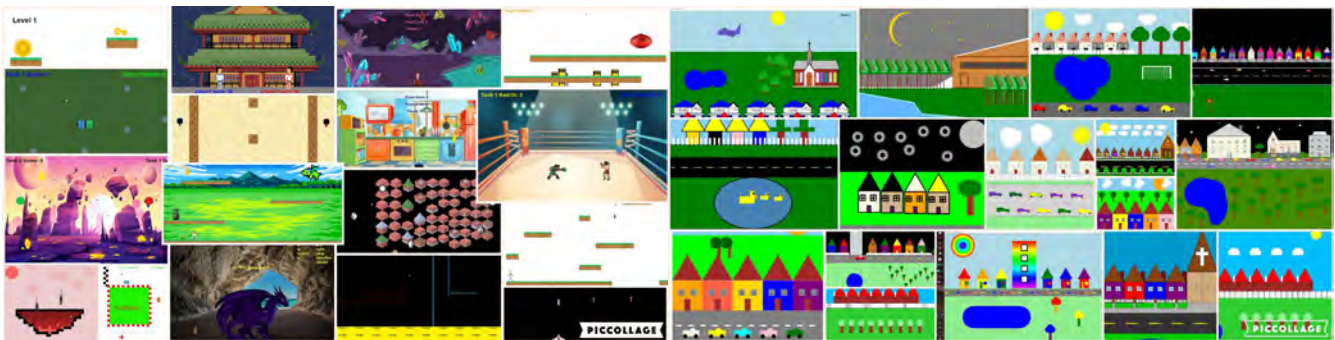

DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

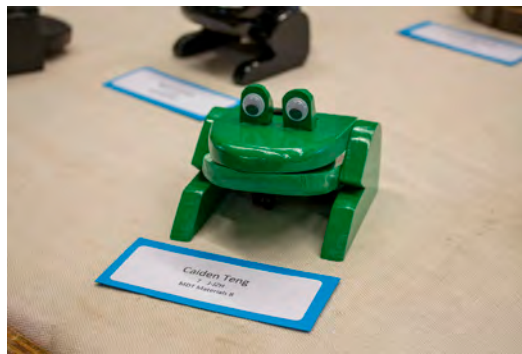

THE VISIT

For three days in June, Year 11s and 12s of the Midnite Youth Theatre Company performed *The Visit*. Piercingly dark, comic performances were the culmination of months of rehearsals and hard work.

The play, written by Swiss playwright Friedrich Dürrenmatt, is a post-war tragicomedy that nose dives into the existential quandaries of the modern era. It tells of the return of Claire Zachanassian, an enigmatic and extravagant woman, to her hometown of Guellen. Claire, who was disgraced many years ago, returns with vengeance, demanding the execution of her old lover for wrongdoings long past. The way she is able to leverage her fortune to distort the moral convictions of those around her, calls into question the values that we hold dear. This dark subject matter is made more acute by the artful blending of comedy and tragedy, emotionally challenging for an ambivalent audience.

The success of the performance is owed not only to formidable individual performances, but to the concerted effort of the play's chorus, whose persistent belief and dedication to the drama drew the audience into the town of Guellen. Outstanding costume, set and sound design similarly helped create a fitting sensory atmosphere.

The abundance of talented and industrious actors is cause for great excitement for the 2022 season. As Midnite veterans, the Year 11s and 12s set a fitting example for younger, aspiring actors. More importantly, the company upheld the strong Midnite tradition of maintaining an inclusive and diverse community. This ethos of professionalism and the embracing of diversity are the hallmarks of mature actors. If their performances in *The Visit* are any indication, there is plenty to be excited about what these actors can achieve next.

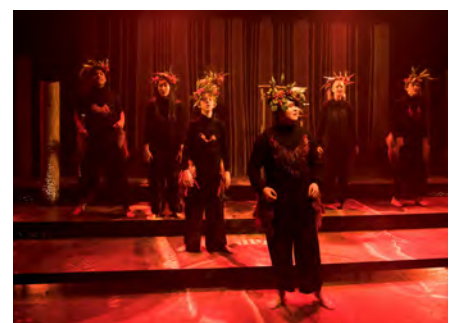
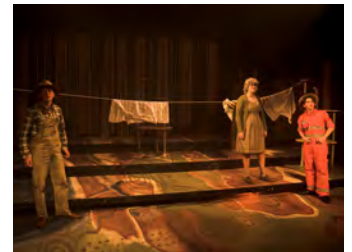
FIRE

In Term 4, the Midnite Youth Theatre Company's production of Scott Alderdice's *Fire* burnt brightly for four compelling nights, igniting audiences with performances from a range of Year 9 and 10 students. The play draws inspiration from the Warrumbungle National Park bushfire in NSW in 2013, where 55 000 hectares of bush and farmland were obliterated in fewer than two weeks, devastating native flora and fauna. Our production was an ensemble effort, with many performers playing multiple roles, giving voice to the tragedy.

The cast rehearsed for many months, learning how a kangaroo hops, how a koala sleeps and how we are all shaped by this extraordinary country. In October, we moved into the theatre, transformed by the gum

bark colour palette of set designer, Ms Stephanie Cullingford, to refine our choices and stitch scenes into a single narrative. Director, Miss Kalika Duck, guided by Noongar Cultural Advisor, Ms Geri Hayden, completed the production with the creation of an Acknowledgement of Country written specifically to honour Australia's First Nations People's profound understanding of and respect for fire.

Bathed in the electric flames of lighting designer, Miss Tess Reuvers, crowned in the native flora of costume designer, Mrs Jay Waugh, and supported by a student crew from Years 8 to 11, we opened in early November. The journey and performances will never be forgotten; we laughed, we cried and enjoyed every minute. *Fire* set the 2021 season ablaze and then, in a breath, it was gone.



ENGLISH

The English Department began the year celebrating the success of our 2020 ATAR students, with our Literature cohort recognised as among the top performing students in the State. Exceptional individual performances for Josh Green (Literature ATAR) and Jackson Bergsma (English ATAR) saw them receive Certificates of Excellence for being in the top 0.5 per cent in their respective examinations. We commend all students and teachers on their efforts.

