The 2023 school year was again a remarkably successful one for the Christ Church Grammar School community. During the year, the Senior School PSA titles won included chess, cricket, water polo, badminton, cross country and surfing. The Preparatory School took out the JPSSA Swimming title once more, having done so every year since 2020.

The School continues to provide a rich co-curricular program, one of the best in the country. The offering includes our Year 9 Rites of Passage Program, which has been incredibly successful with targeted, sequential learning experiences focused on relationships, identity and purpose. Since its introduction six years ago, more than 1200 students have participated, and evidence points to an improvement in the health and wellbeing of the students.

Additionally, we will equip students with the skills to navigate the future of work, promoting capabilities of collaboration and problem solving, making and designing, critical thinking and emotional acuity. All that is achieved within the School throughout the year is a reflection of the incredible work of the teaching and support staff. This amazing group of people come to work every day to assist every student achieve his best.

We are progressing our masterplan which involves maintaining our buildings and also considering new spaces – and PERFORM is one such goal for the School. ACADEMIC RESULTS

MAHENDRA VASWANI I DEPUTY PRINCIPAL AND DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

The Class of 2023 has cemented a year of strong performances across the sporting and artistic arenas with an outstanding finish in the academic domain. With 18 students achieving an ATAR of 99 or above, this remarkable effort has been attained in the face of unconditional early university offers. Every statistical metric from this excellent set of results indicates that Christ Church Grammar School is once again the top performing boys' school in Western Australia. These results have been achieved through the efforts of the Year 12 students, the knowledge of their dedicated teachers and the support of their parents and family members. Our non-ATAR students have also achieved huge success and we were delighted to award our Non-ATAR Excellence Award to Mason Beck.

The top ATAR achieved by a Christ Church Grammar School student was 99.90.
Congratulations to Ben Kao, our 2023 Dux of School, who also earnt a General Exhibition.
The Class of 2023 produced: three General Exhibitions; three Subject Exhibitions; 13 Subject Certificates of Excellence; 19 Top Performing courses; 31 subjects with mean scaled scores higher than those of the State; 32 Certificates of Distinction; 39 Certificates of Merit; and 46 per cent of the ATAR students achieving an ATAR of 90 and above.

Special mention must go to Orlando Keleman, who won a General Exhibition, a Subject Exhibition and a Subject Certificate of Excellence in Modern History; and Lachlan Story, who won a General Exhibition as well as a Subject Certificate of Excellence. Our non-ATAR students have also achieved huge success and we were delighted to award our Non-ATAR Excellence Award to Mason Beck.

In 2023, Christ Church Grammar School had 200 Year 12 students, of which 179 students completed studies in an ATAR pathway. Of these:

- 18 students (10% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 99
- 31 students (17% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 98
- 53 students (30% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 95
- 83 students (46% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 90
- 131 students (73% of ATAR candidates) obtained an ATAR greater than or equal to 80
- 195 students (98% of eligible candidates) achieved the WACE
- 26 students achieved a VET qualification

Christ Church was placed in the group of top performing schools in 19 courses (courses with fewer than 10 students are not included):

Accounting and Finance, Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Design, Drama, Economics, Engineering Studies, Geography, Literature, Mathematics Methods, Mathematics Specialist, Modern History, Philosophy and Ethics, Physical Education Studies, Physics, Politics and Law, Psychology and Visual Arts.

The Christ Church Grammar School Army
Cadet Unit (CCGSCU) had yet another
successful training year that began with
the completion of the prerequisite January
promotional courses, and the appointments
of senior positions for the year. Cadet
Under Officers (CUO) George Playford,
Jamie Kafetzis and Samuel Ou were
appointed to each of the three platoons
respectively. Company Headquarters saw
the appointment of Company Sergeant
Major, CDTWO2 Tim Bellamy and Adjutant,
CUO Jonny Hamdorf.

The CCGSCU was deployed on the Recruit Induction weekend after just three weeks of training in Term 1, in which cadets established core skills at the Northam Army Camp alongside the Guildford Grammar School and St Hilda's Anglican School for Girls Cadet Units. The unit continued its support for the Rats of Tobruk Association with a ceremonial detachment for the 82nd anniversary commemorative service on 19 March, the first post COVID-19.

The remainder of Term 1 saw the unit preparing for our Term 2 Field Training Exercise (FTX) learning radio telephone procedure, observation and reconnaissance, navigation and first aid. During the Term 1 holidays, four of our cadets participated in the national Adventure Training Award; the most physically challenging activity a cadet can complete over their career. This year, CDTWO2 Tim Bellamy, CDTSGTs Ben Colvin and Jack Collis, and CDTCPL Beau Day travelled to Lake Barrington in Tasmania, where they completed a mass casualty scenario, mountain biking, abseiling, canyoning, and a hike up Mount Rolland, experiencing harsh winds and sub-zero temperatures. All cadets completed the testing and were awarded the coveted Adventure Training Award Badge.

In June, we once again joined Guildford and St Hilda's out in the field for our Term 2 FTX. The camp gave our cadets the opportunity to put into practice their new skills with realistic casualty scenarios, practical reconnaissance activities and their first navigation exercise. The camp concluded with a friendly inter-school paintball competition.

Over the Term 2 holidays, five of our Year 11s completed their Sergeants and Advanced Instructors course.

Held over eight demanding days at Irwin Barracks and at CCGS, the course qualified them for the rank of Cadet Sergeant (CDTSGT). Following this, eight of our Year 10 cadets went on to complete their Corporals and Instructors course, qualifying them for the rank of Cadet Corporal (CDTCPL). The march-out parade for this course also saw CUO Jonny Hamdorf join the WA Australian Army Cadet Brigade HQ as the Cadet Adjutant.

Our final camp was held in August, again merging with Guildford and St Hilda's in the field for an extended tactical exercise at Guildford's outdoor education facility, Stronghills. We were tasked with locating and gathering intelligence on a fictional opposing force: the Avon Valley Liberation Front. The CCGSCU performed admirably, employing a mixture of patrolling, vehicle checkpoints and observation posts for operational effect.

In the first week of the September holidays, the unit attended the WA Annual Field Exercise. Members of the unit were split up across a number of different courses, learning everything from survival to operating as a patrol medic, and field engineering to advanced navigation. Students participated in large-scale tactical activities spanning multiple days and after a long week of shooting on Bindoon's 25m range, abseiling off the 30m tower and clearing out the 'gophers' truck,' the boys were keen to get home.

Our year culminated in the Principal's Parade, which gave the cadets an excellent opportunity to demonstrate all the skills they had learnt this year. Despite scorching heat, the unit maintained an excellent standard of drill, dress and bearing – a fitting conclusion to the training year and compelling send-off for the Year 12s.

I would like to pass on our thanks from the entire senior leadership group to MAJ (AAC) Conrad Scott, MAJ Duane Nurse, WO1 Mick O'Sullivan, LT (AAC) Digby Gibson and LT (AAC) Alec Barbour, for their experience, guidance and leadership. Their tireless efforts kept the unit running throughout the year. And to all the Christ Church Army Cadets this year: a leader without a team is just a person. The effort and dedication of the unit was critical to its success this year and I wish the best of luck to those that take up leadership positions within the unit in 2024.

CADETS: SURF LIFE SAVING

JASPER HATTON AND HUDSON WHITING / YEAR 11 CADET LEADERS

Once again, Christ Church fielded an enthusiastic, strong group of Year 10 surf lifesaving cadets. From the start, all 57 were eager to build critical first responder skills with the capable support of 22 Year 11 and 12 leaders.

In Term 1, the group headed to the North Cottesloe Surf Life Saving Club (NCSLSC) each Friday to learn aquatic rescue techniques, including board and tube assisted rescues. As the water temperature dropped, the program shifted into learning first aid techniques including DRSABCD, principles of first aid, as well as beach specific procedures including marine envenomation and spinal injury management. Alongside the NCSLSC trainers, Tom Offer (Year 12), Angus Park (Year 12) and Hudson Whiting (Year 11) used their Instructor's certification to assist with the teaching component. Most surf cadets were then assessed over a gruelling weekend in September. Thanks to another mammoth effort led by Ms Alli Gould, as well as NCSLSC volunteers, assessors, parent helpers and the leaders on water safety, the assessment ran smoothly.