For the first time, CCGS English students in Years 8 and 10 Extension classes sat the ICAS English Competition. Year 8 student Max Harrison was recognised as one of the top performers in the State – a fantastic achievement.

Terms 1 and 2 also saw the introduction of the inaugural Ekphrastic Poetry Prize, with Vidarsha Jayasinghe (Year 7) and Dylan Ang (Year 11) taking out the junior and senior prizes respectively. For the second year running, Nicholas Tan (Year 12) was awarded the PD Naish Poetry Prize for the best poem in the Senior School. The passion for poetry in the School was also recognised with CCGS winning the prize for the Most Enthusiastic Poetry School in submissions to the Roland Leach Poetry Prize for 2021.

2021 also saw the retirement of Simon Hunn, a stalwart of the department whose presence will be missed by staff and students alike. We would like to take this opportunity to thank him again for his service to the School.

HUMANITIES

YEARS 7 AND 10

ANCIENT AND MODERN HISTORY

Year 7 classrooms were transformed into battlegrounds as Athenians fought with Spartans to establish who was superior. The boys created their own three-dimensional models of artefacts that were displayed in classroom museums.

ACCOUNTING AND FINANCE, BUSINESS MANAGEMENT AND ENTERPRISE, ECONOMICS AND INVESTING

In the Investing and Enterprise elective Plan Your Own Enterprise competition, five Year 10 students were recognised with special awards. Division 1 (Individual) winners were Harry Kailis for Entrepreneurship in Changing Times and Archie Martin for Supporting Safety. In Division 2 (Group), Yeshen Behari and Akshay Sivaanujan won Supporting Health/Medical Technology. Finally, Mason Beck won Support for Regions.

GEOGRAPHY

Domenic Leach won the Year 7 Young Geographer of the Year competition for his investigation into the local area/community of Subiaco. "The focus of my study was so familiar to me. It was both natural and beneficial personally to become engaged and I enjoyed completing this analysis," Domenic said.

The Year 7 Urban Planning Challenge had the boys hypothetically developing a sub-division at Mount Claremont.

The Year 10 classes had an excursion to Point Peron, Rockingham and Port Coogee where they investigated coastal processes and management practices.

PHILOSOPHY AND ETHICS, POLITICS AND LAW

A new initiative for the Year 10 students was conducting a mock United Nations Security Council meeting, discussing a resolution on the transition of the Afghanistan Government to Taliban control. The boys adopted the role of a particular country and used their accumulated Humanities skills to investigate the economic, geopolitical and historical tensions. It was impressive to witness the critiques and suggested amendments generated.

YEARS 8 AND 11

Throughout the year, Year 8 and 11 students participated in excursions and external competitions in an effort to add real-world experiences to the dynamic subjects taught within Humanities.

In March, Year 8 visited State Parliament. This excursion had a few alterations due to COVID-19 restrictions in place at the time, but all boys were treated to a tour of both chambers, introduced to key politicians and given a unique insight into how State Parliament is run. Some boys were also lucky as their visit coincided with a press conference on the steps of Parliament House.

In September, Year 11 Geographers visited Rottnest to complete a full day of fieldwork as a part of their unit on sustainable tourism. The boys again had guest speakers and were given an insight into the logistics of running tourism facilities in an environmentally sustainable manner.

The Year 11 Business Management and Enterprise classes had their fieldwork in October, on a day designed to give them an insight into how businesses in different industries are managed. This excursion was a good introduction to their final unit, which required them to design their own business plan. A big thank you to Paramount Nightclub, 303 MullenLowe, Big Loaf Factory Bakery and Revolution Sport for opening their doors and giving up their time to present to the CCGS boys.

Unfortunately, some external competitions were again postponed in 2021 due to COVID-19 outbreaks in the eastern states. Despite this, Year 8 students competed in the Australian History Competition while Year 11 Economics students were able to participate in the Australian Stock Exchange Sharemarket Game.





YEAR 9

The year started off with Economics and Business, with boys introduced to concepts such as specialisation and trade, with particular focus on Australia. Boys accounted for the changes to this over time, looking at real-life supply-chain issues during the COVID-19 pandemic and its impact on supply and demand and prices.

In Geography, boys explored how people and their actions impact the environment around them, particularly in the context of tourism during the pandemic. Even though our borders were closed, boys created virtual tours of holiday destinations with a focus on the values brought to local communities and how the negative impacts of tourism could be mitigated. Boys also undertook a study of animal adaptations and biomes, which culminated in a practical study at the Perth Zoo.

Civics and Citizenship deepened the boys' understanding of our Westminster System, civil and criminal procedures and court hierarchy. Boys also got political – creating their own political party and platforms and producing social media campaigns to influence voters. This got the boys considering whether social media and the manipulation and targeting of voters poses a threat or opportunities for our democracy.

Finally, in History, boys studied developments through the Industrial Revolution which set the scene for the technological advancements of today. Boys also investigated the causes and impacts of World War I and focused on their research skills for their final task of the year. In addition to this, a number of Year 9 students had excellent performances in the Australian History Competition with Gabriel Haselhurst, Tom Labza, Alex Molyneux, Max Pehrse Jeremiah Wang and Andy Wu all receiving a High Distinction in the competition.

ERRATUM: In the 2020 Mitre Humanities report, the name of the winner of the 2020 ESSI Money (Earning, Saving, Spending and Investing Money) competition, run by the Financial Basics Foundation, was incorrect. YEAR 12

In Geography, students undertook fieldwork to investigate the restoration of river foreshore environments (Point Walter and the Kent Street Weir), focusing on the management of environmental change. They also studied urban planning in the Perth Metropolitan Region, including the improvement to transport networks, such as the proposed Butler-Yanchep rail extension, and inner-city urban redevelopments like Yagan Square.

Students of Ancient and Modern History drew parallels between the COVID-19 pandemic and their respective periods of study and how the motivations and actions of individuals impact contemporary society, government and geopolitical conflicts.