Not only did we achieve success on the beach, but we also had an array of other achievements. In December 2022, Jasper Hatton (Year 11) represented NCSLSC at the annual Rise-Up Youth Development Camp for Surf Life Saving Western Australia. Rory Hart (Year 11) has since been selected as the 2023 nominee.

In January, Year 11s Owen Jeffcote, Rory Hart, Jeremiah Wang, Hudson Whiting and Mathew Wong participated in the RSL Cadet of the Year competition, in which Hudson Whiting won the state prize of \$500 in the Community Division.

ENIGMA

INFORMATICS

Informatics (competitive programming) has historically seen great success at CCGS, and the results in 2023 were no exception.

The year saw a strong start with excellent results in the Canadian Computing Competition, with four students, Gabriel Haselhurst (Year 11), Aidan Lim (Year 10), Tom Pickering (Year 12) and Andy Wu (Year 11) achieving a perfect score. This result was consolidated with exceptional results in the Oxford University Computing Challenge, with 11 students achieving a Distinction, including Darius Choo (Year 8) and Nick Hoedemaker (Year 10), who both achieved a perfect score.

A strong performance from Nick Hoedemaker, Aidan Lim and Oscar Narvaez (Year 10) saw their team take first place in the Lockheed Martin Code Quest, taking out other teams from all over Australia, New Zealand and Singapore in an extremely competitive field. Justin Goh (Year 9), Carlos Jin (Year 9) and Andy Wu were invited to attend the Informatics Team Selection School in April. Andy Wu was then selected as the reserve for the Australian team for the International Olympiad in Informatics (IOI).

Christ Church teams saw great success in the annual ProgComp, a team competition organised by the University of NSW, with three teams achieving a Distinction or higher. Our team, consisting of Gabriel Haselhurst, James Renouf (Year 11) and Andy Wu placed third overall, qualifying for the grand final held in Sydney. After an extremely competitive final, we placed third again, bringing back a prize of \$1200.

The Australian Informatics Olympiad, held in August, is the most significant Australian Informatics competition of the year, as it forms the first step in selection for the IOI. CCGS continued its excellent results from last year,

with Justin Goh, Carlos Jin, Aidan Lim and Kenny Hao (Year 10) all placing within the top 10 per cent of their age groups, achieving a gold award.

Andy Wu also achieved an honorary Green Blazer as recognition of his selection in the Australian Informatics Olympiad team.

I would like to thank Mr Jan Honnens for his efforts in tirelessly co-ordinating the Informatics program, and for giving up his lunchtimes to run the Informatics Club. With promising students in the younger years, Informatics at CCGS will continue to flourish in the years to come.

MOCK TRIALS

Participating in the WA Law Society's Mock Trial Competition is no ordinary feat. It requires a combination of legal acumen, critical thinking, and persuasive communication skills, as well as teamwork. The CCGS Mock Trials season eagerly sought to build upon the successes achieved by our 2022 teams. A robust influx of new talent into the program enabled us to field three strong teams.

Round 1 concerned a vandal who (allegedly) intentionally damaged a purple raven mural, by spray painting a large white phallic symbol over it. Miss Alex Molotov, a jealous 20-year-old artist, was the accused. Led by Vice-Captain Sam Singleton (Year 12), Team 'Judge, Judy and Executioner' was able to win its first case. Team 'Kappa Sigma Alpha' was also able to come away with a win, beating a historically dominant St Mary's team.

Round 2 was centred on the game of quidditch and whether the accused, Lucas Sinclair, caused bodily harm to victim, Mike Wheeler, during the quidditch game in a UWA social league. Each team faced tough cross-examinations, rigorous questioning by opposing barristers, and the watchful eyes of the discerning judges. During a short adjournment, teams are provided with the opportunity to refine their closing arguments, pool the evidence together to strengthen their case, and close strongly. This round was another strong one for Christ Church as Team 'The Usual Suspects' and Team Kappa Sigma Alpha were both victorious.

The final round was a civil case in which Jacob Black accused the defendant, Edward Cullen, of nuisance. Mr Black, a dog breeder and the neighbour of Mr Cullen, claimed that one of his dogs had a miscarriage because of strobe lights, smoke machines and loud music emanating from Mr Cullen's backyard during parties, alleging deliberate interference.