The Economics cohort was treated to a virtual Reserve Bank of Australia breakfast this year, which focused on the developments in Australia's economy and the short and long-term impacts of COVID-19. This gave them a practical insight into the economy and an analysis of the fiscal and monetary policies in place to insulate Australia's economy during lockdowns and the pandemic.

Our first Year 12 Business Management and Enterprise ATAR and General cohort focused on business planning, marketing and opportunities provided by technology and the global environment. They undertook an analysis of real businesses and scenarios to develop their knowledge and understanding of successful business management and performance within an ethical business environment.

The Year 12 Politics and Law class demonstrated effective collaboration between the MLC girls and CCGS boys in developing their political and legal knowledge and understanding of both the USA and Australian systems of government.



INDIGENOUS PROGRAM

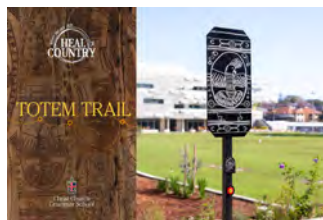

Like last year, we welcomed three very excited Year 7 boys to our program – Bodie Cox, Kayde Kelly and Malakai Websdale. Older boys ensured that the new boys settled into life at CCGS.

We started the year with a tour of Wadjemup (Rottneest Island) by Noongar elder Walter McGuire and his wife Meg, along with St Hilda's First Nations students. We learnt about the imprisonment of Aboriginal people on the island between 1838 and 1904, who were made to work in forced-labour camps until 1931. During that time, about 4000 Indigenous boys and men were incarcerated. At least 373 of them died in custody. They were buried in an area now known as the Wadjemup Aboriginal Burial Ground. Mr McGuire also discussed the steps being taken to acknowledge and reconcile with Aboriginal people. This includes Rottneest Island staff and visitors celebrating Whadjuk Noongar people as the traditional owners of Wadjemup and appreciating the historical and contemporary significance of the island as a unique cultural landscape.

For this year's NAIDOC Week, the boys designed totems to protect the land on which Christ Church sits, using animals or plants from around the School and on Country. We then created a totem trail from the Boat Shed near the river down to the Art Department. We would like to thank local artist and Noongar man Tyrown Waigana, winner of the 2020 National NAIDOC Poster Competition, as well as Ms Pam Yordanoff for all their help. Without the Art Department, this project would not have got off the ground.

We also enjoyed an excursion to UWA's St Catherine's College where we learnt about the Dandjoo Darbalung program. The program supports Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from metro, rural and remote areas of Australia, attending both university and TAFE. Old boy Jaaron Davis gave us a tour and explained the opportunities available at the College.



LIBRARY

The Senior Library was once again a central place in the School for boys from all years to meet, study, research, read and simply have fun.

New Year 7 to 9 reading programs were launched in 2021. Boys selected and read books from age-curated collections and then reflected on how certain aspects of the School's values, such as integrity and social justice, were represented in these books. Popular titles from the collections included *The Faithful Spy*, *Wildlands*, *Sparrow* and *Between Shades of Gray*.

2021 also saw the introduction of new strategies for Information Literacy, in particular, using lateral reading and the SIFT method – Stop, Investigate, Find and Trace – to discern whether a source of information is credible and appropriate for the task. Year 7s and 8s explored a range of sources to learn who or what was really behind the information.

In Term 2, Year 10 Support English enjoyed a virtual visit with author Mark Smith who penned the incredibly popular *Winter* trilogy. Noah Kowald (Year 10) was the lucky recipient of signed copies of each book thanks to the insightful questions he had for Mark.

While we are used to visiting authors and illustrators, we had two unique guests this year – dogs Otis and Koji. Otis came with owner and writer Dean Morris who spoke to Year 8 students about setting up his own charity, Give Our Strays a Chance, and the values by which he lives. Koji has become a regular feature at Study Lab when he accompanies owner Ms Alli Gould on Wednesday afternoons.

We were lucky once again to develop unique partnerships with students and old boys. In 2021, the library helped Tommy Andrews (Year 12) and Noah Kowald create their original books. In Semester 2, we welcomed back old boy Justin Rae who undertook work experience every Wednesday afternoon and created an amazing Remembrance Day display.

A sad note for the Senior Library was the departure of Mr Mason Clarke who was the friendly library face in the afternoons and evenings. In his place we had 2020 old boys supervise the library in the late afternoons as well as Fabien Roussel, one of the School's RENTAs. We thank all of them for their assistance throughout the year.



LANGUAGES

LINGUISTICS OLYMPIAD

With the Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad not running in 2020 due to COVID-19, many students were eager to test their analytical and logical reasoning skills this year. Four groups of students represented the School in the WA finals, all of whom receiving a Gold Certificate. Two Year 9 teams finished in the top three in Western Australia in the Junior category, and for their efforts, earned a spot in the national finals. Competing at UWA some weeks later, a Gold Certificate was awarded to Aaron Goh, Gabriel Haselhurst, Max Pearce and Andy Wu, while Edward Hadi, Alex Molyneux, Wesley Peh and Jeremiah Wang finished with a Bronze Certificate. Our Gold Certificate winners ranked equal third place across all Junior competing teams in Australia.

ALLIANCE FRANÇAISE EXAMINATION

In August our Year 10, 11 and 12 French students once again sat the Alliance Française High School Examinations. 2021 marked the 100th anniversary of the competition. Although the examinations were of a challenging level, our students achieved some exceptional marks. For their strong results

in the written examination, Lucas Hogan (Year 12) and Finn Lip (Year 11) were invited to take an additional oral examination in September. With a mark of 100 per cent in the oral examination, Lucas eventually won third place in the combined examination and was awarded an official prize.

LANGUAGES VIDEO COMPETITION

An enthusiastic group of Year 8 students from the two Japanese classes competed against Australian and New Zealand schools in the Education Perfect Languages Video Competition. They had to make a video entitled My Life, and use the target language to create an innovative story that showcased their command of Japanese. The students filmed and commented on their lives in Australia and then sent the video to their sister-school host families in Japan. It was a logistical challenge for the boys to work on this in addition to their normal studies, but they produced a very creative video. For their hard work, we congratulate Ewan Calder, Hao Guo Deng, Henry Gibb, Francis Hor, Samuel Hoy, Henry McRae, Chris Shen and Nirosh Weerasooriya.

IMMERSION PROGRAM

After much planning, the Languages Department was proud to deliver our first Languages Immersion program as part of our Year 9 Chinese, French and Japanese courses. Over three weeks, students' language classes were turned into Geography classes, conducted through their specific language. All learning materials and teacher-led instruction were solely in the target language, creating a challenging and immersive environment.

The students revisited content studied in their Year 7 and 8 Humanities classrooms, only this time exploring themes and solving problems in another language. The boys also touched upon themes in the Year 9 Humanities curriculum in their content crossover. The experience was intentionally challenging and designed to feel like an immersive experience in a foreign country. The boys came to appreciate the skills required to be an effective communicator in a second language.



YEAR 9 EXCURSIONS

To commemorate the end of the Year 9 Chinese course, both classes headed to Northbridge's Chinatown district for an authentic Chinese lunch and character hunt. The boys learnt about the history of the district, reading signs and seeing Chinese language and culture in an authentic urban setting. The boys enjoyed a banquet lunch at Szechuan Hotseat, following by a refreshing bubble tea at Teamorrow.

In the final week of the year, the Year 9 Japanese classes visited the Japanese School in Perth, collaborating with its primary school classes. The boys created their own children's picture books in Term 3 and had the chance to share these directly with the expat students. The outing also had fun icebreakers and breakout conversation groups, allowing cross-cultural learning and intensive language use. The day concluded with a class party and authentic bento boxes.



YEAR 11 AND 12 DINNERS

To commemorate the end of their respective courses of work, the Year 11 and 12 French classes enjoyed an evening of French fine dining. The Year 11s were joined by Year 11 MLC students at Bloody French restaurant in Subiaco, for an enjoyable evening of French language, culture and *gastronomie*. The Year 12s also took part in their final French food experience as Christ Church French students, enjoying traditional homestyle cuisine at P'tite Ardoise Bistro in Perth. The authentic French décor and unique menu items made for an enjoyable and relaxing evening before their final examinations.



LANGUAGES WEEK

Languages Week is a much-anticipated event each year and 2021 certainly did not disappoint, with something for all students and staff. The week began with French theatre and dance workshops for our Year 10 and 11 students as well as kung fu for the Chinese classes. Mark Golding, the Australian Olympic Karate Head Coach for Tokyo 2020, led a workshop with our Year 8 Japanese classes. Activities were not just limited to school hours, with catered foreign movie nights for the Year 8s in the Senior School Staffroom.

Food was a huge highlight, with local food trucks offering French crêpes, as well as Japanese and Chinese street food. The Year 7s had an authentic sushi-rolling masterclass, with Chinese classes attempting to solve traditional Chinese puzzles. Pétanque (boules) was again fiercely competitive among the Year 8 French classes. Finally, we were treated to an incredible performance of the guzheng (Chinese stringed instrument) by a local maestro – one of only a handful in Australia who can play the instrument.



MATHEMATICS

MEGAN WEST / HEAD OF MATHEMATICS

Unlike 2020, this year we ran all competitions, allowing the boys to mix with students from other schools and compare abilities on the State and national stage.

Competition kicked off early with four boys invited to compete in the Australian Mathematical Olympiad (AMO), which took place over two days in February. Each day consisted of working on four questions in four hours. With WA in lockdown for the first week of the school year, Jeremiah Wang and Andy Wu (Year 9) and Joshua Chen and Junjie Chen (Year 11) completed this at home.

Our first team competition was the Year 11 and 12 Have Sum Fun competition in March. The boys performed very well in a tight contest. Teams for the first three places were only decided on the tiebreak with Christ Church finishing fourth and sixth respectively. Year 7 to 10 teams also performed well in their competitions. We finished second in the Year 9 and 10 competition, missing out on first by just one point in the tiebreaker round. The team consisted of Eddie Gao (Year 10), Edward Hadi (Year 9), Minula Salgado (Year 10), Harold Smith (Year 10), Jeremiah Wang (Year 9) and Andy Wu (Year 9). The Year 7 and 8 teams competed at Aranmore College where we finished first and third respectively – an outstanding effort. Our winning team achieved a perfect score of 40 thanks to the efforts of Harry Billingham (Year 8), Flynn Grainger (Year 7), Rowen Segal (Year 8), Leo Sun (Year 8), Caiden Teng (Year 7) and Nathan Wong (Year 7). In third place was the team of Justin Goh (Year 7), Shuai Hao (Year 8), Flynn Holthouse (Year 8), Haoyan Jin (Year 7), Aidan Lim (Year 8) and Daniel Puddey (Year 7).

Twenty-seven boys braved a 6.50am start to attempt the Kangourou sans Frontières (KSF) competition. This online competition was much more challenging in its second year, but our boys still performed very well. They achieved five High Distinctions, nine Distinctions, 10 Credits and three participation certificates. The High Distinction awardees performed in the top three per cent of students across Australia and New Zealand.

The Computational and Algorithmic Thinking (CAT) competition took place in April. One hundred and sixty-seven boys arrived at 6.50am for a 7.00am start. We had another fantastic set of results with three students achieving perfect scores. They were Justin Goh (Year 7), Rowan Segal (Year 8) and Joshua Chen

(Year 11). We achieved 10 High Distinctions, 45 Distinctions, 81 Credits and the remaining received participation awards.

Every April to September, the boys compete in the Mathematics Challenge and Mathematics Enrichment programs, which take place over a four and 16-week period respectively. The boys achieved outstanding results, as the demands of the program are very high and the content is two to three years beyond the School's curriculum. We had nine boys participate in the Junior Challenge and two in the Intermediate. Year 8 student Aidan Lim's perfect score earned him a High Distinction, placing him in the top three per cent in the country. Aidan Tan (Year 8) received a Distinction certificate with an almost perfect score. Liam Chan (Year 8) and Alasdair Marsden (Year 7) also received Distinctions. Aidan also achieved a perfect score in the Gauss competition, aimed at Year 9 and 10 students.

The Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC) occurred in the second week of Term 3. One hundred and ninety-nine boys sat the competition over the course of the day, with the Year 11 and 12 students again braving at 6.50am start. We achieved outstanding results with 11 boys finishing in the top 0.3 per cent of the State. Prizes went to Justin Goh and Haoyan Jin (Year 7); Shuai Hao, William Kempson, Aidan Lim (perfect score) and Rowan Segal (Year 8); Jeremiah Wang and Andy Wu (Year 9); Eddie Gao and Zean Zhang (Year 10); and Joshua Chen (Year 11). The boys also achieved 30 High Distinctions, which placed them in the top three per cent of students in Years 7 to 10 and the top five per cent of students in Years 11 and 12. Eighty-three boys achieved a Distinction, ranking them in top 25 per cent of WA students for Years 7 to 10 and the top 20 per cent for Years 11 and 12. The CCGS boys achieved higher than the State mean across all year groups. Aidan Lim also received a medal for his perfect score.

Not long after the AMC, six students were invited to compete in the Australian Mathematical Olympiad Committee (AMOC) Senior Contest. This is an invitational event in which approximately 120 students across Australia participate. This year a record seven



Christ Church students were invited, with six choosing to compete. These were Junjie Chen (Year 11); Eddie Gao, Harold Smith and Zean Zhang (Year 10); and Jeremiah Wang and Andy Wu (Year 9).

Term 3 saw the return of the ICAS Mathematics competition. Extension students from Years 7 to 10 answered questions through an online platform in a period of one hour. This year, the boys received 10 High Distinctions, ranking them in the top one per cent of Australia. William Kempson and Aidan Lim (Year 8) achieved perfect scores. We also achieved 35 Distinctions and 46 credits, and all students performed higher than the national median. Medals were awarded to Eddie Gao (Year 10), Justin Goh (Year 7), William Kempson (Year 8) and Aidan Lim (Year 8).

Near the end of September, the Australian Intermediate Mathematical Olympiad (AIMO) saw only 1615 students across Australia sit the competition. Fifteen boys competed, our largest number of boys to date, and a huge reflection of their commitment to Mathematics. Aidan Lim (Year 8) achieved the highest score with 30 out of 36. Aidan, along with Eddie Gao (Year 10), Andy Wu (Year 9) and Jeremiah Wang (Year 9) achieved Distinctions. Six boys achieved Credits with Joshua Goh (Year 7) missing out on a Distinction by one point.

We finished the year off with the Western Australian Junior Olympiad (WAJO) competition, which has two rounds. The individual round took place at the School using an online platform, followed by the team event at UWA a few days later. We entered six teams again this year, two each from Years 7 to 9. Our mixed team of one Year 8 and three Year 9 boys came second overall. This team consisted of Aidan Lim (Year 8), Gabriel Haselhurst, Jeremiah Wang and Andy Wu (Year 9). Jeremiah was awarded a prize for coming second in the individual round, and Merit awards went to Justin Goh (Year 7), Kenny Hao (Year 8), Haoyan Jin (Year 7), Aidan Lim (Year 8) and Andy Wu (Year 9).

Jeremiah Wang and Andy Wu received a Special Excellence Award from the Western Australian Mathematics Olympiad Committee for their outstanding competition results.

SCIENCE

BIOLOGY

SHARYN BANA / *TEACHER IN CHARGE*

The Year 7s enjoyed a day at Herdsman Lake studying the ecology of the area. They scooped the lake to study macroinvertebrates and tested the abiotic factors of the lake and nearby drain for comparison. They discussed the changes that had taken place in the ecosystem due to encroaching urbanisation and considered the importance of retaining natural habitats in metropolitan areas. Boys also did a bird walk and found the top predators in the food web, the swamp harriers, and were also introduced to a number of reptiles that inhabit the area.

The Year 11 Biology students visited Bold Park for the first time as part of their course. They carried out line transects and quadrat studies in different areas of bush that had been mostly restored, partially restored or unrestored, in order to compare species type and number in the different habitats. As part of their fieldwork requirement, they also visited the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development – Fisheries. Here they had to determine how numbers of marine species can be counted using technology, such as video for deep sea organisms or artificial seaweed collectors to monitor puerulus levels.

In Science Week, boys were given a demonstration of and information about a variety of predatory birds or raptors by Birds of Prey Perth, which is part of the Raptor Discovery Centre WA. The sheer size of the birds, and especially their talons, was a surprise to many. Boys also undertook the watermelon challenge to see what forces a watermelon could withstand!

CHEMISTRY

MEGAN CAPORN / *TEACHER IN CHARGE*

It has been a DyNAMiTe year in Chemistry! We started the year filming laboratory demonstrations for students who were learning remotely due to COVID-19 restrictions and then welcomed students back into the labs.

Chemistry conducts a high number of practical experiments daily. Countless trays of chemicals and equipment are prepped for classes each week, including liquid nitrogen for making ice-cream, to hydrogen for hydrogen bombs.

A few snapshots:

- Year 6 students experienced the use of lab equipment.
- Year 7 tested methods to separate mixtures.
- Year 8 investigated chemical reactions and tests for gases.
- Year 9 analysed the strength of acids and bases and how to change the rate of a chemical reaction.
- Year 10 carried out unknown salt analysis.
- Year 11 used the ideal gas law, also called the general gas equation, to determine the molar mass of butane gas.
- Year 12 carried out volumetric analysis titrations to determine the acid content of wine.

A team of Year 12 students represented CCGS at the Royal Australian Chemical Institute's Titration Competition at Curtin University. This competition encourages students who enjoy Chemistry, particularly its practical side, to develop their scientific skills and understanding. It provides an opportunity to conduct an experiment in a laboratory environment at a local university and the chance to compete at a national level.