To add to the complexity of the case, Mr Cullen asserted a counterclaim regarding nuisance because of the dog breeding next door. Congratulations to Team Kappa Sigma Alpha who remained undefeated throughout the season. Despite this, due to the large number of teams, only the top 16 progressed to the finals. This ended the CCGS Mock Trials season, however, the Year 12s and Committee are leaving the cohort in very capable hands with talented Year 11 advocates coming through the ranks.

Scholarships such as the Old Boys' Association Scholarship, the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Scholarship, the Bursary and Scholarship Fund and the Students' Scholarship are key factors in diversifying the School's community and allow the School to be accessible to all boys, regardless of their situation.

Locally, we participated in food drives for Mana Pono Holomua, a charitable organisation which supports the homeless, ran distances for the Preparatory School's Lapathon and painted murals for our annual NAIDOC Week celebrations.

Boys in Year 11 supported the Anglican community with their overnight stay at Optus Stadium where they lived as if they were homeless for a night. This will remain a core memory for those who participated.

A series of donor events took place, such as the Thank You Sundowners and the Mitre Society NAIDOC Week lunch in July. These allowed boys to connect with those who are supporting and funding their school life.

This year the Preparatory School led the charge, raising an outstanding \$23 323 in its Camp Quality Lapathon event, with the Senior School following suit with a Leukaemia Foundation World's Greatest Shave, which raised over \$6000. Another charity event took place during National Boarding Week to raise money for the Royal Flying Doctors. It included a mechanical bull on which the boys were set a difficult challenge to test their rodeo skills and in which \$400 was raised.



Three sausage sizzles took place during the year, the first for UNICEF to support earthquake victims in Syria and Türkiye. A new sausage sizzle record of \$2000 was achieved. In August, we organised a sausage sizzle in honour of Fergus Egerton-Warburton, a Year 11 Noake boy who fought cancer this year, with \$1500 raised to support brain cancer research and treatment for children across Australia. We found joy in singing common English nursery rhymes, using music and hand gestures as a universal language to bridge cultural gaps. Additionally, we facilitated hands-on experiences, such as crafting kites with the children's names, providing a tangible reminder of our shared endeavours as well as creating a fun way for the children to learn to read and write.

The CCF learning program, structured with three periods in the morning and three in the evening, offered a unique schedule. The extended break in the middle of the day became an opportunity for us to connect with the children in the community. Many would be climbing on us and begging for a piggy-back ride. Towards the final few lunch breaks, we either enjoyed some cool air-con in the library or used the rooftop basketball court. Whether through organised play or spontaneous activities, these moments strengthened the bonds forged during our stay that we will forever cherish.

Nights were dedicated to cultural immersion as we delved into learning two Khmer traditional dances. The commitment to mastering these dances demonstrated our appreciation for the local culture and the significance of preserving traditional art forms. The service trip ended with a performance for a large audience filled with teachers and students, as well as CCF founder Scott Neeson, on the eve of our departure.

This shared experience served as a poignant farewell, symbolising the cultural exchange that defined our time in Cambodia. These 12 days, filled with seemingly endless activities, were captured in our nightly group journal sessions.

Weekends saw our teachers and peers visit Toul Sleng and the Killing Fields, which widened our thinking of Khmer culture and left us all with immense gratitude for what we have. Furthermore, we travelled by bikes around the Mekong River, went on a boat ride around the capital, and even visited the Central and Russian markets, where much bargaining and bartering took place.

We wholeheartedly recommend this experience to anyone who is able to apply. The opportunity to contribute to the education and wellbeing of less fortunate children, combined with the rich cultural exchange, is truly unparalleled.

Finally, after three years of an interrupted program, we had the full complement of six activities back for 2023.

It turned out to be a huge year for Craigie House, who won four of the six events with 41.5 points – the largest total in the past 25 years. Jupp House, who came second with 36.5 points, would have won the cup in any other year!