Students across all years took part in the International Chemistry Quiz and a number participated in the Chemistry Olympiad.

This year was unfortunately marred by further disruptions due to COVID-19. The Australian Science Innovations (ASI) Physics Olympiad was carried out online, with preparation sessions for our talented Year 11 students proving to be an interesting collaborative exercise as students discussed and debated appropriate pathways to solutions. Joshua Chen (Year 11) was awarded a High Distinction in both Chemistry and Physics, earning an invitation to participate in the Summer School program held virtually due to COVID-19 restrictions.

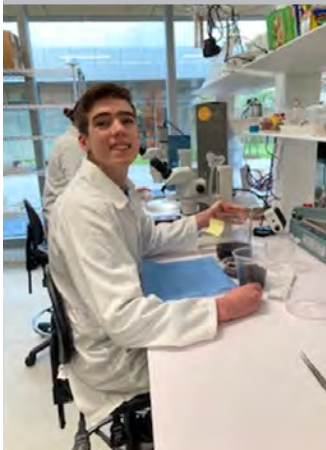

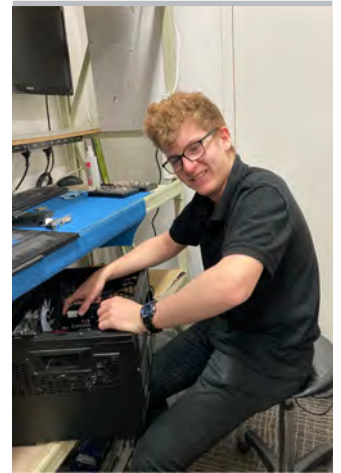

Our musicians performed throughout the year. The Preparatory School Rock Workshop band entertained the crowd at the

Rosemount Hotel in North Perth. Another highlight was the Preparatory School Choir winning the Fremantle Eisteddfod for the first time. Congratulations to Ms Li Liu and the Preparatory School Guzheng Ensemble who took part in the WA Chinese Guzheng Festival at the University of Western Australia for the first time.

CANBERRA EXPERIENCE

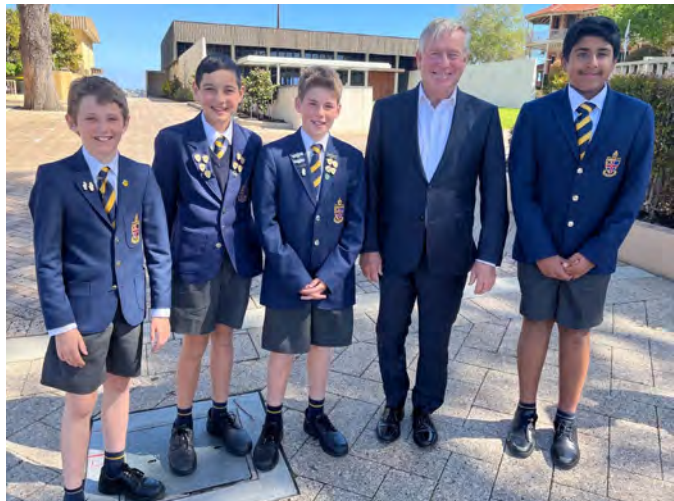
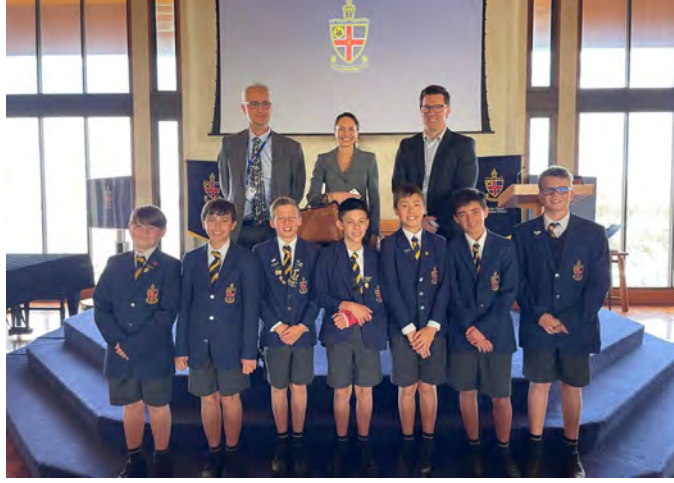
ENDEAVOUR PROJECT

CHINESE LANGUAGE TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION OF WA AWARDS

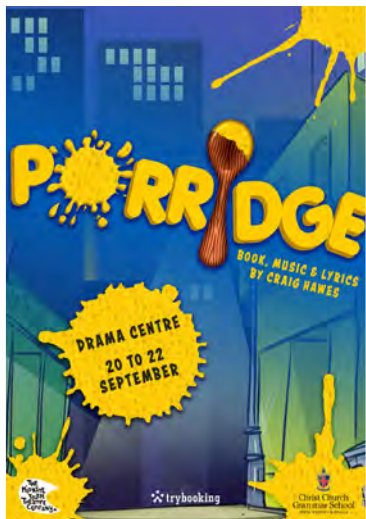

VIVEK VARGHESE / YEAR 6

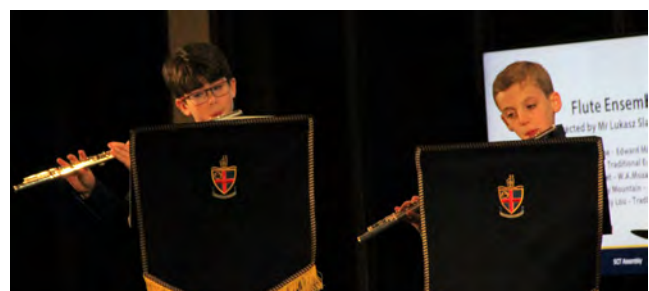

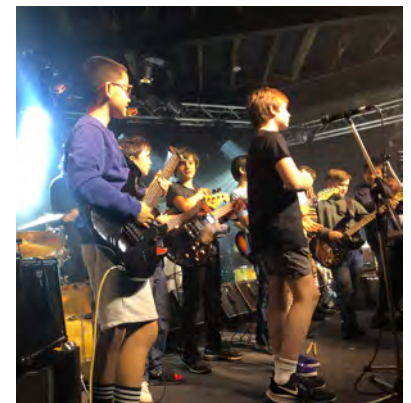
There were many performances throughout the year: Fremantle Eisteddfod, Prep Music