Romsey continued to dominate in the swimming pool, with a comfortable victory by 100 points from Wolsey in the House Swimming Competition at HBF Stadium in Term 1. This event is always a great spectacle of House involvement, with close to 80 per cent of all boys swimming in at least one event on the night. Records were also set by our elite swimmers, with Sam Hicks (Year 10) from Hill House breaking the Under 16 Backstroke record by almost one second.

Early in Term 2, Craigie won the House Cross Country event at Kings Park, with first place in the Year 7 and 8 events, and second in Year 9. Jupp were a close second after winning the Year 9 and combined Year 10 to 12 events, just one point behind Craigie in total points scored.

The House Teams Carnival in Term 2 is always a highlight. Almost all boys are involved in their chosen sport, with seven games played against all other Houses over two-and-a-half hours. It was wonderful to see four of the eight Houses win different sports, with Craigie and Hill sharing the cup for the event. Wolsey won the football and frisbee to also have a good afternoon and finish third.

At the end of Term 2 we wrapped up the House Arts Competition after three rounds, semi-finals and grand finals. Jupp was victorious in Chess and Queenslea won the very competitive eSports. Craigie was dominant in Public Speaking, winning both the junior and senior events as well as the Arts Cup for 2023.

Congratulations to the swim team for an amazing season.



The future of Christ Church Athletics is bright and, as we enter 2024, the Athletics program will look to pursue the Alcock Shield for the first time in the School's history.





The 2023 rugby season for the First XV started off slowly, with the boys only managing to create one senior team.


Despite this, the team consisted of some great talent and the boys worked hard in the pre-season to prepare for the first round against Aquinas.

We celebrated yet another successful NAIDOC Week with the art exhibition and dance. We collaborated with Blank Walls, Perth and London-based mural creators, and invited old boy Irwin Lewis to help us create a mural for outside the canteen.

The process started with brainstorming ideas about how we could link the mural to the area in which the murals would be situated. The idea was to create murals around bush tucker, hunting and different native food sources. We designed four different murals around the themes of saltwater, freshwater, waterholes and land, to ultimately form one body of work.

Each boy was assigned a mural and had to paint an animal associated with the theme. Once painted, we incorporated animal tracks and tools that might be used to hunt them. Finally, we painted the colours on the murals and tried to make each mural flow into the next to form one body of work.

We invited Dylan Shillito, a Wadjak Ballardong Noongar man, to once again teach us Noongar dance. We really enjoyed learning about each dance and practising the different movements. We then performed the dances learnt at the NAIDOC Week Assembly and all the boys were extremely proud of their performance. Keiyon Billy (Year 8) then demonstrated and explained some of the dance moves to the Kindergarten to Year 2 students.

We are looking forward to celebrating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and histories next year.



2023 was another enjoyable year in the Computer Science Department with boys having the opportunity to participate in plenty of fun and engaging projects. Highlights included creating a suburban scene and writing a Choose Your Own Adventure story using Python, creating database driven websites, exploring how to protect your device from other people accessing your data, and techniques for penetration testing of a network.

This year saw the introduction of a new Year 11 ATAR syllabus, which was well received by the students. The new syllabus has a much greater focus on the analysis and application of key Computer Science concepts, making for a challenging yet enjoyable course. The inclusion of open-ended projects, in which students are given the freedom to design their own software systems, allows for an in-depth exploration of the relevant programming and database development skills, and the ability to apply those skills in a context of their choosing.

The Year 10 Ethical Hacking class competed in the annual CyberTaipan competition, in which teams were required to set up virtual computers and secure them against external threats to prevent hackers from gaining access. Once again this was an enjoyable learning experience for the boys, with the team of Luca Campitelli, Darcy Finch, Jamie Thom and Zachary Tay achieving a score that placed them in the top five teams for the second round.

CYBERTAIPAN

DARCY FINCH / PARTICIPANT

The CyberTaipan training exercise, hosted by the USA Air Force, is a 'blue team' experience. The term, blue team, refers to the group responsible for protecting an organisation against simulated or real-world attacks. Teams aim to prepare a computer's defences in the face of an oncoming attack. They must fix vulnerabilities over a four-hour period and are awarded points for each vulnerability they discover and fix. The goal is to qualify for the national competition, by ranking in the top 20 teams nationally. After two challenging and arduous rounds, with teams aiming to be as close as possible to the 200 point maximum, the CCGS team placed third in the second round.