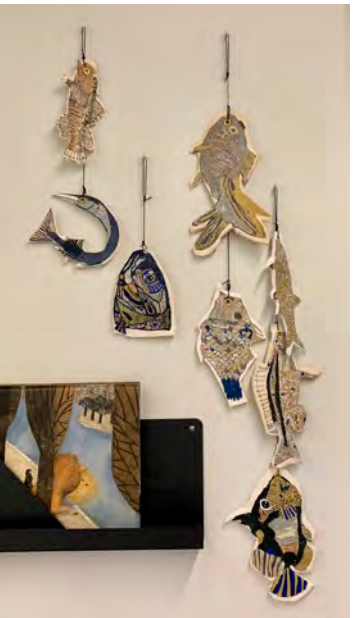
FAIR GAME (YONGA)

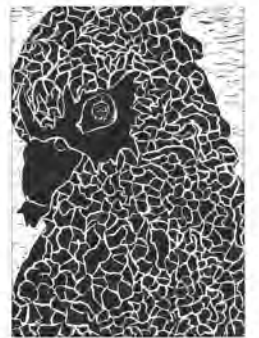

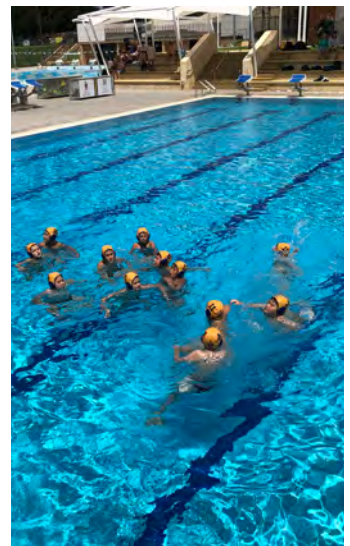

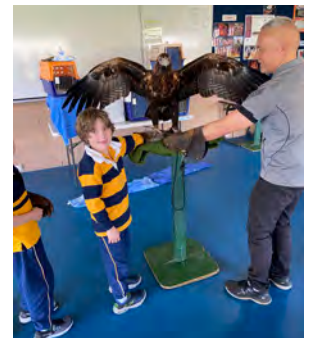