CO2 DRAGSTERS

The CO2 Dragster Competition is an engaging and educational STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) activity that challenges students to design, build and race small-scale dragster cars powered by carbon dioxide (CO2) cartridges. Students have to apply principles of physics, aerodynamics and engineering to create streamlined, aerodynamic cars capable of reaching high speeds on a straight track. They design their dragsters using various materials, considering factors such as weight distribution, shape and friction to optimise performance. The excitement peaks when students race their CO2-powered creations against each other to determine which design is the fastest. This year, several Year 9 students won awards in the state competition and then progressed to the national finals:

SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING CHALLENGE

The Science and Engineering Challenge is an interactive and competitive event designed to inspire and engage students in the fields of STEM. Organised as a series of hands-on activities and challenges, the event encourages participants to apply scientific principles and engineering concepts to solve real-world problems. Students collaborate in teams to design and build solutions for tasks ranging from constructing bridges and creating water rockets, to solving complex mathematical problems. It also encourages students to envision exciting possibilities for their future careers in these fields. This year, we sent a mixed Year 9 and 10 team of 32 students to compete in the challenge. While they experienced great success, finishing third in the State, they narrowly missed out an invitation to the national competition.

LANGUAGES

VINKO SHAIN / HEAD OF LANGUAGES

LINGUISTICS OLYMPIAD SUCCESS

This year, 28 students participated in the state round of the Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad. Two Christ Church teams achieved the highest honours in their respective categories. The Year 11 team, of Aaron Goh, Ben Rippey, Jeremiah Wang and Andy Wu, claimed first place in the senior category. The Year 10 team, of Kenny Hao, Magnus Myles, Narendran Reddy and Lucas Zhang, achieved first place in the junior category. These boys earned the right to represent Western Australia at the national round held at UWA, competing against teams from other states around the country.

LANGUAGE COMPETITIONS

Years 7 to 10 Chinese classes continued their success in the various Chinese Language Teachers' Association of WA competitions. Three noteworthy performances earned accolades in their respective categories: Aaryan Lathia (Year 7 First Prize – Speaking Competition), Matthew Luo (Year 8 Excellence Award – Writing Competition) and Luca Campitelli (Year 10 Excellence Award – Writing Competition).

Students in Year 11 and 12 French participated in the Alliance Française Examinations. David Esterhuysen (Year 11) achieved an overall written examination mark of 70 out of 80, earning him the opportunity to sit an invite-only speaking examination at the state headquarters in Nedlands. After impressive submissions, Ethan Koekemoer (Year 7) and Ethan Di Martino (Year 9) earned the chance to participate in the Alliance Française Poem Recitation final, reciting "L'oiseau du Colorado" and "Les sources de la nuit" respectively.

Year 9 Japanese students took part in a school-based haiku competition, attempting a style of Japanese poem, based on the topic of winter, and limited to 17 syllables over a three-line structure (five-seven-five). Stephan Shen, Michael Vun and Jared Yek were the eventual winners and showcased their linguistic aptitude and imaginative sides to create some vivid imagery through language.

THE GROWTH OF LANGUAGE ENRICHMENT

Following the success of the Chinese Enrichment Workshop launched last year, 2023 saw a significant increase in enrolments from background and non-background learners of the language. Sessions continued to be an age-appropriate learning experience in which students were challenged to use the Chinese language as a means of communicating and problem solving. Students had the opportunity to work through personal projects pitched at an advanced level of Chinese, showcasing their talents. Callum Chesson, Matthew Luo and Riki Rhee were also recognised for their efforts in the Hanyu Shuiping Kaoshi (HSK), or Chinese Proficiency Test, earning themselves globally recognised certificates.











LANGUAGES

BQD LANGUAGE IMMERSION EXCHANGES

The pandemic brought a temporary halt to our overseas exchange program Beyond Queenslea Drive (BQD). However, 2023 saw the program re-start in an overwhelmingly positive way. Four Year 10 French students (Christopher Berg, Michael de Sousa, Tommy Greenshields and George Moore) attended Saint-Jean et La Croix in Saint-Quentin, northern France, and following this, hosted exchange students during their immersion at Christ Church. Ewan Calder and Chris Shen (Year 10) also took part in the program, attending Hotoku Gakuen in Japan during Term 2. The boys then hosted their Japanese host brothers at Christ Church in Term 3 to complete the reciprocal exchange experience.

LANGUAGES WEEK

Languages Week once again had an array of activities within and outside of the classroom. A bubble tea stand brought by Claremont's own Machi Machi was a hit to kick off the week of culinary activities. Year 7 French classes made authentic crêpes while the Year 9 French students were immersed in a cheese raclette masterclass. Year 9 and Year 11 French classes also explored their language through film with excursions to the Alliance Française French Film Festival at both Windsor Cinema and Luna on SX. The Year 8 Foreign Film Festival was another hit during the week, with around 100 students coming to view films in Chinese, French and Japanese.

The Year 9 and 10 Chinese classes went to Northbridge to experience the authentic Chinese culture that Perth has on offer, making dumplings and enjoying a banquet of Chinese cuisine and cooling off with some refreshing bubble tea. Around 50 Year 9 and 10 students across all languages took part in the annual Languages Quiz at Methodist Ladies' College (MLC), enjoying some delicious treats in a competitive forum. Another highlight of the week included six of our most dedicated Year 11 language students coming in at lunchtime to teach some introductory language classes to the Senior School staff. Callum Chin and Jeremiah Wang (Japanese), Kai Mahalingham and Riki Rhee (Chinese) and Cy Lendich and Noah Rucklidge (French) treated their teachers to some survival phrases and ran some interactive activities in the various challenging elements in each language.

AUTHENTIC DINING EXPERIENCES

The Year 11 French class was treated to a night of authentic fine dining with the students from MLC at La Bastide in Shenton Park. They enjoyed an array of authentic delicacies while participating in quizzes and challenges in French language and culture. The Year 12 French students were also joined by the MLC students for a premiere culinary experience at Madeleine in Highgate. After their Semester 2 examinations, the Year 11 Japanese students finished their year with an authentic izakaya dining experience at Furaibo in Perth city.

MATHEMATICS

TAYLOR PERVAN / HEAD OF MATHEMATICS

This year, Christ Church Grammar School competed in a number of Mathematics competitions, achieving many outstanding results.

In Term 1, selected students took part in the Kangourou sans Frontieres competition. With over six million participants each year, this is considered the largest Mathematics competition in the world. The following students received a High Distinction, placing them in the top three per cent of Australian participants for their division:

This was run on Friday nights at Hale School, Churchlands Senior High School and Trinity College. The boys performed very well across the board. Congratulations to the combined Years 9 and 10 team consisting of Kenny Hao, Carlos Jin, Will Kempson, Caden Teng, Nathan Wong and Emmanuel Yuen. Well done, boys.

The Australian Mathematical Olympiad (AMO) is an invitational competition with approximately 200 students from Australia and New Zealand selected to participate. This year, we congratulate Carlos Jin (Year 9), Aidan Lim and Andy Wu (Year 11) who were selected to take part in this prestigious competition, run for eight hours over two days. Andy achieved a Gold Award, placing him in the top 10 per cent of students in this competition and Aidan received a Bronze Award, placing him in the top 50 per cent.

The Computational and Algorithmic
Thinking competition gives the students the opportunity to develop their problem-solving skills through algorithmic thinking. Selected students took part in this competition early in Term 2, and we congratulate the following for receiving a High Distinction, placing them in the top two per cent of their division:

The Australian Mathematics Competition is Australia's longest running, largest and most well-known competition for students. In Term 3, students were given the opportunity to participate. This year Christ Church entered three Year 8 teams and one Year 9 team. The competition was very tough, and overall, the boys put in an amazing effort, representing CCGS with pride. Congratulations to Carlos Jin (Year 9) who came in overall third place for the individual event with a score of 38 out of 40. Well done to Inura Kondasinghe (Year 8) and Justin Goh (Year 9) who received Merit Awards. In the team event, our Year 9 team consisting of Justin Goh, Carlos Jin, Nathan Wong and Oliver Wright came in second place, only narrowly missing out on winning to a very talented Perth Modern team.