ASHER LEE AND VIHAAN KUMAR

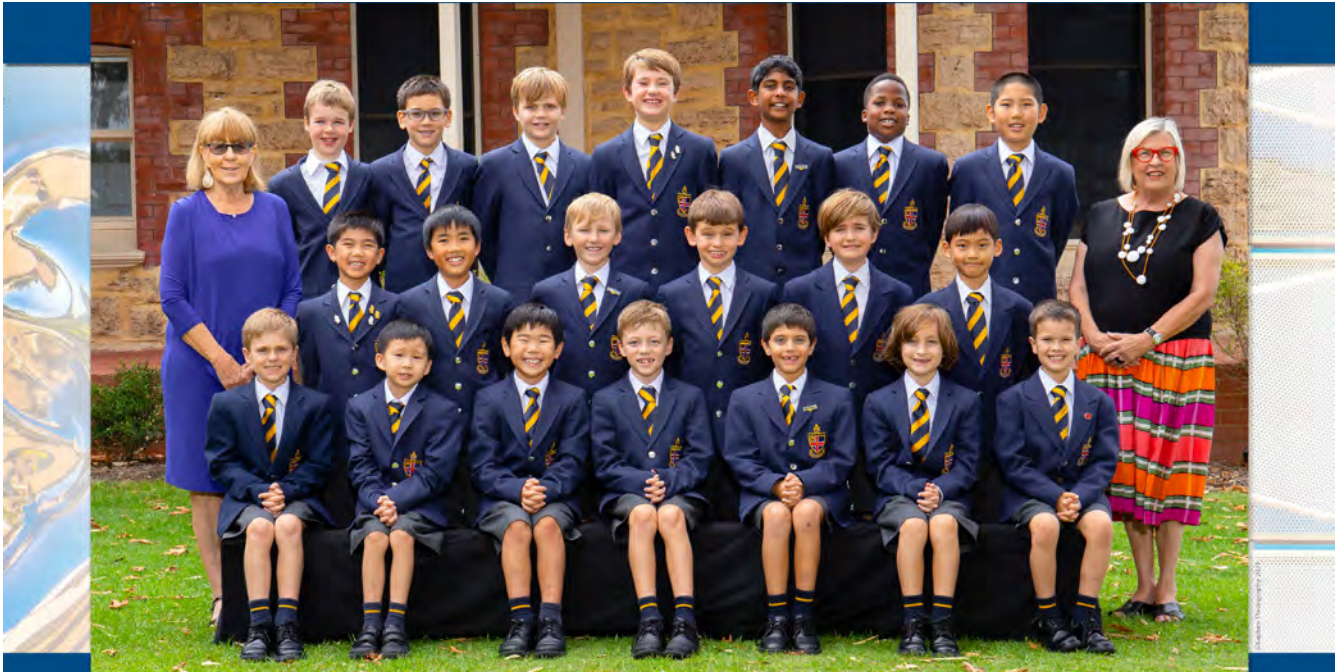

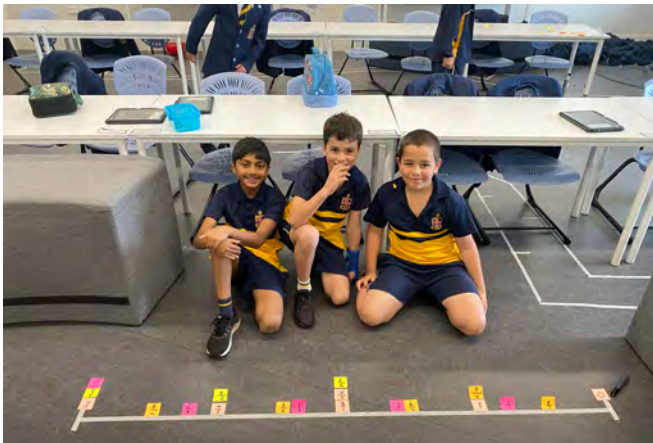

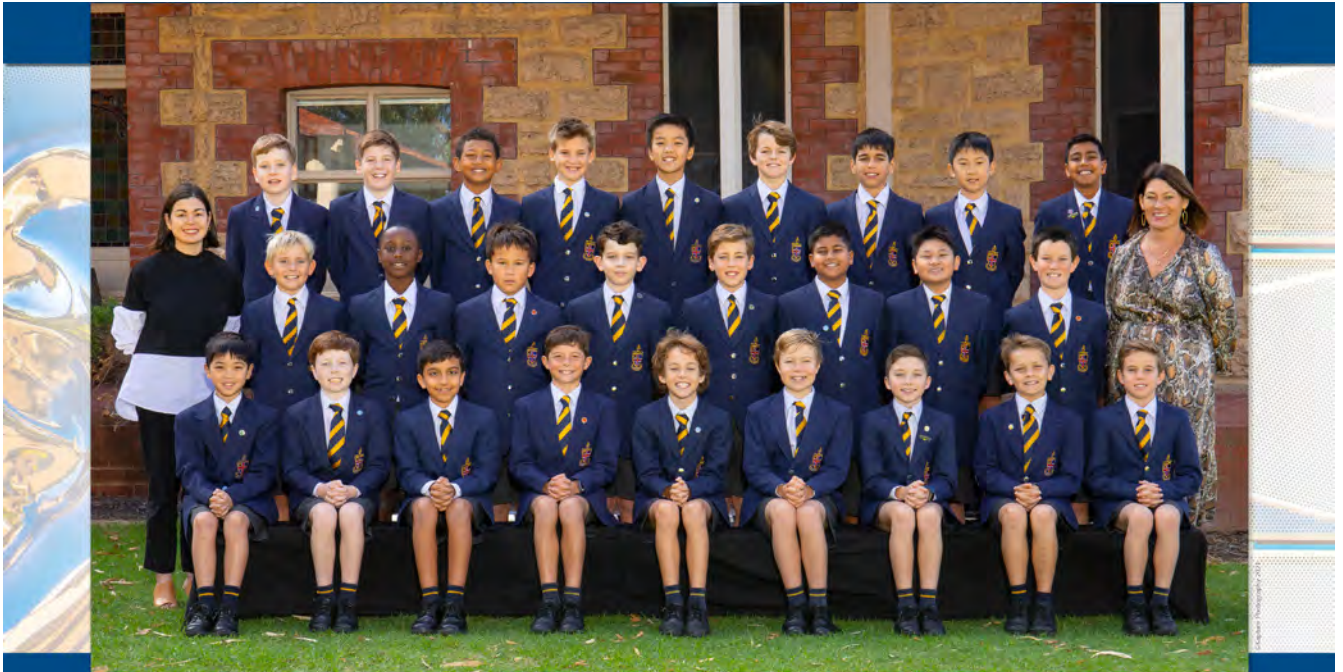

ZAC SHAW

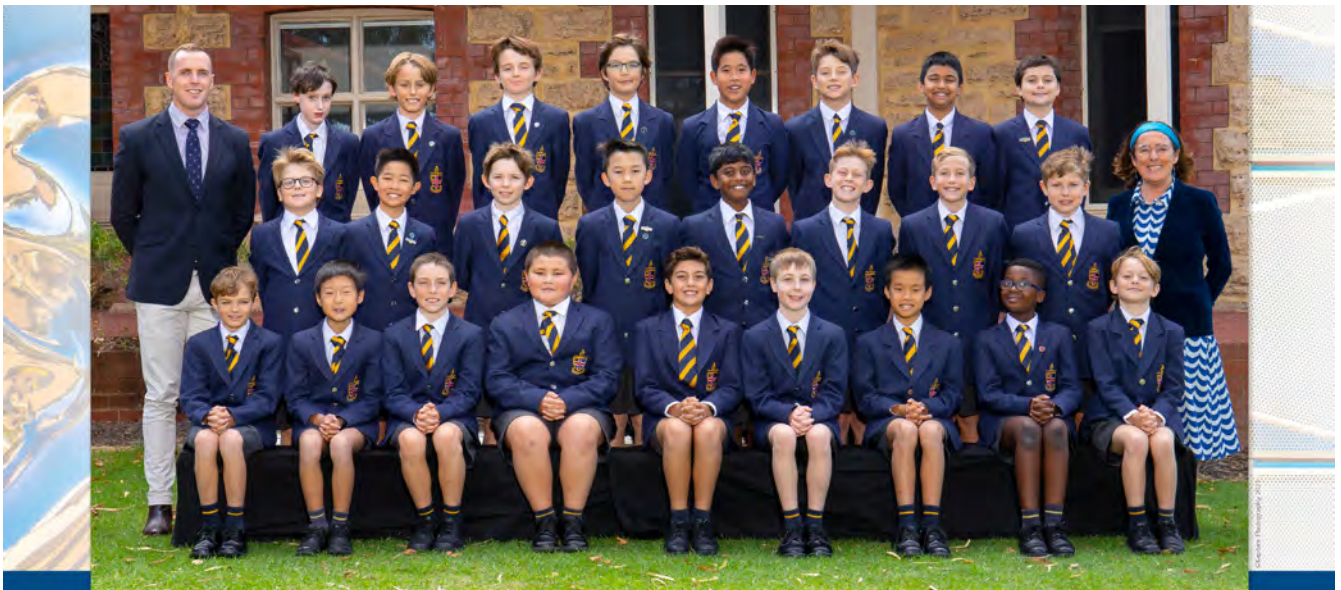