At the conclusion of this event, two very special announcements were made for contributions to Mathematics competitions throughout the year. Carlos Jin (Year 9) was one of three students from Western Australia to be selected to participate in the School of Excellence, a program that recognises exceptional mathematicians with the possibility of being chosen to represent Australia in the International Mathematics Olympiad. Andy Wu (Year 11) achieved the Phill Schultz prize for best overall mathematician in the Australian Mathematics Trust's Enrichment Program, achieving Gold in the AMO and Bronze in the Senior Mathematics Contest.

I would like to thank all students involved for the hard work and dedication shown this year. Finally, a huge thank you to the Mathematics Department for enthusiastically assisting the boys and ensuring the smooth running of these competitions.

BIOLOGY


SHARYN BANA / HEAD OF BIOLOGY

Our enthusiastic Year 10 Marine and Environment students embraced the opportunity to obtain their SCUBA certificates, immersing themselves in the underwater world and gaining valuable insights into marine life. They also undertook a project to assess the amount and type of rubbish that CCGS discards. This involved sampling the School's bins and calculating the general waste produced and how much of this could be recycled.

This course serves as a natural progression from the foundational themes of biotic and abiotic factors introduced in Year 7 Biology. The practical application was evident in the fieldwork conducted at Herdsmen Lake and continued with an ecology project at the Rowing Boat Shed, providing students with first-hand experience.

Year 11 Biology students conducted quadrat and line transect sampling in Dwellingup, comparing and contrasting fire ecology in different areas. Showing their commitment to hands-on learning, students also had the opportunity to humanely trap a chuditch (Western quoll), which was weighed, measured and then released.

Our annual Science Week continued to be a highlight. The Critters Up Close demonstration was a particular delight, especially for the Japanese exchange students, as it allowed students to touch a variety of snakes, lizards and birds of prey after hearing about the abiotic and biotic factors that impacted them.







CHEMISTRY

The Bunsen burners emitted a radiant glow in the vibrant Chemistry laboratories this year, where students from Years 7 to 12 eagerly explored chemicals displaying a varied array of properties.

The ever-anticipated 'pop test' made its customary appearance across the middle years, but students also revelled in the vivid and colourful spectacle of flame tests and delved into the captivating world of pH indicators.

A whopping 191 students participated in the International Chemistry Quiz and a select group of accomplished senior students boldly embraced the challenges presented in the Chemistry Olympiad.

The Year 12 students welcomed the use of pipettes and burettes during their exploration of volumetric analysis. Six teams of three actively participated in the National Titration Competition, with two of those teams adeptly showcasing their skills in the national final.

MARINE AND MARITIME STUDIES

SCOTT CHRYSTAL / TEACHER IN CHARGE

The Marine and Maritime Studies program covers a range of engaging subjects, including oceanography, diving, boating, environment and resource management, and history and archaeology. This diverse curriculum ensures students are exposed to various facets of the marine industry.

One of the goals of the program is to immerse students in real-life industries, providing hands-on experiences and exposure to diverse fields. It also aims to inspire the next generation of marine enthusiasts and professionals.

Highlights this year included:

- Conducting investigations on the differences in abiotic and biotic factors around Rottnest Island.
- Undertaking a longitudinal study on the changing coastal morphology of Cottesloe Beach.

- Using nautical charts to navigate the intricate waterways of the Swan River, thereby demonstrating proficiency in practical maritime skills.
- Successfully completing the Stage A
 Freediving Course. They learnt safe dive techniques and received specialised breath hold training from trained professionals.
- Employing chemical methods to excavate shipwreck artefacts in the laboratory.
- · Hand-building fibreglass fishing rods.

PHYSICS




CHESS










DRAMA


My favourite project was the coding, making our MakeCode Arcade games, because we could choose anything we wanted. I based my game off Pac-Man with the ghost as the enemy.

YEAR 6 PARTICIPANTS




CRICKET



WATER POLO


OLIVER SWANN / YEAR 6

HAYDEN YOON


I like playing with ice and playing with trains with Triston, eating, playing with the Thomas trains. Silkworms can be brown and can be white.
